**ONE IS KILLED,
7 MORE HURT IN
FRISCO CRASH**

Fort Worth, Texas, Dec. 21.—One woman was killed and several other passengers seriously injured when a freight train crashed into Frisco passenger train No. 32 as it stood at a bridge at Cresson, eighteen miles southwest of Fort Worth, about 6 a. m. Monday.

The body of the woman killed was still unidentified at 3 p. m.

The injured were brought to Fort Worth, arriving here about noon. They were immediately taken to St. Joseph's Infirmary in Spelman ambulances.

The body of the woman was taken to Sloan & Harveson's undertaking parlors where it is being held for identification.

The passenger train was due in Fort Worth at 7 a. m. The woman killed was alone in the ladies' dressing room when the crash came.

Woman Got on at Coleman.

The woman is described as about 25 years old, five feet four inches in height and weighing about 140 pounds. She had light brown hair and gray eyes. On her fingers were three rings, one of them a diamond solitaire and another a plain gold wedding ring. The latter was inscribed "Dec. 23-17" and with what appears to be the name "Artie."

She also wore on her waist a small triangular pin bearing the letters "P. S. H." On the reverse side were the initials "E. J." She wore a blue serge suit, the coat of which bore the label "Blass & Co., Little Rock, Ark." According to other passengers the woman got on the train last night at Coleman, Texas.

Injured in Hospital.

The injured taken to St. Joseph's are:

Bernay Sheffield of Brownwood, slightly injured about the feet.

Daniel H. Campbell of Chicago, injured about the body.

Henry Toliver, negro porter on the Pullman, 132 Lee Street, Fort Worth, injured about the head.

Louis Arthur, express messenger, living on Hemphill Street, Fort Worth, seriously injured about the head.

M. F. Kitchen of Handley, railway mail clerk, hurt slightly.

Miss Jean Woodward, 1317 Edwin Street, slightly injured.

A. Walker, 1802 Adams Street, engineer on the freight train, knee hurt, taken to his home.

W. M. White, 1100 Samuels Avenue, fireman on the passenger train, cut about the face.

Charles Clarke, 1800 block on Fairmount, engineer on the passenger train, hurt about the back.

Berth "13" Lucky.

Sheffield occupied lower 13 in the wrecked Pullman. When he bought his ticket in Brownwood Sunday night the agent tried to give him lower 16, but he refused to accept it. That berth was demolished and the occupant probably would have been killed, said Sheffield.

The negro porter, Toliver, was sitting in an unoccupied section when the collision occurred. He said he was

thrown against the opposite berth and knocked unconscious.

The Pullman was cut almost in half, the freight engine plowing up the aisle.

Drs. S. A. Woodward and H. B. Kingsbury attended the injured at St. Joseph's. The condition of the express messenger, Arthur, is critical, it was said.

The passenger train, it was stated by members of the crew, had stopped at a bridge between Cresson and Winscott in response to torpedoes. Workmen were repairing the bridge. The passenger train was just starting ahead when the freight train emerged out of the fog and crashed into the rear Pullman.

Engineer Walker of the freight applied both sets of brakes but was unable to stop his train.

**COMANCHE MAN SECOND
VICTIM OF WRECK ON THE
FRISCO NEAR CRESSON**

Fort Worth, Texas, Dec. 21.—Louis P. Arthur, 23 years old, express messenger on the St. Louis & San Francisco Railroad, died early this morning at St. Joseph's infirmary from injuries suffered early yesterday when a Frisco train ran head-on into the rear Pullman of an inbound Frisco passenger train at the Winscott station, eighteen miles southwest of Fort Worth in the corner of Tarrant county.

Arthur's death brings the total fatalities from the collision to two. Miss Ednel Johnson, 26-year-old nurse of San Antonio, was in the dressing room at the rear of the Pullman and was killed instantly. She was enroute to Fort Worth on her way to Shreveport and Cypress, La., where she was to spend the Christmas holidays with her mother and other members of the family. At the time of the accident and when the train reached Fort Worth it was not thought that the injuries of any of the other passengers were serious. Further examination disclosed that Arthur's neck was broken, that his skull was fractured and that his left shoulder blade was broken. His home was at 3822 May street and his parents are residents of Comanche, where the body was sent this morning by L. P. Robertson, undertaker.

