A total of 20 per cent of the students in Texas schools are being retained, Meno said, and this is a very high percentage.

It's time for the schools' professional staffs to re-structure the schools, the commissioner said.

One of the big problems, according to the Texas Education chief, is the fact that the state's schools can't compete with other industries in the way of teacher salaries. Texas currently ranks 38th in the nation for teachers' salaries, he said.

Lumbrera Being Retried For Son's Death In Kansas

Bovina resident who was accused of killing seven children, including six of her own, is being retried in Kansas for the smothering death of her four-year-old son, Jose Antonio.

In 1990, a Finney County District Court had sentenced Lumbrera to life in prison for the May 1, 1990 death of Jose Antonio. But the Kansas Supreme Court last December cited errors in her original trial in Garden City, Kansas and ordered the new trial moved to another county to avoid

pre-trial publicity. She is now being retried for Jose Antonio's death in Barton

> Parents and patrons may present written or oral comments to the visiting team during this time. Issues they should address include student performance, the planning process, and the decision-making process.

> Reason for the T.E.A. visit, according to Cathey, is the low TAAS scores turned in by Bovina students. Schools are expected to have scores on the test at a particular level, and Bovina's scores were low enough to rate the visit by the T.E.A. team.

The accreditation of Bovina's schools will hang in the balance for the week's review. Cathey said that when the team finishes its work, the local school system could be rated as accredited, unaccredited, or accredited with a full-time monitor from the T.E.A.

Bovina is not alone in having this particular problem with TAAS scores, as a similar team from the T.E.A. has recently finished a week's review at Dalhart, a class AAA school, and the team recommended the "accreditation with a monitor" for that school

"We encourage school patrons to turn out at the public meeting, and show an interest in the school's future. We suggest that mainly parents with children in school be involved, as these are the main ones that the T.E.A. will be focusing on," Cathey said.

A primary interest, according to the Bovina Superintendent, will be how Bovina is addressing its dropout rate; site-management techniques, learning styles and test descrepancies between ethnic

"The team will want to know how we are going to correct our

deficiencies in these areas," Cathey

Also to be addressesd will be staff development, high school honors program, bi-lingual program, SAT-ACT scores, special education and the amount of money spent per child in the Bovina I.S.D.

Cathey said that the team would check to see if Bovina is doing all it possibly can to improve its scores on the TAAS test. They will make recommendations and suggestions as to how these scores could be improved.

"Quite honestly, we're anxious to have them come and make suggestions and recommendations," Cathey said.

The team will visit site-based management teams from Bovina's two campuses, plus the district's site-based management team.


The May 10 meeting will be set aside for community input, both positive and negative.

The T.E.A. team will be headed by Dr. Ron Singleton of the T.E.A.'s Accreditation Division. Another representative from the T.E.A. will accompany Dr. Singleton, along with four school administrators, members of the Texas School Initiative Institute (TSII). Cathey himself, as a member of TSII has participated in such reviews, which are known as "peer review teams."


School officials have known about the upcoming visit since May of 1992, when the T.E.A. stated their intent to make the review visit.

One of the main drawbacks to posting high marks on the TAAS test is the fact that a high percentage of Bovina's students are not as proficient with their English as they need to be.

At the present time, the TAAS tests are administered to students in grades 3,5,7,9 and 11.



NOTICE OF RATE CHANGE REQUEST AND STATEMENT OF INTENT

Notice is hereby given that DEAF SMITH ELECTRIC COOPERATIVE, INC. (the "Utility") intends to decrease rates for electric utility service effective July 6, 1993, or as soon thereafter as may be permitted by law. Based upon a test year ending December 31, 1992, the decrease requested is \$740,000 or 4.465% of actual test year revenues. The changes are applicable to all areas, all customer classes, and all customers served by the Utility.

