LEVY BUYS CENTRAL HOTEL PROPERTY SITE FOR A NEW \$40,000 OPERA HOUSE

NEW THEATRE BUILDING TO COMPARE WITH METROPOLITAN STRUCTURES—SEATING CAPACITY 1,000—ORNAMENTAL BRICK FRONT WITH 2 STORE ROOMS.

Before the year is out, Brady will boast of one of the swiftest theatre buildings to be found in any place outside of the metropolitan cities. This is the assurance given by Julius Levy, proprietor of the Lyric Theatre, following the consummation of a deal for the purchase from W. D. Crothers of the Central hotel property, located on South Blackburn street, and just one-half block south of the square. Final papers in the deal are being passed this week. The purchase price was \$7,000, and Mr. Levy secures immediate possession of the property.

The site has long been recognized, as one of the most valuable business sites off the square, and in its acquisition, Mr. Levy fulfills a long-felt desire to secure a permanent home for the splendid enterprise he has established in Brady. For the past year or more, Mr. Levy has had the erection of a modern theatre building for Brady in mind, and the carrying out of his metropolitan ideas only awaited the securing of a suitable site for the building. His present plans are to either tear down the hotel building, a two-story frame structure, now occupying the lot, or else have it moved off to another location. This will give him a building lot, 90x100 ft., fronting on both South Blackburn and South First streets. The proposed theatre building will be 50x90 ft., fronting on Blackburn street and occupying the middle of the lot. The front will be of pressed brick and plate glass, and will include entrances and show windows for two stores, 20x50 ft., on either side of the raised entrance to the theatre lobby and ticket window. The walls of the building are to be of brick or concrete, and the building will be of fire-proof construction throughout. The location of the building in the middle of the lot, will enable ample emergency exits, and will also permit of windows for ventilation being placed on both north and south sides, as well as in the front of the building, and will insure maximum comfort to patrons of the theatre during the summer months. During the winter months, steam or hot air will be used to heat the building. The interior arrangement of the theatre will provide for a 24-ft. ceiling and will include raised floor, with a row of box seats across the center of the house, and with 200 upholstered reserved seats. Seating capacity downstairs will be 650, and a balcony will be built to accommodate 350 or more, giving a total seating capacity of 1,000.

A stage of regulation size will be equipped to handle every manner of attraction, and will be provided with dressing rooms underneath the stage. The scenery and curtains will be constructed so as to raise straight up instead of rolling.

Two Simplex moving picture machines of the latest improved design will be installed, and which will enable the showing of pictures without stop or wait. A large electric sign, "The Lyric," with 200 lights, will be used to illuminate the front of the building, Mr. Levy using his own generating plant. The indirect lighting system will be used inside, enabling patrons to find their seats at any

time, during the showing of a picture. Prices of admission are to remain the same, 15c and 25c, as heretofore, with the exception of the reserved seats. Still another innovation worthy of special mention is the \$10,000.00 Wurlitzer orchestra, which will be installed. This wonderful instrument, the equivalent of a 16-piece orchestra, has already been purchased by Mr. Levy and the big blower and his pipes have already been received. The new orchestra will be installed in Mr. Levy's present theatre building temporarily, replacing the old orchestra which Mr. Levy has disposed of. Not only will this new marvel be used to furnish entertainment during performances, but Mr. Levy will also engage a pianist to play accompaniments especially written for his various pictures.

All in all, Mr. Levy proposes to leave not one thing undone towards giving Brady a theatre building, and motion picture service that will put Erady right up in city class, and while the cost of the building and equipment will run around \$40,000, he says he knows no better way of showing his appreciation of the patronage enjoyed by him than to give Brady this modern show place, and incidentally establish his enterprise in a permanent home. Seven years ago Mr. Levy built his present theatre building, and while it was of frame construction, yet the splendid ventilating system, and the numerous safety exits, made it at once one of the most comfortable and well-arranged show houses in West Texas. Added to this, Mr. Levy has been furnishing a picture program of the highest class, including all the new and popular films to be found in the cities, and has left nothing undone towards giving Brady a show of which she might be proud. His latest enterprise, however, has served to win for him public approval and commendation upon all hands, the more especially since no one questions but what he will carry out his ambitious plans even to the smallest detail.

