COTTON JUMPS \$5 BALE ON GOVM'T **CONDITION REPORT**

Washington, Aug. 31-Drouth in Oklahoma and Texas, excessive rains in the Southeast, the weevil and leaf worm, caused marked decline during August in the condition of the cotton crop, the Department of Agriculture announced Friday in placing the indicated crop at 10,788,000 bales, as compared with a forecast of 11,516,000 bales as of July 25th.

The condition Aug. 25th was estimated at 54.1 per cent of normal as compared with 67.2 per cent one month earlier , and the indicated yield per acre dropped from 143.9 pounds to 134.8.

The condition of 42 per cent of normal in Georgia reflected the extent of weevil damage in that state, it was said, while the drop from a condition of 82 per cent July 25, to 71 Aug. 25 in North Carolina, revealed the first severe effects of the pest this year in that state.

Prevalence of the army worm, leaf worm and other insects, in addition to the boll weevil, also was reported to be causing considerable damage throughout the cotton states.





HAVE HIGH NUTRITIVE VALUE

According to Bureau of Fisheries, Sea-Mussels Are Not Appreciated as They Should Be.

Officials of the bureau of fisheries declare that sea-mussels are, in a high degree, both palatable and nutritious. The bureau goes farther and says that in view of the abundance of the mussels and the ease with which they can be obtained, the neglect of them for table use is wasteful. - It points out that sea-mussels are found along the coasts of nearly all the northern half of the northern hemisphere, and that there are beds on the New England coast so extensive that the mussels

could be collected daily by the ton. It adds that many persons consider the flavor of the mussel superior to that of the oyster; that, moreover, mussels are in season when the oyser is out of season, and that they are more easily cultivated than the oyster. It admits that fresh mussels are most difficult to market, for they spoil if kept more than 24 hours, but asserts that if canned or pickled they retain their natural flavor for months. The bureau recommends that such cheap and nutritious food be placed on the market.

Horner, archeologist of the University of Oregon, who has visited what is believed to be the burial ground of an ancient tribe of mound builders, near Albany, Ore., has pronounced the place one of the wenders of primitive Oregon. He said the finds made by Claude Peacock, a farmer, represented a higher type of civilization than previous discoveries in





The Galapagos islands were for a long time remote from any steamer lanes. It was natural, therefore, that they should remain uninhabited and undeveloped for nearly three centuries after their discovery in 1535. But their very remoteness made them a safe gathering place for buccaneers. and those worthies who preyed on Spanish treasure ships and the Spanthe islands in the Sixteenth and Seventeenth centuries. Dogs, cats, goats and donkeys left by them have given rise to numerous wild descendants on some of the islands. Much treasure is believed to have been buried there and some, in fact, has been found. What are believed to be the main deposits, however, have never come to

The next picturesque chapter in the history of the islands was written in the early years of the Nineteenth cenwhen American whalers, who found their catches in the Atlantic decreasing, rounded the Horn and began operations in the Pacific. They found the Galapagos islands a convenient place to meet, get water and even to replenish their larders with the delicate flesh of the giant turtles. On Charles island (Santa Maria to the Ecuadoreans) the whalers established on Post Office bay a cache in which the ships left mail for each other.

The islands are directly under the equator, but their climate is far from what is generally understood by the term, "equatorial." A cold ocean current from the Antarctic bathes them and the air currents from this cool water keep the uplands at a pleasant temperature the year round. At night it becomes really cold on the plateaus and camp fires must be used. It is when the visitor finds this upland region that he realizes that there is really some sort of future for the Galapagos Islands.

At present efforts toward the development of the islands are being made at only two places. There is a small hacienda on Chatham Island (Cristobal) where sugar is the principal crop. The productiveness of the soil is further shown, however, by the patches of coffee, grain, and fruits grown by the peons. Herds of cattle are also raised on the excellent pasture lands. This is and is about 20 miles long by 10 wide. On Albemarle island (some 60 miles long by 20 to 40 wide) is another relatively small hacienda.

On the ten principal islands there are many thousands of acres of tillable land and more on which live stock could be raised, so that at some future day the islands will probably support a considerable population. The principal problem would be an adequate water supply. There are no running streams on the islands. But much water falls on the uplands and it is possible to obtain water in many places by digging a few feet. It is believed that a number of subterranean streams empty into the sea, and
