THREE GREAT DAYS OF CELEBRATION PLANNED—AN ELABORATE PROGRAM

GRAND PARADE OPENS PROGRAM THIS MORNING—MEMORIAL SERVICES MARK SECOND DAY'S PROGRAM—BIG BARBECUE TO BE GIVEN FRIDAY NIGHT.

Everything is in readiness for the great U. C. V. Reunion. The various committees reporting last Friday night showed that nothing had been left undone in arranging for the care and entertainment of the immense crowds expected on each of the three days. The reunion grounds proper, and as well the camping grounds on the north side of the creek have been cleaned and present a most inviting appearance. The platform and speakers' stand is in readiness, the lighting of the grounds and the piping of running water, and the providing of an abundant supply of ice water has been completed, and the vanguard of the veterans has inspected and placed his approval upon the arrangements.

A grand parade will mark the opening of the three days' celebration.

Following the bugle call at 8:30 the parade will begin forming on the west side of the Brady square, with Marshals Henry Miller and Ben Moffatt in charge. Upon arrival of the Brownwood band on the morning train at 9:15, the parade, headed by the band will circle the square and proceed to the reunion grounds. In the line of parade will be Brigade Commander J. O. Frink and Staff, in decorated cars flying the Brigade colors; then the U. D. C. in cars decorated with national and brigade colors; then the S. C. V. and all other war veterans, together with Boy Scouts, local officials, societies, school children, business men's decorated floats and citizens in decorated cars.

The granting of low rates on all the railroads, assures a great crowd in attendance from points both near and far distant. The rate announced is one and one-half fare, tickets be-

dy champions and the Coleman team. Coleman undoubtedly has the strongest team the locals have played against this season. In a spectacular exhibition recently on the local diamonds, the two split a double-header and then Brady cleaned up on the Coleman bunch on the home diamond for the third game. The Coleman fans are coming back for revenge and have recruited some classy players, and now claim to have a team without a peer. Needless to say, all three of the games will be wonderful exhibitions of the National sport.

The ball games will be part of an elaborate program to be staged by the Dutton City park management, and which will include rodeos, horse racing, polo games, goat roping and various other features. Each day's program of the attractions at Dutton City park will be found elsewhere in this issue.

With a program so replete with attractions, and so varied in nature, there is no question but what everyone, young and old, may attend the reunion on each of the three days with full assurance of a most enjoyable and interesting time.

While you slept last night, Brady's committeemen had workers on the job putting finishing touches on everything connected with the reunion. R. L. Slaughter, the city's efficient street sprinkler, had his wagon on the job all night long, and again the wagon is on duty today. Just trying to make your visit here cool, comfortable and dustless.

The Brady fire boys, too, have been on the job helping getting ready for the crowds. The fire boys turned their fire hose on the reunion grounds, the streets leading to the grounds, the Dutton City park grounds, and every place not reached by the street sprinkler in his rounds.

All the members of the various committees have been provided with red badges reading "U. C. V. Committee." BRADY IS READY TO WELCOME THE RE-UNION VISITORS—PROGRAM COMPLETE

NORMAN G. KITTRELL, PROMINENT HOUSTON ATTORNEY, TO ADDRESS VETERANS AFTERNOON OF OPENING DAY—ADDRESSES VETERANS NAT'L REUNION.

Everything is set for the great three days' reunion in Brady, and from the first bugle call at 8:30 this morning, there will be something to occupy the attention of the visitors every minute of their stay. The parade, headed by the celebrated Brownwood band, will start the wheels of the three days' celebration to moving, and neither time, money nor effort has been spared towards keeping everything running smoothly and in good shape. Of great interest to every veteran attending the reunion is the acceptance of the invitation to address the veterans upon the opening day, by Judge Norman G. Kittrell, prominent Houston attorney, and one of the foremost men of the south. Judge Kittrell addressed the veterans at the National reunion last October, and his simple, heart-spoken words made a profound impression upon all.

In sending his acceptance of the invitation to address the veterans on the afternoon of the opening day, Judge Kittrell stated that he would make no set speech to the veterans, but to put it in his own words, he will make "A heart to heart talk to the 'old boys,' whom I reverence." Needless to say, the 'old boys' are looking forward to the coming of this eminent man, and to the hearing of his heart to heart words.

The reunion grounds already presents an appearance that is altogether attractive. Demp Branscum, in charge of grounds committee, has performed a wonderful service. Not only have the grounds been cleared and cleaned in excellent fashion, but ev-

ery detail of the work has been carried out, even to the building of a substantial foot bridge across Brady creek, and which makes the veterans camping grounds on the south bank, readily accessible to the reunion proper.

The veterans camp is laid out in orderly fashion, and electric lights have been installed in each of the tents. Running water is also readily available at all points on the ground, and a big tank has been constructed and equipped with innumerable faucets and which will furnish ice water free to the assembled multitudes. The lighting of the grounds has also been extended to include all the con-

HISTORY OF THE MOUNTAIN REMNANTS BRIGADE AT A GLANCE.

Written Especially for The Daily Morning Standard by L. Ballou, Adjutant General Chief of Staff, Brady, Texas

The Mountain Remnants Brigade is an organization composed of Ex-Confederate soldiers, among whom were many members prominent in Texas history. The organization was originally independent of the National and State organizations, with its own constitution and by-laws. It was permanently organized at Round Mountain, Blanco county, Texas, on July 14, 1887, at which time the name of "Mountain Remnants" was officially adopted. The original membership numbered 100, and included veterans who served in various companies and regiments of the army. Subsequently, at the regular annual reunions, many additional members were added, and the membership grew to where many western counties, extending as far as the Pecos river, were included. At the meeting held in Mason last year, however, it was decided to limit the bounds of the organization to twenty surrounding counties, the organization retaining the name "Mountain Remnants." At the Houston State Reunion, the organization was annexed to the State Division, and hereafter is to be designated as the 5th Brigade.