Work on the new theatre building will not begin for possibly 60 or 90 days, inasmuch as the contract is still to be let, all the material and equipment must be assembled, and in the meantime the lot must be cleared of the hotel building which has stood there for the past 30 years or more.

40-H. P. MOTOR FOR WATER & LIGHT PLANT RECEIVED FOR 400-GAL. PUMP

INSTALLATION WILL ENABLE PUMPING OF 400 GALLONS WATER PER MINUTE INTO CITY MAINS WITH A PRESSURE OF 100 POUNDS—LAST OF NEW EQUIPME.

The last of the new equipment purchased for the rehabilitation of the Brady Water & Light Works plant has been received. It is the big 40-horsepower motor which will be used with the 400-gallon per minute pump, and which was received some two months ago. Installation of the new pump has been delayed pending arrival of the motor to drive the same. As before stated, this motor has finally been received and is now being unloaded for installation at the plant.

With the new pump and motor, Mr. Kirchner has received a relief valve, which will operate to shut off the standpipe and permit of pumping water directly into the mains. This will be used in times of fire when a heavy pressure is needed, and will enable the putting of 100 lbs. pressure into the mains on short notice.

That the new equipment will prove a wonderful aid to the local fire department, there can be no doubt, as prompt and fully adequate pressure is thereby assured whenever needed. Mr. Kirchner states that something like a week or ten days will be required in which to accomplish the installation.

ANDY MITCHELL, PIONEER McCULLOCH CITIZEN, DIES IN CALIFORNIA ON SUNDAY

Andy Mitchell, old-time McCulloch county citizen, is dead in California according to advice received by relatives here. Back in the '90's Mitchell made his home for a number of years in what is now known as the Life community, and was one of the most prominent citizens of this county. Twenty-two years ago, he removed from the county, taking up his residence at Higgins, Libscomb county, where he served as postmaster for a number of years. Later he removed to California, and had made his home there.

Mr. Mitchell had been in bad health for the past four months, but his mind remained clear, and he endured no suffering up until almost the last minute. Death came suddenly last Sunday. At his own request, his body is being shipped back to McCulloch county for burial at Fife, the body having started for Texas on last Tuesday, in charge of his sons.

Deceased is survived by his widow and three sons in California; also by two brothers, Jack and Tom Mitchell, and one sister, Mrs. L. Bradley who reside at Fife. To them is extended heartfelt sympathy.

DEATH OF S. GOLDWASSER, FORMER BRADY MERCHANT, IN ST. LOUIS RECENTLY

S. Goldwasser, former Brady merchant, passed away suddenly in St. Louis, on Sunday, February 20th. For some five or six years Mr. Goldwasser had engaged in the dry goods and clothing business in Brady, occupying the present Hub Dry Goods Co. stand, where he enjoyed a lucrative business. After selling out in Brady about five years ago, he removed to his former home in St. Louis, where he had engaged in the clothing business up to the time of his death. Mr. Goldwasser had apparently enjoyed good health. He returned from a show at about 9:00 p. m., when he was suddenly stricken with heart failure. At the time of death he was 49 years of age. His wife, and one son, aged 13, survive. Funeral services were held and interment made in St. Louis.

Henry Zweig, brother-in-law of Mr. Goldwasser, and who arrived in St. Louis on a marketing trip just the day before Mr. Goldwasser's demise, was in attendance upon the funeral.

GORDON VALLIANT SUSTAINS SEVERE INJURIES WHILE HARNESSING MULE

Gordon Valliant well-known McCulloch county farmer, sustained quite serious injuries Tuesday afternoon while attempting to handle a young mule on Mann Bros.' place, 8 miles north of Brady. While holding the mule with a rope, the animal jerked Valliant against a tree, striking forcibly on his hip. At the time, Valliant paid no special attention to the injury, and finished harnessing the mule. After cooling off from his exertions, however, he found his side giving him great pain, and eventually was unable to move one of his legs. Wednesday he was carried to the local sanitarium, where an x-ray picture disclosed the point nearest the spine out of place, and the ligaments badly torn. After placing a bind around the injured portion of the body Valliant was returned to his home, where it is hoped that by resting and avoiding exertion of any character, that the injury may soon be overcome.

