JUDGE W. W. McCRORY OF STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION HERE LAST SAT'DAY

MAKES INTERESTING AND ILLUMINATING ADDRESS UPON FUNCTIONS OF HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT—BRADY BAND MAKES HIT WITH MUSICAL PROGRAM.

Judge W. W. McCrory of San Antonio, member of the State Highway commission, addressed the citizens of McCulloch county at the court house Saturday afternoon, giving an interesting and illuminating account of the operation and functioning of the State Highway department, which he termed one of the states most valuable non-political institutions. Judge McCrory also explained the new Federal act regarding maintenance of highways, and which will serve to perpetuate the Federal highways, once they are constructed.

One of the features of Judge McCrory's address was the appearance of the Brady band, just prior to the speaking. The band boys marched from the band hall, circled the public square playing inspiring martial and march airs, and then assembled on the south side of the court house, where two additional numbers, the first a tribute to Highway No. 9, and the second a tribute to Highway No. 10, were announced by W. D. Jordan. The band then marched up into the court room, where a third number, a tribute to Highway No. 23, was played. This second public appearance of the Brady band was all the assurance needed to convince the most skeptical that Brady has a real band; one which has made the most wonderful of progress in the few months of its organization, and one of which everyone may be justly proud.

Judge McCrory, in his opening remarks, commented upon the happy co-incident which enabled a man named McCrory to come to a town named Brady, located in the county of McCulloch, to make an address. In the outset of his talk, he stated that he would take no part in the local issue, that our differences of opinion were our own, to settle among ourselves, and that what he was most concerned in was to set the highway commission in its true light before the public.

In the course of his remarks, Judge McCrory paid a high tribute to good roads, placing their value above even that of good schools, in the enlightening and educating of the masses. He stated that if a railway were projected into a community, its people would vote bonuses, give right-of-way and make other concession to get such a railway; yet a great highway was of even greater value to a citizenship than a railway. In their wisdom, the fathers of our country had placed in the constitution of the United States the clause, that the "United States shall have authority to establish post offices and to build post roads." From the days of Jefferson on down to the present time, the building of roads has been a vital factor in extending the influences of civilization, and in the enlightening of the public.

Judge McCrory stated that the highway commission was composed of men who were giving their time for the love of the great work in which they were engaged, viz: the building of a system of highways throughout the state. These men give 100 days a year active service, for which they are paid \$1,000 each—consequently, it must readily be recognized that the office they hold is one of honor, rather than of remuneration. R. J. Windrow, state highway engineer, alone has commanded a greater salary, having been paid \$10,000 a year. The last legislature had sought to cut his salary down to \$6,000 a year, and finally had compromised on a cut to \$9,000 a year; this in the face of the fact that Windrow had a standing offer from a private contracting firm in this state of \$10,000 a year. The result has been that Windrow has just recently resigned to accept a position in private capacity with a Missouri capitalist, and in which he will have supervision of the expenditure of millions of dollars for the construction of a highway system in the state of Missouri. For this, Windrow will receive the salary of \$12,000 per year, all his traveling expenses, and the expense of moving his family from Austin to Missouri. Judge McCrory

termed his resignation as the greatest calamity that had befallen the highway department.

In further explanation of the department's operation, Judge McCrory stated that political influence had no part whatever in their decisions when granting Federal aid. That the only way in which they viewed any proposition was strictly from a business standpoint. That they were concerned chiefly in building connecting links of highways; in other words, a highway running from one definite point to another definite point. The highways were to be divided into two classes, major and minor. On the major highways, not less than 60% of the Federal apportionment to the State of Texas must be spent; on the minor highways, not over 40%. The major highways were those connecting large cities or important sections of the county with one another, while the minor highways were inter-county roads or those connecting one county seat with another.

To show the great responsibility resting upon the highway department, as well as the implicit trust placed in it, he stated that to this department was delegated sole authority to distribute 4 1/4 million dollars allotted by the Federal government to the state of Texas this year. He stated that he felt sure future allotments would not be less, but rather might be greater. At its last sitting the highway commission allotted \$3,000,000 in Federal aid.

The highway department he characterized as one of the most efficiently organized and most economically managed departments of the state government. Every one of the 600,000 automobiles and trucks in Texas was registered with the highway department, and every transfer of an automobile was likewise on record. As a consequence the ownership of an automobile might be obtained from the highway department in a few minutes time, regardless of the number of times it had changed hands. The highway department sends out the seals and numbers for all the automobiles used in Texas, and the purchase of these 600,000 seals and numbers represents quite a sum of money. Some newspapers made much to do over the extravagance of the highway department, when, in fact, this supposed extravagance merely represented the amount of money used in the purchase of these seals and numbers.

