Tennyson, A Picturesque Little Town, And A Progressive People

"Sunset and evening star,
And one clear call to me,
Let there be no moaning at the bar,
When I put out to sea."

Thus wrote Lord Alfred Tennyson, the English poet, and author of some of the most wholesome and romantically beautiful sentiment that ever flowed from the pen of man. He wrote of the beautiful and romantic things of the universe, and his poetry touches the deepest springs of the human heart, and the soul is made to respond with its deepest and noblest emotions to the lines of such of

And when one goes to Tennyson, Coke county, Texas, the same emotions are quickened as the reading of Lord Tennyson's poetry awakens

This picturesque and beautiful little village to the south of Bronte, geographically near where three counties, Tom Green, Runnels and Coke, touch each other, is beautiful as a landscape, and beggars human description. The writer has been in towns, cities and villages of two republics. And nowhere not even in the towns and villages that nestle in the mighty Rockies, has he ever seen a village, the natural scenery and surroundings of which are more beautiful and more inspiring.

We are informed that Tennyson took its name from Lord Tennyson. Author of the town's name is not quite established in the mind of the writer. He learned that its name was given it either by Mr. Sam Sayner, or Mr. John Sayner. Because of its picturesqueness, it seemed so close akin to the beautiful poetic sentiment of Lord Tennyson that it was given the name it bears after him.

Approaching Tennyson from any direction except the West, one comes into view of the town from some distance before the town is reached. Just behind the village on the West is Mt. Marguerite, towering so high above the village and the other mountain peaks, that one who has seen Pike's Peak, is reminded of that world-renowned mountain peak. Towering away six hundred feet above the village, it seems to stand as a mighty guardian over the peace-

ful populace of the village that nestles hard by.

Tennyson has been a town with post office facilities since August 20, 1906. It was first located about a mile southwest of the present location and was known as Juniper. In 1909 the post office was moved to its present location. The community has had school facilities since 1904. The school was first called County Line. In 1912 the name of the school was changed to Tennyson and school district No. 18 was created. A beautiful and modern brick school building was erected.

If there were not another indication of the progressiveness and culture of the people of the Tennyson community their school facilities alone would be sufficient. The building is splendid in its architecture, and in its construction and gives the community as good school facilities as will be found anywhere in a community no larger than Tennyson. The building stands at the very foot of Mt. Marguerite and is built of red brick. It has three rooms with cloak rooms and hall, and gives ample room for all their school needs. And the building stands as a monument to the progressiveness of the ideals of the men in the community who have to assume responsibility of leadership. They have a fine seven months school.

The town has one church building, owned by all the religious denominations of the community—the Methodists, the Christians and the Baptists.

Industrially and commercially the town has four stores, one garage and blacksmith shop and cotton gin.

J. L. Howell is post master, and sees to it day after day that the people of the community receive their mail and sends out their mail to the world at large. Mr. Howell is also engaged in the grocery business and auto accessories and lubricating oil and gasoline. Mr. Howell formerly resided in Fort Worth and is a retired railroad man. He came to Tennyson a few years ago and has built up a good trade in his line of business. He is progressive and believes in being a "booster" for his home com-

munity. Therefore, he has an ad in this issue of the Enterprise inviting one and all to give him their business in his line.

J. A. Ellison is also a merchant. He hails from "Old Kentucky," and is proud of that fact. But he has been in Coke county for eighteen years—he is also proud of that fact. He was formerly engaged in the ranch business. But now he sells drugs, jewelry, dry goods and hardware. He is a pleasing gentleman, in every sense of the word. He also thinks a man should do all he can for the community in which he lives. Hence he has an ad in this issue of the Enterprise and asks that those who read this paper, far as possible, give him their business.

M. J. Dunn is another of Tennyson's merchants. Mr. Dunn has been in Coke county for twenty five years—hence he is one of "the old timers" which means, of course, that he is as full of hospitality as a Kentucky colonel could possibly be full of "kernel." He is the soul of courtesy and is just putting his store building in proper condition to carry a full line of fresh clean groceries and also a full line of garden seeds. Mr. Dunn is also establishing hotel facilities at Tennyson and is therefore doing a fine thing for the town. Hence from this time forth the traveling public as well as the local people can have hotel accommodations in the town. This should mean much to the town. Mr. Dunn also handles country produce. He has an ad in this issue.

