

# Attendance Goal Set At 1,100

Sunday, March 7, will be religious emphasis day in Bovina.

Members of a steering committee from Bovina Woman's Study Club, who voted to sponsor the project this year, met recently with representatives from Chamber of Commerce, Bovina Lions Club, Woman's

Study Club, Roping Club, Bovina High School Student Council and pastors and representatives from each church, and received enthusiastic response to the project.

At the meeting, it was decided to set the date as March 7 and the goal at 1100 for at-

tendance at Bovina churches that day.

Student Council President Meloney Marshall, Roy Ramirez, vice-president, Heidi Corn, SC representative, and Gary Cox, sponsor of the Student Council, agreed to ask students at Bovina Schools to sub-

mit suggestions and slogans with a number of the slogans judged best presented to an open meeting Tuesday afternoon, to select the best slogan for use in the campaign.

Members of the steering committee are Mrs. Earl Whitten, committee chairman; Mrs.

Bobby Englant, Mrs. Clarence Jones and Mrs. Jesse Walling.

"March 8 -- I'll Be One of A Thousand," was the slogan for last year's campaign and 1,122 were in the church pews that Sunday. That was the first such promotion here and it received area-wide publicity.

First Baptist reported 404 attendance, St. Ann's Catholic Church reported 225, Bovina United Methodist had an attendance of 212, Church of Christ had 140 attending, Mission Belen Bautista, had 75 in church, Pentecostal Holiness had 53 and New Jerusalem Baptist reported 13 in attendance.

Purpose of the campaign here is for it to be a layman-backed attendance, conducted entirely by citizens and supported by Bovina ministers.

Many persons have expressed interest in making this campaign an annual affair, reports Mrs. Whitten.

### WHITTLIN'

Be it good, bad or indifferent, Saturday is on the way out as a business day. That's true even out here in the heart of the great agricultural country where one day ---- save Sunday ---- is supposed to be the same as any other.

A generation ago, Saturday was the big day of the week from a business standpoint. It was even referred to as "butter and egg day" as the folks from the farms brought their products to town to sell and attend to shopping and other town business while they were at it.

That, of course, went out when butter and eggs ceased to be farm products of any significance and Saturday has been on the decline ever since.

The 40-hour week, which originated in the big cities, probably has been the biggest reason for Saturday's decline as a business day of importance. It's just a lot easier to figure how to get 40 hours into a week when Saturday is omitted.

On the local level, the past few months have seen the bank start closing on Saturdays. Ditto the window service at the post office. (In fairness, maybe it should be pointed out that the bank now stays open until 6 p.m. on Fridays to give extra time for people to do their banking business since Saturday closing was initiated.)

Many retail businesses, even, close at noon on Saturday and have for the past several years.

At last week's city council meeting, for instance, the board tabled a suggestion to close the city hall on Saturdays, thereby giving city employees an extra half day off each week and cutting the weekly number of hours from 44 to 40.

The council, in other words, took no action on the proposal except to agree to consider it again at a later time.

But we're guessing that such action is forthcoming. It's just a matter of time. With other offices closed on Saturday mornings, we'll guess it's just a matter of time until the city will follow suit. Such is inevitable unless the present trend is changed and we can see no reason why it will be.

Saturday continues to be a big day for competitive independent businesses which are hustling retail sales. Also, businesses which provide entertainment should continue to see their Saturday business increase.

We aren't for or against Saturday closings ---- just making observations on the situation. For the employees involved, the extra day or half day of non-work is welcomed and the businesses or institutions involved aren't hurt to the harmful extent or they wouldn't go along with the deal in the first place.

Probably it should be pointed out, too, that agriculture service businesses here remain open around the clock and seven days a week during busy seasonal times such as harvest. This is brought about, no doubt, by competition and a sincere desire to be accommodating to their farmer customers.

Saturday, then, is on its way out as a business day. In a way, we hate to see it go. The only reason, probably, is that we grew up during a time when it was an important business day of the week.

And the whole thing may not end with just closing on Saturday. A week of work consisting of 35 hours is already being considered or maybe even practiced in some parts of the country. Also, we've heard about making the 40-hour week cover only four 10-hour days per week.