Judge McCrory read the article of the new Federal act pertaining to maintenance, and which provides that in case a highway is not maintained, when once constructed, it shall be the duty of the Secretary of Agriculture to notify the state to place such highway in first-class condition within a period of ninety days, and upon failure of the state to do so, the Federal government shall place the highway in first-class condition, charging the costs against such state, or withholding its entire allotment altogether.

In other words, unless the state sees to the maintenance of its highways, such state stands to lose future allotments of Federal aid.

Judge McCrory's address was highly appreciated by all, and it is safe to say that all his audience were clearly impressed with the importance and great value and usefulness of the highway commission to the state.

E. T. Jordan of Melvin, vice-chairman of the McCulloch County Good Roads association, presided at the meeting, and called upon Dr. J. B.

Granville to introduce the speaker. Dr. Granville took occasion to pay tribute to the good roads movement, and also to the plan through which the sponsors of the movement hoped to put McCulloch county in the lists with the other good roads counties of the State. Directing attention to the pitcher of pure water upon the speaker's stand, Dr. Granville called attention to the fact that that water—one of the biggest boons ever given to the city of Brady—had been obtained through a bond issue, the carrying of which involved the overcoming of the same kind of opposition as was being put forth against the road bond movement.

ROAD BONDS GET MAJORITY VOTE BUT FAIL TO CARRY TWO-THIRDS

TOTAL RETURNS GIVE ISSUE TEN MAJORITY—1206 VOTES CAST IN COUNTY—BRADY CASTS 405 VOTES AND GIVES 101 MAJORITY FOR BONDS.

The county-wide road bond election failed of the necessary two-thirds vote today, although it was given a majority vote. A total of 1206 votes were cast in the county, 608 favoring the bond issue, and 598 being opposed. In the Brady box a total of 405 votes were cast, Brady voters giving the issue a majority of 101. The election passed off quietly enough, although considerable interest was manifested throughout the day. Quite a number of women's votes were polled. In the Camp San Saba box, through some misunderstanding, the women were not permitted to vote, even though they had poll tax receipts and shared in community property.

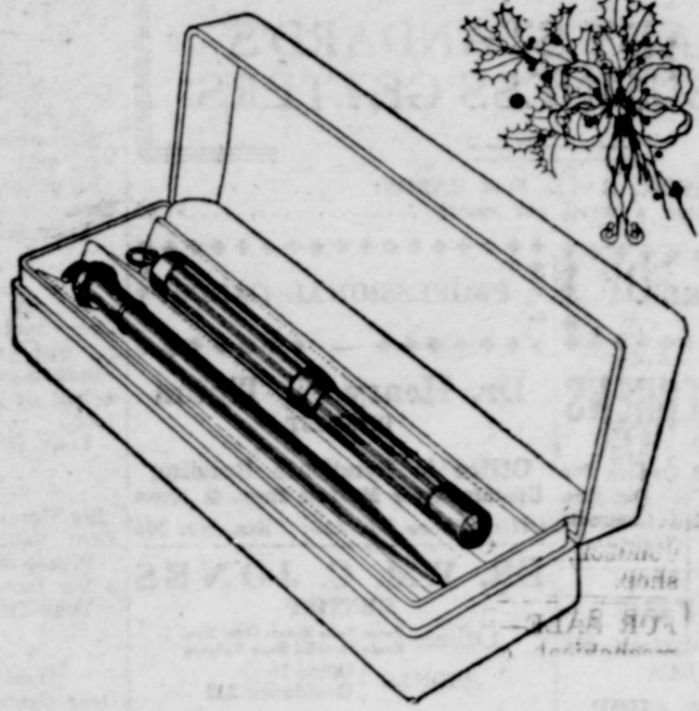

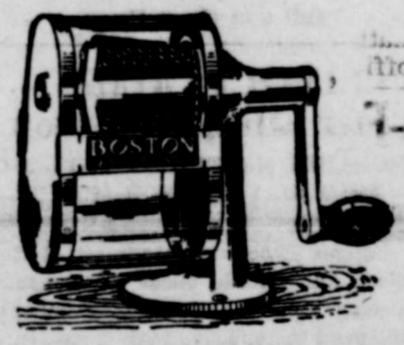