The accident was exceedingly unfortunate coming at this particular time, and bars Mr. Valliant from taking any part in planting his crop.

HORNSBY'S ATTEMPT TO ESCAPE FROM JAIL FRUSTRATED SATURDAY

Belton, March 5.—Plans for a wholesale delivery were frustrated this morning by Deputy Constable Jack Bonds, who is a special guard of George F. Hornsby, held in jail here for the murder of J. N. Weatherby at Brownwood last fall.

This morning about 4 o'clock the special guard was awakened by noise within the jail where the prisoners are kept. Keeping close guard Mr. Bonds waited until day before he made a thorough examination, knowing that in the event any of the prisoners made it out of the inside pen they would still have another wall to go through before they could obtain their freedom. At day break he notified Sheriff Bonds and deputies and an examination was made inside the cells. They stated their investigation revealed that Luther Craddock and Hornsby had appropriated part of a cot to pry off an iron bar about four feet long which is a part of the lock system, and had concealed this in a bed and hung a pair of trousers over the place, where the bar came from to hide their work.

The damage done in the work last night by the prisoners was estimated to be about \$500 by Judge Sutton. About two weeks ago officers stated that an attempt was made by Craddock and Hornsby to saw through the cells and they had almost sawed through the steel when their plans were detected. Hornsby and Craddock have been placed in solitary confinement, officers state, and are no longer allowed the privileges of the other prisoners. About one month ago Craddock made his escape from the basement of the jail but after a hot chase was captured by Sheriff Bonds about a mile west of town.

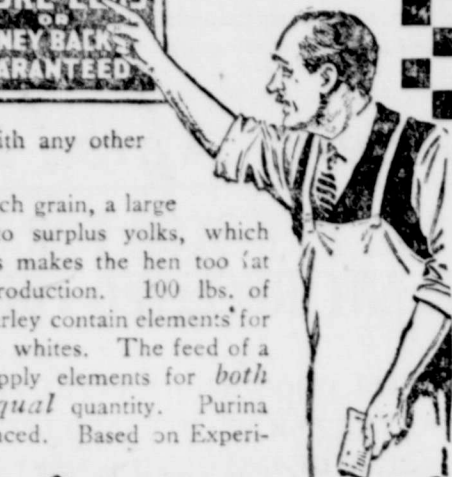

Mrs. Charley Frankum and children of San Saba county are visiting her sister-in-law, Mrs. John Newlin.

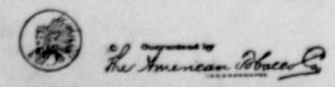

Carl Hanson returned from his old home at Hutto, Texas last Saturday, where he was called to be at the bedside of his aged father, who died after being sick for several months.

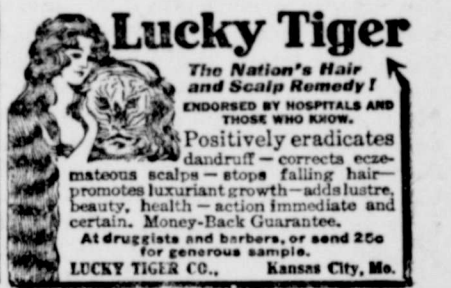

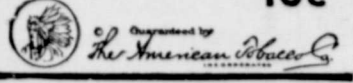

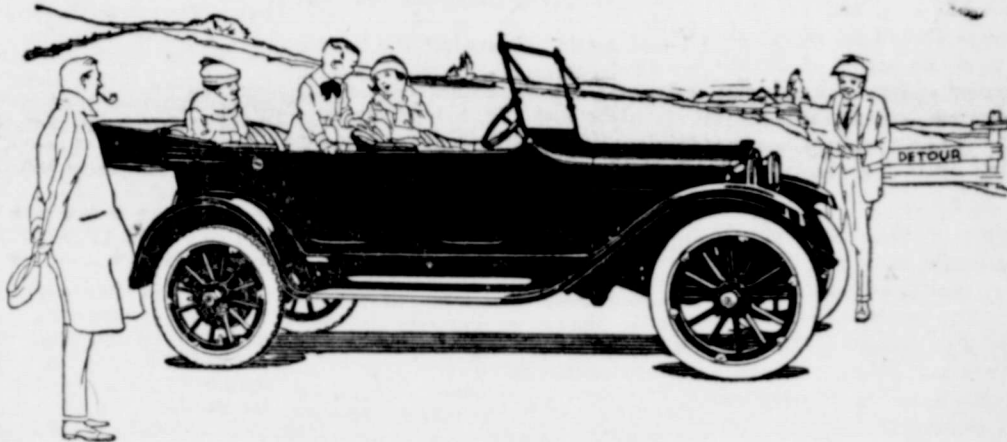

HEALTH WEEK.

