The Williamson well on the Cox farm two miles southwest of Byrd's store in north part of Brown county, is flowing by heads at 2390 after entering the sand at 2385.

Local oil scouts who visited the well Tuesday stated that the well was shut down at 2390 to move boiler back and make ready to drill in. It was of the opinion of scouts that the well would make 50 barrels production as it is and that bigger production might be expected when drilled in.

The well is a few miles east of the Coleman county line and in the vicinity of the Bailey well which is a small producer.—Coleman Democrat-Voice.

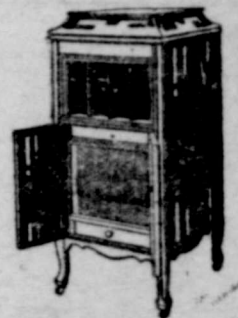

WHITE WELL NO. 6 BRO'T IN THURSDAY AT MERCURY

White well No. 6 was drilled in last Thursday in the White field, 3 1-2 miles southwest of Mercury, and has added enthusiasm to operations in McCulloch county, by showing up with greater quantity of oil than any well so far drilled. The well was drilled in at 366 ft., and 7 ft. of sands were drilled through. This is a foot more sand than was found in any of the other White wells. There is much activity and many rigs in operation in the Mercury field.

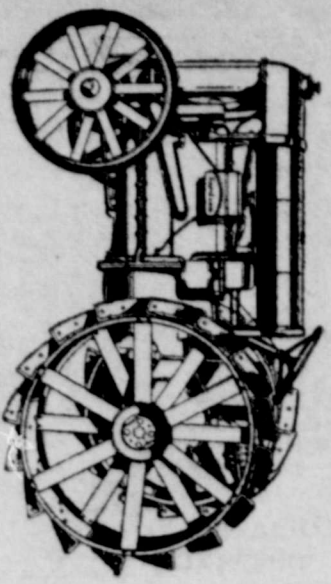

DR. HICKS MARTIN LOSES HOME AT KATEMICY BY FIRE

Dr. Hicks Martin was in Brady Monday from the Kateincy community and reported having suffered a heavy fire loss in the complete destruction of his home, together with all its contents, on Thursday night of last week. Not a single article of furniture, household goods or clothing was saved from destruction. Dr. and Mrs. Martin were visiting at a neighbor's about a quarter mile distant, when the blaze was first noticed, and the doctor rushed to his car and drove to the scene in mad haste, finding a number of his neighbors already on the scene. In the intervening few minutes, however, flames had enveloped the entire house, and not the least article could be rescued.

The house was a substantial 7-room structure, and was one of the most comfortable and commodious homes in the Kateincy community. It was built some seventeen years ago, and had

been occupied for the past sixteen years by Dr. and Mrs. Martin. Not only is the loss a heavy blow to them in that the fire destroyed the building and improvements made during these many long years, but also it is an irreparable loss in the destruction of many invaluable relics and heirlooms dating back to the forebears of the couple. No insurance was carried by Dr. Martin.

Mrs. Martin is all but prostrated by the disaster, and no plans for rebuilding have yet been formulated by the doctor. For the present they will make their home in the rear of the drug store. In their misfortune they have the sympathy of all.

QUALIFIED VOTERS MAY CAST BALLOT WITHOUT PAYMENT POLL TAX, ATTORNEY GENERAL SAYS

Austin, Sept. 13.—All men and
women of Texas who are otherwise
qualified to vote may participate in
the general election to be held Nov. 2
without payment of poll tax, accord-
ing to an opinion from the Texas at-
torney-general made public late today
by the governor, who declined to com-
ment upon it.

Male inhabitants are still liable for
the payment of a poll tax, the opinion

said, but that failure to pay the same
will not disqualify a man from voting
who is otherwise a qualified voter.
The opinion said that the suffrage
amendment is now recognized by the
federal government as part of the con-
stitution of the United States and that
all states are prohibited from exer-
cising discrimination against citizens
who desire to vote and who are other-
wise qualified to vote by reason of, or
on account of sex.

CITY WATER COM- MISSION LOWERS LIGHT AND POWER RATES

The Board of Commissioners of the
Brady Water and Light Co., this week
announces a reduction in both water
and light rates, to apply upon quanti-
ty consumption. The new rates are
20c for the first 25 K. W. of light,
and 15c per K. W. thereafter. The
power rate is 10c for the first 100 K.

imum power rate is \$1.00 per h. p.
motor.

eration and maintenance costs should
be returned to the citizens, and by

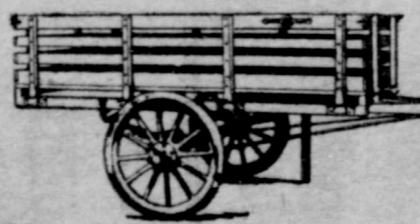
