# DEVINE HAS RIGS ON GROUND AT MERCURY FOR WHITE RANCHES

## TWO NEW WELLS WAIT ON SMILE OF WEATHER MAN

C. A. Devine arrived Wednesday afternoon from Fort Worth to complete arrangements for the drilling of the two wells on the White ranches, contracted by Cunningham & Devine. Mr. Devine reports five carloads of rig material unloaded at Mercury and awaiting on favorable weather and passable roads to be hauled out to the drilling locations. The material includes everything necessary to build the two standard rigs for Cunningham & Devine, one of which will be erected on the W. N. White ranch 14 miles north of Brady, and the other on the G. R. and W. N. White ranch 15 miles northeast of Brady. The first-named, to be known as the Helen, will be located on Survey No. 2, and will be drilled to a contract depth of 3500 ft.; the second, to be known as the Marie, will be located on Survey No. 19, and will be drilled to a contract depth of 2500 ft. Mr. Devine has contracted with T. H. Laird of Melvin for the hauling out of the rig material, and Contractor A. L. Jones of Coleman is holding his rig-building crews in readiness to begin work as soon as enough material is assembled to enable him to get a start. The tools have also been purchased and are now enroute, and the entire equipment for both new tests will be in readiness for immediate beginning of operations by the time the rigs are completed.

**Death of Alvin Beasley.** After a lingering illness, Alvin Beasley passed away at the local sanitarium last Friday night. The remains were shipped to Mercury Saturday night for burial, the local Woodmen lodge taking charge of the remains and acting as funeral escort to the union depot.

Alvin Beasley was the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Beasley of Mercury, and was well known and highly esteemed by the citizens of his home town and McCulloch county. During the past winter he had been at Post City with his parents working on some of the big ranches. While there he became ill and underwent an operation for bladder trouble, without securing relief. Upon the family's return to McCulloch county a couple months ago, the young man was placed in the local sanitarium in the hopes of securing relief, but it soon became apparent that nothing could be done for him, and that the end was merely a question of time.

The sympathy of all is extended to the bereaved parents and relatives. As Man to Man. ## WET WEATHER UNDERMINES FOUNDATIONS OF BRADY COURT HOUSE

For a year or more each succeeding grand jury has made complaint of the condition of the McCulloch county courthouse, and has recommended that the broken and fallen plaster on the walls and ceiling be replaced, as well as calling attention to other needed work. The commissioners court, in session this week, gave careful consideration to these complaints, admitting many of them to be just, and determined to do what they could towards the remedying of the trouble. In view of the low ebb of the county's finances, and the great expense attached to the tick eradication work, the court was unable to meet the requests for improvement or repairs, however much they might have wished to do so.

A careful examination of the courthouse the commissioners found that the building showed great cracks, reaching almost from the foundation to the roof, which condition would have to be remedied before re-plastering would be at all feasible. The excessive rains have doubtless undermined the foundation of the courthouse, causing the building to settle. The courthouse was erected in 1899—just 20 years ago, and has withstood equatorial heat, north pole freezes, hurricane windstorms and window-shattering hail storms—but torrential rains was something that West Texas builders had not calculated on, and the courthouse foundation evidently now seems to be seeking rock bottom.

## TO INAUGURATE HEALTH CRUSADE IN CO. SCHOOLS

One of the most interesting of the meetings during the Teachers' Institute the past week, was held Wednesday afternoon at the Methodist tabernacle at which the Health Crusade and First Aid work inaugurated by the Junior Red Cross in the McCulloch county schools the past session was discussed. There was a full attendance of the McCulloch county teachers, and many teachers from the other counties in attendance upon the institute also attended the meeting.

Mrs. W. H. Ballou, county chairman of the Junior Red Cross, explained the "Peace Time Program," reviewing the work accomplished in those McCulloch county schools which took up the Health Crusade and First Aid work the past year, and suggested that all the schools of the county join in and take up this work with the beginning of school.

Mrs. Ballou's address was well received, and Dr. L. W. Sackett of the University Department of Education at Austin, added his endorsement to this great work, giving instances of the splendid results obtained and which had come under his personal observation. Superintendent Leonard Passmore of Voca, and Mrs. O. E. Rice, First Aid instructor, of Rochelle, told of the excellent work accomplished in McCulloch county, and Superintendent R. C. Patterson of the Rochelle schools, told of what excellent work he had seen done in other counties. In fact, all schools which had had the First Aid work, as well as those who had seen the results, were eager to have the work again. Many of the teachers from other counties also grew enthusiastic over the work and requested Mrs. Ballou to help them get organized.