So, Friday could be the next

### Snow's Moisture Said Nil

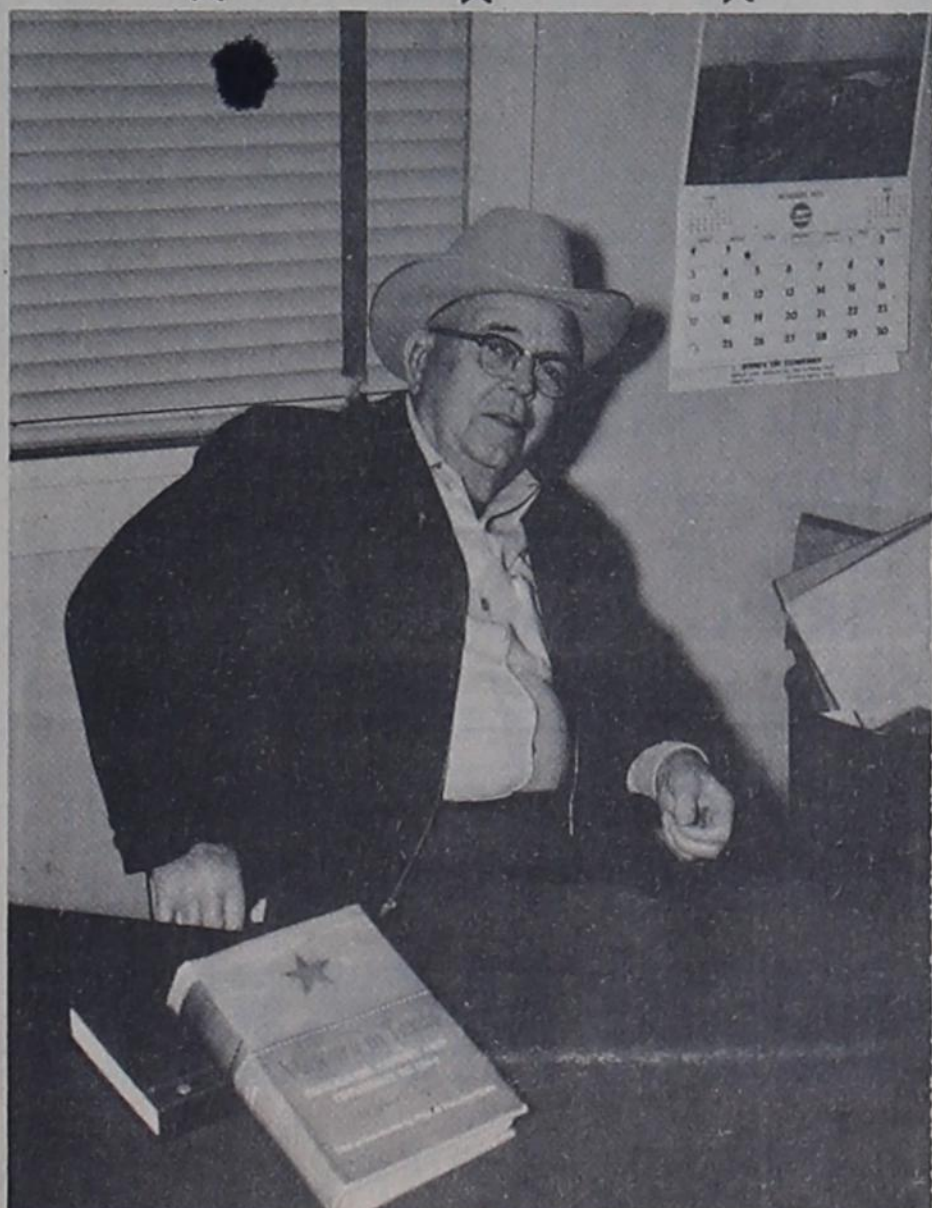
A blast of winter weather blew into the area Sunday, sending temperatures plunging and depositing a light snow.

## Wilkinson Gets Masonic Honor

A. B. (As) Wilkinson was honored for 50 years in Masonry at a meeting of Farwell Lodge No. 977 here last (Tuesday) night.

Presentation of the 50-Year Service Award in Masonry was made to Wilkinson by District Deputy Grand Master Doyle Underwood of Dimmitt.

Wilkinson has been a member of the lodge here since 1935. He served as secretary for 13 years, from '48 to '61, when he resigned from the post because of ill health.

Wilkinson was elected to the Lodge at Electra, No. 1067, in 1917. However, he was called to the Navy in World War I before he had time to take his work for the first three degrees. The degrees then waited until he returned home from the Navy following the War and he took the first degree in November of 1919 and finished the master degree in November of '20.

He received his 32nd degree in Masonry's Scottish Rite at El Paso in '46.