S. J. Townsend is another of the business men of the town. Mr. Townsend came from "way down in ole alabama," and therefore he knows the South and southern people and southern people's ways, which means, of course, that he knows West Texas ways. He came to Tennyson fifteen years ago and aided in building the Orient railroad he being an old, experienced railroad builder. But, Mr. Townsend is now selling dry goods and groceries, and is buying the people's produce. He has just recently entered the mercantile business. Mr. Townsend might

Their Father Dies

Alonzo and Walter Kiker returned Friday from Erath county, where they had been for some days at the bedside of their father who had been ill for some time.

Their father died Monday, the 14th and was buried in the old family burying ground at Green Creek in Erath county Tuesday.

Deceased was one of the old pioneers, not only of that portion of Texas where he lived, but of all this part of the West. He was born in Georgia, and came to Texas 51 years ago. He spent one year in McClellan county, and then moved to Erath county and settled on the place

where he died.

Brother Kiker was married to Miss Schranah Howell about 54 years ago. To them thirteen children were born, ten of whom survive and all were present when the body of their aged father was put away for its last sleep.

Deceased was a member of the Masonic Lodge, holding membership at Dublin, and his brother Masons buried him with Masonic honors, following religious services which were held by his pastor. Deceased has been a Christian since early childhood and held membership in the Southern Methodist church. He was always faithful and for

many years he was steward and at the time of his death he was trustee of the church he had so long held membership in.

Deceased was an Ex-Confederate veteran, having followed the fortunes of Lee and Jackson until the surrender and their struggle became known as "the lost cause." No braver soldier ever "shouldered a musket" than was J. M. Kiker. And the evidences of that fact he carried in his body from the war of the sixties until he fell a sleep. He was seriously wounded, being shot through and was left for dead. But a soldier came along and saw him struggling for life and gave him succor and

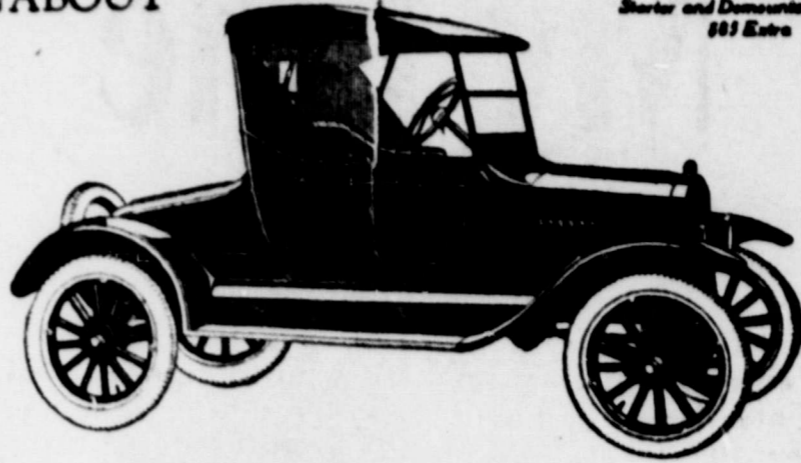

The weight of the foot is properly distributed when a balance is preserved between the points of the triangle made by the foot. The heel is one of the points and the others are at the base of the first and fifth toes. When the toes are turned out, the foot has a tendency to bend inward, so that the weight of the body is on the inside of the foot. The pressure causes the arches to sink in and become painful. Ballet dancers, who turn the toes out, exert a strong pull on the outer muscles of the leg, so as to arch the foot and offset the tendency to sinking in. When the toes are pointed straight ahead, the arch is more readily held in place and it is not necessary to exert the pull on the leg muscles.

BIG LOTTERY CRAZE IN 1777

Prices Given by All Sorts of English Business Houses to Gain Trade.

The present revival of lotteries, large and small, reminds one of their ubiquity in the Eighteenth century in England, says the Manchester Guardian. Not only were there the state lotteries with "potentiality of riches beyond the dreams of avarice," but private ventures as an inducement to purchasers.

The "Annual Register" for 1777 speaks of lottery magazine proprietors, lottery tailors, lottery stay-makers, lottery gloves, lottery hat-makers, lottery tea merchants, lottery snuff and tobacco merchants, lottery handkerchiefs, lottery bakers, lottery barbers (where a man for being shaved and paying three-pence may stand a chance of getting \$50), lottery shoeblacks, lottery eating houses (one in Wych street, Temple Bar, where if you call for six penny-worth of roast or boiled beef you receive a note of hand with a number which, if it turns out fortunate, may entitle the eater of the beef to six guineas); lottery oyster stalls (by which the fortunate may get five guineas for three penny-worth of oysters), and, to complete this curious catalogue, an old woman who keeps a sausage stall in one of the little alleys leading to Smith field, wrote up in chalk "Lottery sausages, or five shillings to be gained for a farthing relish."