The body of Miss Johnson was sent tonight to Louisiana following the arrival here of Mrs. Irene Rader, 110 Euclid avenue, San Antonio, with whom Miss Johnson had made her home. The young woman was a graduate nurse of the class of 1919 at the Physicians' and Surgeons' Hospital at San Antonio. A class pin and a card bearing the name of Mrs. Rader and her address led to the identification of Miss Johnson. It had been expected that an uncle of the woman would arrive here from Shreveport, but he failed to appear, and preparations were made by Sloan & Harveson, undertakers, to send the body at the direction of Mrs. Rader. Miss Johnson formerly lived in Louisiana, and is

**HOGS RID FIELD OF
BOLL WEEVILS SAYS
FALLS CO. FARMER**

Rockdale, Dec. 20.—A Falls county farmer named Stratling turned twenty-three pigs into his twenty-three-acre cotton patch. These animals about cleaned up the boll weevils. The acres thus treated yielded Stratling better than half a bale to the acre, while on the thirteen acres in an adjoining field, on which no hogs were run, 90 per cent of the crop was destroyed. That thirteen acres made less than two bales.

The front part of the twenty-three acres was kept cleaner and made a better turnout of the staple than did the lower half, because the upper half was the first part to be visited every morning when the hogs began feeding, their bedding places being outside the barn and next to the cotton field in which they were turned.

Stratling is convinced that hogs will get nearly all the weevils in the average small farm.

**NO FLU EPIDEMIC THIS
WINTER, SAYS SURGEON—
IMMUNITY SEVERAL YEARS**

Washington, Dec. 8.—"There is absolutely no way of definitely foretelling whether this winter will witness any recurrence of epidemic influenza," said Surgeon H. S. Cumming of the Public Health Service yesterday. "As a result, however, of the careful analysis of the epidemiology of influenza it may be stated that an attack of influenza appears to confer a definite immunity to subsequent attacks, an immunity lasting for several years."