Next week, March 13th to 19th, inclusive, has been proclaimed as Health Week by Governor Neff of Texas. Every citizen of the state is urged to spend the week devoting his energies to making his home and community, his county, his state a better and healthier place to live in. There are many ways of accomplishing this end. One is, and the ministers of Texas should all co-operate in this, to have the gospel of cleanliness, sanitation and health preached from every pulpit on next Sunday. If "Cleanliness is next to Godliness," then it should serve as a good sermon subject.

Every school in the county should instruct the pupils, large and small in matters of health, sanitation and cleanliness. Too much stress cannot be laid upon these subjects. It is the first step, and a big one, towards a better citizenship, and a stronger and more virile generation.

In the home, too, the importance of these subjects cannot be over-esti-

mated. First, and lasting impressions, are most often had in the home. Teach the child right, and he follows the right path through life, since his feet have been set in the right path. Last, but not least, don't forget that you owe it to yourself, your family your neighbors, to have your premises clean and sanitary. This should be clean-up week, not only in Brady, but in every community in the county. Every place, every citizen, every child should do full part towards the clean up of the community for the better health of the community.

RETURNING CHICKENS.

Here is a remarkable editorial reprinted from the Tulsa World of February 23rd. There have been, from time to time, rumors of extravagance and waste in the national government, which have filtered through to the ears of the common people, but the following editorial is about the strongest indictment of any public official we have read in some time. If the World and Leslie's tell the truth, then there is indeed need for an accounting. If it is not the truth, then both of these publications should be called to account.

Here is the editorial, as it appeared in the Tulsa World:
Evidence accumulates that William Gibbs McAdoo is going to be forced to that accounting which his adroitness protected him from during his entire official tenure.

Mr. Paul V. Collins, writing in the current number of Leslie's on "Our Government Orgy of Waste," says of the former secretary of the treasury and director general of railroads: "If for every minute of time since the beginning of the Christian era, three dollars had been cast in the sea, the sum would not equal what McAdoo cast away in his intoxication of profligate mismanagement of railroads."

And again, discussing the gentleman's desertion of the ship of state after the armistice had been signed: "At the close of his mismanagement of the railroads, Secretary McAdoo declared he could no longer afford to remain in government service—he must get out and recoup his private fortune. * * * He resigned, and invested about \$1,200,000 in a modest home in California, and a sum approximately the same in another humble shelter on Long Island, indicative of his stringent need of provision for his family."

The senate judiciary committee, haling before it Secretary Houston, McAdoo's successor, or at least one of his successors, asked the meaning of McAdoo's published statement in op-

position to the government continuing as the financial backer of struggling nations in Europe. Mr. Houston replied that he did not understand Mr. McAdoo's statement, and read from the former secretary's report to show that he had extended European credits totaling \$8,171,976,666 while he was in office.

All of which recalls the McAdoo statement at the time the coal strike was pending, claiming that coal operators had been making criminal profits throughout the war period. Some one called attention to the fact that McAdoo must have been cognizant of this as secretary of the interior and was himself guilty of permitting it to go on. That stopped him. But he had carried his point—gained the support of the union leaders involved in the controversy and thus made himself a formidable candidate for the presidency.

Eventually, we think, McAdoo will be shown to be one of the most evil of all the evil influences of the Wilson regime.

DESPERATE CASE.

The News has just learned of a family residing near Mason that is close to starvation. One of the children came to our office and informed us that they would have to ask us to discontinue their paper because they were unable to afford it. The News costs but \$1.50 per year and we are certain that a family that is really and truly unable to lay aside that small amount each year to spend for their local paper is bound to be in a financial strain and is very likely on the verge of starvation. Evidently there is something besides the excuse which was offered as the main reason for discontinuing the paper, for the child was far from looking like a poor urchin, but nevertheless, we have stopped the paper and trust that the family will soon be able to save enough thereby to replace their old Ford with a better and more expensive model.—Mason News.

