

'TECH' COLLEGE LOCATING BOARD TO VISIT BRADY AND MENARD JULY 17TH

BRADY TO BE THIRD CITY TO BE VISITED OUT OF LIST OF 38 CONTESTANTS—TWENTY-SIX DAYS REQUIRED TO COMPLETE ITINERARY.

Austin, Tex., June 16.—Details of the itinerary of the locating board of the Texas Technological college in its inspection tour of applicant towns was announced tonight by W. R. Nabours, secretary. The board will leave Austin on July 13 and make its first inspection at Boerne on July 14. Schedule of other inspections follows: July 16, Lampasas; 17, Brady and Menard; 18, Brownwood and Coleman; 19, Ballinger and Paint Rock; 20, Miles and San Angelo; 21, Midland; 23, Stanton and Big Spring; 24, Colorado and Sweetwater; 25, Abilene and Buffalo Gap; 26, Clyde and Cisco; 27, Seymour and Munday; 28, Haskell and Stamford; 30, Snyder and Post; 31, Wilson and Lubbock; Aug. 1, Crosbyton and Spur; 2, Floydada and Plainview; 3, Tulia and Amarillo; 4, Claude; 5, Memphis and Quanah, and 7, Vernon.

Because of previous engagements, members of the board to locate the Texas Technological College will not take the field until July 14 and expect to spend about twenty-six days inspecting sites tendered for the college.

The decision to begin the inspection on July 14, which is a Saturday, was officially announced by the board Thursday at a meeting attended by all members except Dr. F. M. Bralley, president of C. I. A. The others are S. B. Cowell, chairman; Dr. W. S. Sutton, acting president of the University; Dr. W. B. Bizzell, president of A. & M. College, and Prof. S. M. N. Marrs, State Superintendent. W. R. Nabours of the Board of Control is secretary of the board, but is not a member.

Itinerary Announced.

In addition to announcing the date to start the work, the board also indicated the order in which the towns will be visited in making the following statement:

"The board was very anxious to make the trip at the earliest possible

date, in fact, the original plan was to make the trip and select the location during the month of May, hence some of the members of the locating board made other arrangements covering different periods of this month and the first half of June, believing that the question of the location of the college would be determined by this time. Other conditions have arisen since the unavoidable delay has been occasioned which makes it impossible for all the members of the board to go in a body before the date agreed upon. It is estimated that the trip can be made in twenty-six days, since the board has heretofore stated that its entire procedure would be placed upon a business basis and elaborate social entertainment would not be expected. The official party will consist of six people—the five members and the secretary.

TEXAS SCHOOLS WILL GET ABOUT \$13 PER CAPITA

Austin, Tex., June 16.—Texas public schools will receive \$13 per capita apportionment during the next school year under appropriations made by the recent legislature and regular revenues, State Supt. S. M. N. Marrs said today. Marrs said the \$13 allotment however is contingent on holding the alleged textbook contracts illegal. If they should be held legal, the allotment will be reduced to \$12 per capita.

It is estimated by the state superintendent that the available school fund will total \$17,555,000 during the year. This includes the \$2,000,000 supplemental appropriation, and additional funds from the oil tax, gasoline tax and sulphur tax as well as regular revenues. Only \$500,000 is set aside for textbooks, whereas if the recent contracts are held legal, this source will require \$2,000,000.

POISONED FISH YARN IS GIVEN WIDE PUBLICITY

One of the biggest hoaxes yet pulled on the dear unsuspecting public was the yarn carried last Sunday by the Fort Worth Star-Telegram, as well as all Associated Press papers, concerning a supposed wholesale poisoning of campers and fishers near Brady from eating fish which had feasted on cabbage leaves sprinkled with arsenic to kill grasshoppers. The article had all the earmarks of authenticity, since it was given out by a Fort Worth doctor, who declared himself one of the victims, and who reported 22 patients in the Brady sanitarium at the time of his return to Fort Worth. Just what ailed the doctor will probably forever be a mystery—certainly his diagnosis called for an operation on his head and, not on his "innards."

The ridiculousness of the published statement is first, that cabbage should be so plentiful out in the Brady section as to be used for grasshopper bait; and second, that arsenic poison when eaten by a grasshopper, or when washed by millions of gallons of water into a living stream, should be sufficient to cause a human being to become deathly ill from eating fish taken from such water. All the arsenic a fish could swallow under such circumstances wouldn't so much as make a tonic for a person. Not a single Brady physician has ever been called to treat a case of any such nature, and it would be illuminating indeed to know just what was absorbed by the Fort Worth doctor and the many "sick" folks, which caused their desperate illness and their even more desperate yarns.

BRADY BALL TEAM HAS HECTIC TIME AT WINTERS—WINS THURSDAY

The Brady ball team had a hectic time at Winters in the three game series played there the end of last week. Thursday's game was won handily by Brady, the score resulting 4 to 2. Koch for Brady was matched against Maddox for Winters, and the game was a splendid exhibition of the national sport.

Friday, Brady entered the contest confident of winning, only to have the boys receive the surprise of their lives. In three innings, Hale was touched for 5 hits and four runs. McCarty, who succeeded Hale on the mound, fared even worse, yielding six hits and six runs. Taylor thereupon essayed the pitcher's role, retiring after two innings with a score of about 8 hits and 6 runs against him. "Big" Fuller completed the last two innings of the game, allowing but one hit and no runs. Total score, 16 to 7 in favor of Winters. The score would indicate that Brady, herself did some slugging and base running, but not in the same class with Winters.

In the third game, Bungar was matched against Maddox. The score ended 13 to 2 in favor of Winters. While Bungar allowed 17 hits, Maddox was also heavily touched, Brady getting 13 hits, but failing to place them as opportunely as their opponents.

In yesterday's game, Brady won a ten-inning contest by a score of 2 to 1, Brady getting six hits and Mason 3 hits. Brady had the game won 1 to 0 up to the 9th inning, when, in attempting to catch a Mason runner off third, Koch threw wild and let Mason make a run, tying the score. It required another inning of playing for Brady to untie the tally.

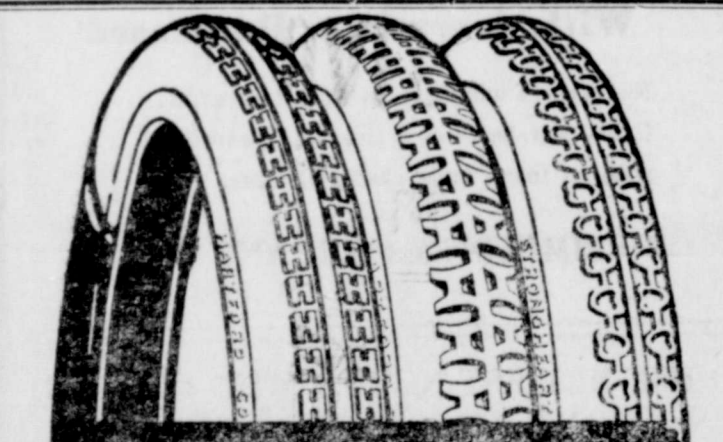
