Friday night. They report a real nice time.

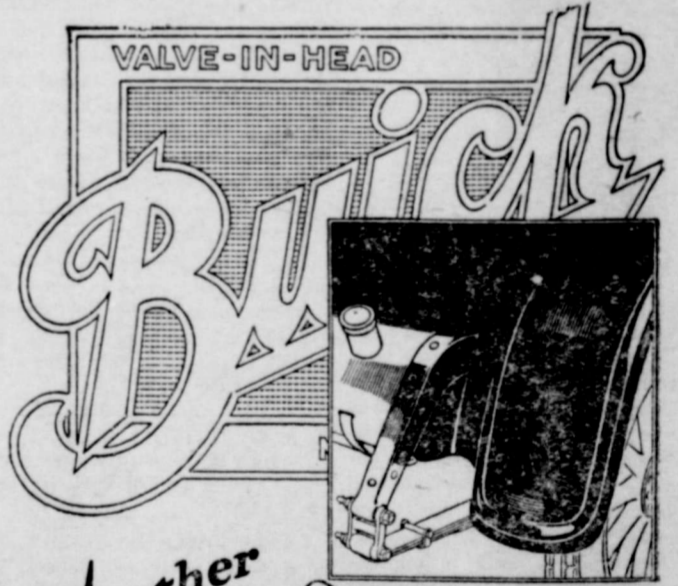
Misses Ruby and Annie Behrens attended the show Saturday night at Mason.

EARLY DAY REMINISCENCES

Capturing Wild Mustangs.

Wonder, Ore., Jan. 3, 1924.
Editor Brady Standard:

Way back in the "seventies" there lived in McCulloch county a Mr. Jno. H. Hall and a young, tall, longlegged man by the name of Reub Wooten, (most people called him "Rube Ootan"), he could ride most any small broncho bare-backed with only a hackmore on its nose. Well, he and Mr. Hall formed a syndicate all by themselves, for the purpose of catching wild mustangs and taming them for cow ponies. They struck camp on the head waters of Brady creek in Concho county on Live Oak. I think it was near where now is located the thriving railroad city of Eden. At that time there roamed at large numerous bands of wild horses among which were many good horses and mules that had strayed away from their owners and taken up with the unbranded mustangs.

The usual method employed to catch wild mustangs was to build a stockade or large corral around a permanent watering place in dry weather where the mustangs were in the habit of coming for water. The corral was built of trunks of trees and large poles stood on end and firmly set in the ground close together at the bottom and fastened together at the top with wire. The opening or gate would be on the trail or path in which the mustangs usually traveled in going to the water hole. Whenever the horses got down to the water farthest away from the gap and busy getting a drink a man in hiding nearby would slip up right quick and close the gap in the fence. Sometimes a man would lead a saddle horse and follow a bunch of mustangs around keeping in sight of them until they would get tame enough for him to drive them; which sometimes would require ten or twelve days of following. The color of most of the mustangs was brown and dun with a black or dark stripe along their back from one end to the other and stripes around their legs from their knees and hocks to their feet. And they were as tough as a pine-knot and could endure more hardships than any other horse of their size. Upon one occasion I was up on Live Oak on business and stopped for the night at Mr. H. B. Warren's camp. I staked my saddle pony out on the grass by tying the rope to a bush over night. Early next morning I went to move him to a fresh place and upon finding him wound up I decided to hobble him and leave him dragging his rope. I had no sooner returned to camp when Mr. Warren said that I had better go and catch my horse for there was a bunch of mustangs just beyond where he was and they were liable to run him into the herd and leave me afoot. It is needless to say that I took his timely advice.

HONEST INJUN.

Preparedness in peace times is as necessary as preparedness in times of war. The fire drill at Central school Wednesday morning proved that.

WHERE COMMENDATION IS DUE.

It is opportune at this time to speak a word of praise for the teachers of the Brady schools for the discipline and training given pupils, along with their efforts to "teach the young idea to shoot." In less than two minutes after the signal for fire drill had been sounded, the Central school building on last Wednesday morning had been emptied of its precious contents of human lives. There was no disorder; no panic. The training of many months stood the teachers and their charges in good stead, and the children marched from the building, threatened by fire, just as they had been accustomed to in fire practice.

The danger was real, not imaginary. Some day, somewhere, a circumstance will arise when the danger will be magnified many times. Then again, will this same training stand teachers and pupils in hand—if the training has been properly given. Brady citizens should be aware—they must acquaint themselves with what the teachers are doing for their children. And they should further be made aware of the fact that this same training in fire drills and the teaching of fire prevention, in the schools, secures for Brady a reduction in the fire insurance key rate of the city. The children of today are the citizens of tomorrow. If they are taught calmness, orderliness and proper action in times of emergency; if they understand the necessity of fire prevention and control, then they are in position to save themselves, their own property and as well their friends and neighbor's lives and property. The State Board of Fire Insurance recognizes this fact, therefore, it is willing to give a city credit where fire drills and fire prevention is taught in the schools.

Let praise be given where praise is due.
