PLEA OF GUILTY DRAWS FINE IN 2 COURT CASES

A plea of guilty in county court drew a fine of \$5.00 and one hour in jail for Laudy Lemons in each of two cases charging theft to the value of less than \$50.00. Lemons was on trial jointly with Arthur Stiles and Jeff Edmondson on charge of stealing a casing and also an inner tube from a party in Richland Springs. The cases against Stiles and Edmondson were dismissed, following Lemons plea of guilty.

The cases against the Mexican, C. S. Raman, charged with aggravated assault on Bill Johnson in the Lohu community and against whom a pistol charge was also filed, were continued. A new charge was filed against the Mexican charging the carrying of a pistol on his person, following Mr. Johnson's complaint that the Mexican had a pistol in his hand and threatened him (Johnson) with it. The first pistol charge, in which the Mexican was accused of having a pistol in his wagon, will likely be dropped in favor of the new charge.

The case against Mayhew Produce Co., on a charge of creating and maintaining a nuisance, on appeal from justice court, was, by agreement, passed for the time being, the elder Mr. Mayhew being out of town. Other cases disposed of in county court were the following:
State vs. Viek Lee, aggravated assault; dismissed by order of county attorney.
State vs. Elias Smith, theft under \$50.00; jury returned verdict of not guilty.
State vs. Robert Johnson, aggravated assault; dismissed by order of county attorney.
State vs. M. A. Stiles, theft under \$50.00; dismissed by order of county attorney.
The civil docket will be taken up next week, the chief case of interest being the one in which W. S. Shropshire will endeavor to regain possession of the Ford car stolen from him some months ago, and which was located by him at Llano in possession of a Llano county ranchman.

MEXICANS FORM COMMISSION IN BRADY SUNDAY

The Mexican citizens held an important meeting in Brady last Sunday, the occasion being the visit here of the Mexican Consul, Sr. Angel Casarin, Jr., of San Antonio, and party. The meeting was held in the Christian tabernacle, and something like 1,000 people were in attendance. In the consul's party were Ricardo A. Gordia, vice consul; his brother, Carlos A. Gordia, and Ramirez Cardenas, editor of the La Prensa, one of the leading Mexican newspapers.

By invitation, a number of the leading citizens of Brady met with the Mexicans, among the number being Mayor J. E. Shropshire, Postmaster A. B. Reagan, F. R. Wulff and M. S. Sellers.

The great object of the meeting was to promote closer and more cordial relations between the Mexicans and citizens of Texas, and to this end addresses were made by the vice-consul in Spanish and by the consul in the American language. The meeting here was one of a series which the consul and his party will make in his district. In the addresses the Mexicans were advised to be loyal citizens, to obey the laws of the country, and to work in harmony with their American neighbors.

The body was also addressed by Mayor Shropshire, who assured the Mexicans that they would be accorded every right and privilege in the civil and criminal courts, that their interests would be safe-guarded, and more than that, that their children would be educated and given a start in life the same as our own children. A commission of local Mexicans was thereupon formed, the object of which will be to represent the Mexican consul locally in looking after the interests of their citizens and in their dealings with the American authorities. Composing this commission were the following: R. Cervantes, president. E. Losoya, Antonio Valdez, Pablo Cadena, Antonio Picina, S. Elguetsa, Francisco Peres.

An order of the Blue Cross, an organization among the Latin countries and which operates along the same lines as the American Red Cross, was formed, with Senorita Mary Fernandez as head.

Following the meeting, the Mexican officials, together with members of the local commission and Brady representatives at the meeting, enjoyed a banquet at the City Cafe.

W. H. MARTIN, BALLINGER MAN, GIVEN FIVE YEARS ON CHARGE OF KILLING SON

Ballinger, Texas, Oct. 19.—The jury in District Court at Paint Rock yesterday fixed the penalty for W. H. Martin, charged with killing his son, at five years in the penitentiary. Martin shot his son with a shotgun on a farm near Paint Rock one year ago when the father and son quarreled over the crop. The young man was killed in a fight which followed the quarrel, and by agreement between State's and defense counsel the charge was reduced to manslaughter, and Martin pleaded guilty.

W. S. HOUSE, PIONEER MERCURY CITIZEN, DIED SUNDAY—FUNERAL HELD MON.

In the death of W. S. House at Mercury last Sunday afternoon, was marked the passing away of another of McCulloch county's pioneer and most prominent citizens. Mr. House was 83 years of age. Death resulted from an affection of the gall bladder, with which he had suffered for some time.

Mr. House was for many years one of the leading merchants of Mercury, being associated in the mercantile business with his sons, Ed and C. C. Some years ago he retired from active business, and following the removal of C. C. House from Brady to Fort Worth, the family took up their home in Fort Worth. They returned to Mercury only about three weeks ago.

Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon at the Cox cemetery by Rev. Reece of Winchell, one of the largest assemblies of citizens ever known at Mercury gathering to pay their last respects to this splendid man.

