WELCOME U. C. V. RE-UNION VISITORS

THREE GREAT DAYS OF CELEBRATION NEXT WEEK—ELABORATE PROGRAM

GRAND PARADE WILL OPEN FIRST DAY'S PROGRAM—HALL AND WHITE BOXING MATCH FEATURE OF SECOND—BIG BARBECUE ON THIRD DAY.

Everything is in readiness for the great U. C. V. Reunion to be staged in Brady for three days next week, beginning Wednesday, August 3rd. The committees reporting last Friday night showed that nothing was being left undone in arranging for the care and entertainment of the immense crowds expected on each of the three days. The reunion grounds proper, and as well the camping grounds on the north side of the creek have been cleaned and present a most inviting appearance. The platform and speakers' stand is being erected, the lighting of the grounds and the piping of running water is in progress, and the vanguard of the concession men has arrived and is arranging stands and locations.

A grand parade will mark the opening of the three days' celebration. The bugle call will be sounded at 8:30 a. m., following which the parade will begin forming on the west side of the square, with Marshals Henry Miller and Ben Moffatt in charge. Upon arrival of the Brownwood band on the morning train at 9:15, the parade, headed by the band will circle the square and proceed to the reunion grounds. In the line of parade will be Brigade Commander J. O. Frink and Staff, in decorated cars, flying the Brigade colors; then the U. C. V. in cars decorated with national and Brigade colors; then the S. C. V. and all other war veterans, together with Boy Scouts, local officials, societies, school children, business men's decorated floats and citizens in decorated cars.

The granting of low rates on all the railroads, assures a great crowd in attendance from points both near and far distant. The rate announced is one and one-half fare, tickets being sold on the certificate plan. As evidence of the anticipated great attendance, W. M. Bryson, chairman of the rations committee, announces that preparations are being made to feed 10,000 people at the barbecue on the last day of the reunion.

While the program published in the adjoining columns is complete insofar as it covers the entertainment at the reunion grounds, there are numerous other features worthy of the attention of reunion visitors. One of these is the boxing match between Alvin Hall of Melvin, and Tommy (Sailor) White of Richland Springs. This bout has been matched for the second day of the reunion. White last fall during the McCulloch County Exhibit, won a decision over Hall on points. Hall broke his hand in one of the early rounds of that bout, which placed him at a disadvantage. In next Thursday's match, both men will be seen at their best.

For base ball fans, three games have been matched between the Brady champions and the Coleman team. Coleman undoubtedly has the strongest team the locals have played against this season. In a spectacular exhibition recently on the local diamonds, the two split a double-header and then Brady cleaned up on the Coleman bunch on their home diamond for the third game. The Coleman fans are coming back for revenge and have recruited some classy players, and now claim to have a team without a peer. Needless to say, all three of the games will be wonderful exhibitions of the National sport.

The ball games will be part of an elaborate program to be staged by the Dutton City park management, and which will include rodeos, horse racing, polo games, goat roping and various other features. The complete program of the attractions at

Dutton City park will be found elsewhere in this issue. With a program so replete with attractions, and so varied in nature, there is no question but what everyone, young and old, may attend the reunion on each of the three days with full assurance of a most enjoyable and interesting time.

BRADY COMPRESS BURNS EARLY THIS MORNING, ENTAILING \$100,000 LOSS

COTTON BUYERS AND FIRMS LOSE 750 BALES COTTON—COMPRESS HAS \$15,000-\$20,000 SUPPLIES DESTROYED—ERECTED IN 1907, COST \$65,000.

Brady early this morning suffered a disastrous loss in the complete destruction of the Brady Compress, together with between \$15,000 and \$20,000 worth of supplies and also about 750 bales of cotton belonging to local buyers or firms represented by them. The total loss will run well over \$100,000. The origin of the fire is a mystery, Nightwatchman George W. White having made his rounds only fifteen minutes before the flames suddenly burst out, and leaped across the platform with such rapidity that the plant was doomed almost before the alarm could be sounded.

The clock at the compress shows that the compress was a seething mass of fire from 12:20 to 12:30 by Mr. White while making his rounds of the compress as watchman.

