

WADE SPEAKS ON LUNCHEON CLUBS AS SOCIAL CENTER

SAN ANGELO, Texas, May 21.—In his address at the conference of secretaries and unit directors on "Lunch Clubs," Homer D. Wade, assistant manager of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, spoke as follows:

"Nothing augurs better for town and community than agencies that bring people together socially. I suggest the festive board as a point of contact that all may reach and one that will reach all. The question of community development involves cooperative effort of all who live in said community. Each individual is a unit and the growth will be in proportion to the activities of the unit. The question of development, therefore, resolves itself into avenues for recognition and inspiration for activities.

Finds Talent Dormant.

"In my observation and experience in chamber of commerce work I have found some of the best talent in a town lying dormant because of failures in proper recognition and hence lack of inspiration for activities. The ideal citizen will not wait for this because he will meet the test of good citizenship at all times and places. It is not possible, however, to interest men and women whose best impulses are latent or that may not have been quickened.

"Recently I read where there was a town whose membership in the Chamber of Commerce was 100 per cent. I think Ray Lehman of Mineral Wells makes the boast that this same condition obtains in his splendid city. I am not going to call these conditions into question, but I make the prediction that if there is not some source provided that will give proper recognition and some avenue provided that will generate activities that these ideal conditions will begin to wane. May I challenge the secretaries present upon this point? Are you willing to assert that every person living in your respective cities, towns or communities are completely sold upon the said city, town or community in which they live? I make bold to say that such a state of affairs is not an iridescent dream.

Work for Betterment.

"On the other hand, I believe it is possible and practical that every person in a community that has reached the age of accountability should be at work for the betterment and development of his community. It is admittedly a hard thing to believe, but I submit that when the units are properly aroused to the point of their responsibilities that a response of some kind can be given. It is not impossible to teach the doctrine that every person living in a town or community owes some of his time, some of his mind, some of his means to the upbuilding of that community.

Suggests Social Center.

"As stated in the beginning, I suggest a social center as a potent factor in the progress to the ideal conditions that I have outlined. Social and business castes are an impediment in town development. A common meeting point for the citizenship is the antithesis of castes. This brings me to my theme, luncheon clubs.

"Every town and every community should have a center, social and otherwise. In the rural community, a schoolhouse or church are the logical magnets. A common table is not always available, but a picnic spread where the boys and girls can mingle with the adults will suffice. In the community the topics of interest are the betterment of schools, efficiency of public roads, marketing facilities, condition of crops, better breeding and many kindred subjects. These will interest the boys and girls much more than is generally recognized. Anything that will develop ideas and arouse interest will be found profitable. They can fill places on the

program with credit and pleasure. The women have their problems. Give them an opportunity to discuss them.

"I can not resist the temptation to suggest that Chamber of Commerce executives can not expend too much energy in lending assistance to the communities surrounding their towns. Clubs Need Time.

"The smaller towns can practice the same ideas, but perhaps with a little more convenience, but what I have said of the rural communities applies with equal force to them. I am in agreement with the sentiment that it is too burdensome for a town with less than 2,500 or 3,000 people to maintain a paid secretary with headquarters and expenses incident to maintenance. It is not impossible to do so, but in most instances impractical. A luncheon club properly functioning can supply this need.

"A luncheon club, however, to give results must be given thought, time and variety. In towns where there are insufficient facilities for having such affairs there are other places that can be utilized. A vacant store building, a church or school building will be acceptable. The Parent-Teacher Association, the women's auxiliary of the American Legion or women's auxiliary of the fraternal organizations or churches are generally alive to some opportunity to make money. They are quick to serve luncheons at an agreed sum, even though they make their husbands donate the necessities for the luncheon and then pay for their individual luncheon.

Enumerates Results.

"These have results in many ways. First, the circle of activities is enlarged. Second, the women earn something for the organization with which they are associated. Third, it eliminates castes, social and otherwise. Fourth, it brings people together in a common cause—that of discussing things of mutual interest. Fifth, and most important, it makes the individual feel his responsibility as a citizen. Interest the boys and girls by inviting their presence and giving them places on the program. There is always some boy or girl in the public school who has talent in the fine arts or some other character. In addition to lending aid in the development of this talent, pride is aroused and a point of contact made for the younger generation. As already stated, the younger element will absorb the ideas of the older ones about civic, commercial and constructive development a great deal more than they are given credit for. Care should always be given to making these programs short and snappy with ample variety. The more people that can be drawn to them the more good will and fellowship and patriotic impulses will be aroused and whatever ties people together socially tends to weld them in the spirit of the undertaking which is so paramount in general developments.

Business Men Respond.

"In regular functioning Chambers of Commerce the luncheon plan is just as outstanding as the instances I have recited. The business men will respond to them as readily as others. A luncheon given with social opportunities given relaxation from intense business and at the same time lends aid in vision and teamwork which are the fundamentals of development in any line.

"The success of the Rotary, Kiwanis, Lions and similar clubs shows the truthfulness of this statement. In planning these luncheons it is immaterial if they are held at night, noon or morning. There are some fundamentals, however, that should be observed. First, make the meals worth the price paid for them. Second, have the program short and snappy and by all means pass up long drawn-out affairs. Third, have an end to reach and reach the end. I do not submit the luncheon idea as a panacea nor utopia, but as an outstanding incentive for teamwork, good fellowship and good citizenship."