Mr. House is survived by his widow, two sons, E. T. of Mercury and C. C. of Fort Worth, and two daughters, Misses Louise and Rosette, of Mercury.

\$97,500 BUDGET ADOPTED FOR SALVATION ARMY

Adoption of a budget of \$97,500 to finance activities of the Salvation Army in Northwest Texas for the coming year featured the activities of the closing session of the second annual convention of Salvation Army Advisory Boards at the Texas hotel Friday afternoon.

The Editor of The Standard, in company with Commissioner R. L. Burns, attended the meeting, they being delegates from the McCulloch county advisory board, and accepted upon behalf of McCulloch county, a minimum of \$500, as this county's contribution towards the Army's yearly budget. During the meeting, it was announced that the first county going over the top would be given a full page write-up in a Sunday edition of the Star-Telegram, together with illustrated views of the county, all of which would be prepared by a special representative of that paper who would be sent to the winning county. This generous offer was made to the Salvation Army by the Star-Telegram to stimulate interest in the campaign. All other counties going over the top will be given a page write-up in the Army's own bulletin, which is sent all advisory boards, bankers and prominent citizens over the state.

With 65 delegates representing 40 counties in attendance the convention was one of the most enthusiastic ever held by the Army. Unanimous approval of the report of Commandant John J. Shearer, divisional special efforts secretary, showing that 346 cases had been handled for the county advisory boards last year received much applause. Several of the delegates told of the work the Army has

done in their respective communities. W. D. Davis, president of the Northwest Texas district Advisory Board presided at the convention. The address of welcome was delivered by W. B. Townsend, Fort Worth city commissioner. Charles Cope, secretary of the Weatherford Chamber of Commerce, made the response. Rev. Frank P. Culver, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal Church South offered the invocation while State Senator W. A. Hanger and H. C. Burke Jr. were among other local speakers on the program. The address of J. A. Cashman, New York Attorney, visiting in Fort Worth was a feature of the convention.

Lieutenant-Colonel George Wood, commanding the Southwestern division of the Army, which comprises the states of Texas and Louisiana, told of the Army's work among men and boys at the morning session. Colonel Wood is a prominent member of the Dallas Rotary club and also the Shrine. He explained the methods of the Army in reducing the criminal elements in the coming generations through salvaging the youth of the country. A home for children is to be established soon at Hillsboro, Texas, he said, where newsboys, messengers and children from the slums will be given an opportunity to learn the self-respect which comes with making their own way.

Mrs. Commandant Shearer spoke on "The Hand of Mercy Among Women and Children" in which she told of the Army's Rescue and Maternity home in San Antonio where annually more than 150 girls are taken and restored to society as useful citizens in place of becoming possible outcasts of the underworld. The story of some of her experiences brought tears to the eyes of her audience.

TIME TO BE DOING.

Good roads boosters who have taken special pains to sound out the citizens of the rural districts upon the subject of good roads say there is a widespread and deep-rooted feeling predominating among these citizens that the time is now ripe for a county-wide good-roads bond issue. The value of good roads has been demonstrated time and again—good roads building is no longer looked upon as a burden, but rather as an investment, that brings rich returns in the way of time-saving, practical elimination of repair bills, lightening of gasoline bills, and above all, the increasing of physical comfort and happiness. The good road of today brings greater returns than the railroad, because it is accessible to everybody, and makes everybody and everything accessible to the citizens. So much for the value of good roads.

Now the proposition that appears the logical solution of McCulloch county's road problems is to have a county-wide road bond issue for the purpose of improving all the recognized highways in the county, viz: the Puget-Sound to the Gulf, the Fort

Worth, Brady and Fort Stockton, and the Southwest Trail. This, then, would put a first-class highway thru every section of the county, and would, consequently be of value and direct benefit to every citizen of the county.

The federal government has just allotted \$4,000,000 to Texas to aid in road-building. McCulloch county should make her road bond issue large enough to build all these highways, and McCulloch county citizens should remember that the federal government is now placing a premium upon good roads to the extent of offering to match dollar for dollar with the citizens who want good roads.

Tonight Brady citizens should join in enthusiastically to put over a rousing big American Legion post for McCulloch county. Let's show our boys the appreciation that is due them for the great sacrifice they made in fighting democracy's battles—in risking their lives for those of us back home. Let's help them organize in a big way; put pep into the meeting, and a spirit of unity and progressiveness into the organization. We need the American Legion here—and the boys need us behind them. Let the citizenship do their part, for the boys have never yet forgotten the training they received in going over the top with whatever they undertake.

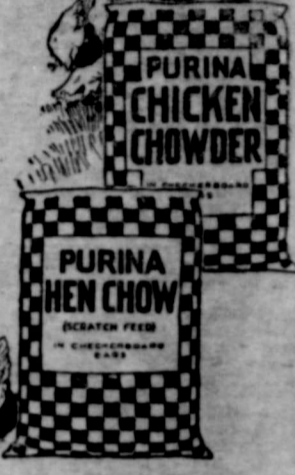

CAPT. W. J. WILSON, AGED VETERAN, PASSES AWAY AT SAN SABA

Capt. William J. Wilson died at the home of his son, A. B. Wilson, Sunday night, October 9. The body was buried in the Odd Fellows cemetery Monday afternoon, funeral services being conducted from the Methodist church. Rev. Jas. F. Pennybacker, pastor of the church, conducting the last sad rites.