With another man, Mr. White was sitting in the office, when at 12:45 a noise caused him to look out. He says he saw the flames breaking out on the platform close up to the compress, and as they caught the cotton bales, they seemed fairly to leap across the platform. In a few min-

utes the compress was a seething mass of fire, and beyond any hopes of saving. Mr. White's statement is corroborated by Pars Wooten, watchman at the McCulloch County Cotton Oil mill, one block to the south. Mr. Wooten made the rounds of the mill at about the same time as Mr. White did at the compress. He was in the mill office, when some sheep in the yard suddenly stampeded, causing Mr. Wooten to step out to ascertain the cause of their alarm. He then noticed the compress bursting into flame.

The fire department responded, but the fire plug at the compress was in the midst of the flames, and the intense heat prevented a near approach. The chemical was used in saving the office. So rapidly did the compress burn that the fire never reached the office building, although it was partly in the path of the flames. The interesting platform was torn up, and the timely efforts of the fireboys saved the building. As a consequence the books and records of the company are intact.

The compress was built in 1907 at a cost of \$65,000, and was owned by the National Compress Co. The press was closed down about the middle of June, and had not been fired up since. According to the records of the company, there were 750 bales of cotton upon the platform at the time of the fire, all of which was completely destroyed, and which results in a loss to cotton buyers and their firms of between \$35,000 and \$40,000. Among the losses are E. H. Perry & Co., 43 bales; A. H. Richardson & Co., 255 bales; Huey & Roe, 140 bales; Bellamy & Walker, 95 bales. Other losses could not be ascertained. One freight car at the loading platform, was burned, nothing but a mass of twisted steel remaining.

The property destroyed was all insured, although the cotton will represent considerable loss, as between the 13c and 14c market upon which much of it was purchased and the present market value of 9c to 10c. The intense heat of the blazing cotton caused great whirlwinds to form and which carried fire brands for blocks. The cotton yard, one block north was in constant danger, and numbers of bales were caught a-fire. Only the constant vigilance of hundreds of volunteers, prevented a great loss in cotton here.

FARM BUREAU NOTES.

TO THE PEOPLE OF McCULLOCH COUNTY:

Your former demonstration agent, Mr. B. D. Black, having resigned, I have been sent here by the Extension Service of the A. & M. College to fill the vacancy. I don't present myself as a walking encyclopedia of agriculture, nevertheless, I completed the course of agriculture at the A. & M. College, and was making a close study out on the farm when called to this position by the Extension Service. We realize more and more each day the magnitude of the field of agriculture and that there are a great many things which I and everyone else still have to learn. I am here for work and am asking your cooperation in order to make this work a success, for unless it is made a success I am not earning the salary which is being paid me.

The whole machinery of the Federal and State Departments of Agriculture and the Extension Service is behind your demonstration agent and therefore any difficult problems which may arise will have the cooperation of these institutions in their solution. I am in direct touch with the A. and M. College all experiment stations and both State and Federal Departments of Agriculture, and am therefore in position to obtain information more readily than the average farmer.

I will leave this (Sat.) evening for College Station to attend the Farmers' Short Course and Annual Conference of county agricultural agents. I will be back on duty no later than August 2nd, and by the way, let us all be here for the Confederate Re-Union and get acquainted while we are having a good time and forgetting for the moment the serious side of our business.

You are getting the grain off your fields, and this is a very good time to have that terracing done, and I will be glad to get in touch with anyone wishing to have this work done. It takes nature hundreds of years to build up that top layer of soil and but a short time for excessive rains to wash it away, causing a tremendous loss which can and should be checked.

A great work is being done just now in the way of culling flocks of chickens, that is in weeding out the non-layers. The Extension department is getting up the itinerary for a the State. I wish to lay especial stress upon this work for it means much to the man or woman with a flock of hens. It is possible to cull out as many as a third or more of hens from some flocks, reduces the feed bill by that much, retains the daily output of eggs and by substituting layers for non-layers materially increases the production of a flock without increasing the feed bill. I wish to get in touch immediately upon my return with anyone desiring to have their flock of hens culled. Let's sweat the Star Boarders in our flocks. The Extension Department proposes to give each county one day with two culling demonstrations in different parts of the county and it will be necessary to make our date with them by the 15th of Aug, so they can arrange their schedule and lose as little time as possible.

We realize that the grain sorghums are the corn of the western sections of our state and that by proper seed selection, we can very materially increase the acre yield of these grains. More grain on less acres should be our motto.

Last, but by no means least, I wish to get in touch with the members of our various Boys' and Girls' Clubs. A great work has been done in co-operation with our future farmers and I am anxious to see the good work continue. I wish to meet every farm boy and girl personally and any time you are in town boys and girls you are welcome to make my office your headquarters.