Tennyson, A Picturesque Little Town, And A Progressive People

"Sunset and evening star,
And one clear call to me,
Let there be no moaning at the bar,
When I put out to sea."

Thus wrote Lord Alfred Tennyson, the English poet, and author of some of the most wholesome and romantically beautiful sentiment that ever flowed from the pen of man. He wrote of the beautiful and romantic things of the universe, and his poetry touches the deepest springs of the human heart, and the soul is made to respond with its deepest and holiest emotions as the lines of much of his poetry are read.

And when one goes to Tennyson, Coke county, Texas, the same emotions are quickened as the reading of Lord Tennyson's poetry awakens

This picturesque and beautiful little village to the south of Bronte, geographically near where three counties, Tom Green, Runnels and Coke, touch each other, is beautiful as a landscape, and beggars human description. The writer has been in towns, cities and villages of two republics. And nowhere not even in the towns and villages that nestle in the mighty Rockies, has he ever seen a village, the natural scenery and surroundings of which are more beautiful and more inspiring.

We are informed that Tennyson took its name from Lord Tennyson. Author of the town's name is not quite established in the mind of the writer. He learned that its name was given it either by Mr. Sam Sayner, or Mr. John Sayner. Because of its picturesqueness, it seemed so close akin to the beautiful poetic sentiment of Lord Tennyson that it was given the name it bears after him.

Approaching Tennyson from any direction except the West, one comes into view of the town from some distance before the town is reached. Just behind the village on the West is Mt. Marguerite, towering so high above the village and the other mountain peaks, that one who has seen Pike's Peak, is reminded of that world-renowned mountain peak. Towering away six hundred feet above the village seems to stand as a giant over the peaceful

ful populace of the village that nestles hard by.

Tennyson has been a town with post office facilities since August 20, 1906. It was first located about a mile southwest of the present location and was known as Juniper. In 1909 the post office was moved to its present location. The community has had school facilities since 1904. The school was first called County Line. In 1912 the name of the school was changed to Tennyson and school district No. 18 was created. Bonds were voted and the present beautiful and modern brick school building was erected.

If there were not another indication of the progressiveness and culture of the people of the Tennyson community their school facilities alone would be sufficient. The building is splendid in its architecture, and in its construction and gives the community as good school facilities as will be found anywhere in a community no larger than Tennyson. The building stands at the very foot of Mt. Marguerite and is built of red brick. It has three rooms with cloak rooms and hall, and gives ample room for all their school needs. And the building stands as a monument to the progressiveness of the ideals of the men in the community who have to assume responsibility of leadership. They have a fine seven month school.

The town has one church building, owned by all the religious denominations of the community—the Methodists, the Christians and the Baptists.

Industrially and commercially the town has four stores, one garage and blacksmith shop and cotton gin.

J. L. Howell is post master, and sees to it day after day that the people of the community receive their mail and sends out their mail to the world at large. Mr. Howell is also engaged in the grocery business and auto accessories and lubricating oil and gasoline. Mr. Howell formerly resided in Fort Worth and is a retired railroad man. He came to Tennyson a few years ago and has built up a good trade in his line of business. He is progressive and believes in being a "booster" for his home com-

munity. Therefore, he has an ad in this issue of the Enterprise inviting one and all to give him their business in his line.

J. A. Ellison is also a merchant. He hails from "Old Kentucky," and is proud of that fact. But he has been in Coke county for eighteen years—he is also proud of that fact. He was formerly engaged in the ranch business. But now he sells drugs, jewelry, dry goods and hardware. He is a pleasing gentleman, is always ready to accommodate any one, even, a stranger and enjoys life to its fullest. He also thinks a man should do all he can for the community in which he lives. Hence he has an ad in this issue of the Enterprise and asks that those who read this paper, far as possible, give him their business.

M. J. Dunn is another of Tennyson's merchants. Mr. Dunn has been in Coke county for twenty five years—hence he is one of "the old timers" which means, of course, that he is as full of hospitality as a Kentucky colonel could possibly be full of "kernel." He is the soul of courtesy and is just putting his store building in proper condition to carry a full line of fresh clean groceries and also a full line of garden seeds. Mr. Dunn is also establishing hotel facilities at Tennyson and is therefore doing a fine thing for the town. Hence from this time forth the traveling public as well as the local people can have hotel accommodations in the town. This should mean much to the town. Mr. Dunn also handles country produce. He has an ad in this issue.