The largest number ever registered at an annual reunion was at Brady on July 28, 1904, being 408, including widows of old soldiers. Many of its most active and prominent members have, with the words of their beloved general, Stonewall Jackson, "Passed over the river to rest under the shade of the trees," and their numbers are now estimated by their adjutant general at about 150.

HISTORY OF THE MOUNTAIN REMNANTS U. C. V. FROM ORGANIZATION TO 1907

Having been requested to get up a condensed history and progress of the origin and growth of the Mountain Remnants of Confederate Veterans of Texas, I herewith submit the following, to-wit:

On September 3., 1886, pursuant to call the ex-Confederates met at Johnson City, Blanco county, Texas, and Joseph Bird was called to the chair, J. G. Baldwin was made secretary, and 96 names were enrolled.

On motion they went into permanent organization, and Joseph Bird was made president, J. J. Adams vice-president, J. G. Baldwin secretary and R. B. Maddox treasurer. They then chose by vote the place of meeting for 1887, Round Mountain, July 14th was selected as the time, and to remain in camp for 3 days. On July 14th, 1887, the ex-Confederates of Blanco and surrounding counties began pouring into camp at Round Mountain. A great number of them were accompanied by their families.

At roll call 100 responded to their names. The good people of Round Mountain and vicinity had made ample provision for their comfort, and a beautiful site was selected for the encampment. Camps were speedily arranged and knots of old Veterans were seen in all directions howding with their old war comrades and calling up reminiscences of the war with which they were collectively or individually familiar. At night they dispersed temporarily from camp, some going to church, some going to a dance, and others having a love feast, fighting over again the old battles. Comrade Lewis presided over the roasting pit and kept all supplied with delicious barbecued meats that he knows so well how to prepare.

Friday, the 15th, was the day appointed for the transaction of business, and by 10 o'clock 130 old soldiers were present. It was decided that they go into a more permanent organization, so that the names and acts of the members might be perpetuated.

After roll call J. D. Harrison of Gillespie county was called as temporary chairman and J. G. Baldwin of Blanco county temporary secretary.

On motion a committee appointed to draft laws to govern the organization. Joe Bird, A. G. Perry and J. G. Baldwin of Blanco, John Hamilton of Hays, Levy Watts of Llano and D. E. Moore of Gillespie county were appointed on this committee, who immediately retired to perform their duties. The committee on returning reported their deliberations as follows, to-wit:

NAME—Article 1. The name of this organization shall be "The Mountain Remnants of Ex-Confederates."

MEMBERSHIP—Article 2. All Ex-Confederate soldiers and sailors residing in Blanco and surrounding counties shall be entitled to enrollment.

OFFICERS—Article 3. Officers of the organization shall be elected at each annual encampment, and shall consist of a Commander, Major, Adjutant and Quartermaster.

DUTY OF COMMANDER—Article 4. The duty of the Commander shall be to arrange, order, supervise and govern all meetings, and orders emanating from him shall be strictly observed by any and all members whilst in camp.

Carried. The following officers were elected:

Commander, J. D. Harrison, Willow City, Gillespie county; Major, Jas. Bird, Round Mountain, Blanco county; Adjutant, J. G. Baldwin, Blanco county; Quartermaster, A. W. Cox, Blanco, Blanco county.

On motion a vote of thanks was tendered to the ladies for their presence, and three cheers for the women everywhere.

On motion three cheers and a tiger were given for the battle-scarred veterans present who opposed us in a manly way during the way. Blanco town was chosen by acclamation for the next meeting.

After a vote of thanks to the good people who had so splendidly entertained them at Round Mountain, the encampment adjourned to meet at Blanco on the last Thursday in July, 1888, at 9 a. m.

Blanco, Texas, July 26, 1888.

Pursuant to adjournment The Mountain Remnants C. V. met at Blanco, Texas, on the above date and was called to order by Adjutant J. G. Baldwin. The Quartermaster A. W. Cox and 129 others answered roll call. By a two-thirds vote Article 3 of the by-laws was amended by striking out the words Commander, Major, Adjutant and Quartermaster and substituting Major, Adjutant, Captain, First Lieutenant, Second Lieutenant, Sergeant and Quartermaster.

The election of officers being in order, J. M. Pound was elected Major, Andrew Perry captain, Ben W. Palmer first lieutenant, C. L. Pruitt second lieutenant, Ben Brigham sergeant, J. G. Baldwin adjutant, A. W. Cox quartermaster.

By a two-thirds vote Articles 4, 5, 6 and 7 were repealed.

On motion it was ordered that the officers in the discharge of their duties shall be governed by army regulations.

Selection for a place for next meeting, Llano was chosen.

On motion it was ordered that the duties of Quartermaster remain the same as prescribed in Article 7 of the by-laws.

After three cheers for the Federal veterans present and a vote of thanks to the ladies and citizens of Blanco and surrounding country for their

hospitality in entertaining their visitors, the meeting adjourned to meet in Llano the last Saturday in July, 1889.

Signed J. M. POUND, Major. J. G. Baldwin, Adjutant. Llano, Texas, July 25th-26th, 1889.

Pursuant to adjournment The Mountain Remnants of Confederate Veterans met at Llano on the above dates, and in the absence of Adjutant J. G. Baldwin, P. F. Appell called the meeting to order and was made adjutant pro tem., A. W. Cox quartermaster, and 360 others. By order of the Major the books were opened for enrollment and 276 names were added, making a total membership of 505 members.

