### G. COHEN SELLS DRY GOODS BUSINESS TO H. ZWEIG

Announcement was made last Saturday of the purchase of the dry goods business known as "The Leader" store, from G. Cohen to H. W. Zweig, proprietor of the Hub Dry Goods store. Mr. Zweig taking immediate possession of the new purchase, while Mr. Cohen retires from business activities here. The deal, while in the nature of a general surprise, resulted from Mr. Cohen's desire to close out his interests here in order to become associated with his brother-in-law, M. Simon, in a very lucrative dry goods business conducted by Mr. Simon at Memphis, Texas.

Mr. Cohen opened "The Leader" store in Brady last April, and while he has built up a large patronage and was doing a most satisfactory business, yet he felt that he could ill afford to turn down the proposition to take over the M. Simon business at Memphis, especially since his recent fire entailing the loss of most of his household effects, left him freer at this time to make a move than he could hope for at any time in the future. Mr. Cohen states that he and his family will probably leave the latter part of this week, visiting first with relatives at San Saba and other places, before going to Memphis to make their home. In taking their departure, the family carries with them the best wishes of all their friends.

Mr. Zweig announces the continued operation of both the Leader and the Hub stores, the former being in charge of his brother-in-law, Edward Olan with Mrs. Nona Montgomery and Mrs. J. M. Pate, assistants, while

Mr. Zweig will continue in charge of the Hub, with Mrs. Chas. Tupman assisting, the while exercising general supervision and doing the buying for both the stores.

Mr. Zweig engaged in the dry goods business in Brady something like eight years ago and has built up a splendid business, carrying a large stock and complete lines. His newly purchased store gives him one of the most advantageous business locations in the city and should prove a splendid investment.

### 11 TOWNS GET ADDED CREDIT ON INSURANCE

Austin, Feb. 5.—Eleven additional towns have been allowed a credit for good fire records by the State Fire Insurance Commission, for the past three years. The towns and the amount of credit for each follows: Coppers Cove, 15 per cent; Sanger, 15 per cent; Carbon, 15 per cent; Wills Point, 12 per cent; Brownwood, 12 per cent; Corpus Christi, 15 per cent; Del Rio, 15 per cent; Brenham, 15 per cent; Paris, 15 per cent; Nacogdoches, 15 per cent; Brady, 15 per cent.

These credits apply on the final rate of insurance and on policies written on or after March 1, 1921, and expire on Feb. 28, 1922.

Local insurance representatives call attention to the fact that the foregoing is merely a continuance of the present insurance rate in effect in Brady. In other words, Brady already has the 15% credit for good fire insurance record, and her good record the past three years merely serves to continue this credit in force. Brady had a heavy run of fire losses during 1920, and would have lost this credit but for the good record the town made in 1918 and 1919, the three years' average serving to continue the 15% credit.

### E. J. BROAD BUSINESS HOUSE BO'T BY SMITH & PATE

The business house and block of ground known as the E. J. Broad property, and which is located southeast of the main business section of Brady, has been purchased by Messrs. T. T. Smith and J. M. Pate from the International Life Insurance Co. of St. Louis.

The property includes a solid block of real estate, particularly valuable because of its location close to the main business part of town, the north half of which is covered by a substantial rock building 100x200 ft. in dimension and with a ground floor space of 20,000, square feet. Not only is the building the largest in Brady in acreage covered, but its substantial construction and its advantageous location, makes it of particular value for storehouse and warehouse purposes, to which use the Messrs. Smith & Pate will put the building. The terms of the deal totaled \$11,500.

In making the purchase, the Messrs. Smith & Pate also took over the Brady Storage Company, doing a cotton storage business, and which has been conducted in the Broad building the past couple months by Messrs. W. W. Jordan and J. C. Taylor. The business will be continued under the same firm name, but the new proprietors will extend the activities so as to include all lines of farm products, as well as doing a general storage business.

Both Mr. Smith and Mr. Pate are accounted as among the most substantial, as well as progressive, business men of McCulloch county. Mr.

Smith has lived for a long number of years, prior to coming to Brady last fall, in the Melvin community, where he is well and popularly known. Mr. Pate, who also took up his residence in Brady the past year, was for many years one of the leading and most influential citizens of the Doole community. Their wide acquaintance and the general favor in which they are held, will stand these gentlemen in good stead, and assure them of success in their new line of endeavor.

### W.F. DUTTON FIRE SUNDAY BURNS BARN AND FEED

The feed barn at the W. F. Dutton place north of Brady, together with its entire contents, was destroyed about 9:00 o'clock Sunday night by fire of unknown origin. The fire boys responded to the alarm, but were unable to do anything towards saving the barn or the feed, both because the fire had gained such headway, and also because no fireplug was close enough at hand to afford the required water hose connection. The chemical was used, but was not able to make any perceptible effect upon the roaring flames.

