## MASON HIGH SCHOOL WINS FROM BRADY HIGH BY ONE SCORE TO FOUR TO ONE

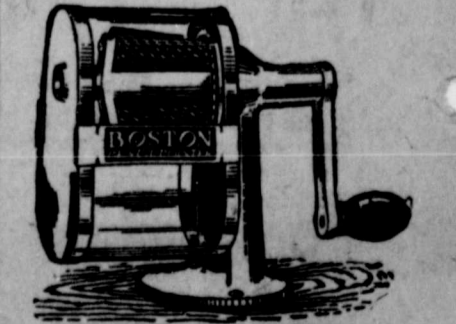
