A BATTLE OF WORDS.

Over in Neighbor Brownwood there is being waged a fierce and ferocious battle—of words—about the subject of taxation in general, and an increase in water rates in particular.

But the interesting point the matter has brought up is the allegation that perhaps not over a dozen citizens or firms of Brownwood pay as much as \$25 per year water rent.

Brownwood citizens, only 50 miles removed from Brady citizens, are raising a rough house because of a proposed increase in water rates, when perhaps not over a dozen pay in excess of \$25 per year.

Brady citizens for years have paid exorbitant water rates—prohibitive water rates—rates that were established when Brady, itself, was experiencing a water famine, and when rates were raised to the sky to force a reduced water consumption.

ANTI-LYNCHING BILL.

Passage by the House of the Dyer anti-lynching bill by no means insures its passage by the Senate, to which it now goes, but unquestionably the magnitude of the majority by which it passed the House—230 to 119—gives it a much greater possibility of being finally enacted into law than if the House vote had been closer.

Most observers appear to hold the opinion that the Dyer bill will not be passed by the Senate. The upper house of Congress, it is believed, will give the measure such consideration, in view of the big majority by which it was adopted in the House, but will therefore likely the present effort to provide federal administration of the punishment of lynchers.

In the present situation there has been more or less politics, it is true, but back of it all is the fact that most of the states have failed utterly to control the mob and have permitted lynching to increase at a rate which is alarming to all good citizens.

COUNTY POLL TAX PAYMENTS TOTAL 2,500--CITY 378

Monday and Tuesday saw a grand rush on at both County Tax Collector, Hubert Adkins' office, and also City and School Tax Collector W. G. Joyce's office. The rushes came in waves sometimes there being scarcely standing room in either of the offices, while at others the waiting list dwindled to two or three. With extra help, all comers received attention in due time, and receipts were issued both for tax payments and polls.

Mr. Joyce states that the last minute payments exceeded expectations, and brought the total up to a fair average. In fact, he boasts that his collections for school and city on the last day exceeded those of the county. Joyce's receipts on the 31st totaled close to \$10,000, while those of Adkins' ran around \$8,000.

With a great mass of letters containing poll tax payments still to be opened and receipted for, Mr. Adkins Wednesday could give no accurate statement as to the number of poll tax receipts issued this year, but stated that the number would exceed the 2,436 rendered, and would probably run close to 2,500. This, for the reason that many polls were on the supplemental list, or were paid by women whose polls had not been assessed.

Mr. Joyce reports a total of 378 city poll tax receipts issued.

The list of poll tax payments in each voting box of the county will not be available until next week, by which time all exemption certificates will probably also be issued and included in the total figures.

WALTON POTEET TO ADDRESS FARM BUREAU SOON
--OFFICERS AND DIRECTORS

The second annual meeting of the McCulloch County Farm Bureau was held Friday afternoon in the District court room at Brady. The meeting was called to order at 2:30 with County Agent Geo. E. Ehlinger, acting chairman, at the request of President H. J. Huffman.

Secretary-Treasurer R. E. Williams was the first on the program and made his annual report to the association. The report was unanimously adopted and the association voted to have the report published in each of the county papers, for the benefit of those members who were not present. The association also requested the president to appoint a committee of three members of the association to audit the books of the secretary.

Messrs. H. J. Huffman, Dan Zimmerman and R. E. Williams were unanimously re-elected to succeed themselves as president, vice-president and secretary-treasurer, respectively, of the County organization. The directors for the ensuing year were elected as follows: Precinct 1, H. N. Davis of Brady; Precinct 2, M. A. Leddy of Voca; Precinct 3, N. T. Gault of Placid; Precinct 4, J. H. Smith of Pear Valley.

Following the election of officers an hour or more was given over to a round-table discussion of the affairs of the organization. An invitation was then extended to Mr. Walton Poteet to address the association at some date during February. The meeting then adjourned with all members present agreeing to bring out at least one new member each to hear Mr. Poteet.

CITY AND SCHOOL TAX PAYMENTS RUN 95 PER CENT

Citizens of Brady and those of Brady Independent School district as well, responded nobly to the appeal for tax payment, with the result that tax collections this year for both school and city ran approximately 95% of the total. To be exact, the totals compiled by Tax Collector W. G. Joyce show 94.5% of the original school-tax roll collected, while 95.33% of the original city tax roll has been collected. The city collections run within 1% of last year's total, a fraction over 96% of the total roll having been collected on January 31st, 1921.

A week ago The Standard called attention to the fact that but about 50% of the tax rolls had been paid, but the rush of the last few days of January resulted in only about 5% of the rolls going delinquent on February 1st.

The Standard does not believe there is a town or school district in Texas that can show a larger percent of tax payments than Brady, and the Brady citizenship is to be highly commended for responding so liberally, and thereby placing both the city and the schools upon a substantial basis that will assure the highest efficiency and greatest returns to the citizens.

SCHOOL BENEFIT PROGRAM LAST FRIDAY THOROUGHLY DELIGHTFUL, AND A SUCCESS

One of the most delightful of entertainments was that given at the Methodist tabernacle last Friday night by the school children, and which was presented under the auspices of the Parent-Teachers association. Ye Old Folks Singing gave opportunity for Master Willie Dee Evans and Little Miss Lucy Mae Ricks the former as grandpapa and the latter as grandmama, to present these characters in especially pleasing fashion. Master Erickson, as leader of the singing had mastered the role perfectly, and Little Miss Elizabeth Ballou, as Fidgety Sue, fidgeted to the delight of everyone, while Master Barnes Collier was all the trial a sleepy cherub could possibly be. 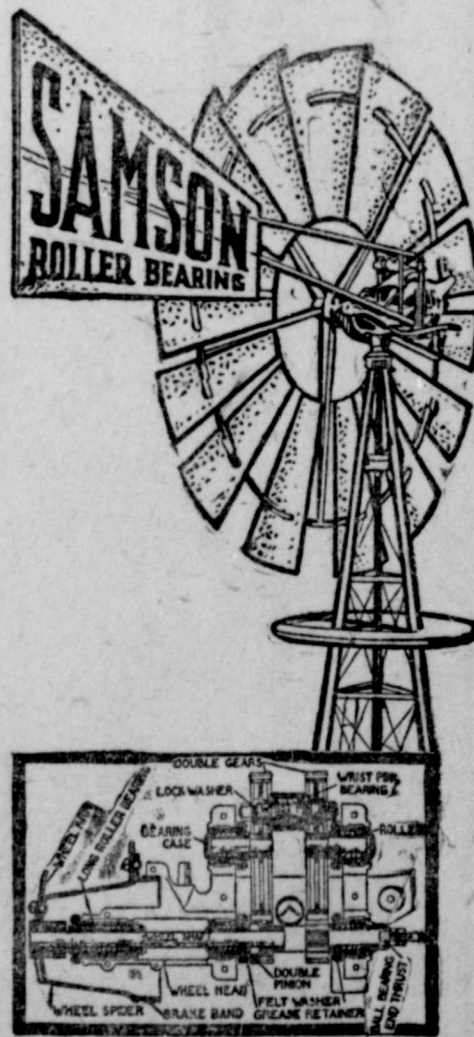