The Utility proposes to change all rates for Farm and Home, Residential Space Heating, Irrigation, Commercial, Large Power, Industrial, Cotton Gin, and Lighting, including demand, energy, minimum and other charges. The proposed changes are expected to affect the classes as follows: for the 4,416 customers in the farm and home class, the proposed decrease will be \$109,357 or a negative 4.53% change in revenues; for the 147 customers in the residential space heating class, the proposed decrease will be \$7,793 or a negative 3.39% change in revenues; for the 4,060 customers in the irrigation class, the proposed decrease will be \$376,215 or a negative 4.15% change in revenues; for the 774 customers in the commercial class, the proposed decrease will be \$54,019 or a negative 6.17% change in revenues; for the 111 customers in the large power class the proposed decrease will be \$81,413 or a negative 8.11% change in revenues; for the 26 customers in the industrial class, the proposed decrease will be \$95,907 or a negative 3.74% change in revenues; for the 6 customers in the cotton gin class, there will be no change in revenues; and for the 2,888 customers in the lighting class, the proposed decrease will be \$15,296 or a negative 6.11% change in revenues.

The Utility also intends to change its service rules and regulations, including rules relating to obtaining service, line extension and line extension charges, the provision of electric service, service fees, and discontinuance of service.

Information concerning the proposed rate changes, including the proposed revisions of tariff and schedules is available at the General Office of the Utility, located at Highway 60 at Whittier Street, Hereford, Texas 79045-0753. Inquiries should be directed to Mike Veazey.

The Utility is required to give notice of the percentage change in base revenues which is negaive 12.087 %. The percentage decrease in base revenues is not an indication of how much your bill will change. Rather, it is a measure of the decrease in revenues that will be experienced by the Utility for its own operations, excluding payment of the cost of power purchased by the Utility from its wholesale power suppliers.

On or about May 7, 1993, the Utility will file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, a Statement of Intent to Change Rates, specifying in detail each proposed change. Requests to intervene must be filed no later than 45 days after the application filing date; Thus, the Utility anticipates the deadline for intervening and objecting to the rate changes will be June 21, 1993. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. A request to intervene, participate, or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Suite 400N. Austin, Texas 78757. Looking Up!

The psalmist wrote, "Thy word have I hid in my heart that I may not sin against Thee" (Psalm 119:11). By that, he meant that God's word, the Scripture, gave him guidance for daily living. He took seriously the divine principles that brought order, meaning, and blessing to life!

Too many Christians today hide God's word, but not in their hearts. Rather they hide their Bible on the bookshelf, behind the magazine rack, or under the stack in the hall closet! To them, the Bible is just another book to possess, but not a daily resource of nuture to live by.

To say that Scripture has profoundly impacted my own life is an understatement! I remember hearing the major Bible stories from early childhood, both at home and at church. I knew I could grow up to be as brave as David facing Goliath, and as much a disciple of Jesus as Peter, James, and John.

Then during my older childhood, my mother enrolled herself, my older brother and sister, and me in the Bible Memory Association of St. Louis, a program which our pastor initiated in our church. We memorized twelve verses per week for twelve consecutive weeks each winter and spring for three years. That's 432 verses!

At one time, as a teenager, I could quote verbatim most of the gospel of John, plus numerous other passages. I also memorized many key chapters of the Bible, including Psalm 1, 8, 23, and 24, Isaiah 53 and 55, John 1, 3, 10, Romans 8, and I Corinthians 13. I can no longer quote them all perfectly now, but they have stuck in my heart and soul, and snatches of verses and phrases from passages are still often brought to mind by the Holy Spirit who uses them to speak to my heart at various times in my life.

Sometimes, when we travel, one of the car games we play is "Guess That Verse." One of the 3 "J's" will get a Bible and turn to various scripture passages. They read a verse or phrase, and then make me guess where it is found in the Bible. They are amazed (and so am I!) that I so often can tell them not only the Bible book, but also the chapter and even the verse reference.

All of this came to mind again recently as two of our church's children, Levi Steelman and Julie Grisham, participated at Lubbock in the State Bible Drill Competition, sponsored by the Baptist General Convention of Texas. Esther Steelman has been diligently working with these two on Sunday evenings at church. They have memorized all the books of the Bible, many verses, and certain key passage references.

In the competition, they tell what books of the Bible go before and after the book cited, quote the verse when a reference is given, or give the reference when a verse is read, or else finish the quote when only a portion is given. We are proud of Levi and Julie. Participating with kids from all over the region, Levi received a "Good" rating and Julie an "Honorable Mention." Congratulations to them and to

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Tortillas Can In Many Interesting Recipes

By Carla McKeown My parents taught me to eat Mexican food almost as soon as I could eat solid food. For as long as I can remember, my mother made dishes such as beef enchiladas, chicken enchiladas, tacos, Spanish

But, it wasn't until my family moved to West Texas that we really began to appreciate the tortilla. After we moved to Plainview, I became friends with a girl my age and her family who introduced me to many aspects of their Mexican-American culture, including homemade flour tortillas.