Representative Beasley has introduced in the legislature and secured a favorable committee report on the measure to give the pecan a legal weight. It was not commonly known, but a fact nevertheless, that the pecan, a native Texas nut, was not listed in the legal weights of products as recorded in the weights and measures department of the state. The legal bushel weight of the pecan, according to this bill, will be 44 lbs.—Coleman Democrat-Voice.

CLEAN-UP TO BE THOROUGH SAY CITY OFFICIALS

City officials are anxious that the Brady clean-up be made thorough, and every citizen of Brady will be expected to have his premises or property in apple-pie order, so far as sanitary condition is concerned by the end of the week. A preliminary inspection of the various sections of the town by Chief of Police has disclosed that many citizens have so far taken not one step in the direction of a clean-up, and in order to give these citizens another chance, the city's wagon will not start out on its rounds to haul away the trash until next Monday.

It must be understood that the city wagon is under contract to haul away all trash gathered in a convenient and accessible place, and that there will not be one cent of cost for this service to any citizen. All that is asked, is that each citizen gather rubbish trash and offal together in one pile at a convenient point. The city bears the expense of hauling this trash to the dump grounds.

As before stated, the trash wagon starts out next Monday, and will visit each section of town, but will not visit the same property twice. For this reason, trash must be ready for the wagon at the time it calls. However, should the wagon overlook anyone, the matter should be phoned to City Secretary W. G. Joyce before the end of next week.

Chief of Police Wood will make another inspection of the town next week, and every citizen will be expected to have his property in first-class sanitary condition at that time.

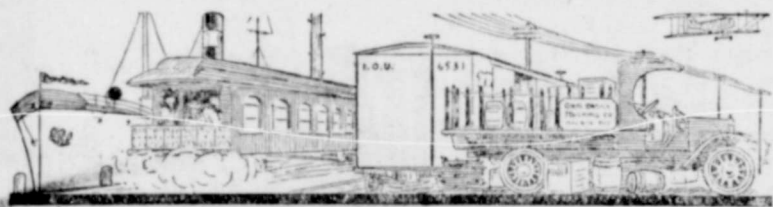

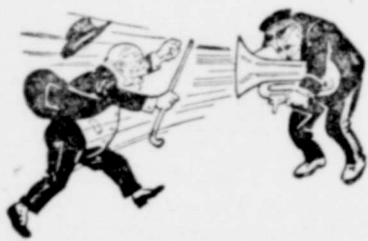

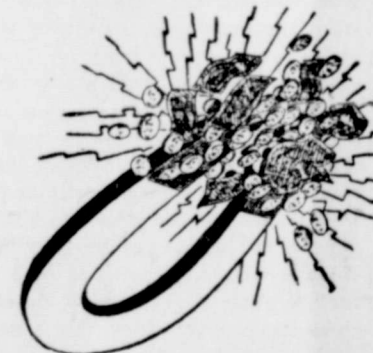

DON'T CROWD! U. S. LID IS LIFTED ON "BEER WITH KICK"

Washington, March 8.—The prohibition lid was removed today on "beer with a kick" for medicinal purposes. The Department of Justice ruled that physicians are authorized under the Volstead law to prescribe beer when in their judgment it will prove beneficial. The beer ruling was drafted before the new administration came into office and bears the signature of A. Mitchell Palmer, attorney general.

Beer now takes a status equal to that of wine as a curative agent, legally listed by the government, and physicians will be allowed wide latitude in directing its use by patients when such use will aid recovery in cases of illness or convalescence.

The beer decision is the climax of a warm conflict between some of the Government's legal minds. Prohibition Commissioner Kramer opposed such a ruling on the ground it would mean a general loosening up of the rigid rules governing the brewers and the sale of their products.

Officials are considering amendments to existing rules to allow brewers to sell beer of about 4 per cent alcoholic content, in order that an ample supply may be available to meet expected demands upon druggists.

FARM HINTS.

By B. D. BLACK, County Agt.

