And the fact that the event is passed only enhances the danger of the land-ago of the times. If the waste of wealth to the profit of no one, and rather to the hurt of all the participants had been expended in humanitarian ways the world would be enriched and the memory of all taking a part would be happier.)

The editor has received a private letter from a much appreciated friend and reader of The Enterprise, in another town, who is one of the most widely read men we know intimately, and who keeps informed as to current events and the trend of the times as but few men do. As the letter is private we refrain from giving his name, and hence there is no embarrassment to him, in publishing his letter. And we print it first because of the wholesome grasp he has on the affairs of today and second to comment on the last paragraph of his letter:

Mr. Editor:

I have just read your thoughtful editorial column, but if I were an editor, at the present time I would have two slogans that I would pound into the readers every week until they reformed their ways. I would begin the first editorial column with this slogan: "Economy Is the Road to Success." I would begin the second column with this slogan: "Extravagance is the road to the poorhouse, to the asylum and to the penitentiary." Yes, extravagance is the besetting sin of this age; it causes all robberies and thefts and most all murders. I will state however, for your consolation, that the city of Austin will bear all the expenses of Ma's ball, and no one ought to attend unless he is able to bear his own expense. I am, your friend,

His dissertation in the first part of the letter shows that the writer divines the trend of the times—economy and extravagance are the two outstanding things that need to be taught the masses just at this time. There is no question out that this is the best period in the history of this country for the young man who has "to build from the ground" his fortunes and place in the world. But he who does not practice economy now will suffer later. Likewise is the writer correct when he says that extravagance is the curse of this age. It is enough to make thoughtful men weep, the extravagance of the younger generation. And nowhere is there greater blame than in our present educational ideals. Our schools are hot beds of extravagance in their ideals and methods; the greatest lesson most of our youth learn is to be "spenders," and they are taught but little the importance of their getting their money by scrupulously honest methods.

And now to the last paragraph in the above letter, with reference to the far-famed—yes, the world-famed (indeed that reaches to the nethermost parts of this great universe) inaugural ball. In fact, we wonder if inhabitants from Mars will not descend to be at the august, imposing, world-beatin' inaugural "blow-out" when "Ma," and the eminent

