THURSDAY, JULY 20 was an important anniversary in the history of our nation.

At exactly 4:16 p.m., E.D.T. on July 20, 1969, our country won one of the only head-to-head races we have ever had with the Russians by landing the first man on the moon.

The feat capped more than a decade of scientific "push" across our nation, after America saw the Russians launch the first space satellite in 1957.

America's goal had been clearly set out, and stated many times, and was to land men on the moon prior to the end of the decade of the 1960s. The Apollo II astronauts did just that.

Do you remember where you were and what you were doing 20 years ago when Neil Armstrong steered the Eagle module to a safe landing on the moon's surface?

A few hours after the landing, Armstrong expectantly climbed down the ladder on the module to set foot on the lunar surface, and made his now-famous statement, "That's one small step for man, one giant step for mankind."

At the time, we did not know that Armstrong had had to take manual control of the module after a computer overload caused the Eagle to overshoot its proposed landing site by almost four miles.

Armstrong was forced to look out the module window, and with time and fuel running out, pick out a spot on the moon's jagged surface that he felt would work. When he made touchdown with the Eagle, Armstrong and co-pilot Buzz Aldrin had less than 20 seconds worth of descent fuel left.

The entire world was watching as America pulled off this space "first," and it was quite an accomplishment.

The moon landing program cost America roughly \$50 billion, through NASA's budget, but it has been said that man's conquest of the moon would have been a bargain at twice the price.

For the past two decades, Americans have reaped the benefits of the "space race." History has shown that during times of war, more discoveries, especially in medicine, are made. Our "cold war" with Russia was no different.

Among the direct benefits from the Apollo moon project were such things as freeze-dried foods, cordless power hand tools, shatterproof eyeglasses, Teflon-coated cookware and quartz-crystal watches.

We have also benefitted by the system of weather and communications satellites which have been launched during the past 20 years.

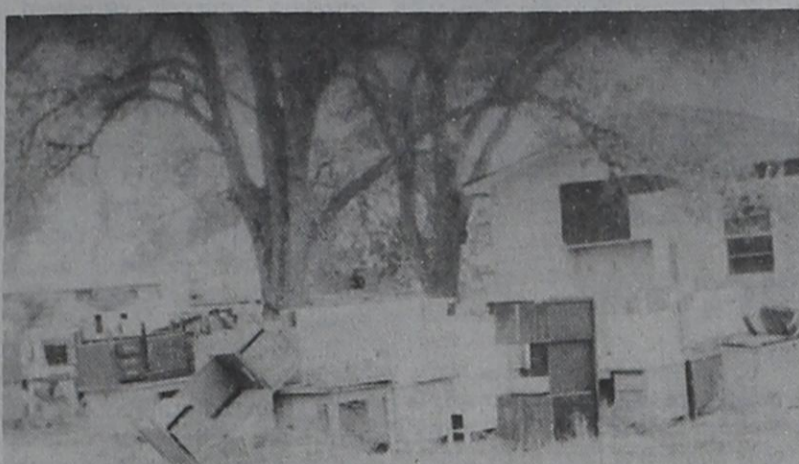
The satellites have benefitted us in providing world-wide TV news coverage on a live basis; giving the telephone industry a new international telephone system that works with crystal clarity, and have proven especially beneficial in the tracking and forecasting of weather systems.

Before satellites, about all that weather forecasters had to go on were the records provided by the major airlines and National Weather Service stations around the country. Today, many residents can watch weather systems develop while they are thousands of miles away from the local area.

But probably the greatest benefit from the Apollo program was in the field of computers. Harry Hurt III, writing in *Newsweek*, states that in the late 1950s the state-of-the-art computer was the size of a city block. Engineers developed a 17-pound model for the Eagle crew.

Today, with such developments as "mini chips," the home computer and business computer is almost as commonplace as typewriters once were.

And we owe it all to our country's Apollo program. Here's a 20-year toast to Neil Armstrong and the thousands of Americans who got the job done.

Local Women Tour Northern United States

Maesie Flynn and Erma Bradshaw left Amarillo on June 13 with the Trailways Tour, called Heart of America, with a group of 28 people for fourteen days through several states.

They traveled across Missouri to St. Louis, and enjoyed a city tour with a local guide which included a visit to Gateway Arch. They began fifty feet below ground where they boarded one of two capsule-transporters, the only ones of their kind in the world.

Each tram consists of eight barrel-shaped capsules joined together to form a train-like vehicle that runs on special tracks up to the hollow, curving legs of the arch. Each capsule holds five passengers and is equipped with a leveling device to keep a person in normal position throughout the sweeping curve of the four-minute ride to the top.

The capsule door opened and they climbed a short flight of steps

to the observation room which was 630 feet above the ground. The room was 65 feet long, seven feet wide and can accommodate 100 people. The arch was fully air conditioned and heated. It had sixteen windows on each side of the room with a spectacular 30-mile view.

That evening they attended a Major League baseball game with the St. Louis Cardinals and Montreal Expos, at the famous Busch Stadium. This was just a few blocks from their hotel room. They also visited the beautiful St. Louis Cathedral.