In addition to being a member of the Scottish Rite at El Paso, Wilkinson is a member of the York Rite in Plainview and of the Khiva Shrine Temple in Amarillo.

Wilkinson, a retired farmer, says he considers it a privilege and an honor to be a member of the Masonic Lodge.

## File Murder Charges Against Rhea Farmer

Rex Beardain, 34, prominent Rhea Community farmer, was charged with murder Wednesday of last week following the shooting death of his father, Roy Beardain, 68, at the father's home in Friona.

Beardain went to the police station in Friona shortly after 8 a.m. Wednesday and told of the shooting to Bill Denney, assistant police chief, and Garland Freeman, deputy sheriff.

The law officers then went to the elder Beardain's home and found the body, which had been shot seven times, according to reports.

Beardain turned in a .22 calibre pistol to the lawmen when he told them of the shooting. He was taken to Farwell for arraignment before Justice of the Peace J. R. Thornton. He was released on \$2500 bond.

The case will come before the grand jury, which is scheduled to meet early in March, according to a report from the sheriff's office this week.

The father was a retired farmer and owned apartments

in Friona. His wife died May 2 of last year.

Beardain was taken into custody about 8:30 when he went to the police station to report the shooting. He was placed in Friona city jail while the lawmen

investigated the shooting and then was taken to Farwell, where he was arraigned.

The elder Beardain was pronounced dead at the scene by (Continued on Page 2)

Present at the meeting were all members of the council and Mrs. Martin and Read.