Mr. Dutton is of the opinion that rate gnawing matches in the hay loft caused the fire. His loss includes between 200 and 250 bales of cane, about 250 bushels of oats and 25 bushels of corn—feed that was especially valuable just at this season. He carried no insurance on the feed, but had \$500 on the barn.

## HONEST INJUN.

We're not kidding when we say Walter Jordan has the new record for kids—triplets. Walter says that's what one of his nanny goats showed up with, and all three of the kids are doing fine.

"Governor Pat M. Neff has submitted four propositions to the Texas law, will go farther towards making the state one of the most unpleasant places for criminals of any state in the American union," says the Sherman Democrat. "First, he asks for the repeal of the suspended sentence law, that great incubator of criminals. Intended to reach out a helping hand to erring youth, this law has become the harbor and refuge of every class of criminal. Time after time, here in Grayson county, it has developed that men deliberately planned to violate the criminal laws, counting on getting out through the suspended sentence act if caught. Governor Neff would provide for the speedy removal from office of men who fail or refuse to enforce the law. No man has the right to draw the people's money for enforcing the law and then lay down on the job. The third proposal is that the Dean prohibition act be so amended as to provide that the verdict of a jury, after learning all the facts, shall not be set aside by any technicality of the law as to the sufficiency of the evidence. In this connection, Governor Neff calls the attention of the legislature to the recent holdings of the court of criminal appeals that under the Dean law a conviction would not be sustained upon the testimony alone of the purchaser of the intoxicant. This should be remedied at once. The further recommendation, to use the governor's own words is 'to correct the extravagant and ineffective procedure of permitting prosecuting attorneys to permit a defendant who is charged with a number of violations of the law to plead guilty and serve all of his sentences concurrently, and at the same time to permit the prosecuting attorney to charge as if the defendant had been convicted in each case.' The Democrat hopes to see the legislature enact each of these suggestions into law."

# RABBIT DRIVES STILL FEATURE OVER COUNTY

The Standard is still receiving good reports from all over the county concerning the rabbit drives held in various communities, and according to available reports, the death toll of mule-ears is mounting into the tens of thousands. Among those reporting, East Sweden reports a highly successful drive last Thursday, with a total bag of about 700 rabbits, according to Chas. Samuelson. Among others, Eric Swenson and Will Murphy went out from Brady and participated in the drive in the afternoon, Swenson giving a particularly good account of himself. The biggest individual bag in the morning amounted to 49, and during the afternoon Swenson shot to such good account that he ranked third with a total of 69, as against 70 and 71 rabbits apiece for the leaders. The drives in the East Sweden community will be continued every Thursday, and everyone is invited to join with them, meeting at the school house at 1:00 o'clock p. m.

A. M. Finlay was here from the Fife community Saturday and reported something like 500 rabbits having been killed in the drive made east of Fife Friday. The drivers started in at J. T. Smith's house and drove north towards the river; then they went up the river and drove south, taking in practically all of the territory east of Fife. On Saturday of this week, they are expecting a good crowd out and, starting at Fife will take in all the territory west.

Fairview community had a big clean-up on rabbits last Friday, something like 30 men participating, and six sections being covered. The drivers took in a range about two sections wide and drove across three sections. So good were the results that they have called another drive for Friday of this week meeting at A. J. Kinney's place on the Coleman road, at about 8:00 or 9:00 o'clock in the morning.

Out Dodge way they are planning on a big drive tomorrow (Wednesday). Aside from individual hunts, no concerted action against rabbits has been taken at Dodge. However, Sunday A. R. and Ev Simpson, accompanied by R. B. Spears and another, killed 111, which shows that game is plentiful. Not only are all the Brady citizens invited to come out and participate in the drive, but they are also invited to the big barbecue dinner, which will be a feature of the event. Messrs. John and Theodore Lyckman have offered a sheep and A. R. and Ev Simpson will donate a goat. Roy Simpson will have charge of the barbecuing and the dinner will be served on his place. Needless to say, everyone is enthusiastic over the event, and a great clean-up is expected.

### Waldrup Report.

Here is the rabbit report from Waldrup, with which Friend E. B. Kennedy has favored us:

"Well, I will send you a report of our last drive which was last Saturday, it being the largest ever pulled off by the club yet. 1160 rabbits were killed and have no idea as to the wounded that went off to die. This moves us up to 4160 since the drives started. Saturday is driving day every week until they are killed out or leave out. We invite anyone wishing to help to come. Say, Mr. Editor, those 85 jack rabbits killed on that 80 acres belonged to an old bachelor; no use to say he possessed any hunting qualities."

