COLEMAN MAN IS TO HELP GET LINE ON WOOL MARKET

Waco, Tex., Nov. 6.—J. E. Boog-Scott of Coleman, member of the board of directors of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, has been appointed as a Texas representative on the wool marketing committee of the American Farm Bureau Federation, according to an announcement given out here today by C. O. Moser, secretary of the Texas Farm Bureau.

This committee is said to control 80 per cent of the farm wool of the United States, and is making a program for co-operative marketing of wool held by Farm Bureau members and affiliated organizations. The present plan contemplates the erection of seven big wool warehouses in the United States to be located in Boston, Mass., Columbus, Ohio; Chicago, Ill.; Portland, Ore.; Salt Lake City, Utah; and one each in some city in New Mexico and Texas. Representative Boog-Scott was put on the national wool marketing committee to give Texas wool producers a chance to become a part of the great selling organization. It is said that the wool growers will employ salesmen who will sell directly to spinners on the basis of quality of wool produced. Mr. Boog-Scott will leave to attend the session of the committee in the near future.

FARMER SAVES DAMAGED COTTON—STORE AND DRY

Max Zieschang was in the city Tuesday and told a Ledger man how he had saved his bad grade cotton and made good grade out of it, and he is doing the same thing this year.

Mr. Zieschang's statement is verified by others who have tried the plan and vouch for its value, and those who have tested the plan say that all farmers should profit by adopting this method of picking their storm damaged cotton.

"I discovered this thirty-one years ago," said Mr. Zieschang, "and it has saved me a great deal in the past years. Thirty-one years ago we had just such a storm as visited this country last Saturday night a week ago. I picked my cotton, which was badly damaged by the storm, and stored it away in a house. To my surprise when the cotton was ginned, it made a good sample, and classed out what our buyers call a No. 2 grade."

Mr. Zieschang says that he picked the cotton from the stalks, picked it off the ground at the same time and piled all the cotton in a dry room. It went through a sweating process and turned out a pretty grade, while neighbors who picked their cotton and carried it direct from the field to the gin got a low grade, and lost about \$20 per bale.

Mr. Zieschang says that he will vouch for a saving of at least enough to pay for the picking, if the farmers will store their cotton and wait for some time before taking it to the gin.—Ballinger Banner-Ledger.

Death of John P. Sheridan.

The death of John P. Sheridan, one of Brady's oldest and most prominent citizens, occurred last Friday night at 10:30 o'clock, following an illness of some months. Brights disease was the primary cause of death.

Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock from his late residence, the Rev. S. H. Jones conducting, and a large concourse of friends gathering to pay last tribute to the memory of the departed. Interment was made in Brady cemetery.

At the time of death, Mr. Sheridan was 73 years of age. He was one of Brady's oldest citizens, and at one time was an extensive landholder in this section. He was prominent in business circles, being a director in the Brady National bank, and having served as mayor of the city and ex-officio member of the board of trustees of the Brady Water and Light works for several terms. His able administration of civic affairs resulted in a general demand that he continue in office during the period of rehabilitation of the light plant and water-works system. The weight of years and his desire to retire from active pursuits, however, caused Mr. Sheridan to decline the honor, and he voluntarily retired at the expiration of his last term of office some five years ago.

For the past year or so he had suffered greatly with his fatal malady, and while his demise was not entirely unexpected, it brought sorrow, not only to surviving relatives, but to the entire Brady citizenship.

**PROSPERITY IS
FOLLOWED BY IN-
CREASED GAMING**

Dave Booker, colored, ran afoul the law Saturday noon when Sheriff Wall nabbed him just in the alleged act of selling a quart of perfectly good corn whisky to two boys for the trifling sum of \$15.00. The sheriff had had Booker under suspicion for the past six months or more, but was unable to catch him in any of his transactions. Saturday he was tipped off that Booker was about to close a deal; so Wall hid in the weeds on Brady creek, and witnessed the entire transaction. When arrested, Booker was dressed in the height of fashion, and gave every evidence of having enjoyed a highly lucrative business. He stated that he secured the liquor from a Mexican. Booker has been in Brady for the past year or more.