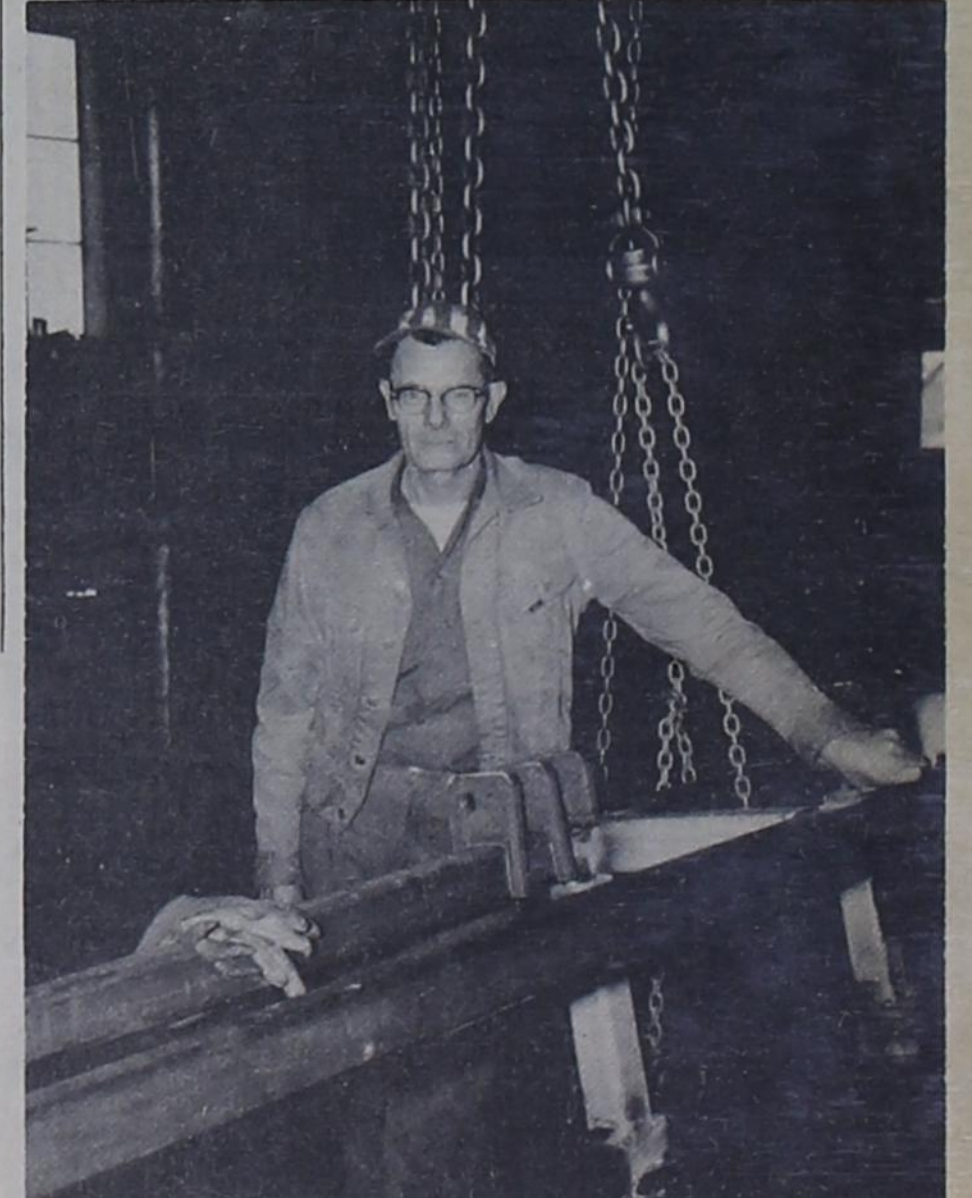
### 175 Attend Sausage Meal Here Sunday

The Home Economics Division of the Bovina FFA Livestock Show will have its second show Wednesday, Feb. 17, in what is expected to be an annual event in the homemaking cottage of Bovina Schools.

The show is open to all unmarried girls in Bovina enrolled in Homemaking, FHA or 4-H Club work.

Entry blanks and a 10 cent entry fee (per entry) are due Thursday, according to Mrs. Janie Potts, homemaking instructor.

Featured are five classes of foods, four classes of hand work and three of clothing.

Judging the show will be someone from out-of-town, Mrs. Potts reported.

Ribbons will be presented the top five places in each event, according to Mrs. Potts.

During the day, from 11:30 a.m. until 3:45 p.m., open house will be held for all interested persons in the area.

SCENTED BOUQUET



Home-grown carnations can give blooms almost the size of those from flower shops.

Grow carnations for a scented bouquet. The newer, giant-flowered varieties have blooms almost as large as those you buy from the florist.

And yet, they can be grown from seeds, will bloom quickly and will flower until frost. Of course, you'll have to sow seeds early either indoors or out, but that's good practice anyway.

Probably the largest flowers come from seeds of English Giants. These, once plants are budding, should be disbudded just as the florist does in the greenhouse. All side buds should be nipped off so all the food the plant makes goes into the tip bud. That's how to get huge blooms.

A delightful, fairly new carnation is named Fragrance and seeds are available only in mixed colors.

These plants grow only 12 inches high, have strong enough stems to remain upright and are nice looking, compact plants.

The tiniest carnations, very dwarf and compact, so good for growing in pots, are those named Baby. Only 10 inches high, they have the same double flowers and delicious fragrance as all carnations.

It's the scent, after all, that has endeared carnations to centuries of gardeners.