By order of the Major the widows and daughters of Confederate veterans were admitted as honorary members. Four widows and twelve daughters were placed on the roll. After a very pleasant session of the body, it was decided to hold the reunion for 1890 at Llano. No records of the meeting was kept or can be found, but it was understood by all that the reunion for 1891 would be held at Marble Falls for that year, which was done, but no records can be found for that meeting.

The next meeting was held at Johnson City 1892; still no records. The next meeting was held at San Marcos in July, 1893, but still no records. In 1894 the reunion was held at Burnet and 21 camps answered to roll call. A Brigade was formed at this place and called the Third Brigade Central Texas Sub-Division of Mountain Remnants. J. D. Harrison was elected as Brigadier General, T. D. Vaughn Colonel 1st Regiment, Ben Palmer Colonel 2nd Regiment and J. J. M. Smith Adjutant General. Marble Falls was selected for the reunion of 1895, July 24, 25 and 26. The body then adjourned.

The Mountain Remnants Brigade, U. C. V., met at Marble Falls on the above dates and was called to order by General Harrison at 10 o'clock a. m. Address of welcome by Prof. W. H. Bruce. Response by General Harrison. Music by the band till dinner.

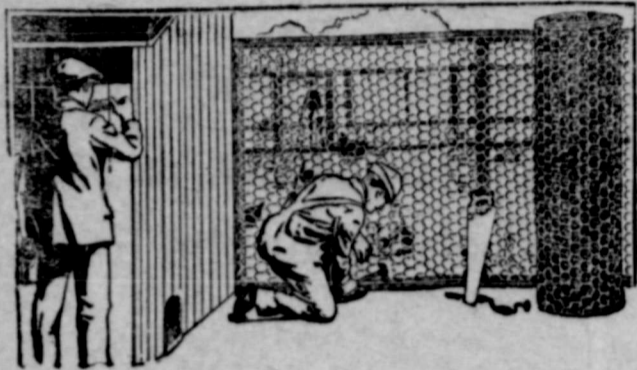

3 p. m. Called to order by the General for the annual address by Governor O. M. Roberts, which was grand, eloquent and pathetic, as this noble old hero and jurist could so well deliver. After the governor's speech the veterans enjoyed their time in social pleasure till reveille.

Friday morning, July 25th, the General called the Brigade to order and formed the old boys in line for their pictures to be taken, which was done to their evident enjoyment. They then marched to town and back, demonstrating to the people that they were not too old to show that they were soldiers yet. Election of officers resulted as follows, to-wit:

Joe D. Harrison, General Commanding, by acclamation; T. D. Vaughn, Colonel of Cavalry; Ben W. Palmer, Colonel of Infantry; D. J. M. Pound, Surgeon General, by acclamation; J. J. Smith, Adjutant General by acclamation; A. F. Hicks, Quartermaster General by acclamation; Jerome Harralson, Chaplain, by acclamation; C. Haynes, 1st Lieutenant, Cavalry; Tom Giles, 2nd Lieutenant, Cavalry; John Noe, 3rd Lieutenant, Cavalry; Tom Farmer, 1st Lieutenant, Infantry; M. L. Reed, 2nd Lieutenant, Infantry; Henry Lewis, 3rd Lieutenant, Infantry.

Miss Emma Arnold was elected Sponsor of the camp, with Miss Love Pound first and Miss Clara Smith second maids of honor.

An address by Governor F. R. Lubbock was great and full of historic facts from personal knowledge and observation.

252 Veterans answered roll call at this meeting.

Lampasas was selected for the place to hold the reunion for 1896, and after prayer by the Chaplain the General declared the reunion adjourned to meet in Lampasas July 30th and 31st and August 1st, 1896.

Third West Texas Sub-Division.

At this meeting all the old officers were re-elected, and A. F. Hicks was elected Quartermaster General.

Lampasas was chosen as the place of meeting for 1896.

The Mountain Remnants Brigade met at Lampasas in July, 1896, and all the old officers were re-elected. The Brigade had a most harmonious meeting and pleased the citizens so much, that a large petition was introduced representing the town as well as the county at large, asking that the Brigade meet at that place again in 1897, and upon a vote being taken the Brigade decided to meet in 1897 at the city of Lampasas. The Brigade made such a splendid record at this place and pleased the citizens so much that they vied with each other in making the old boys have a royal time. But the time came at last for adjournment, and all expressed themselves that death alone should keep them away from the reunion in 1897.

Lampasas, Texas, July 1897.

On the above date the bugle sounded loud and long at 9 a. m., and the old boys thronged to the assembly room at the pavilion of the Hanna Springs. General Joe D. Harrison at 10 a. m. called the Brigade to order, and prayer was offered by the Chaplain, Rev. Jerome Harralson.

Officers present: Joe D. Harrison,

Brigadier General; J. J. M. Smith, Adj. General; A. F. Hicks, Quartermaster General; Dr. J. M. Pound, Surgeon General; T. D. Vaughn, Col. 1st Regiment; Ben W. Palmer, Co. 2nd Regiment; Rev. J. Harralson, Chaplain; Monta Ramsdell, Brigade Bugler; Miss Emma Arnold, Sponsor; Miss Lizzie Hicks, Miss Love Pound and Miss Vaughn, maids of honor.

The address of welcome by the mayor of the town, John Townson, was full of welcome and love for the old soldiers. Answered by Major A. McFarland.

