STATE BANK, \$25,000 CAPITAL, IS BEING ORGANIZED AT LOHN

CALIFORNIA-TEXAS CO. BUILDING DERRICK ON LEDBETTER RANCH

DAY WELL LOG OF NO. 2 CORRESPONDS PRACTICALLY EXACTLY WITH LOG OF WELL NO 1—NOW SETTING CASING TO 465 FEET TO SHUT OFF WATER.

Construction of the derrick for the California-Texas company's rig on the Claud Ledbetter ranch, near Pasche, is now in progress. The location is given as the south-east part of Survey No. 65, being two miles south and west of Pasche.

Thad O. Day No. 2 is setting casing to a depth of 465 ft. to shut off a flow of water. The log of No. 2 tallies almost exactly with the log of No. 1, the water being struck at approximately the same depth, although about ten feet more of water sand was had. The crews are working hard, and good progress is noted at this well.

J. D. Vance, superintendent of operations at the Smith & Jergins well, reports setting 6 5/8 inch casing to a depth of 1905 ft. to shut out water and a cave-in. This well has a strong flow of salt water, and the cave-in occurred while drilling in black shale.

C. S. Thomas well at Whiteland is drilling at 3320 ft. The Thomas well at Salt Gap is pulling 8 1-2 inch casing to straight-ream and reset. The depth of this well is 2900 ft.

The Lucky Stone Oil Co. is setting 8 inch casing to a depth of over 500 ft. on Survey 1059.

The Casa Oil Co., Inc., successors to Cooper-Shields, are setting 10-inch casing at 940 ft.

CALLAN TRIAL AT LLANO—BOND IS SET AT \$20,000

The grand jury in session at Menard this week returned an indictment last Tuesday against James Callan, former president of the Texas Cattle Raisers association, who is charged with the murder of V. R. Billings, a stockman of DeWitt county, the killing having occurred last November on Callan's ranch near the town of Callan, Texas. A change of venue to Llano county was granted, and the trial set for May 11th at Llano.

STATE BANK BEING ORGANIZED AT LOHN WITH \$25,000 CAPITAL STOCK

CITIZENS OF LOHN, FIFE, WALDRIP AND PEAR VALLEY OVERSUBSCRIBE CAPITALIZATION—CHARTER APPLIED FOR—IN OPERATION BY JULY 1ST.

A new State bank, with a capitalization of \$25,000, is in process of organization at Lohn, and so enthusiastic are the citizens of Lohn, Fife, Waldrip and Pear Valley over the proposition that they have already over-subscribed the bank's proposed capitalization. After three days' work, the subscription committee reports over \$30,000 stock subscribed. Application has already been made for a charter, and it is thought the new bank will open its doors for business by July 1st.

Temporary directors have been named as follows: J. K. Shelton, L. O. Marshall, W. F. Roberts, Jr., P. C. Dutton and John Hester. Lohn; J. H. Smith, Pear Valley, and Henry Bradley, Fife. The first three compose the subscription committee and began their work only last week. After three days' work they found the \$25,000 quota so far over-subscribed as to necessitate the returning of part of the subscriptions. They state it would have been just as easy to have raised \$50,000.

The temporary directors expect to call in part of the stock subscriptions within the next week, at which time the contract will be let for the construction of a neat brick or stone building to house the new bank. The Lohn, Fife, Waldrip and Pear Valley communities include some of the finest farming and stock raising sections in McCulloch county, and a greater degree of prosperity than ever before has come to the citizens there this past year. The stockholders in the new proposition comprise the leading and most substantial citizens of these communities, which leaves no question as to the success of the new undertaking.

BENEVOLENT WAR RISK SOCIETY TO RAISE FUNDS FOR BUILDING SOLDIERS' TUBERCULAR HOSPITAL

The Benevolent War Risk society of Texas has undertaken to build a tubercular hospital for the use of the Texas ex-soldiers. John C. Townes, Jr., has been appointed State Chairman for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions for this cause. Most of the work is being done through the former draft board of the various counties. The quota for McCulloch county is \$634.00.

Death of R. B. Sheppard.

The death of R. B. Sheppard occurred here last Thursday evening at 4:00 o'clock, at the age of 75 years. Death followed a general break-down. Funeral services were held Friday afternoon at 4:00 p. m., interment being made in Brady cemetery.

For 35 years "Shep," as he was affectionately called, had been driving a stage line. Six years of the time, and prior to the extension of the Frisco, he drove the line between Brady and Brownwood. For eight years he drove the Brady and Mason line. He was one of the early settlers here, and was well known over the county, being held in high esteem by all.

Surviving are his wife, four daughters, Mrs. June Cooper of Brady, Mrs. Lige Garner of Mason, Mrs. N.