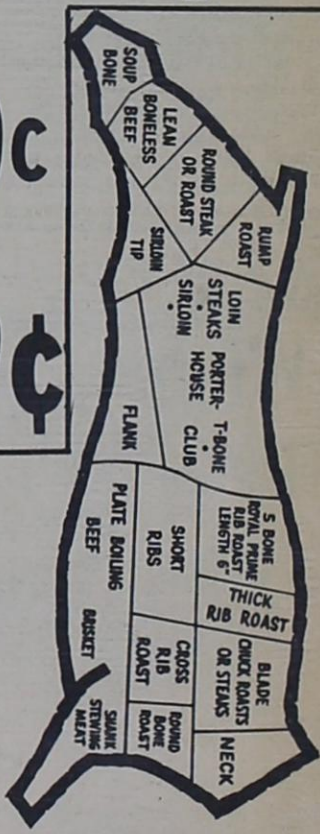

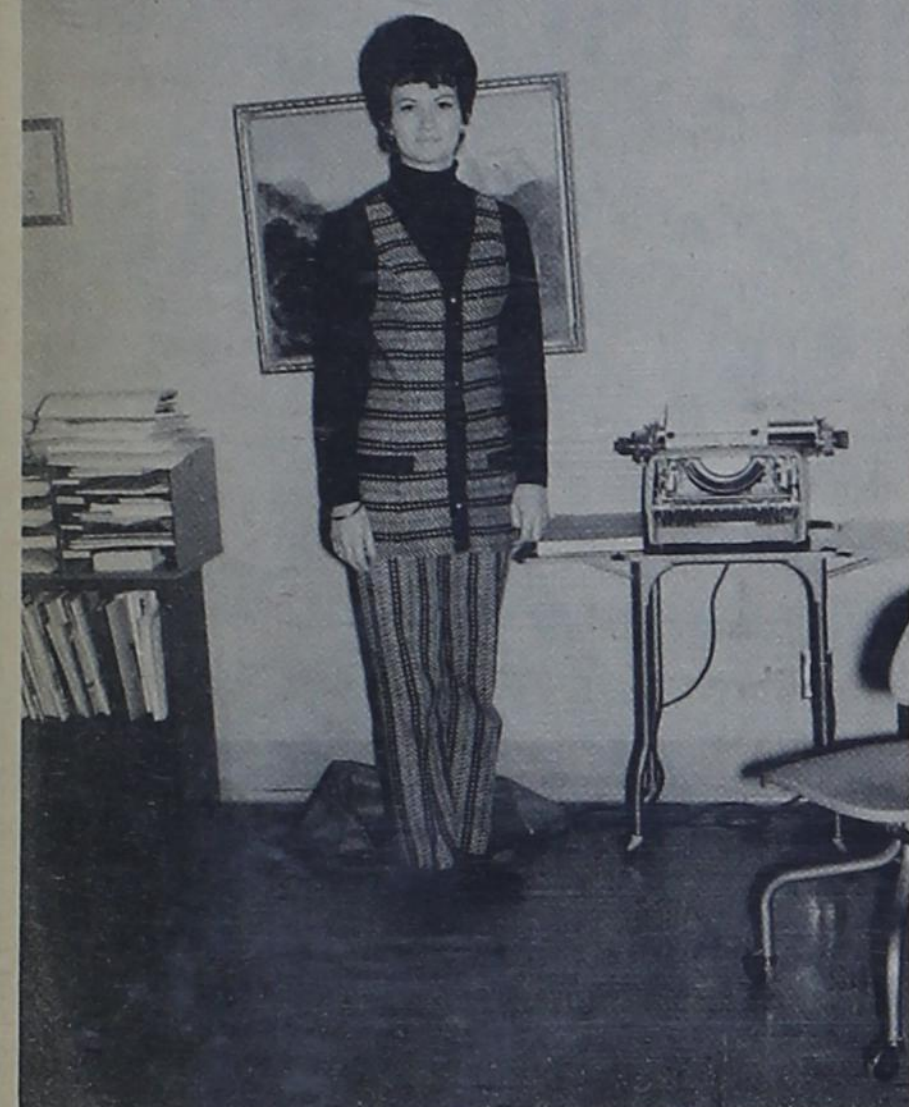

#### MILLIONAIRE PIE

- 1 c. condensed milk
- 1/2 c. lemon juice
- 1 - #2 can crushed pineapple
- 1 c. chopped pecans
- 1 pkg. Dream Whip
- 1/2 c. sugar

Mix condensed milk with lemon juice, add drained pineapple and 1/2 c. chopped nuts.

Whip topping mix according to directions of package and slowly add 1/2 c. sugar while beating. Fold into other mixture. Sprinkle top with remaining 1/2 c. nuts. Refrigerate several hours.

#### YEAST ROLLS

- Dissolve 1 pkg. dry yeast and 1 t. sugar in 1/2 c. warm water.

Mix together: 1 beaten egg, 1/2 c. melted shortening, 1/2 c. sugar and 1/2 t. salt.

Mix into yeast mixture. Gradually add 2 c. warm water and 6 c. flour. Mix well, cover and let rise to double its size. Knead and shape into rolls. Let rise and bake about 15 minutes at 400 degrees.

#### CORN BREAD TAMALE PIE

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 large onion, chopped
- 1 can tomato soup
- 2 c. water

- 1 t. salt
- 1/4 t. pepper
- 1 T. chili powder
- 1 c. whole kernel corn, drained
- 1/2 c. chopped green pepper