At this meeting it was unanimously decided to make the Brigade an independent Brigade, made up of individual members, each member to pay as annual dues the sum of 25 cents per year as Brigade dues. Also to extend the Brigade territory west to all the mountain counties to the Rio Grande. At this meeting by unanimous vote the General was given the right to appoint his staff officers.

Standing Committees.

Finance—The Colonels of the 1st, 2nd and 3rd Regiments.
 Committee on Program—Adjutant General and two members to be appointed by the General.

Committee on Management—Adjutant General, Quartermaster and one appointed by the General.

The officers elected by this meeting were as follows:

Joe D. Harrison, General; T. D. Vaughn, Col. 1st Regiment; Ben W. Palmer, 2nd Regiment; W. R. Alexander, 3rd Regiment; General Harrison appointed his staff officers as follows: J. J. M. Smith, Adjutant General; A. F. Hicks, Quartermaster General; Dr. J. M. Pound, Surgeon General; Rev. J. Harralson, Chaplain.

The annual address by Comrade W. H. Browning was a gem of oratory and pathos, and gave so much pleasure to the old boys that when the time came to elect the orator to deliver the annual address for 1898, Hon. W. H. Browning was elected by acclamation.

Miss Emma Arnold was appointed Sponsor of the Brigade, and Miss Lizzie Hicks and Miss Love Pound were made maids of honor.

The town of Llano was selected as the place to hold the reunion of 1898.

The Constitution was amended at this meeting so as to make the Brigade an Independent Brigade made up of individual Veterans from all the counties in the Brigade territory; and that each Veteran should pay 25 cents per year as Brigade dues. After a vote of thanks to the good people of Lampasas for the splendid manner they had treated the old soldiers; to the railroads for special favors; the societies of the town, as well as the merchants and citizens of the county for courtesies, the General called to their feet the whole Brigade to engage in prayer with the Chaplain, and after the benediction the General declared the Brigade would stand adjourned until the annual meeting to be held in the city of Llano in July, 1898. Tents and flags struck. Fin's.

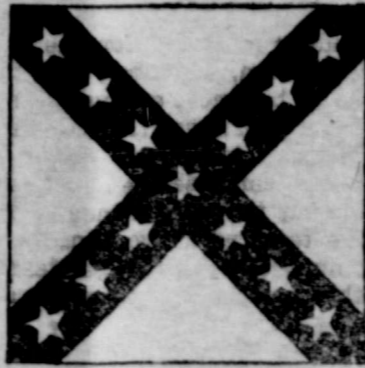

OVER ONE HUNDRED VETERANS REGISTERED FIRST DAY OF U. C. V. REUNION

GABRIEL CHOAT OF LOHN, AGED 95, IS OLDEST VETERAN, BUT IS ACTIVE AND HEARTY—THREE COLORED EX-SLAVES ARE ATTENDING THE REUNION.

Over one hundred veterans were registered by Adjutant General L. Ballou on the opening day of the great Mountain Remnants 5th Brigade, U. C. V. reunion, which met yesterday in annual session in Brady. The register shows about 120 names, which includes widows of veterans. Adjutant General Ballou is expecting still more to be registered during the remaining two days of the reunion, and the number may likely be swelled to 150. Gabriel Choat of Lohn holds the record of the oldest veteran, his age as given by the register, being 95 years.

The register discloses a number of interesting things, among others being the presence of the reunion of three ex-slaves, viz: Chas. Miller and Richard ("Uncle Dick") Andrews and wife of Brady, and Dick Perkin of Brownwood. Miller registered as a workman at Fort Sumpter, N. C., during the war, while Andrews and Perkin were both in Walker's division of the 17th Company, Texas.

Gabriel Choat and sister is the entry on the register for the reunion's oldest member. Despite his advanced age, Mr. Choat is active and hearty and takes keen interest in the reunion and the conversation of his comrades. Reddy, Mr. Choat is but 94 years old, but his birthday comes on the 14th of this month, so he may safely be said to be 95 years. Mrs. W. H. Ballou, of the Daughters of the Confederacy, has promised the venerable old gentleman a birthday party during the reunion, and it is

The ball game was an interesting and hard-contested exhibition, with final score in Coleman's favor.

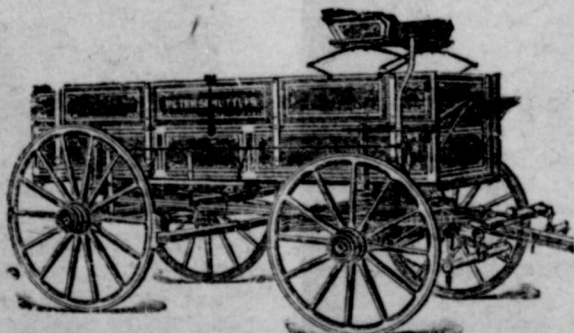

HISTORY OF THE MOUNTAIN REMNANTS U. C. V. FROM ORGANIZATION TO 1907

By A. F. HICKS, MARBLE FALLS, TEXAS

(Continued from Yesterday's Daily)

Llano, Tex., July 28, 29, 30th, 1898.

The bugle called the Veterans to the grand stand erected by the people of Llano at 10 a. m. on the morning of the 28th of July, 1898, and the stand was quickly filled by the old soldiers, where they were regaled with music by the silver cornet band, and were then called to order by General Harrison, and after prayer by the Chaplain the General opened the reunion.

Welcome address by Hon. H. R. McInnis and response by Col. J. A. Stevens. Addresses were made by Hon. D. Johnson of Mississippi, Hon. W. H. Bales, Col. Alexander and others.

