THE SWEET TOOTH

There is nothing mysterious about the relation of sugar to decay of the teeth. Sugar ferments very easily and this fermentation is hastened by bacteria that are present in the mouth. Lactic acid is the result of this fermentation and this acid acts on the lime or hard portion of the teeth in any place where the enamel is imperfect. When the lime is dissolved the soft part of the tooth is exposed and then real decay begins. Each small grain of sugar that remains in the teeth may be the means of setting up this decay. Sugar mixed with other substances as in the case of candy is peculiarly liable to decay, since particles of candy are heavier than pure sugar and more apt to lodge in the cracks of the teeth or in the gums. Anyone who eats a large quantity of candy must be willing to take special pains in caring for the teeth.

Golden Text Joshua; 23;14

By way of introduction it possibly will be better if we begin a little in advance of today's lesson. After leaving last Sunday's lesson, the Crisis at Kadesh the children of Israel did considerable wondering. They however remained very close to Kadesh.

I remember when I was some what younger than I am now, while studying about these people, the conception was drawn upon me that these people traveled as we see travelers now adays, camping over night and resuming their journey the following day. This, according to my opinion was not the case with these Israelites. We are told that they camped for possibly ten months in the valley below the mount on which Moses received the laws. Moses knew by this time that he was to die in the near future, and he of course was seeking a leader to succeed him (Num. 27 17). We find however that he made no outward effort to select his successor. Jehovah selected Joshua for that important position. Joshua was not a young man unprepared for the place. He was familiar with most of the incident beginning back with the bondage in Egypt. Josephus told us he was with Moses continually during these years in the wilderness.

Since Aaron had preceded Moses in death, with the follow-

ing of Moses this was now clear for the leadership of Joshua.

As soon as Joshua was elected he gave orders for the people to prepare for the march. God gave the command to Joshua to arise go over the Jordan, thou and all this people, unto the land which I do give to them.

The great promise that Jehovah gave them, verse 31 should have been sufficient for them.

Joshua remembered the knowledge obtained from the spies some thirty eight years before. He at once began preparing for the conquest of Canaan.

Joshua ask King Sihon of the Amorites for permission to pass through their country, this request was refused, not only was the request refused but the King immediately mustered an army and attacked the Israelites. Joshua gained a very decisive victory and took possession of their capital city. With this victory the Israelites quickly conquered all of the country east of the Jordan. Just how long they remained here we do not know. Time and space will not permit me to go into details of the remaining conquest of Canaan. However the conquest was not given up until all Palestine was conquered. Luckily for Joshua, the Israelites were never forced to fight against united Israel. Since the country was ruled over by several kings. For each tribe had its own king.

If we in our busy hours of daily duty would provide for the selection of God given men. Is God choosing men today as he chose Joshua, Moses, or Abraham. In our greed for money and wealth forget our selves, in as much do not always select our leaders upon their merit, but always some outside influence to control our selection.

Siltage Of The Colorado River Is Discussed

F. U. Taylor, dean of the engineering department of the University of Texas, is giving wide publicity to alleged siltage conditions at the Austin dam. This is doubtless for the purpose of discrediting the state wide move for water conservation, as this move is opposed by Mr. Taylor

and also by Mr. Stiles of the Reclamation Department. In fact, these two gentlemen are the only ones out of the 250 Texas engineers who met with Governor Neff in 1923 who are not favorable towards the move. To fully understand the siltage conditions at the Austin dam,

it is first necessary to know that this is a CHANNEL dam, and that Lake Austin for the first several miles above the dam does not average more than one third of a mile in width. Also, Lake Austin drains 35,000 square miles of watershed and naturally accumulates a large amount of silt.

For the benefit of those who fear the same condition would prevail in the proposed reservoir on the Colorado in Coke County it should be stated that this reservoir only a short distance above the dam will be nearly four miles wide, and maintains a high average width for several miles up stream. Also it drains only about 5000 square miles of watershed.

As the proposed Coke County lake would be 10 times as large as Lake Austin, and drains only 1-7th as much territory, it can be seen that it would silt up only 1-70th as fast. In fact, the government engineers state at a very conservative estimate the dam in 135 years would lose but one half of its capacity. Even this condition, could be remedied by the use of properly constructed sluice gates.

In the construction of the Elephant Butte dam, the engineers figured that siltage would seriously impair the usefulness of that project in 85 years. A careful check has been kept on siltage conditions there, and the engineers now revise their estimates and state that siltage will not affect that reservoir for 285 years.

A further element in favor of the Coke County reservoir is that a large part of its water

shed lies in the hills and mountains and ranch country, while the greater part of the watershed adjacent to the Austin dam

is in the intensively cultivated section of Central Texas.