The next day they traveled through Decatur, Champagne and Gary, Indiana to Holland, Michigan. There they toured the Dutch Village and saw that it was an authentically created Dutch town, with lots of tulips. It was an interesting village with many kinds of shops which included the wooden shoe factory and they

Police Chief Is Shot After Routine Stop

Bovina Police Chief Gary Coleman was shot last Thursday night in front of City Hall on Main Street in Bovina.

Officer Coleman was shot in the face by Travis Gene Lambert, 24, at about 11:30 p.m. Lambert was driving a pickup truck with stolen license plates and was stopped during a routine traffic check.

Lambert was put into the back seat of the police car by Coleman. The back seat of the police car has

a security cage, and Lambert was not handcuffed. The officer said he was not arresting the young man at the time, and only meant to talk to him when he was put in the back seat.

Coleman was talking to him through the sliding window between the back and front seats, then turned away. Lambert called to him and when he leaned back into the car, he was shot in the face by a 25-caliber automatic handgun that Lambert had concealed.

Officer Coleman fell backwards after he was shot and Lambert crawled through the window between the seats of the patrol car and out on the driver's side of the car. Coleman managed to draw his gun and shot Lambert in the right leg. After Lambert escaped the police car, he again shot at Officer Coleman several times but missed each time. He then ran into the darkness.

Coleman called for assistance on the police radio, then got into the police car and began driving around looking for Lambert. He then decided to return to City Hall and wait for an ambulance.

Officer Coleman underwent surgery to remove the bullet which entered the lobe of a nostril, went through the roof of his mouth, bounced off his spine and lodged beside the carotid artery in his neck. He came through the surgery real well, but had difficulty in swallowing and had to be fed intravenously in bed. He was released Monday, July 17, from the Clovis High Plains Hospital where he was a patient for four days.

The following area law enforcement agencies were called in to assist the search for Lambert: the Texas Department of Public Safety, the Clovis Police Department, the Curry County Sheriff's Office, the Bailey County Sheriff's Office, the Earth, Texas Police Department, the Friona Police Department, the Texico Marshal and Parmer County Sheriff's Office.

The Clovis Police Department sent one of its canine units with Sgt. Gilbert Holguin to assist in the search.

Lambert was located about 3:15 a.m. on top of the old Isaac's building on Main Street, not far from City Hall and the Police Department building.

Lambert was taken to the doctor the next morning and his wound was clean. There were no broken

bones. He is now being held in the Parmer County Jail.

The pickup was searched later and a vial of cocaine, scales to weigh it and also some marijuana were found.

Sheriff Rex Williams expressed his appreciation for the response from the Clovis Police Department and the Curry County Sheriff's Office in assisting. Williams said, "I'll be happy to return the favor anytime."

Channel 10 TV Station was on the scene before Lambert was apprehended and had good coverage all the way. Channel 4 and Channel 7 were also in Bovina the next day with cameras.

For those who want to come by and sign the applications, the center will be open Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 8-11 a.m.

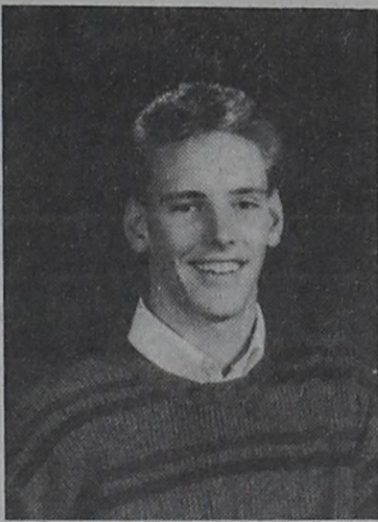

Lanny Webb Is Energas Dist. Mgr.

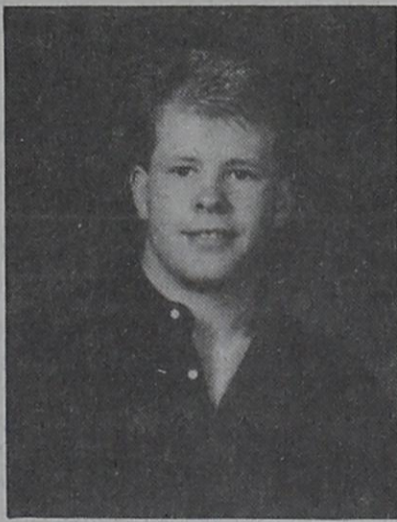
Lanny J. Webb has been named to the position of district manager of the Hereford District of Energas Company.

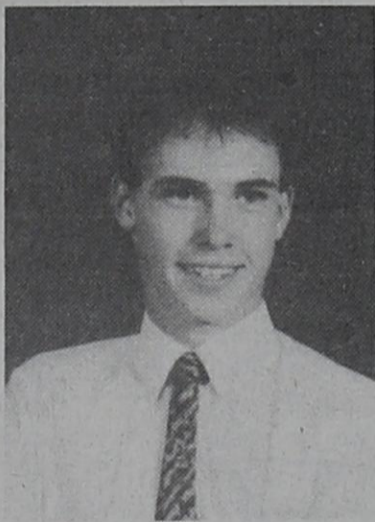
Webb, a native of Tyler, Texas and his wife, Marilyn, have three children. They will be relocating to Hereford.