#### TOPPING

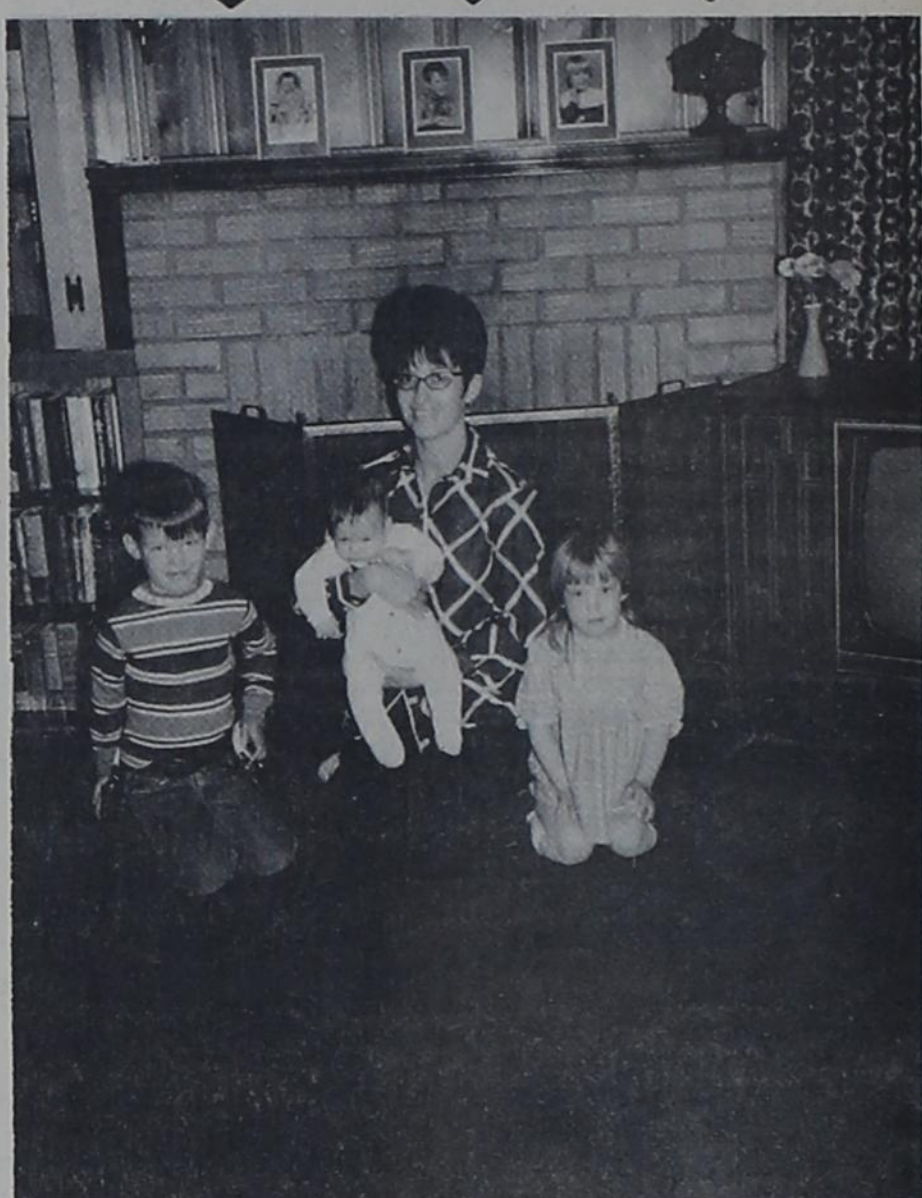
- 3/4 c. corn meal
- 1 T. flour
- 1 T. sugar
- 1/2 t. salt
- 1 1/2 t. baking powder
- 1 beaten egg
- 1/3 c. milk
- 1 T. salad oil

Brown ground beef and onion in skillet; add tomato soup, water, seasonings, corn and green pepper; simmer for 15 minutes. For topping, sift together dry ingredients. Add beaten egg and milk, stirring lightly until combined. Fold in salad oil. Place meat mixture in greased baking dish. Cover with cornbread topping. The topping will disappear but will rise during baking and