Martin has been in jail here since the killing last fall, being unable to make bond fixed at \$10,000, pending grand jury investigation. # FARM BUREAU MEETING WILL BE HELD SATURDAY, FEB. 19TH, ADOPT CONSTITUTION—BY-LAWS

This meeting is for the purpose of adopting Constitution and By-Laws. It is important that every member be present at this meeting, as you all want to know what you are to be governed by.

Your committee met last Saturday and framed a tentative constitution and by-laws, and they are ready for your consideration. As soon as adopted we will be ready for a more active campaign for members.

We will have with us on that day T. L. Smith of A. & M. college of Texas, who will give us the benefit of his experience and observation in connection with the workings of other county organizations. It is our purpose to make McCulloch county as near 100 per cent as possible in both membership and efficiency. We are in the Farm Bureau to get all the benefit that is possible to be derived from it, and to that end we want all the advice and consultation we can get in perfecting the working of our local organization and especially do we want the assistance of our own A. & M. college which is in a position to help us.

Every member is expected to be present and to bring as many new members as possible. We hope that within the next two weeks that there will be a local farm bureau organized at every school in the county. If your district is without an organization you will do well to make arrangements with me while at this meeting Saturday, if not before, for a speaking date with your people. The sooner you organize the sooner we will get results from our State and National organization. The more members we get in the county the greater good each member will derive from the county organization. In fact, we cannot do much locally until we get a strong membership. It is up to you and me to work for members and work hard now so we can begin to function right away and get the quickest results possible. Some of us feel that we have got to get ready to plant another cotton crop. That is important in a way. But we must be careful to do the most important things first. Listen! Why plant much cotton? Did you know that the biggest carry-over crop of cotton since 1910 was in 1918? And that that was 7,519,000 bales? Look at the price of the following crop. According to the report issued by the U. S. Bureau of Markets under date of January 19, 1921, it is estimated that we will have on hands July 31, 1921, 12,457,750 bales of cotton; and they also estimate that the world consumption for 1921 will be only 13,166,250 bales. What does that mean to us if we raise even a half of a crop this year? I think we had better be more concerned about the manner of marketing what we already have and a small crop this year than we are about raising another crop.

The following communities are already organized. If yours is not included we hope you will get busy and call for help and organize: Placid, Rochelle, East Sweden, Claxton, Fairview, Calf Creek, Fife, Lohn, Pear Valley, Melvin Dodge, Nine, Voca, West Sweden, Camp San Saba, Mercury. Do not forget to meet at the court house next Saturday afternoon at one o'clock.

### W. G. JOYCE, CITY TAX COLLECTOR, MAKES GOOD RECORD IN COLLECTIONS

W. G. Joyce, whose energies have been devoted the greater part of the past year to holding down the triple duties of city secretary, city tax assessor and city tax collector, has won much commendation for himself from the city council, and the citizenship in general, by the capable manner in which he has carried out his duties. Through Mr. Joyce's persistent and tireless efforts, the city sanitary department is once more upon a substantial and paying basis, with a competent man on the job. Even better is the showing made by Mr. Joyce in the matter of the collection of taxes due the city, the city's uncollected tax receipts totaling but \$357.09, and this amount representing both bonded and unretained property. More than that, Mr. Joyce has collected and placed in the city treasury \$1,425.69 in delinquent taxes, being accounts running from one to twelve years old. In other words, he has more than made his own salary in the collection of delinquent taxes.

Mr. Joyce recently also took over the assessing and collection of the taxes in Brady Independent school district and will carry on this work along with his regular duties as city secretary and collector.

### PHYSICIANS ASKING ABOUT PRESCRIBING BEER FOR THE SICK

Washington, Feb. 12.—A ruling as to whether physicians can prescribe beer for sick people under the terms of the prohibition enforcement act was sought from Attorney General Palmer today by the treasury department.

Assistant Secretary McLean explained that since the recent order permitting physicians to prescribe wine in unlimited quantities, many inquiries had been received from doctors asking why the right to use beer for medicinal purposes was denied.

The argument was advanced, Mr. McLean said, that beer had a lower alcoholic content than wine and for some ailments, particularly various forms of weakness its medicinal properties were more valuable.

### LAW REGARDING FISHING IS STRICT AND WILL BE ENFORCED, SAY OFFICIALS

Festive fishermen are often careless and even forgetful of certain laws in regard to fishing. There are certain laws in force in Texas in regard to fishing that are being strictly enforced and which it would be well for people who fish to remember. In the first place no bass under 11 inches must be caught and kept, nor is it lawful to catch any crappie under seven inches in size. Fishermen who catch fish below the sizes indicated would do well to place them back in the water, so they may have opportunity to grow and make larger fish. Young fish should not be caught, and the intention of the law in this instance is to preserve the young so they can grow and thus keep the species from being destroyed. Nets and seines must not be used in March and April. These are easy rules to remember and they are costly when they are forgotten. A man who lives on the Colorado river forgot these simple rules and it cost him \$59.70, which he promptly paid when brought to Brownwood and arraigned before Judge Cross. The man didn't even know, perhaps it was against the law and there may be others who do not know of these things.—Brownwood Bulletin.