At night the annual sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. Hays, D. D. After the eloquent sermon by this grand old soldier, (who lost his right arm at the battle of Trevillian Station July 11th, 1864) the Brigade vied with each other in trying to be first to shake the hand of this splendid soldier of the war as well as the Cross, and a very happy time was spent in a love feast, led by the much loved Chaplain, Rev. Jerome Harralson, in which Veterans and their wives as well as the citizens of Llano joined, until the hour arrived to adjourn for the night.

The morning of the 29th the Brigade was called to order by the General at 9 a. m. Beautiful bouquets of flowers were presented to General Harrison, Quartermaster General Hicks and Chaplain Harralson by the ladies of Llano. Election of place to hold the re-union of 1899 was held and the city of Blanco secured the Brigade unanimously.

A committee was appointed to examine the correspondence of Adjutant Smith in the Mack Stuart case. Col. Alexander, Col. J. A. Stephens and Capt. Yoe were appointed and the correspondence was turned over to said committee.

Election of officers resulted as follows: J. D. Harrison, General Commanding; T. D. Vaughn, Colonel 1st Regiment; B. W. Palmer, Colonel 2nd Regiment; W. A. Alexander, Col. 3rd Regiment. The General appointed his staff as follows: J. J. M. Smith, Adjutant General and Chief of Staff; A. F. Hicks, Quartermaster General; H. J. Dawson, Assistant Quartermaster General; Dr. J. M. Pound, Surgeon General; Jerome Harralson, Chaplain; Miss Emma Arnold, sponsor; Miss Love Pound, first maid of honor; Miss Lizzie Hicks, second maid of honor.

Committee appointed to examine correspondence of Adjutant Smith in the Mack Stuart case reported as follows: That they had examined the correspondence but did not feel it their duty to give an opinion as to the guilt or innocence of a gallant Confederate soldier; yet they appreciated the great interest of Brigade Adjutant J. J. M. Smith, manifested by his efforts to have Comrade Stuart released, and cordially commend his return to the office of the Brigade, Alexander, Yoe and Stevens, committee.

After the usual resolutions of thanks to the citizens, railroads and ladies of Llano so bountifully extended to the Veterans and their families, and prayer by the Chaplain, the General declared the reunion adjourned to meet in the city of Blanco in July, 1899. Tents were then struck and flags pulled down and the reunion for 1898 was at an end.

Blanco, Texas, July 27, 1899.

On Thursday, July 27th, 1899, the Brigade met in annual reunion with the good citizens of Blanco and at 10 a. m. the bugle call assembled the Veterans at the grand stand and were called to order by General Joe D. Harrison; prayer by Rev. Jos. Bird.

Welcome address by the great old jurist, Captain J. W. Bains, and responded to by Adjutant General A. F. Hicks.

Hon. W. W. Burnet of Kerrville delivered the annual address, which elicited rounds of applause. Speeches were made by Congressman J. D. Slayden, Carl Goeth, Kyle Zimmerman and General Joe D. Harrison.

The annual sermon was preached by Rev. Hill of General Harrison's staff. The reverend gentleman said that he had been in over 200 pitched battles, yet the God he served had always protected him and he had come out of the 4 years war without a single wound.

Friday, July 28th, memorial services were held. Seven of the old soldiers had passed away during the year as follows: Col. R. W. Alexander, 3rd Regiment; Capt. A. W. Morrow, Co. F, 3rd Regiment; Capt. C. R. Perry, Co. A, 1st Regiment; Private J. B. Tunnell, Co. G, 2nd Regiment; Private J. P. Galbreath, Co. E, 2nd Regiment; Private J. J. Williamson, Co. G, 2nd Regiment; Private James Tanner, Co. F, 3rd Regiment.

As the roll of dead was called and the name of the soldier was called, a comrade who had known him best stepped to the front and spoke of his brave deeds and sterling worth, the tears and sobs of the survivors told in solemn and pathetic terms how much each one was missed in the ranks of the living.

All the old officers were re-elected except Colonel of the 3rd Regiment. R. Colb was elected to this office. Miss Love Pound was made Sponsor and Miss Lizzie Hicks first maid of honor.

Ten places were nominated for the next place to hold the reunion in 1900, as follows: Lampasas, Llano, San Saba, Mason, Dripping Springs, Willow City, Blanco, Johnson City, Kerrville and Marble Falls. After a hard fight Marble Falls secured the prize. Judge Burnet of Kerrville was elected orator for 1900. After a very impressive prayer by the Rev. Hill, the General declared the reunion for 1899 closed.

Marble Falls, Tex., July 27-28, 1900.

The Mountain Remnants Brigade, U. C. V., was called to order by General Joe D. Harrison at 10 a. m., and prayer was offered by the Chaplain General Jerome Harralson, who invoked the blessing of the God of battles upon the present meeting. After the prayer the gifted and eloquent young senator, W. D. Yett, delivered the welcome address, which was replete with cordial wishes that the Veterans might have a happy and successful meeting. The gifted speaker's happy description of the little gem city and its wonderful record as a health resort; the grand water power, granite, marble, iron and other undeveloped resources were graphically portrayed, and when he had finished his address every old Veteran felt glad that he had come and that the welcome was truly from the heart. The Chaplain General responded for the Brigade in his well-known happy way and all felt pleased.

Adjourned for dinner—and such a dinner—fish, flesh and fowl in the greatest abundance, with all the addendum that go to make up an epicurean banquet fit for the gods.

Talks and speeches were made by several well-known orators and the day was spent in a most enjoyable way by the old boys, interspersed by music by the splendid band.