"The brain used in March will save the back in June."

All bulletins referred to below may be obtained from the Department of Agriculture at Washington, D. C.

Read how other men have planned farm operations in Farmers' Bulletins 81, 986, 1000 and 1015.

PLANS.
The thing that counts is not crop acres but more profit per acre; not more cows but profit from each cow; not more hours labor but better returns.

Don't plant in the moon; but get the best seed and prepare the seed bed then plant when soil and moisture conditions are right.

Grow everything that you can use at home. Do not sell what you will need later. If you do the business will be expensive.

If one's work is in town he should move in and save gasoline expenses.

Is the harness all repaired and oiled and ready for spring operations?

Is that planter and other implements ready to be taken out of the shed and put to work without loss of time?

If weeds are beginning to sprout in the plowed ground a section harrow is a dandy implement with which to kill them and mulch the ground.

When you overhaul the tractor read Farmers' Bulletin 1093.

Teach your boys and girls the vital points of early tillage and conservation of moisture. Encourage them in collecting and studying the life history of your troublesome insects. Also, encourage them in the club work. Close observation is needed by the youth, more especially.

Plan your work and then work your plan.

POULTRY.
April hatches are late. May is too late. Dust sitting hens thoroughly with good lice powder several times during the hatch. Feed balanced rations.

For breeders, select strong, active fowls. Do not breed sluggish, knock-kneed, pale, sunken eyes, and long snaky, or crow heads.

Eggs for hatching can be saved after the birds have been mated two weeks.

LIVESTOCK.
Prepare pens for sows which are to farrow soon. Have pig rails in position so as to reduce loss by sow laying on pigs. Sows should become accustomed to pen and attendant before farrowing, to eliminate any possible excitement.

Sows should be given clear water only for at least twenty-four hours after farrowing. Then she should be brought to full feed gradually in about two weeks.

Look for milk fever in cows soon after calving; more especially those with a heavy milk flow. Symptoms are, swelling of udder, sinking of eyes in head and sometimes bloating, and a general depression. This disease is very fatal. Treatment: pump air in the teats with ordinary pump and quill. The eyes should brighten in a few minutes. If not give salts, of a soda solution enema. Bowels and kidneys should act for best results. Farmers' Bulletin 206 describes the disease.

Milk cannot be substituted as a food.

Begin now to get your stock ready for the Exhibit in October.

If the horse has been idle give him light work to prepare him for the Spring duties. Watch his shoulders to keep them clean and the collar smooth and fitting snugly.

For instance, one man in South Texas had 800 bales of one variety of cotton this last year and a man came all the way from Liverpool and gave him \$30,000.00 premium on the staple. Several farmers in Nueces country grew one variety of cotton this last year and realized \$68,000.00 premium from the lint and seed. The same thing was done in Cameron county with a profit of \$66,713.00 over what other cottons brought, when sold in the usual way. San Patricio county did the same thing only on a larger scale and their premium on lint was \$195,000.00 and the seed sold for a premium of \$27,600.00.

PAUL AND E. E. WILLOUGHBY RECEIVE JUDGMENT FOR \$11,969.97 IN SAN ANGELO COURT

Judge Charles E. Dubois of the Tom Green county district court Wednesday entered judgment in the suit brought by Paul Willoughby and E. E. Willoughby against E. F. Vander Stucken and others in favor of Willoughby against J. T. Evans estate for the sum of \$11,969.97. Judgment also gave Willoughby possession of the Frank Baker vendor's lien note for the principal sum of \$7,619.44. E. F. Vander Stucken was rendered judgment against Willoughby for the sum of \$1,820.51 to balance accounts due as interest on the note involved.

The suit was a complicated affair and occupied the attention of the court for several days. It first came to trial on February 22 and a verdict was rendered by the jury on February 25th. Five law firms were involved in the suit and besides the plaintiffs, Paul and E. E. Willoughby, other parties to the suit were E. F. Vander Stucken, the First National Bank of Junction, the J. T. Evans estate and Dr. H. R. Wardlaw of San Angelo.