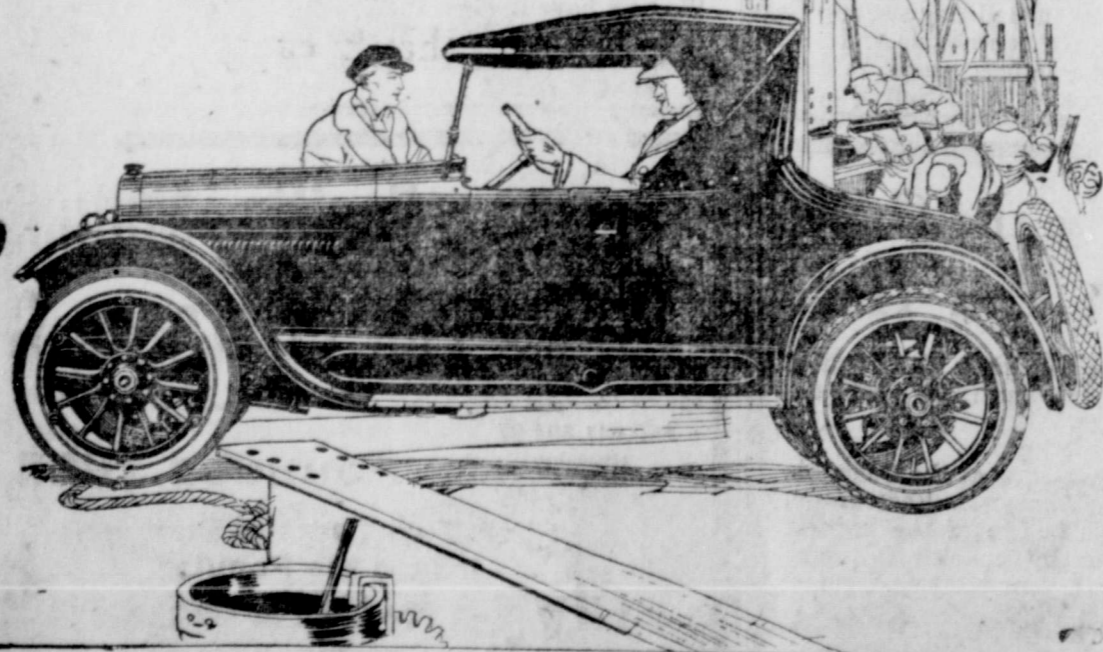

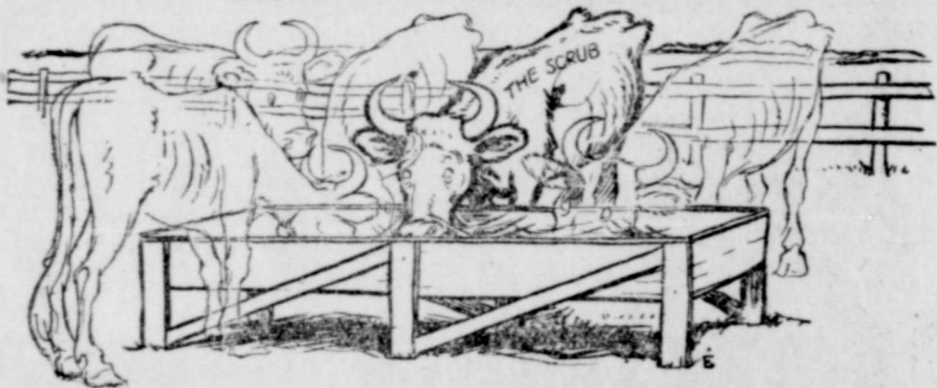

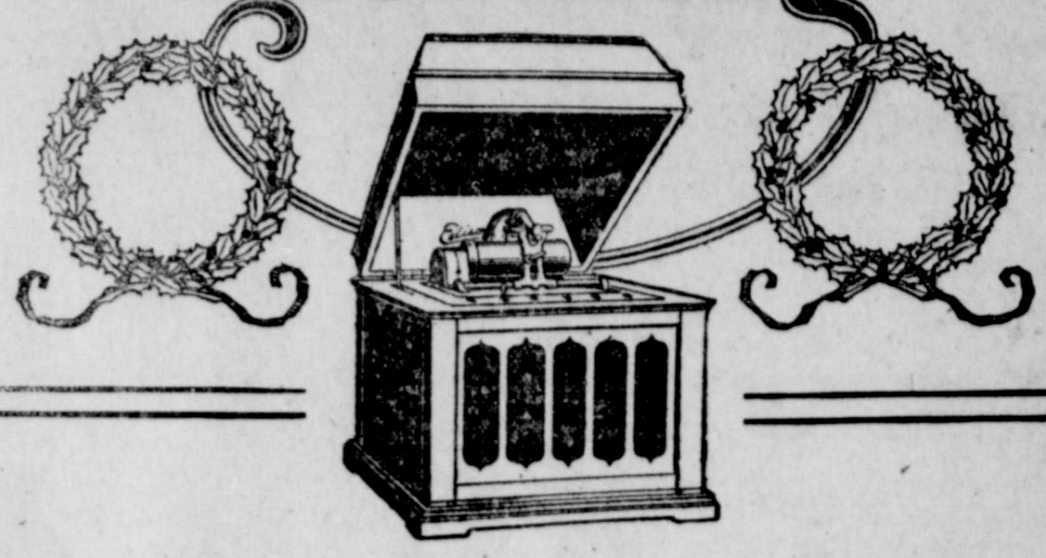

CAPT. W. R. SHAW, PIONEER COTTON MAN, PASSES INTO GREAT BEYOND SUN. NIGHT

Capt. W. R. Shaw, one of the pioneer cotton men of Texas, and who was known far and wide over the state, passed away Sunday night at the local sanitarium, having fallen a victim to pneumonia. His death cast a shadow of sadness over his friends, whose names were legion.

Capt. Shaw was preparing to go to Temple to spend the Christmas holidays with home folks, when he was taken suddenly ill Wednesday night. He was taken to the local sanitarium, where his condition was soon pronounced serious, and relatives and friends were notified. Mrs. Shaw and daughter arrived from Temple and were with him until the last. Despite the great shock, they bore up bravely, and all that a host of loving friends could do, was done to comfort and console them in their sorrow.