The following committee was chosen to work out details of the plan whereby the banks will supply \$2,500,000 or \$3,000,000 for financing the association: Nathan Adams, Dallas, chairman; J. A. Ponder, Dallas; W. W. Woodson, Waco; J. A. Hoopes, Houston; H. A. Wroe, Austin; and E. Sledd, Fort Worth.

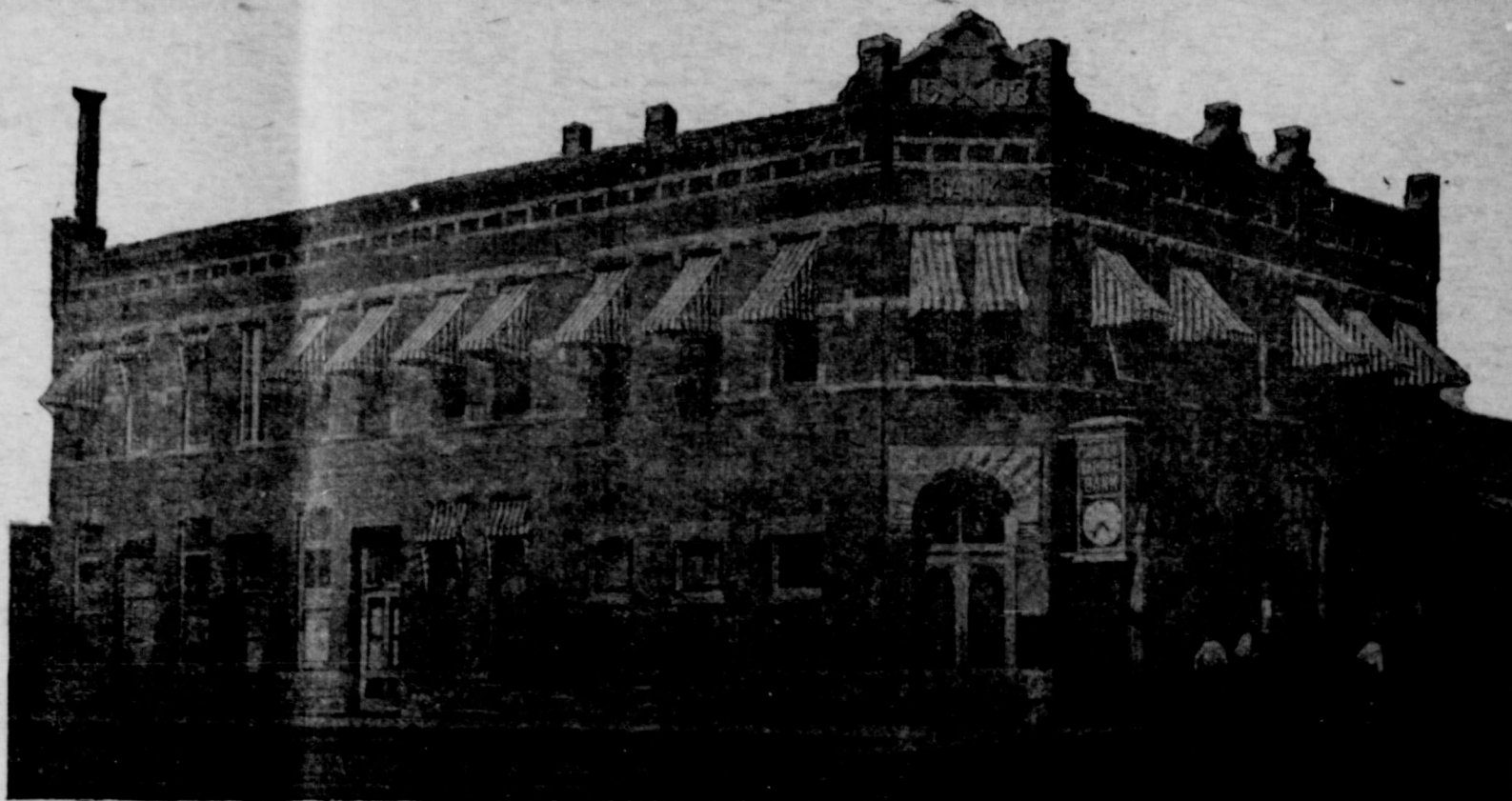