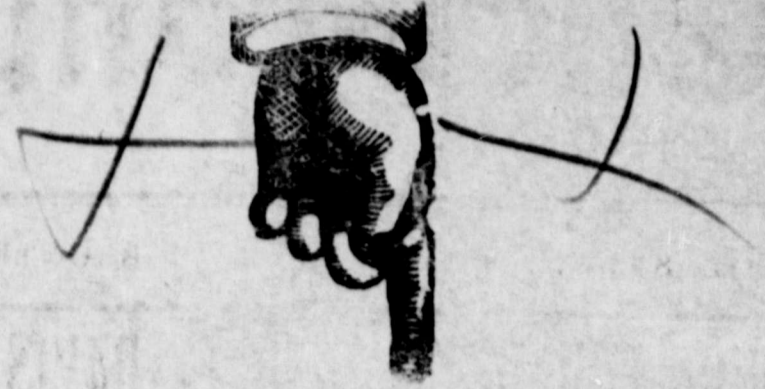

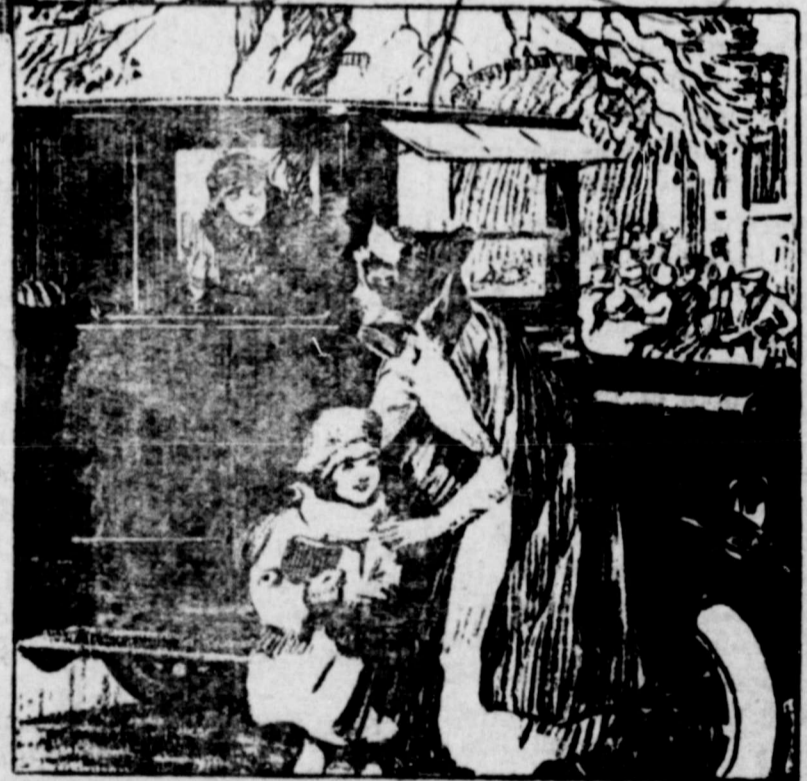

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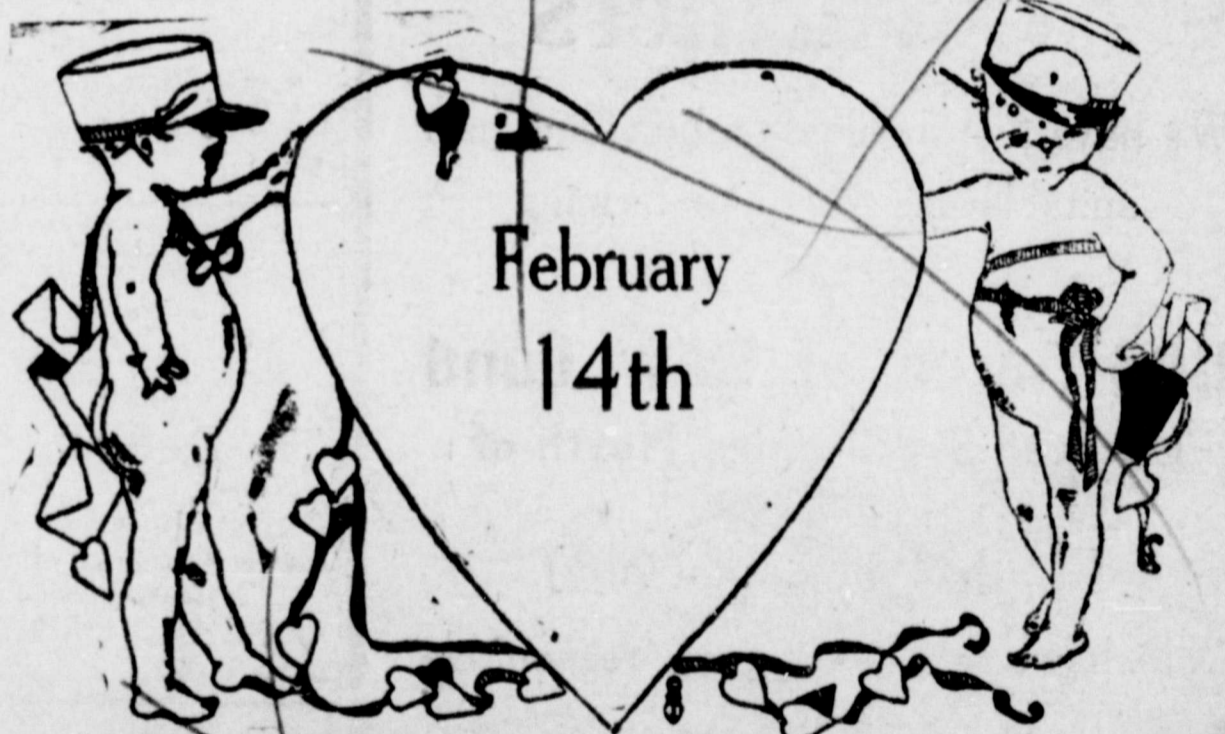
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
