TRAGIC DEATH OF LEE MORGAN IS SHOCK TO BRADY

The tragic death of Lee Morgan, aged 58, prominent and most highly-esteemed citizen of Brady, through the accidental discharge of a shotgun at 8:00 o'clock Wednesday morning, was a shock to the entire citizenship. His death marked the passing of one of Brady's old and most highly thought of citizens. Mr. Morgan had made his home here over a quarter century, coming here from Lampasas, and had followed his profession of building contractor. In the past two years he had operated the Texico Filling station on South Blackburn street, and his new and modern filling station which he was erecting on his lot on Blackburn and South Second street, was nearly completed and ready for occupancy.

Just before the fatal discharge of the gun, Mr. Morgan had gone out onto the sleeping porch of the Morgan home, telling Mrs. Morgan that he was going to clean the gun, a 12-gauge Winchester pump shot gun, preparatory to loaning it to John Blackwell, who had planned a hunt. The gun was fired as Mr. Morgan sat on a settee, his cleaning rods beside him, the charge of No. 6 bird shot going in through his mouth, and virtually tearing the top of his head off. When found, the body had fallen from the settee and lay in a weltering pool of blood, while the porch presented a most gruesome scene. The shot, together with part of the skull, was found in the dead man's cap, which he was wearing at the time, and which had apparently been blown to the ceiling and then dropped to the floor, the small shot not piercing the cloth.

Mr. Morgan was a man of most substantial character, and though of quiet and retiring disposition, yet those who knew him best, esteemed him highest. He was a member of the Methodist church, and was of the type of citizen whose lives and deeds speak the highest praise for them.

He was married about twenty years ago to Miss Minna Bell Wall, who, with one brother, J. D. Morgan, in Lampasas, and three sisters, Mrs. Joe Matthews of Menard, and Mrs. Charles Martin and Mrs. Kate Martin, both of Chicago survive.

Funeral services were held yesterday afternoon at 3:00 o'clock at the family residence, the Rev. L. T. Morris conducting, and interment was made in Brady cemetery. A large concourse of sorrowing and sympathizing friends was present to pay last respects to the dead, and to extend sympathy and condolence to the bereaved family.

Father Dies at Iredell.

S. H. Deatherage was in Brady last Saturday on his return to Doole from Iredell, where he had been called on October 3rd by the sad news of the death of his father, E. L. Deatherage, at his home three miles south of Iredell. The elder Mr. Deatherage was born in South Carolina November 15, 1833, and was therefore nearly 90 years of age. Later he moved with his father to Arkansas, and where he was married. He enlisted in the Confederate army and served until his health broke down, and was discharged in the then Indian territory. With his family, he moved to Texas in 1863, and with the exception of a couple of years spent in the San Antonio section, he had lived in Bosque county and the Iredell community ever since. He was one of the pioneers in Texas, and had many thrilling experiences with Indians. One of the finest of tributes is paid to the deceased by an old-time friend, who had known him for fifty years, and who paid his memory a glowing eulogy in an article written for the Meridian Tribune. He was a member of the Christian church, but did not confine his religious gifts and good will to that one denomination, but helped whenever help was needed for the promotion of the Savior's work.

Besides Sam Deatherage of Doole, deceased is survived by three other sons and one daughter, W. F. of Colorado, Tom of Jaytown and Thad Deatherage of Beaumont, and Mrs. Jackson of Terrell.