In the preliminary examination held before Justice of the Peace Lyle Monday, Booker was bound over to await the action of the grand jury. In the meantime he was granted his liberty under \$500 bail which he readily furnished.

Sunday Deputy Sheriff E. B. Scarborough flushed a full-fledged crap game in the negro flat near the Planters gin, and took nine crap-shooters in tow. Monday they all plead guilty in Justice court and paid uniform fines of \$18.90 apiece, making the total of the fines paid, \$168.30.

In speaking of this case, Sheriff Wall stated that between the sessions of the last two grand juries, 85 cases had been filed against gamblers and bootleggers, while since the last grand jury session in September, 65 cases had been filed. The general pocket full of money, is the videntia prosperity of the McCulloch country, and with every cotton picker with a pocket full of money, is the evident cause for the wave of gaming and bootlegging.

COUNTY AGENT BLACK
OUTLINES AGRICULTURAL
PROGRAM FOR YEAR 1920

We have just closed a very success-
 ful year in the Boys' and Girl's club
 work, having 155 members at the dif-
 ferent schools in the county. They
 report having learned a good deal
 about their different projects, as well
 as earning some money for themselves
 at the same time. They have not all
 kept up the work or reported on what
 they have done, but a goodly number
 have and their reports show that the
 work was not in vain. The figures
 given below are not as accurate as I
 would like but they are approximately
 correct. They have produced 250 bu.
 corn, 17 bales of cotton, 2 tons milo,
 1½ tons kaffir, 1 ton feterita, and
 have cared for 50 fattening pigs, 45
 breeding pigs, and 9 brood sows, 4
 baby heeves, 2 dairy calves and 160
 chickens. Six of these boys went to
 the A. & M. college and took the short
 course and 13 went to the Dallas fair,
 their expenses being paid by the Brady
 Chamber of Commerce. Several have
 not reported on their work yet, but I
 hope they will do so at once and get
 credit for what they have done.

I have had several requests from
 men that I allow them to come in and
 join the Baby Beef club. Since the
 boys have demonstrated that they can
 win prizes over the men in many in-
 stances they have authorized me to
 challenge the men for a contest, there-
 fore I am soliciting club members this
 year without reference to age or sex.
 If you want to become a member for
 1921 do not wait but send in your
 name to me at once stating what club
 you wish to join.

The Baby Beef club seems to be at-
 tracting more attention just now than
 any other. It appears now that there
 will be some very attractive cash
 prizes offered to those growing baby
 heeves. Some of the ranchmen have
 offered to sell some of their best calves
 on time for this purpose, and to do
 everything they can to help the work
 along. Those who join will receive
 bulletins put out by the A. & M. col-
 lege telling how to select and care for
 their animals, and how to grow crops
 to the best advantage. They will also
 be visited regularly by the county
 agent who will advise with you re-
 garding the best interest of your
 project. If you plan joining drop
 me a card right away so you can get
 started early and have a better chance
 to win. Do not wait to get your animal
 before you join. I can possibly be
 of help to you in selecting a good
 animal for this work. Experience has
 proved that inferior animals cannot
 successfully compete with animals
 with breeding and conformation.

You might not have thought about
 it but the club work in the county did
 more to put the McCulloch County
 Co-Operative Exhibit over than any
 other thing. Some may doubt that
 statement, but I am in a position to
 feel that I know that to be a fact.
 The swine were well represented at the
 exhibit, but the baby beef department
 was not. Let's come up with that end
 of the work next year and have a fine
 exhibit of baby heeves at the exhibit.
 You know now that the exhibit will
 be put over in 1921 and we must be-
 gin now to get ready for it.

I believe that everybody in the county
 is willing to begin now to make the
 next exhibit the best in Texas. To
 this end I shall be glad to have any
 and all suggestions for the betterment
 of the coming fair and I want to take
 this opportunity to express my heart-
 felt thanks to everybody in McCulloch
 county for their co-operation in put-
 ting over the fair that you all seemed
 to enjoy here at Brady. We had a
 very nice exhibit at the Dallas fair,
 but we must go next year and be re-
 presented with every item on the score
 card. We must bring back some prize
 money next time. I believe we will,
 too.