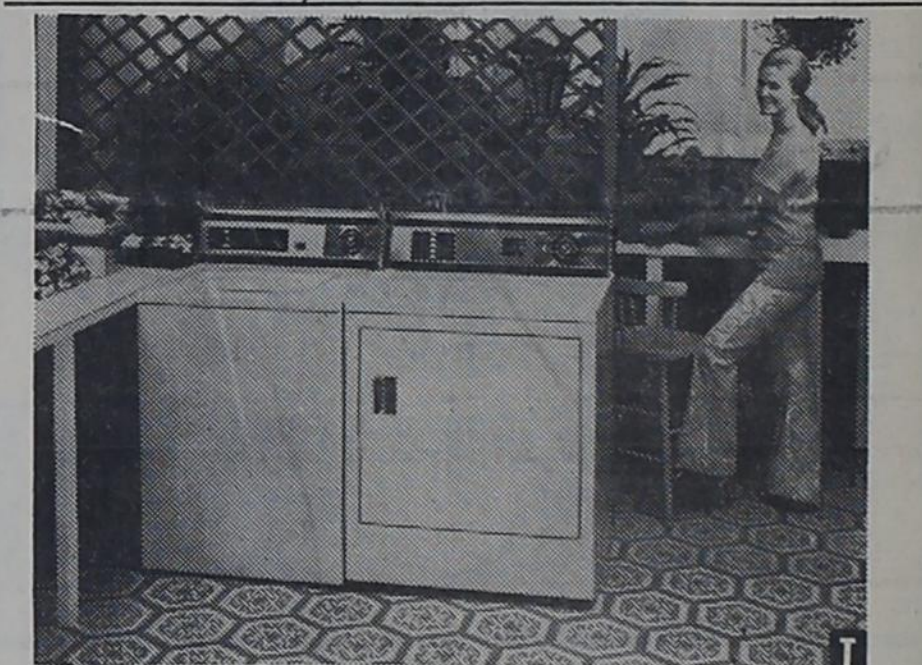
#### BLENDER BANANA NUT BREAD

- Sift into bowl:
- 2 c. flour
- 1 1/2 t. baking powder
- 1/2 t. soda
- Place in blender container:
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 c. shortening
- 1 1/2 T. sour milk
- 1 t. lemon juice
- 3 large bananas
- 1 c. sugar
- 1/4 t. salt

Blend smooth. Add 1 cup nuts and blend 15 seconds longer. Pour over dry ingredients and stir lightly together. Bake in greased loaf pan (9 1/2 by 5 1/2) at 350 degrees for 45 minutes or until done.

#### GREEN BEANS

- 1 qt. green beans - heat - do not boil
- Drain off juice and then add 3 T. salad dressing (according to taste)

Humidity, as well as temperature, contributed to a comfortable home environment. Most of us work best and are more comfortable in air that contains 35 to 40 per cent relative humidity. During winter, however, when homes depend on heating systems, the air inside may become dry enough to cause damage to furnishings. Wallpaper may peel or crack, furniture warps, cracks or becomes unglued and the piano may be out of tune often.

People are also susceptible to dry air. Touching metal objects produces static shock, and nasal passages feel dry. Also, one may feel cold even when the room temperature is high.

To increase the relative humidity, place pans of water near heating units or in the furnace. Open doors and windows occasionally to ventilate the rooms. In extreme cases of low humidity, a commercial humidifier may be used.

## On The Farm In Palmer County

### MEETINGS SLATED TO EXPLAIN WHEAT REFERENDUM

Two meetings are slated in the Panhandle for the week of February 15 to explain a wheat referendum to producers in 17 counties. These meetings are required prior to a certification by the state commissioner of agriculture for the Texas Wheat Producers Association to conduct such a referendum.

Purpose of the referendum is to raise funds with which to conduct programs of education, research, disease and insect control and marketing relating to wheat. The first meeting will be held February 15 at 2 p.m. in the County Community Building in Dumas.

Another meeting is slated for February 16 at 7 p.m. in the Community Center in Hereford. This meeting will be for producers in Deaf Smith, Parmer, Castro, Randall, Potter, Oldham and Armstrong counties.

The program at each location is designed to explain the provisions of the referendum and to give a brief report on the overall wheat industry.

Ed Garnett of Amarillo, area farm management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will be the principal speaker at each meeting.

Representatives of the Texas Wheat Producers Association will also be on hand to answer questions concerning the referendum.

I urge all wheat producers in Parmer County to attend the upcoming referendum meeting so that they will be able to make a knowledgeable choice when election time for the referendum rolls around. A two-thirds majority vote will be required.

March 1 is the deadline for farmers to file their 1970 income tax return. This date was extended from February 15 to March 1 by the 1969 income tax law.

To qualify for reporting as a farmer, two-thirds of your gross farm income must be from the sale of agriculture products. If farm income is less than two-thirds of the gross income, a taxpayer may be required to declare estimated tax and make quarterly payments. Statutory penalties are assessed for failure to file required declarations of estimated tax.

Many taxpayers will not be required to file a return due to a new low income allowance. As an example, for 1970 returns, married persons filing a joint return would not be required to pay any tax if their incomes were less than \$2,300. However, farmers may be required to file an income tax return in order to report self employment tax if their net income exceeds \$400 for 1970.

Additional information regarding farm income tax reporting regulations can be found in the 1971 edition of the Farmer's Tax Guide which is available from your county agricultural agent or the Internal Revenue Service.