Friday, 27th, 9 a. m., called to order and prayer by the Chaplain General, who announced that the time had come to hold the memorial service. Fifteen comrades were reported to have died in 1900, as follows: Tom Giles, Clinton; T. A. Evans, Willow City; Crockett Riley, Crabapple; W. O. Hutchinson, San Marcos; Thos. Gerhardt, Lone Mountain; T. M. Davis, J. R. Allen, G. W. Harden, Wm. George, C. S. Reeves, M. D.; J. H. Hogan, C. C. Cummings, T. J. Estes, J. W. Nance, Jack Lockley and Miss Lucy Ricks, Willow City. Tears of sympathy were freely shed during the services, and at its close the right hand of fellowship was given and the memorial services were brought to a close.

Major General I. B. Polley of the Division of Texas made a speech to the Veterans that captured the old boys, and the rebel yell was very much in evidence. When he closed

thunders of applause were given the brave old hero.

3 p. m. Election of a place to hold the reunion of 1901. Lampasas, Llano and Marble Falls were then placed in nomination, and after eloquent speeches in favor of each place, Marble Falls again secured the reunion of 1902.

At 8:30 a. m. on the morning of the 28th the General called the Brigade to order for the election of officers. General Harrison was elected by acclamation, T. D. Vaughn re-elected Colonel of the 1st Regiment, Ben W. Palmer 2nd Regiment, Joe Frazier Brown 3rd Regiment; A. F. Hicks was made Adjutant General, H. J. Dawson Quartermaster General, Dr. J. M. Pound Surgeon General, Dr. Duncan Assistant Surgeon General, Rev. Jerome Harralson Chaplain, Lewis Riddle Ensign, F. M. Ramsdell Bugler, Miss Love Pound Sponsor, Miss Lizzie Hicks first maid, Miss Barton second maid of honor.

Committee on resolutions made report which was adopted unanimously: That our reunions are for the pleasure and fostering of the brotherhood feeling in the hearts of its members as an organization, and is a military encampment when in camp and should of propriety be so regulated and controlled. As good order is necessary for proper results in all cases both for good citizenship and Christian character, and for the protection and preservation of the good name of our encampment, we beg leave to present the following resolutions:

First: That we request of the place for our assembling sufficient space for grounds for easy encampment, and that all rights or privileges be within the possession and under the control of a committee appointed each year by the commanding officer and a like committee raised by the place of meeting.

Second: That hereafter the arrangement of the grounds about the place for public assembling be better and more systematically laid off, and that more room about the public stand be secured for easier and safer moving about within the encampment socially, as well as for military maneuvering that may be desired. That the Quartermaster General and Ad-

jutant General be so directed to do in co-operation with the local committee.

Third: That no noisy or demoralizing concern be allowed within disturbing distance of the public stand.

Fourth: That a faithful and competent man for such duties be appointed by the commanding officer as special marshal to assist in keeping order on the grounds, and especially within disturbing distance of the public stand.

Fifth: That a committee of three comrades be appointed each year, to be known as the program committee, who shall provide suitable programs for all meetings of the encampment and to see to its execution.

Respectfully submitted, Jerome Harralson, W. H. Bales, B. W. Palmer, committee.

A vote of thanks was then offered to the Marble Falls band for the splendid music furnished to the citizens of the town and county who had contributed to the pleasure and happiness of the old Veterans, to the newspapers, railroads, and all others that had helped to make the reunion such a success, which was unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

254 Veterans answered roll call.

After prayer by the Chaplain the General declared the reunion adjourned to meet in Marble Falls in July, 1901.

Official: A. F. HICKS, Adjutant General

Marble Falls, July 25, 26, 27, 1901.

At 9 a. m. on the morning of the 25th the bugle sounded out the call for the Mountain Remnants Brigade to assemble at the grand stand. At 10 a. m. Col. T. D. Vaughn of the 1st Regiment called the Veterans to order, and in the absence of the Chaplain General, Comrade J. E. Bell offered up a heartfelt prayer.

General A. R. Johnson made the address of welcome to the Gem City on the Crescent Lake, and got so near the old boys in his welcome they felt they were truly welcome and that if they did not have a good time it was their own fault. Colonel Vaughn responded for the Brigade, thanking them for the cordial welcome and regretted that our much-loved and lamented General Joe D. Harrison had not lived to enjoy the reunion of 1901 with the comrades he loved so well, but god of battles had willed it otherwise, and we must submit to the Divine will of our Heavenly Father.

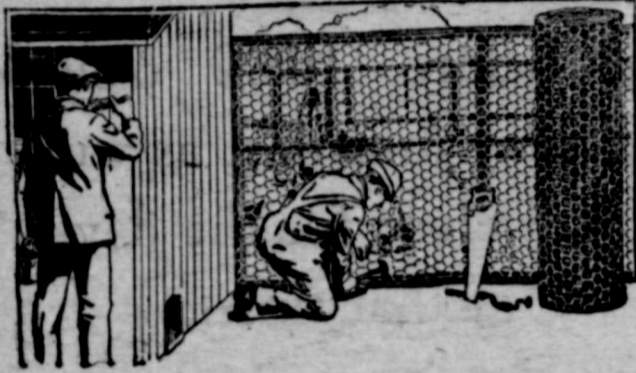

The Colonel asked the Veterans to be patient with him whilst he undertook to fill the chair of our lamented commander until his successor was elected.

Captain B. Badger, Rev. Waller of Llano, Senator W. D. Yett and others filled the day with speeches that breathed of love and patriotism, which gave much pleasure to the old Veterans. The magnificent Florence band rendered some fine selections of appropriate music until 12 m.