Capt. Shaw came to Brady early in the cotton season, and his lovable disposition soon won him the firm friendship of everyone with whom he met. A typical Southern gentleman of the old type, he was everywhere well received, and among the cotton men, he was a particular favorite. For the past 48 years he had been engaged in the cotton business, being located in various parts of Texas and in Mississippi during these years. At the time of death, he was aged 63 years. The body was shipped on Monday noon's Santa Fe train to Temple, being accompanied by the widow and daughter. Funeral services were held there, and then the body was carried to Waco for interment.

Besides the widow and daughter, a son living in Houston, survives. He joined the funeral party in Temple.

The oil is flowing into a pond as construction of tanks is being rushed. Oil men estimate that the well is a 5,000-barrel producer. Months ago the well had been drilled to a depth of about 1,500 feet and abandoned. The accident happened at the home of Mrs. Bradshaw's sister, Mrs. Otto Armstrong, in South Brady, where the family were Christmas visitors. The little fellow was off in a room by himself, and it is supposed he found the torpedo and by falling, or while chewing on it, caused the missile to explode. The lower lip was torn loose from the gums and badly cut and torn. The little fellow was rushed to the local sanitarium, where medical attention was given him, and he was able to return to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Armstrong the early part of this week. Unless complications arise, it is thought he will make a speedy recovery.

PREVENTION OF FIRE TAUGHT IN LOCAL SCHOOLS

Beginning next Monday, fire prevention as a study will be added to the curriculum of the local schools, thereby entitling the city of Brady to an additional 3% discount from the fire insurance key rate. The taking up of this study in the local schools, according to Superintendent N. A. Cleveland, is the result of authorization and co-operation upon the part of the Brady city council. The securing of this additional reduction upon the city's key rate will mean the saving of thousands of dollars to the mercantile and business interests of the city in fire insurance premiums, not to mention the good results from the elimination and reduction of fire risks.

While the local schools have heretofore had fire drills and instructions in fire prevention, the new course of study will be made complete, so as to receive recognition from the state fire board. Chief study will be given the subject of fire prevention, but fire fighting and proper methods of building fires will also receive the attention of the students. Report blanks showing the progress of the students will be made out every quarter and filed with both the city council and the state board of fire insurance commissioners. In the grade school, special lessons on fire prevention will be had twice monthly, together with fire drills at various intervals.

This new course of study marks a big step forward in the local schools, and not only the pupils, but the parents and patrons of the schools will be asked to join in the study of the pamphlets on the subject. The result is sure to be found in the elimination of every-day fire risks, in increased efficiency in the fighting and handling of fires, and in safety-first methods of building fires. These results will be had not only among the school children—the business men of the future—but through the co-operation of parents and patrons, immediate results will obtain for the citizens and business interests of today.

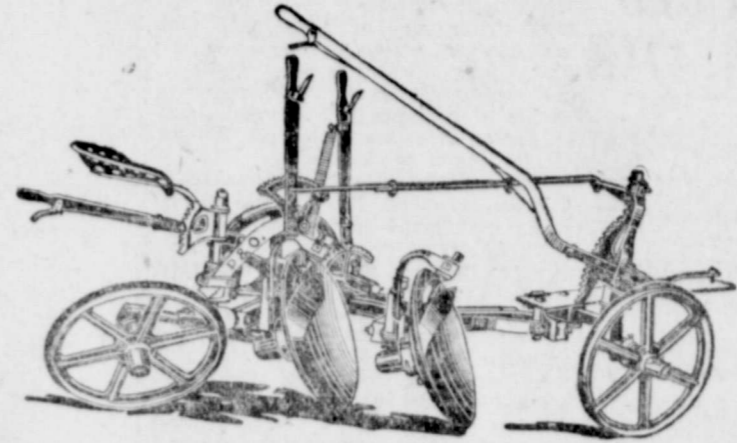

SENTIMENT—AND THE WAR.