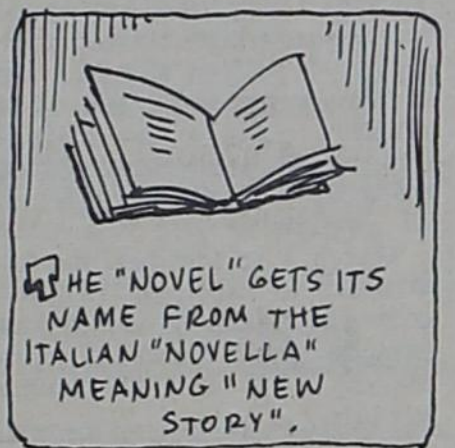
## FFA, Lions Benefit Game Monday Night

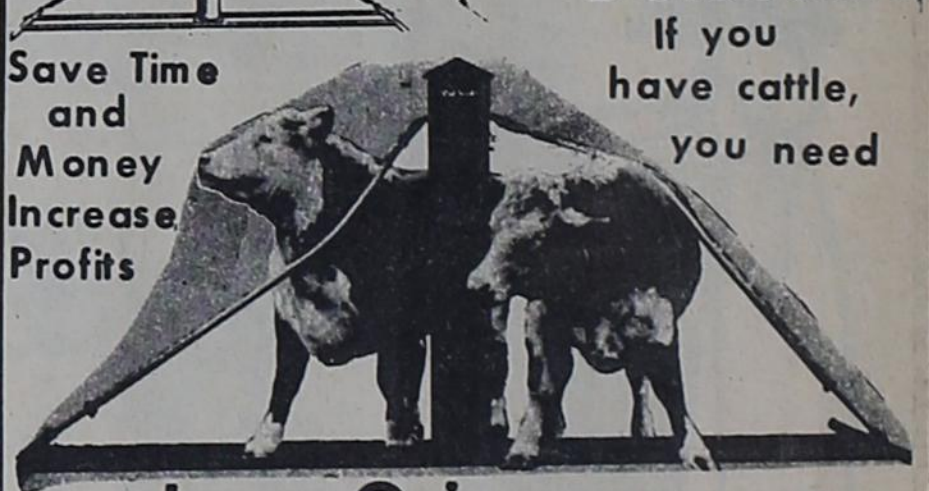

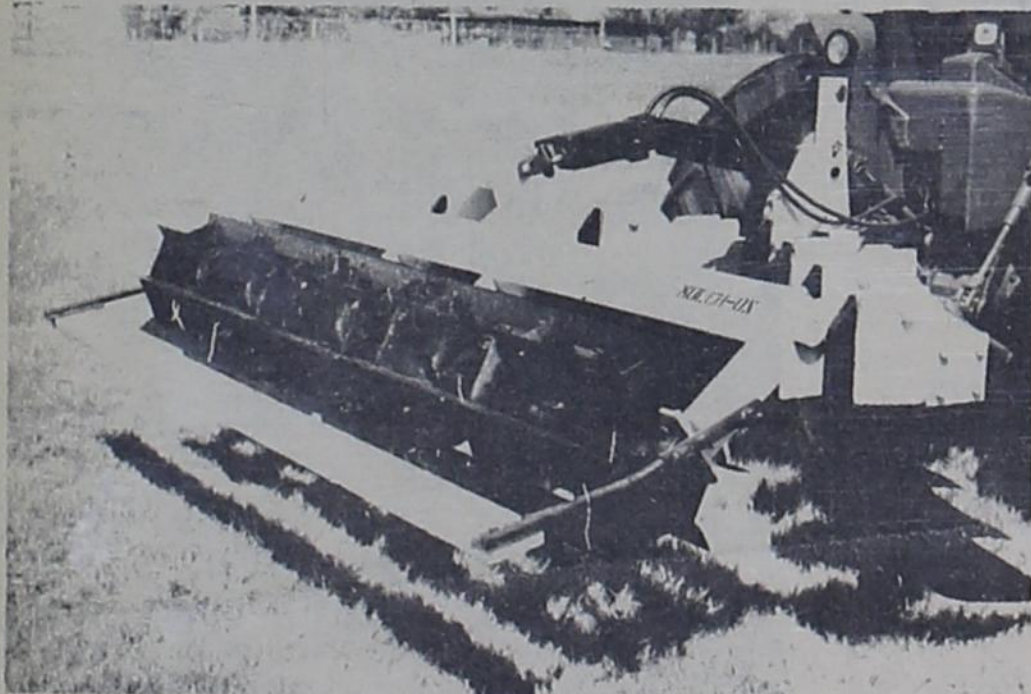