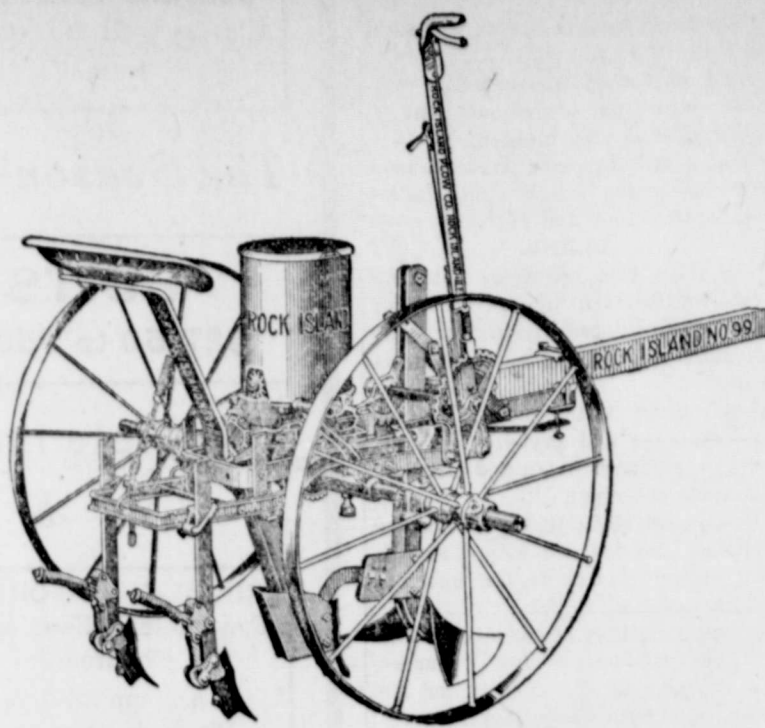
In the judgment the court held that J. T. Evans, Sr., the payee and legal owner of the Frank Baker vendor's lien note for the sum of \$7,619.44 pledged the note as security to Willoughby, subject to a prior pledge to the First National Bank of Junction. The court ruled that Willoughby, as endorsee of the note, paid the note for which the Baker note was offered as security and that the J. T. Evans estate was indebted to the plaintiffs, Paul and E. E. Willoughby, for a balance of \$11,969.97.

The court also found that Dr. H. R. Wardlaw, one of the defendants, paid to the First National Bank of Junction the sum of \$2,730.02, the amount of the indebtedness due it by J. T. Evans, Sr., for security of which the note was pledged, and received by J. T. Evans note and the Baker note as collateral and that Wardlaw sold the notes to E. F. Vander Stucken. Willoughby then made a tender, the court found, to Vander Stucken of the full amount paid by Dr. Wardlaw and that Vander Stucken refused to accept payment and to deliver the Baker note. The court found \$1,820.51 due Vander Stucken by the plaintiffs as balance on accounts of interest in the note.

The court also ordered that Paul and E. E. Willoughby recover from Vander Stucken the full title and possession of the Frank Baker note.—San Angelo Standard.

R. R. PASSENGER RATES ADVANCE MONDAY, 14TH

A 20% increase in passenger rates, and a 50% increase in pullman fare becomes effective next Monday on all Texas railroads. This increase follows the ruling of the Interstate Commerce commission, and which supersedes the ruling of the State Commerce commission forbidding increase in rates. The latter ruling caused a suspension of the increased rates in Texas for the past 6 months or more, and, as a result, passengers buying tickets to out-of-town points paid a higher rate of fare than those buying tickets to points within the state, since the inter-state rates have figured in the former case, and intra-state rates in the latter. Thus, passengers bound for out-of-state points, have found it to their advantage to buy tickets to the Texas border at the old rate, and then buy transportation for the balance of their journey at the nearest border point.

The increase in passenger rate amounts to quite a bit over pre-war prices, especially with war tax added. For instance, the pre-war fare from Brady to Fort Worth was \$5.70. Effective next Monday, the fare will be \$7.40, including war tax. The pre-war rate to Brownwood was \$1.49. The new fare will be \$1.91, war tax included.

The Pullman berths, however, show the biggest and most startling increase. Berth from Brady to Fort Worth, at pre-war prices, sold for \$2.50. Effective next Monday, the rate will be \$4.05, war tax included. Effective March 18th, another increase in freight rate also becomes effective, the increase amounting to 1 2-3%.