At 2:40 p. m. the gifted young State Senator, W. D. Yett, in an hour's speech won the hearts of the old boys, and at the close of his speech, and when the applause had passed away the band rendered the National Anthem and everyone was happy. At night the play, "Sam Davis" was rendered, and the noble character of the boy hero was well portrayed by the talented young actor.

Friday, 26th, 9 a. m., the memorial service was held, led by the Chaplain. Roll of dead for 1900 and 1901 was called as follows: Jas. Lowhon, Lampasas; Budd Atkinson, Buffton; William Spidner, Burnet; Chas. Hahn, P. L. Faulkner, W. T. McFarland, Bertram; T. B. Nevitt, Rev. J. N. Key, H. H. Haven, Lone Grove; Robert Foster, Mexican and Confederate Veterans, and our lamented and loved General Joe D. Harrison, total 11, lost to the Brigade. As the names were called a comrade stepped to the front and answered dead. Then this comrade told of his good qualities as a man, as a soldier and a Christian, and truly a band of noble Christians had been lost to the Brigade. When the name of our dear lamented old general was called, strong men and women all over the vast audience wept like little children, and for a time nothing but tears and sorrow reigned. After a time Judge Melnis, followed by Colonels Vaughn and Palmer, Adjutant General Hicks and Chaplain General Harralson, as well as other of his comrades and friends, vied with each other in paying tribute to his great worth as well as his loss to the Brigade, and the scene that followed when the good old song was sung, "We Shall Meet Beyond the River Where the Surges Cease to Roll," beggars description. One good old Methodist sister who had gone through the war as hospital nurse, said: "This beats any campmeeting I ever saw, and such scenes as this pays me for all I suffered through the war and keeps me reminded of the great reunion when we shall clasp hands over the dark river with our loved ones who have gone before us."

After dinner Governor Joe D. Sayers, who had arrived and gone into camp with his staff, made a speech of an hour and thirty minutes that was thrilling, and the old boys responded again and again with the rebel yell. As he spoke of battle after battle and the grand old heroes who took part in them, Hood, Terry, Maxey, the Johnsons, Forrest, Stonewall Jackson and the peerless Lee, the greatest general the world has ever produced, the comrades who had served with those old heroes were carried off their feet again and again. It took a long selection of the beautiful music by the band to calm the grand old Veterans.

The General then called the Brigade to order for a business meeting and to elect where to hold the reunion for 1902. Llano and Lampasas were nominated and after a hard fight Llano won the prize.

8 a. m., Saturday, business meeting and election of officers. Colonel T. D. Vaughn was promoted to General, Ben W. Palmer promoted to Colonel of the 1st Regiment, B. Badger 2nd Regiment, W. H. Bales Colonel 3rd Regiment, A. F. Hicks Adjutant General, H. J. Dawson Quartermaster General, Dr. J. M. Pound Surgeon General, Rev. Jerome Harralson Chaplain, H. Hiney Flag Lieut., Monty Ramsdell Bugler, Miss Love Pound Sponsor, Miss Lizzie Hicks first maid of honor, Miss R. B. Stuart Brigade Orderly.

Guy Green, a gifted member of the Athens bar—but a Marble Falls raised boy—made a rousing speech in defense of the Southland and her rights according to the Constitution as given by that document.

After resolutions of thanks to all who had contributed to make the reunion such a success; done by unanimous rising vote.

The General then appointed the committee on management and program for 1902; Adjutant General A. F. Hicks, Col. B. Badger, Judge Melnis and Quartermaster Dawson.

Roll call 276 Veterans answered to their names.

After prayer by the Chaplain, the General declared the reunion adjourned to meet in Llano on the last Thursday in July, 1902. Tents were then struck, flags pulled down and the reunion of 1901 was at an end.

A. F. HICKS, Adj.-Gen., M. R. B. C. V. Llano, July 31st to Aug. 2nd, 1902. On the banks of the beautiful Llano river on the morning of July 31st the bugle sounded out the call for the Mountain Remnants Brigade to assemble at the grand stand, and at 10 a. m. General T. D. Vaughn called the Brigade to order; Rev. Briggs offered the invocation.

The splendid Besserer band of Austin gave one of its best selections that straightened up the old Vets and made them feel as if they were on dress parade. The address of Hon. M. Oatman promised a happy time for the old boys, which was carried out to the letter. After dinner Captain John C. Oatman made a telling speech that was well received by the Veterans. After some more fine music by the band Judge Melnis came to the front and gave a magnificent description of the women of the South. As he so beautifully described her wonderful and noble character and the sacrifices she had made for her loved ones and country, all felt that a monument that would reach almost to the clouds should be raised in her honor.

Friday morning, August 1st, memorial service led by Dr. Briggs, B. A. Eleven more Veterans had passed over the river as follows: Comrades Withers and Rose of Blanco; Shirley, Caveness and Johnson of Mason;

Chapman and Brown of Llano; Tannahill of Burnet; Ponton of Marble Falls; Freeman and Grandpa Aullynor of Gillespie. Those who knew them best spoke of their virtues as a soldier, husband, father, and citizen, and some could give a wonderful experience as a Christian. The tears that fell testified to the worth of those noble old men, and when the grand old song was started, "Nearer, My God, to Thee" all felt that it was truly "God's hand that had done this and made the parting necessary."