I thought I was in culinary heaven the first time Rosa's mother Mrs. Efrain Nunez, handed me a hot tortilla fresh off the stove. Rosa put some margarine on it for me, and I rolled it up and ate it just like that. I was hooked.

I still haven't learned to make the round, flat bread, but I have thoroughly integrated tortillas into my cooking.

Tony and I often stuff tortillas with eggs, potatoes, and bacon, sausage or chorizo for breakfast burritos. A little leftover meat, some shredded lettuce, chopped tomatoes, and a dash of salsa or hot sauce all rolled up in a tortilla make a quick lunch-time meal.

From burritos and enchiladas to fajitas and tostados, the tortilla is a versatile bread enhancing every meal from breakfast to midnight

Tortillas--flour or corn--can be heated and eaten while they are soft and pliable. Or, they can be fried-flat or in a taco or basket shape-until crisp and then filled. Another option is to fill the tortilla and then fry it, creating a flauta or a taquito.

Try the following recipes (the Chicken Burritos is one Tony and I created together, tasting and adjusting each time we cook them) and enjoy the versatility of the

CHICKEN BURRITOS 2 boneless, skinless chicken breasts 4 cups light soy sauce

Vegetable oil 1/2 onion, chopped 1 garlic clove, minced or pressed Chili powder, to taste Cayenne pepper, to taste

1 can tomatoes and green chilies

Green onions, chopped

6 flour tortillas

Cook the chicken breasts (in a microwave or skillet); allow to cool and shred into bite-sized pieces. In a large skillet, cook the chopped onion over medium heat until soft. Add the garlic and cook for 1 minute. Add the chicken and chili powder and cayenne pepper to taste; stir to mix. Add tomatoes and green chilies and stir. Let simmer until mixture is not too watery. Fill heated tortillas with chicken mixture and sprinkle with chopped green onions. Makes 2 to 3

FLAUTAS

1 dozen corn tortillas 1 chicken, boiled and cut into chunks or shredded Oil or lard

Sour cream

Warm the tortillas, one at a time on a griddle. Place the chicken in each tortilla, near one end of the tortilla, and roll. Secure each roll with a toothpick. Fry the flautas in the oil or lard until crisp. Drain on paper towels. Serve with sour cream and salsa.

TORTILLA SOUP

9 tortillas 1/4 cup vegetable oil l onion, chopped

1/3 cup tomato puree 2 quarts chicken broth

1 tablespoon chopped fresh cilantro 1-1/2 cups grated Monterey Jack

Cut the tortillas into 1/2-inch wide strips. Fry them in hot oil until crisp. Remove and drain on paper towels. Fry the onion and tomato puree in the remaining oil over lower heat for 5 minutes. Add the onion mixture, the tortilla strips and the cilantro to the boiling chicken broth. Simmer for 30 minutes. Put the grated cheese in each soup bowl and pour the hot soup over the cheese. Makes 6 servings.

FAJITAS

Combine the soy sauce, brown sugar, garlic, onion, lemon juice and ginger in a jar; cover and shake to mix well and to dissolve the brown sugar. Let the marinade stand in a sealed jar overnight. Trim the fat from the beef and peel off any membrane. If the meat is more than 3/4-inch thick at the thickest part, cut it in half lengthwise so it will cook quicker. Pour the marinade over the beef and marinate for 2 hours or overnight in a sealed container in the refrigerator. Remove the steak from the marinade and grill over very hot coals for about 10 minutes per steak. Brush the meat with the marinade 2 to 3 times while grilling. Chop the meat with a cleaver and wrap in warm flour

CHEESE ENCHILADAS 4 tablespoons flour

1/4 cup vegetable oil 2 tablespoons chili powder 2 teaspoons ground cumin 1 teaspoon salt

1 large clove garlic, minced 2-2/3 cups hot water Vegetable oil for softening tortillas

12 corn tortillas 12 ounces Cheddar cheese, grated 1 medium onion, finely chopped