S. J. Townsend is another of the business men of the town. Mr. Townsend came from "way down in ole alabama," and therefore he knows the South and southern people and southern people's ways, which means, of course, that he knows West Texas ways. He came to Tennyson fifteen years ago and aided in building the Orient railroad he being an old, experienced railroad builder. But, Mr. Townsend is now selling dry goods and groceries, and is buying the people's produce. He has just recently entered the mercantile business. Mr. Townsend might

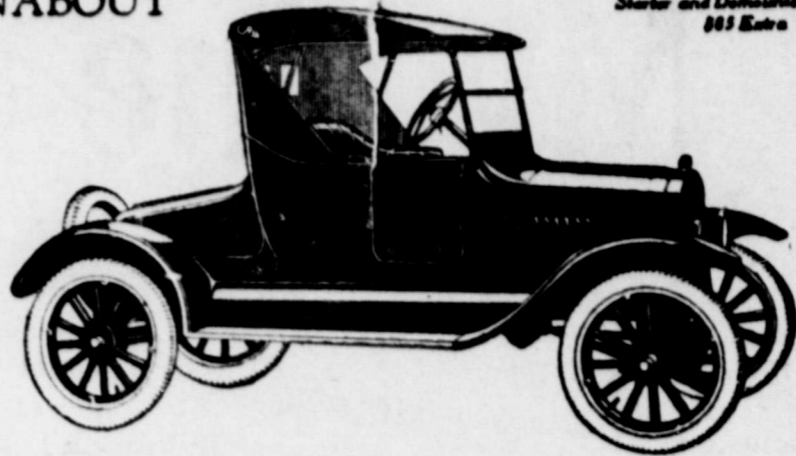

The weight of the foot is properly distributed when a balance is preserved between the points of the triangle made by the foot. The heel is one of the points and the others are at the base of the first and fifth toes. When the toes are turned out, the foot has a tendency to bend inward, so that the weight of the body is on the inside of the foot. The pressure causes the arches to sink in and become painful. Ballet dancers, who turn the toes out, exert a strong pull on the outer muscles of the leg, so as to arch the foot and offset the tendency to sinking in. When the toes are turned straight ahead, the arch is readily held in place. It is necessary to exert leg muscles.

Creek in Erath county Tuesday.

Deceased was one of the old
pioneers, not only of that portion
of Texas where he lived, but of
all this part of the West. He
was born in Georgia, and came
to Texas 51 years ago. He
spent one year in McClellan
county, and then moved to Erath
county and settled on the place

where he died.

Brother Kiker was married to
Miss Schranah Howell about 54
years ago. To them thirteen
children were born, ten of whom
survive and all were present
when the body of their aged
father was put away for its last
sleep.

Deceased was a member of the
Masonic Lodge, holding mem-
bership at Dublin, and his broth-
er Masons buried him with Ma-
sonic honors, following religious
services which were held by his
pastor. Deceased has been a
Christian since early childhood
and held membership in the
Southern Methodist church. He
was always faithful and for

many years he was steward and
at the the time of his death he
was trustee of the church he
had so long held membership in.

Deceased was an Ex-Confed-
erate veteran, having followed
the fortunes of Lee and Jackson
until the surrender and their
struggle became known as "the
lost cause" No braver soldier
ever "shouldered a musket"
than was J. M. Kiker. And
the evidences of that fact he car-
ried in his body from the war of
the sixties until he fell a sleep.
He was seriously wounded, be-
ing shot through and was left
for dead. But a soldier came
along and saw him struggling
for life and gave him succor and

he survived.

A striking thing, which shows

BIG LOTTERY CRAZE IN 1777
 Prices Given by All Sorts of English
 Business Houses to Gain
 Trade.

The present revival of lotteries, large and small, reminds one of their ubiquity in the Eighteenth century in England, says the Manchester Guardian. Not only were there state lotteries with "potentiality or riches beyond the dreams of avarice," but private ventures as an inducement to purchasers.

The "Annual Register" for 1777 speaks of lottery magazine proprietors, lottery tailors, lottery stay-makers, lottery gloves, lottery hat-makers, lottery tea merchants, lottery snuff and tobacco merchants, lottery handkerchiefs, lottery bakers, lottery barbers (where a man for being shaved and paying three-pence may stand a chance of getting \$50), lottery shoeblacks, lottery eating houses (one in Wyck street, Temple Bar, where if you call for six penny-worth of roast or boiled beef you receive a note of hand with a number which, if it turns out fortunate, may entitle the eater of the beef to six guineas), lottery oyster stalls (by which the fortunate may get five guineas for three penny-worth of oysters), and, to complete this curious catalogue, an old woman who keeps a sausage stall in one of the little alleys leading to Smith field, wrote up in chalk "Lottery sausages, or five shillings to be gained for a farthing relish."