At 1:45 p. m. the bugle sounded and all flocked to the grand stand to hear the speech of the Hon. S. W. T. Lanham, candidate for Governor of Texas. For nearly three hours this gifted soldier and statesman held the attention of the vast audience so closely that you could almost hear a pin drop, and as the grand old hero described the memories of the 60's and the pride of his heart as he followed the grandest heroes the world has ever produced, the old Veterans lived over again the four years of the mighty struggle. When he described the terrible pangs of hunger and the only means of relief, (by tightening the belt around the skeletoned framed heroes tight enough to relieve the empty feeling for a time); when he spoke of the grand and noble women of the South who remained at home and toiled and suffered with so much resignation for the cause they loved, tears flowed freely from the eyes of all who heard him, and the universal verdict was, he is a grand man and we will have a Governor we will be proud of. Mason and Lampasas were nominated for the place to hold the reunion for 1903, and after a hard fight Mason won out with 52 majority.

Saturday, 9:30 a. m., election of officers. General Vaughn was re-elected, A. F. Hicks was made Adjutant General, H. J. Dawson Quartermaster General, Dr. J. M. Pound Surgeon General, Rev. Jerome Harralson Chaplain, B. W. Palmer Colonel 1st Regiment, W. H. Bales Colonel 2nd Regiment; Tom Rainey Colonel 3rd Regiment, Henry Hiney Flag Lieut., J. S. Cruze Bugler, Miss Love Pound Sponsor, Miss Lizzie Hicks first maid of honor, Miss Striegler second maid of honor, Miss Edna Moore third maid of honor.

Resolution to change time of selecting place of meeting to the last day of the session, was carried unanimously.

Committee on Program—Adj. Gen. Hicks, Col. Tom Rainey and Wilson Hay.

Committee on Management—Adj. Gen. Hicks, Col. Tom Rainey, Major H. J. Dawson and M. W. Holland, 217 Veterans answered roll call.

Resolutions of thanks were offered and carried unanimously thanking the good people of Llano for their splendid entertainment, the press, the railroad, the Besserer band and all others that had contributed to make the meeting such a grand success. After prayer by the Chaplain, the General declared the reunion adjourned to meet at Mason in July, 1903.

A. F. HICKS, Adj.-Gen. Mason, Texas, July 31st, 1903.

On Thursday, July 31st, 1903, the bugle call sounded at 9 a. m., and a parade was formed headed by the Marshal and horsemen, sons of Veterans and others, and marched around the speakers stand and were reviewed by General Vaughn and staff and the old Veterans who had arrived on the ground at that time. Conspicuous in the procession were the colors of Fort Mason Chapter No. 604, Daughters of the Confederacy—the first flag of the Confederacy.

At 11 a. m. General Vaughn called the Brigade to order. All Hail the Power of Jesus Name was sung by the audience, and after prayer by Rev. J. P. Pye the splendid Florence band gave then some excellent music. County Judge Jones delivered the address of welcome that made the old heroes and their families feel that it was good to be there. The response of Judge Melnis for the Brigade was truly a response of appreciation of the courtesies extended by the grand and noble people of Mason, town and county, and was received with cheer by the Veterans. A beautiful recitation by Mrs. Van Loring, The Confederate Flag, was rendered in such a manner by this gifted lady that the old soldiers were carried back to the war with all its victories, sufferings and pathos described the old flag and its sequel, the old men wept at the vivid remembrance of the past when they had followed so faithfully this old loved flag until all hope was gone. Adjourment was then had for dinner, and such a dinner; my! my! It makes me—did I say dinner? It was a feast fit for the gods. When I think of it now it makes me long for repetition of that eventful time.

2 p. m., bugle call. Then came a speech from the Hon. Clarence Martin that was grand, eloquent, and full of good things that helped to solve the problem of States Rights and to hold the reunions until the grave shall close over the last old Veteran; then their sons, and sons' sons of the grand old heroes shall continue to maintain that the South was right in her interpretation of the Constitution. The learned jurist asserted that the time will come when all the land, North as well as South, will admit that the South's interpretation of the Constitution was the right one. Tears and sobs resounded all over the vast audience when he recounted the last appeal of General Lee to the army; when he told the old war-scarred heroes that to prolong the struggle longer, would be to commit murder instead of doing right, truly it was a grand and eloquent address and showed that the talented young jurist was well up in the history of the war. At night the High School Alumni entertained the Veterans with a choice program that pleased the old boys and their families, if the applause of the audience meant anything.

**COLEMAN TEAM COPS
 FIRST OF REUNION BALL
 SERIES—SCORE 5 TO 3**

In an interesting game yesterday afternoon, Coleman won from Brady by a score of 5 to 3. Except for errors on both sides, the game was a splendidly played exhibition, the errors contributing largely to the scores made, and also probably costing Brady the game.

Coleman got her first score in the opening frame, when with two down, Akin of the visitors singled, and then scored on Bost's two-bagger. Brady retaliated in the last of the second frame by scoring twice. Lane reached first on an error, advanced to second on Bailey Jones' sacrifice bunt, and scored on White's long drive to center garden, which Bost failed to spear. Meanwhile White landed on third sack, and brought in the second score on Robertson's long hit just inside first base line.

Coleman promptly tied the score in her half of the third, when she got a runner on 1st on a clean hit along third base, who got around to third sack on two passed balls, and was scored on a safe hit.

The next two innings both sides blanked. In the 6th, Featherstone was hit by a pitched ball, advanced from first to second on a passed ball and landed on third sack while Brady was tagging the batsman out on first. A safe hit scored him for Coleman's third run.

In the 8th Roach dropped a high fly back of second, and both first and second sacks were occupied when the next batter bunted safely. Idol came up at this time and swatted the sphere for a three bagger, scoring two runs for Coleman.

In Brady's half, Roach redeemed himself when, with one out, he hit for two bags, and scored on Lane's high fly to left field. Jones landed safely on 1st but was forced out at second.
