BRADY SENDS ONE OF LARGEST DELEGATIONS TO SAN ANGELO CONVENTION

BRADY MUNICIPAL BAND WINS SECOND PLACE IN CONTEST—BRADY BALL TEAM CAPTURES SERIES—"LADY BRADY" MOST BEAUTIFUL SPONSOR.

If there is anything that would make a Bradyite's heart swell with pride, it was the splendid showing Brady made at the San Angelo convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. Brady had one of the largest delegations in San Angelo, and the Brady badges were everywhere in evidence. The Brady Municipal band was one of the outstanding features of the convention, and won praise wherever and whenever they made their appearance. In fact, the band permanently fixed Brady's position upon the map of West Texas. The Brady ball team was there, too, with the bells on, and captured the series of ball games, defeating Winters and also Howard Payne of Brownwood. And of all the sponsors, "Lady Brady," in the person of Miss Marjorie McCall, was one of the most beautiful, and her appearance in the pageant and again in the parade was acclaimed with great applause.

The Brady camp in the San Angelo tourist park, originally established by the band and base ball boys, was constantly swelled by new arrivals until by Wednesday several hundreds of citizens from Brady and from McCulloch county had joined the original bunch.

Brady's famous Municipal band gave Brady the greatest possible publicity, and a picture of the band in action appeared in Wednesday's Star-Telegram. In the Class B band contest, Brady won second place, the Fort Worth band taking first, and Colorado third. It was generally conceded that the capturing of the contest honors lay between Brady and Colorado, and the awarding of the first prize to Fort Worth occasioned some surprise. The entrance of Fort Worth in the contest was not announced until after the other bands had finished their programs. At that, the Brady band boys have the happy satisfaction of knowing that it took a city organization to defeat them.

Brady ball team split her series with Winters, losing the first day by a score of 4 to 0, and winning the second day, 4 to 0. In both games Brady outclassed Winters, but had all the breaks against them Monday. At that, Winters has one of the strongest ball teams Brady has gone up against, and while they did not finish out the series, they expect to come to Brady next

Elbert Kruse Dies in Florida.
A message received here Tuesday afternoon by F. H. Kruse announced the death of his son, Elbert S. Kruse. The body was carried to Austin, Texas at Tampa, Florida, at noon that day, for interment, leaving Tampa that night.

Elbert Kruse was a splendid and ambitious young man. He had studied law and was located in El Paso at the outbreak of the World War. Entering Uncle Sam's service, he was stationed at San Antonio in the hospital corps. There he contracted mumps, followed by kidney trouble, which not only caused almost complete loss of his sight, but which resulted in his becoming a helpless invalid. In October, 1918, he was invalided home, and for four months made a gallant fight to regain his health. Finally, in February, he was able to be up and about once more, and his eyesight also improved to some degree. He readily made friends and was highly esteemed by all who met him. Following a visit in Illinois with a sister, he was advised by physicians to seek a warmer climate, and accordingly located in Florida. He was married two years ago to Miss Nichols of Austin, who survives him. At the time of his passing, she having been in Florida since last July visiting him and her other children there.

Besides the wife, there survive his parents, two brothers, Robert of St. Petersburg and Orlando of Tampa, Fla., and three sisters, Mrs. Carrie Miller of Rushville, Ill., Mrs. Elinor Plummer of Chillicothe, Texas, and Miss Bernice of Miami, Fla.

THE TEXAS LEGISLATURE.

Your lawmakers are up in the air in the third called session. They have passed appropriation bills calling for some \$10,000,000 more than they have money to pay. Now many of those who fathered these appropriations are afraid they are in a hole. The people are being heard from. Taxes are to be raised and as the appropriation bills are already in the hands of the governor, nothing can be done until he acts on them. The "lump sum" appropriation for the educational institutions was put over in a storm after it was passed, some one half million dollars was added to it for a new normal school at Kingsville, along with several thousands of dollars for other purposes. Now, under the "lump sum" bill, the governor cannot veto parts of this bill, he can cut out the Kingsville normal or other special items in it but he cannot veto one salary without cutting them all out. Personally, I think the legislature should refuse to pass any revenue bills until the appropriations are cut down to a reasonable amount. I see no reason for swelling appropriations at a time when thousands of our citizens are unable to pay their taxes.

The country has not yet recovered from the great war. The Federal government has reduced its taxes, why not the State, at least stand pat, and not go on establishing new normal schools, new departments, raising salaries and acting as if we were prosperous.

We who are opposed to the policy of the state branching out and squandering more money are hoping that the governor will veto the educational bill and several of the special appropriations now in his hands, send them back to us and let us cut them to where they can be paid with what revenue we have already provided. We will favor a reduction even in the public school appropriations if the cut is extended on down the line, but do not favor cutting out the public school appropriations and letting the other state institutions stay as they are.

We have many bills introduced representing appropriations made in the regular and last called session but most of them are introduced merely for political effect and for no other reason. The same members who voted for them before will still stay in nearly every instance and the bills will accomplish nothing in my view. Many of the members thought when we were called in this session that we would be through in a week, but we are near the end of the second week and have just started. The people back home know as much about what will be the final outcome of this session as most of us do, so I will ven-