L. Graham of Seymour and Mrs. John Green of Ada, Okla., and one son, H. B. Sheppard. One sister, Mrs. Bud Keese, and his mother, also, still survive, the latter being at the advanced age of 92 years, making her home at Bandera. On account of being very feeble, she was unable to attend the funeral. His son, and Mrs. Garner and Mrs. Graham came to Brady to attend the funeral.

MEN ARRESTED AS SWINDLERS ARE IN COUNTY JAIL

Two men giving their names as H. Harris and S. L. Goulson were arrested Wednesday at Stacy by Sheriff Wall on a charge of swindling. It is alleged that the men had been going about over the county selling spectacles, and offering to cure affections of the eyes. After receiving pay for the glasses, and promising to return in a few days, they would take their departure for newer and greener fields. Quite a number of McCulloch county citizens claim to have been victimized and several of the checks given the men by local parties were cashed in Brady. One check given them by A. F. McCoy at Nine, it is stated was also raised from eighteen to twenty dollars.

Sheriff Wall got on their trail this week, and succeeded in overtaking them in the Stacy community. In the meantime, it appears that the men are wanted on swindling charges in Hayes, Kendall and Erath counties, and the sheriff of Erath county arrived here last night to investigate their operations and see if they can be identified as the same parties who used the same tactics in his county.

Examining trial of the two men was held yesterday afternoon, at which testimony brought out the fact that while the glasses sold by the men were worth ordinarily about \$12 a pair, yet the glasses were sold at hap-hazard and with no attempt to correct eye troubles.

Bond was set at \$1,000 each, and upon their failure to make bond, both men were remanded to jail.

that had got so old as to have outlived his days of usefulness. One evening he, Jones, came home and told his wife he had sold old Tray. "What!" said she, "sold him? For goodness sake! how much did you get?"

F. R. WULFF GIVES INTERESTING ACCOUNT OF DELCO-LIGHT CONVENTION

F. R. Wulff, who returned Saturday from a two weeks' visit in Dayton, Ohio, Detroit, Mich., Dallas, Texas, and other points, speaks with great enthusiasm about the various meetings and manufacturing plants included in his visits. First of all, Mr. Wulff attended the Fourth Annual Delco-Light convention in Dayton, spending four days in all there, and then going to Detroit, where he visited both the Dodge and the Hudson factories, and completed arrangements for two carloads of Dodge cars and one carload of Essex cars to be shipped to him each month. Upon his return to Texas, Mr. Wulff attended the Texas Auto Dealers convention at Dallas.

At the Delco-Light convention there were present over 1500 salesmen and representatives, each of whom had won his trip to the convention by reason of having exceeded a stipulated total of sales. Thirty-one dealers went to the convention in a special car from Fort Worth alone. The importance of the meeting is indicated by the fact that representatives of six of Chicago's largest banks, and thirty representatives of newspapers and farm journals were also in attendance upon the three days' meeting.

A most remarkable sales showing was made by the dealers in attendance, each of whom had saved up all orders for Delco-Light plants sold since March 1st to the opening day of the convention, March 17th. The 17-day sales period showed \$830,000 worth of plants sold.

An exhibit that excited much comment was that of a Delco-Light plant which had been aboard a ship torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine. For two years the plant had lain with the ship at the bottom of the ocean. When the boat was raised the plant was salvaged, and was in operation throughout the period of the convention with the same parts as originally contained in it.

The Delco-Light company is putting out \$2,000,000 worth of plants per month, or three times as many as all other lighting systems combined. The company has set aside half-million dollars this year for advertising and has requested each dealer to spend 1% of his gross sales in the advertising of Delco-Lighting systems. The three-day convention cost the Delco-Light company \$60,000. Notable was the address made the dealers by Mr. Ketting, designer of the Liberty motor, and who is chief engineer of the General Motors company, with which the Delco-Light company is affiliated. Mr. Ketting stated that General Motors had appropriated \$7,000,000 for improvements and enlargements this year.

On Thursday afternoon, the whole convention body of some 1500 members were taken on a trip through the great Delco-Light factory, largest of its kind in the world and covering more than a million square feet of floor space. On Thursday night the feature was a comedy with music, produced and presented exclusively for the Delco-Light organization.

Friday's program dealt with intimate service and financial problems and included, also, a striking parade of factory employees, representing each department. The keenest interest and enthusiasm were displayed on every hand, declares Mr. Wulff clear up to the culminating feature, the annual banquet for the entire con-

vention body, on Saturday night. Prominent speakers, delivered stirring talks, and at the conclusion, motion pictures were shown of many of the important features of the three-day convention.