As a result, it was decided to put on a county-wide Health Crusade in the schools, and Superintendent Boyd Commander of Lohn was elected director of all Health work. Superintendent M. E. Abernathy of the Harkrider school at Nine was appointed director of Junior membership. The Juniors are enthusiastic over the work, and feel sure of success providing sufficient finances are raised to enable them to provide the prescribed instructions in the schools of the county. In view of the importance of the work, it is felt that the citizenship of the county will assure ample funds to carry the work to a successful conclusion.

## DEALERS IN FISH, OYSTERS, ETC., MUST SECURE LICENSE FROM STATE GAME COMMISSION

Secretary T. P. Grant of the Brady Chamber of Commerce, in receipt of advice from W. G. Sternett, game, fish and oyster commissioner, that on October 22nd the new fish and oyster laws will go into effect, and that all persons, firms or corporations engaged in buying and selling fish, oysters and other marine products will be required to secure a license from that department.

Mr. Grant has personally notified all local meat dealers, restaurants and other parties who might engage in the handling of these products, of the new law, and has also sent the names of all such dealers to the commissioner of game, fish and oysters.

## REGULATIONS OF FISH, OYSTERS, ETC., SET FORTH

Austin, Texas, Oct. 14.—The 1919 state legislature made a number of changes in the laws regulating the taking of fish and oysters from Texas waters.

A digest of a statement issued by the fish, game and oyster commission shows the following salient features:

Any person engaged in buying or selling fish, oysters, shrimp, turtles, or other water product must pay a license of \$10 and a tax of \$1 per one thousand pounds of fish and one cent per barrel of oysters. Only citizens of the United States may secure this license.

The new law bases the size of fish to be sold upon length instead of weight, the following standards being set: Red fish over twenty-seven or under twelve inches. Red fish, it is said, do not begin breeding until they reach near the maximum set. Trout, minimum twelve inches; sheephead, minimum, nine inches; flounder 12 inches; pompano, nine; Spanish mackerel, four inches.

Seines, fifteen hundred feet long and with mesh not less than one one-half inches for the bags and not less than one inch for fifty feet on each side of the bag may be used. But nets or seine of wire or metal are prohibited.

Fresh water fishing is restricted to the use of a hook and line, trot line or set or drag net with meshes not less than three inches. A twenty-foot minnow seine is allowed.

The law creating a closed-season for bass and crappie was repealed, but the use of artificial bait, seines or nets is prohibited during what was the closed season. The minimum bass for any season is eleven inches long; crappie seven inches.

A number of changes relating to the taking of oysters have also been made.


Death of John Humphrey, Shock — Grandma Wise Passes Away.

However, we are hoping for dry weather as hard as any people you ever saw, and we believe it is coming sometime in the near future. Cotton picking would be the order of the day if it would stop raining long enough but the cotton is opening slowly around here. No hands are to be had, only by those who have gone east and brought them here in numbers. We want to keep them coming on, so when we do get a dry day there can be some work done.

The people of this place were terribly shocked this morning when the news of the death of Mr. John Humphrey at Brownwood came over the wires. It seems as though he got hurt while at work in the oil fields there and paralysis followed, from which he died at 6 a. m. Sunday. His brother and family, accompanied by his aged mother of this place, left Sunday on the east-bound Santa Fe to meet the remains and family, from Brownwood and will go to Burnet where the body will be laid to rest in the cemetery there by the side of his dear old father, who preceded him a few years. 



# 1919 CROP PRODUCTION IN McCULLOCH COUNTY

This is the thirteenth of a series of fifteen articles on industrial conditions of Brady and McCulloch county. The data has been gathered from authoritative sources and show true conditions as they exist today. Each of the articles has been censored and approved by the President of the Brady Chamber of Commerce—Editor.

If any seeker after truth and knowledge were to inquire as to the nature, extent, quality and quantity of crops produced, or capable of being produced, in McCulloch county, the year 1919 would give full answer—in fact, a careful and accurate account of McCulloch county's production in grains, fruits, vegetables, nuts, cotton, feed and forage would read like a fairy tale. Which merely proves again that "truth is stranger than fiction."

McCulloch county is so situated that it combines the productive soil of the tropics with the rare and balmy atmosphere of the mountain resorts. In fact, it is the happy medium between these two. Its production approaches that of the near-tropics; yet

kind of fruit, vegetable, grain, cotton or feed. On the contrary, every manner and kind of product has made a bumper yield—without exception more has been produced than could have been gathered or harvested even under the most favorable of weather conditions.