Brown the flour on a cookie sheet at 400 degrees in oven for 15-29 minutes. In a saucepan, combine the browned flour, oil, chili powder, cumin, garlic and salt. Simmer over low heat, gradually adding hot water while stirring continuously with a wire whisk. Simmer slowly for 1 hour, stirring occasionally. In a small skillet, heat vegetable oil. Dip one tortilla at a time into the hot oil until the tortilla is pliable. Remove each tortilla from the oil to a warmed plate and continue with each tortilla. Fill each tortilla with 3 tablespoons of cheese and 1 teaspoon onion. Roll up each tortilla and lay them in a baking dish, one alongside the next. Pour the warm sauce over all the enchiladas and top with the remaining cheese. Bake at 250 degrees for 15 minutes.

DESSERT TACOS 2 pounds slightly green bananas 6 tablespoons butter 1-1/2 tablespoons brown sugar

6 corn or flour tortillas 1/2 cup sliced almonds

1-1/2 cups sour cream 1 tablespoon powdered sugar

Peel the bananas and cut into 1/4-inch thick rounds. In a large frying pan, melt 2 tablespoons of the butter over medium-high heat until foaming. Add the banana pieces and brown. Turn and brown the other side, about 1 minute altogether. Remove from heat and set aside. Place 1 tablespoon of the butter and 1/2 teaspoon of the brown sugar in a frying pan large enough to hold a tortilla. Heat on medium-high until the butter foams and the sugar melts. Stir the mixture. Then, place a tortilla in the pan and fry for 30 seconds. Turn and fry the other side, until warmed through and sugar coated, but still pliable, about 30 seconds more. Remove and continue with the other tortillas, adding a little more butter and sugar as needed. Toast the almonds by stirring in an ungreased frying pan over mediumhigh heat for 2-3 minutes. Place the sour cream and powdered sugar in a small bowl and stir until smooth. Spread 1/3 cup of the bananas in the middle of a tortilla. Top with the sweetened sour cream and toasted almonds. Fold and

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



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SPS Survey Shows Continued Growth

Company's annual Fed Cattle Survey indicates another recordbreaking year in the area's cattle

The survey shows a six percent increase in fed cattle from 1991 to 1992--the fourth consecutive year of growth. Feedlots in the SPS service area fed 5,988,196 head of cattle in 1992, compared with 5,644,133 in 1991.

Another trend that indicates steady growth is the total number of feedyards in the area--from 122 in 1991 to 124 in 1992.

"The six percent increase in fed cattle is three times higher than last year's percentage," said Dave Krupnick, SPS manager of agricultural and wholesale marketing. "I think this reflects a positive trend for the area's entire economy."

SPS annually prepares a Fed Cattle Survey including feedlots in its service area, which covers 52,000 square miles. The region includes the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles, the Texas South Plains, eastern and southeastern New Mexico and southwestern Kansas.

Krupnick pointed out that several packing plants are located just outside the service area. "That accounts for the difference between the number of cattle slaughtered and the number fed," he said.

The Fed Cattle Survey includes a chart on the ten-year history of fed cattle, the one-time capacity of surveyed feed lots, as well as information on the number of feedlots with 5,000 head capacity or more. It also has a county breakdown of lot capacity and numbers fed.

Krupnick said information from the survey is used across the country by ag-related industries. "It lets others know how vital agriculture and food-processing are to this area," he said.

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

Bivins Co-Sponsors Ban On Income Tax

Bivins (R-Amarillo) has signed on as co-sponsor of a constitutional amendment to prohibit a state personal income tax without voter

"I sponsored an income tax ban during my first session in 1989, but I couldn't rally enough support to pass it," Bivins said. "This time, however, I sense much more support within the Legislature for such a ban."

Under the amendment:

*No income tax could be implemented without voter

*Voters would have to approve any increase in the income tax rate if such a tax is implemented;

*Revenue raised by an income

AUSTIN--State Sen. Teel tax would have to be dedicated to education and property tax relief.

"A state income tax would be a major change in public policy for this state. It's proper that voters be able to vote on an income tax since it would drastically affect their lives and personal finances," Bivins said.

The two-term senator also pointed out that the amendment would free Texans from the concern that the Legislature would unilaterally implement an income tax in response to a state budget