A news item from Mason, Texas, says: "If the feeling against Germany was strong during the war, it has been forgotten." And then it tells of Mason citizens donating 80 milk cows and \$1,080 in money to be sent to Germany to help save the starving children of that nation. The item is misleading. The citizens of Mason who have made these donations to Germany are descendants of German parents, and some of them are native Germans. They never had "any strong feeling against Germany," either during the war, or before or since. In fact, they hoped that Germany might win. Many of them would have given almost their right arms to have kept the United States out of the war. But when the United States got in these men of American citizenship and German blood and faith, gave their sons without protest to fight against the nation whose blood was the same as their own. And now that the war is over, and defeated Germany pleads for help for its suffering children, the citizens of Texas of German blood are doing for them all that they can. What views the German people of this country may have of the Kaiser and the absolute monarchy he maintained, were varying in degrees of tolerance and indifference, but their sympathy for the German people, to which they were related in blood and ideals, was never in doubt and never concealed. No German citizen of this country witnessed the crushing of the German armies without regret and humiliation, but, with few exceptions, they held their peace and were commendably loyal to their adopted country. The war is over, and the German masses plead for assistance. That the Germans of this country, in the midst of their plenty, should give them this assistance, is right and natural, and they do not give this help in the thought that Germany may be raised again to an aggressive and offending nation, but in the hope that Germany may be restored upon the basis of a

new government that will offer the same independence which they themselves enjoy.—Brownwood News.

The Magnolia Petroleum Co. will on December 28 declare a stock dividend of 10 per cent, or \$60,000,000 to be paid as stock dividend to stockholders. That doesn't look like a dry hole.—Coleman Democrat-Voice.

Solvent borrowers who are caught by the sudden decline in prices in a position where they need time to enable them to mobilize slow assets have a right to expect consideration from their bankers and are receiving it. It is a function of bank credit in a period of strait to mobilize the slow assets of solvent borrowers. It is, however, no part of the function of the bank to validate the bad assets of really insolvent borrowers and it is no part of the function of the bankers to extend the loans to the borrowers for the purpose of aiding them to withhold goods on a declining market.—Financial economist of a New York bank. Business appears to be business the world over.—Fort Worth Record.

Representative Blanton has introduced a resolution in Congress providing for the reapportionment of representatives in Congress under the fourteenth census on the basis of districts of 350,000 population, so that the total membership of the lower House would be 394 instead of 435 as at present, or nearly 450 as it will be if the apportionment is carried out as heretofore on a basis of 211,000 people to each district. Mr. Blanton's bill will no doubt receive considerable support, in view of the fact that it is apparent that Congress is somewhat unwieldy in size and is to be greatly increased under the 1920 census apportionment. The proposal of the Texas member would give this state thirteen congressmen instead of eighteen as at present, while New York would continue to head the list with a total of thirty members.—Brownwood Bulletin.

Just as soon as we can get out of the "dumps" now impregnating and vitiating the air there is going to be the biggest rush of business in this country in the history of the nation. The country is just rearing to go ahead, and with the passing of the storm of adversity there is going to be a radiance of activity and prosperity that will so outshine our other days of activity that the gloom of today will be laughed at and then soon forgotten. We are safe and sound as far as a government goes; we are as well off today as could possibly wish if we would only admit it, but you cannot successfully admit anything in the midst of a brain-storm. In one sense of the word the present depression is a providential lesson from which the more knowing ones will learn and soon the sun of prosperity will be beaming brightly.—Hamilton Herald.

Consider the Telephone Cable

It consists of many small, fine copper wires, insulated from one another by wrappings of paper, all bundled together and enclosed in a water-tight sheath of almost pure lead.

It may consist of only ten "pairs"—20 wires—or it may contain as many as 600 "pairs"—1200 wires. It may be "aerial," strung overhead from pole to pole, or "underground"—resting in conduits buried beneath the streets.

In either case it must be water-tight to function properly, for even a tiny hole that lets in moisture will interfere with the insulation of the little wires, and many telephone circuits will then be "crossed" or "dead." Cables are carefully inspected to prevent such holes, but crystallization of, or defects or small cuts in the sheath may cause them—and the next rain does the rest!

The utmost of precaution will not prevent all cable trouble, but when it does occur it is given first attention; should your telephone be affected by it you may rest assured that prompt repairs are being made.