The wheat and oats yield this year has been without precedent. Eighty bushels of oats to the acre, and 32 bushels of wheat to the acre, have been reported with the average production running not far below these figures. Oats tested out around about 30 pounds to the bushel, and wheat something like 57 pounds to the bushel. The total carload shipments of wheat and oats from Brady alone ran around 180 cars—and this is only

its delightful climate due to its altitude—1670 feet above sea level makes it one of the best places of abode in Texas.

McCulloch county's soil is wonderfully fertile and, given seasonable rains, will produce almost anything and everything grown in either the temperate or semi-tropical zones. This year has, perhaps, brought out this fact more noticeably for the reason that not a failure or half-crop has been made in the production of any

about one-half what would have been shipped to market had the weather permitted the threshing of the wheat and oats harvested and shocked ready for the thrasher. In addition, heavy shipments were made from Melvin, Rochelle, Mercury and other points in the county.

The corn yield, both in quantity and quality, has equaled, if not surpassed, that of the corn belt of Illinois and Iowa. Ears of corn have been exhibited from 12 to 14 inches in length

and weighing close to four pounds. The grains have been large, well-filled and set in even rows on the cob—in fact, nothing could surpass the corn made in McCulloch.

The production of maize, feterita, cane, sudan grass, Johnson grass and feed and forage crops of every kind has been without parallel. As the accompanying koda k reproduction shows, these crops grew prolifically, some of the crops—corn, cane and maize especially—attaining a height of from 12 to 14 feet. Not only was more feed and forage crops grown than could be harvested, but, after being seeded in, these crops grew without any cultivation whatever, or any further attention. This unequalled growth and production is directly attributable to the numerous rains had—but the result remains the same. It shows beyond question of a doubt just how productive the McCulloch county soil is when seasonable moisture is added.

McCulloch county's fruit production made her a veritable Garden of Eden. From early in the season until the present time, McCulloch county peaches have been ripening on the trees. So overloaded were the trees that the limbs broke under the weight of the fruit. It was impossible to market the fruit grown, and thousands upon thousands of bushels of choice Early Wheeler, Mamie Ross and Elberta peaches rotted underneath the trees in the orchards, or were fed to the hogs. For size and quality of fruit, the McCulloch county peach acknowledges no superior. Added to this, there was a wonderful crop of plums—many of the wild variety—produced in the McCulloch county. Add to this apples, pears, figs, cherries, and almost any kind of fruit you might mention, and you will have an insight into what can be grown and produced in McCulloch county.

Berries produce here in profusion and abundance, and there was an overplus of every kind and variety, from the native algerita, growing wild, to the tart and luscious grape. While not grown to any extent, strawberries, under proper care, will produce well. Blackberries and dewberries produce in abundance, and are unexcelled. The white grape produced here is unsurpassed by the California variety, and the black Spanish grape is unequalled for making jellies of exquisite flavor.

McCulloch county is the natural home of the fleecy staple, and in years past, has set the world's record for production and shipment. This year's production, however, has not been one whit behind her marvelous record of eleven years ago, when 50,000 bales of cotton were marketed

in Brady from wagons. The production this year has been marvelous. The great moisture has caused a large stalk and a heavy fruiting, with an especially large and promising top crop. Despite the heavy rains, McCulloch county cotton has been comparatively free from pests—in fact, the production has been virtually top-notch. When cotton first began to mature, many farmers had assurance of having a half-bale production already in sight, and this magnificent yield promised to be swelled by later production as well as by the top crop. At present, the continued rains of the past several weeks have brought cotton picking to a stand-still. The approach of fall, however, gives hopes that an early frost will stabilize the weather and clear the skies. With clear or sunshiny weather, cotton picking will be in full blast within another week, and with the assistance of the great numbers of imported laborers, McCulloch county yet promises to make a record marketing of the fleecy staple.

The McCulloch county is the home of the world-famous paper-shell pecan. For years, this superb nut has held first place over all the nuts of the world. For delicacy of flavor, for richness and for goodness, the world knows no equal of the paper-shell pecan. Production this year is not only the greatest in history, but for size and quality of the nut no other crop on record has been its equal. Shipments this year, it is estimated, will run somewhere around ten carloads. These are distributed all over the north and east, where the McCulloch county pecan brings top-notch prices and is eagerly sought.

McCulloch county, the first nine months of the year 1919, has recorded about 36 inches of rainfall, against an average annual rainfall of 26 inches. With such an abundance of moisture, the soil here is literally soaked down to bed rock, giving the county a season the like of which has never




