

Now, all the people of the south east part of the county do not want the road changed at all. This old road was laid out and surveyed in 1875 At that time it was known as the Brady and Austin road. At the time it was surveyed, at the end of a mile just that many hacks on a tree indicated the number of miles, or if no tree to hack, it was indicated by that many rocks in a heap.