Deceased was a native of North Carolina and came to Texas away back in 1880 and in 1887 settled in San Saba county. He served for the four tragic years of the Civil War in the Confederate army and for valiant service was promoted from enlisted man to the rank of captain. After the war he served his state in the legislature during the dark days of reconstruction and was ever faithful to every demand of a patriotic, loyal home-loving citizen. He was also the author of a spelling book which was the adopted speller in his native state for a number of years. In his later years he compiled and composed a number of patriotic and religious songs and published the same as the Eureka Songster and for thousands of these he found a ready sale. He was a member of the Methodist church and in his younger and active days was a valuable member of the official boards. He was intensely religious and those who knew him best know that the rule of his life was to ask, "What Would Jesus Do." During the last few years he had divided his time between living with his son in San Saba and two other sons in the old home state, making some ten trips. He was born Nov. 17, 1828 and was thus within a month of his 93 birth anniversary. He returned from North Carolina last Friday and was taken suddenly ill. He was a clean man in thought and word and life and for his true worth as a man and citizen was loved and respected.—San Saba News.

FARM HINTS.

The following is the second of a series of articles upon the growing of Sweet Clover, written by C. H. McDowell, Superintendent, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Sub-Station No. 6, Denton, Texas.

Seed Bed Preparation. Sweet clover is not similar to any of our well known Texas crops in its seed-bed requirements. It must have a firm, well settled seed-bed with just enough loose surface dirt to cover the seed not more than one-half inch deep.

Time of Seeding. In North and Central Texas seeding may be successfully done from September 1st, to possibly as late as March 1st. The best time for seeding, however, is early in January and not later than the 15th of February.

Rate of Seeding. Where the seed-bed is firm and well settled and contains plenty of moisture, and the seed are clean, of good quality and having a high test in germination, from 10 to 15 pounds per acre will be sufficient.

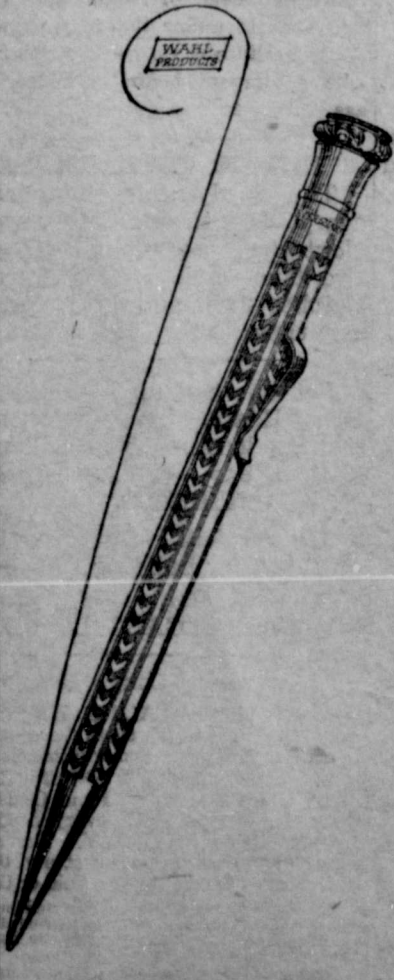
Method of Seeding. The best method of seeding sweet clover is broadcasting and harrowing the seed in lightly. The best type of seeder to use is the Wheel-barrow style grass seeder.

As many sweet clover seeds are hard, that is, the seed-coat will not absorb water, it is advisable that seed planted in January be "scarified," or otherwise treated so as to insure prompt germination.

to scatter the seed uniformly over the ground. In soft, loamy or sandy soils, great care should be taken not to harrow the seed in too deep. In no case should the seed be covered more than one-half inch deep. Sowing sweet clover with or in wheat and oats as a nurse crops is not necessary, and this practice is not recommended in a general way.

MAYHEW PRODUCE CO. IS OPERATING PECAN GRADER —2900 POUNDS. PER HOUR

A pecan grader, which sorts out pecans of various sizes at the rate of 2900 lbs. per hour, is now in operation at the Mayhew Produce Co., its installation having just been completed. The grader is in the form of a huge metal cylinder with perforations of various sizes, and which enable the sorting of four grades of the nuts. The pecans are carried from the bin to the grader by means of an elevator operated upon an endless belt. After being dumped in the swiftly revolving grader, the nuts first pass over a screen which permits all the trash and dirt to fall through. Then the nuts pass over a small-sized mesh, which causes all the smallest nuts to drop into the first bin. From this the remaining nuts travel the length of the cylinder, or until they fall through a mesh of the right size into their respective bins. A chute at the bottom of each bin enables the sacking of the sorted pecans with ease.
