BRADY RESIDENT PROPERTY STILL BEING SOUGHT

Probably never in the history of Brady has there been such activity in Brady resident property as this year. Each week sees new deals closed, and the significant part is that the various sales show the property is gravitating towards permanent ownership—the purchasers being almost without exception, citizens and home builders. NAOMI WELL SOUTH OF TRICKHAM BAILING TWO HUNDRED BARRELS; SAND BARELY TOUCHED BY DRILL

Concerning the new well brought in on Lee Vaughn's place in Brown county, the Brownwood Bulletin of last Friday, says:
"Interest in the Vaughn No. 1 of the Naomi Oil & Gas company, a mile south of Trickham on the Vaughn ranch, is increasing as the well shows a steady production with the drill only two feet in the sand.
"The bailer has been run constantly during the past two or three days, and John Featherstone, driller in charge, has been unable to lower the oil while taking out ten barrels an hour. As soon as store facilities can be arranged the sand will be drilled a few feet deeper, and those who have visited the well are confident this additional drilling will greatly increase the production.
"The stakes have been set for Vaughn No. 2, and the Naomi people announce that they will go right ahead with their drilling program. The Vaughn well is opening up much new territory and strengthening that previously opened in the neighborhood of Trickham, and regarded as particularly valuable because of the fact that the sand was entered at 986 feet.
"R. E. Vanduff, the geologist who located this well, has been receiving the compliments of his friends and admirers because of the accuracy with which he defined the structure in that section."

SLEET AND FREEZING RAIN CAUSE BIG DAMAGE—COMMUNICATION CUT

BRADY, FOR TIME BEING, ISOLATED FROM OUTSIDE WORLD—WEST TEXAS TELEPHONE CO. REPORTS \$15,000.00 DAMAGE TO TELEPHONE LINES.

Thursday night witnessed McCulloch county in the grasp of the tail end of a blizzard which swept over the northern states, and which resulted in the death of at least one person in Oklahoma—a doctor responding to a sick call, and whose automobile was overturned in the midst of the blinding storm. The storm struck Brady about 7:00 o'clock Thursday night, and alternated sleet with a sloshing rain, the water freezing as it fell, until trees, buildings, telephone wires, and all out-doors were weighted down with a heavy coating of ice. Numerous telephone and telegraph poles were broken down, not to mention wires, and the limbs of trees were bent to the ground under the weight of their icy coat. Telephone and telegraph connection with the outside world was interrupted, and with the delayed arrival of the trains Friday, Brady was almost isolated.

Friday was somewhat milder, and pending the replacing of burned-out flues in one of the boilers. Fortunately, new flues were borrowed from the Brady Cotton Oil mill, and so a threatened shut-down of perhaps four or six weeks, while waiting for a shipment of flues, was averted.
About the only ray of sunshine that crept into all this gloom, was the distribution of coal among several hundred clamoring and fuel-less Brady citizens Saturday and Monday. The coal was parceled out in about the same ratio as sugar, and every man did his own transporting of the supply in the best manner possible.

Death of Mrs. S. S. Bumgardner.

The death of Mrs. S. S. Bumgardner occurred at 3:00 o'clock Thanksgiving morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. S. Cox, at Commerce. Mrs. Bumgardner had lived in Brady the past twenty-five years, and was a most estimable woman. She had been a member of the Baptist church since early childhood, was a devoted Christian, and was loved and admired by all.
Two children are left to mourn her passing away: Mrs. J. S. Cox of Commerce, Texas, and Jim Bumgardner of the East Sweden community.

Kindergarten Helps for Parents
This is No. 16 of a series of articles issued by the National Kinder-
garten Association. They will appear weekly in these columns.

TRAINING LITTLE CHILDREN.
By MRS. PRINCESS B. TROWBRIDGE.
Often mothers say to me, "Don't
all the things you do with your chil-
dren take most of your time?" By no
means. I am a mother of three, and
do all my own work, except washing
and ironing, and I have to do sewing
without end. A busy mother will
make suggestions which can be car-
ried out while she is busy at her
household tasks. Stories may be
told. For instance, baking will sug-
gest the story of "The Ginger-bread
man." This can be found in "Best
Stories to Tell to Children," by Sara
Cruz Bryant. Paring an apple or a
squash makes the opportunity to tell
about the seeds hidden in their cradle,
how in the winter they go to sleep,
and so on. Make a whole story of it.
A few days ago I told my 3-year old
baby this story and sang to her:
I know of a baby so small and so good,
Who sleeps in a cradle as good babies
should.
Sleep, baby, sleep.
I know of a mother so kind and so
warm,
Who covers this baby from all cold
and harm.
Sleep, baby, sleep.
Several days later we had another
squash to prepare, and immediately
she said, "Mother, sing about the
baby." Later, on request, she told her
older brother and sister the story of
the seed babies.
It is well to make much of holiday
celebrations. Have the children pre-
pare little gifts for a birthday. Per-
haps it may be only to draw a picture.
On Valentine's Day we always make
valentines. Use scrap pictures and
paste them on colored cardboard. Or
use paper dollies, cutting out the cen-
ter and pasting on a piece of card-
board, with an appropriate picture
underneath. This makes a pretty lit-
tle valentine of paper lace. Cut out
hearts of red cardboard or paper and
string them together in graduated
sizes on red ribbon or twine.
At Christmas time even the two-
year-old can make something. A sim-
ple matchholder may be made as fol-
lows: Cut from cardboard a circle
about four inches in diameter. Cut
a slit one-third of the diameter at
each end. Fold the lower half up-
wards, turning the cut edges and pasting
them to the upper semi-circle to
form the holder.
To make a match scratcher cut a
piece of sandpaper any desired shape
and paste on cardboard. A Christ-
mas picture or bell may be pasted at
the top of the cardboard. Penny cal-
endars can be used by the children in
endless ways.
Mats for the dining table are also
easily made. Cut a six-inch circle of
cardboard with a circular hole in the
center, and wind with raffia. Picture
frames can be made in the same way,
cutting the cardboard any shape de-
sired. There are endless things chil-
dren can make with water colors or
crayons and cardboard, using colored
paper and the Perry pictures. Perry
pictures illustrating all sorts of in-
teresting subjects can be bought for
one cent each. A catalogue will be
sent upon request by the Perry Pic-
ture Co., Malden, Mass.
Children never tire of making chains
for decorating purposes out of colored
paper. Take a strip of paper about
four inches long and half an inch wide
and make a ring by pasting one end
over the other; slip another strip thru
this ring, and paste ends together,
and so on. Our children make paper
chains for one another as birthday
presents. They always bring delight.
White and colored chains can be used
as Christmas tree adornments and
give the added pleasure of letting the
child feel he has helped make the tree
beautiful.
Let me urge fathers as well as
mothers to enter into the life and play
of their children. For only when the
father lends his aid in the process of
child training can there be perfect
unity. By working together mother
and father can lead the children to
understand the life about them. They
can teach them to know and to love
nature. They can direct the emotions,

NEW ORLEANS JUDGE HOLDS WAR IS OVER; PERMITS LIQUOR SALE

New Orleans, Nov. 26. — Holding that the war-time prohibition act is unconstitutional, Federal District Judge Foster today granted an injunction restraining the government officials from interfering with the sale by the Henry Leiser Liquor Co., of bonded liquor held in warehouses here.

Judge Foster announced his opinion that wartime prohibition is unconstitutional as the war formally came to an end when Congress adjourned without rejecting the peace treaty.