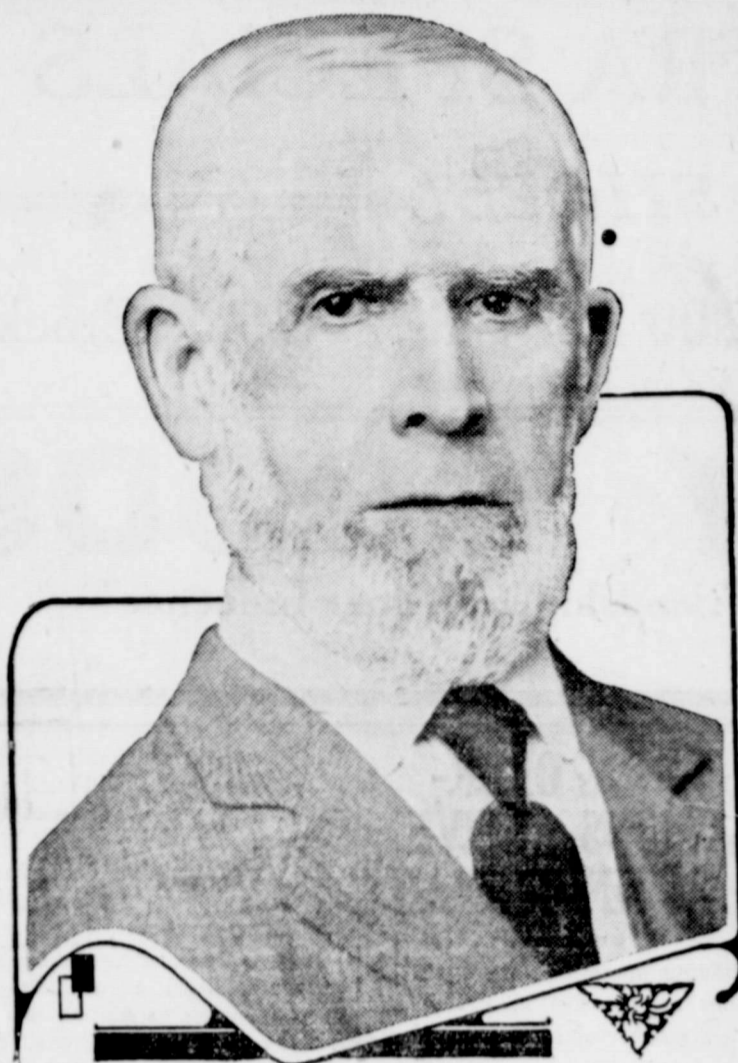

### HORNBY CASE WILL COME UP FOR TRIAL AT BELTON MONDAY, 14TH OF MARCH

The case of the State versus George Hornsby alias George Scott has been set for March 14th, according to advices received from Belton where the case will be tried. Assisting the district attorney at Belton will be the firm of Hair & Woodward of Belton, Lon Curtis of Temple and Wilkinson & McGaugh of Brownwood. It is probable that District Attorney Walter Early will not be able to attend court during the trial of this case as district court is in session at Ballinger at that time and he will have to be there.—Brownwood Bulletin.

### BILL FAILS TO PROTECT TAXES DUE FEBRUARY 1

Austin, Feb. 2.—The bill recently passed by the Legislature and signed by Governor Neff postponing publication of delinquent tax lists until October, 1921, and reducing the penalty for failure to pay 1920 taxes on time from 10 per cent to 5 per cent does not affect the penalty for failure to pay 1920 taxes due Feb. 1, 1921 according to a ruling by the attorney general's department.

The bill did not pass the Senate but the necessary two-thirds majority to make it effective on being signed by the Governor and therefore does not go into effect until ninety days after adjournment. Up until that time the penalty for non-payment of 1920 taxes will be 10 per cent, according to the opinion. The opinion was given at the request of Lon A. Smith, state comptroller, who said that he had received large numbers of queries from over the State as to whether the reduction was now applicable.

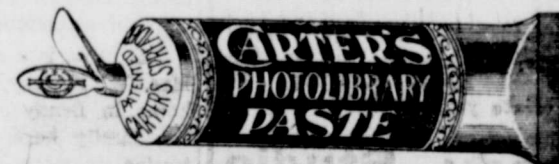
