Hear Dr. Porter in Service for Men and Boys at Methodist Church Sunday Afternoon

Large Extra Water Reservoir to be Built by City

"Day by day in every way," Bronte is growing and growing. One of the most certain evidences that the town is growing is seen in its improvements. Not that the improvements have been on such startling scale, but whatever improvements are made are substantial and modern, and with a view to the future. This was true in the vision of the people in erecting the present school building. This is true in the modern light and power plant that has been installed by Messrs. Holder and Brown. This is true in the poultry plant installed by the Poultry Raisers' Association. And this is also true with reference to all the work of the city fathers regarding the municipal affairs of the town.

One of the first steps towards progress was the stock law that did away with that most torturous of all pests, the town cow. Then, came the grading up of the streets. Two years ago the mayor and city council took steps to get a water supply for the town. Bonds were voted and a water system equaled by but few towns the size of Bronte was installed. Acreage was bought East of town, just beyond Kick spoo creek, and a reservoir that was estimated to supply the town for six months without a drop of rain when it was once full, was built. Water mains were laid on all the leading streets and water was supplied the town.

The estimate of the city council at that time has proven to be correct. The present city lake, which has by common consent been known from the first as Lake Knierim in honor of Robert Knierim who at that time was mayor of the town, has met every expectation. There has not been enough rainfall to run on the ground since early last fall. But the supply of water

has not failed and will last until about May 1st.

Yet, the present Mayor, O. W. Chapman and the members of the city council believe in the doctrine of "preparing for war in the time of peace." Therefore, they have negotiated a deal with J. B. McCutchen by which the city has become owner of a forty acre tract two miles Southeast of town. This tract is a natural reservoir. With practically no expense, speaking comparatively, the site can be converted into a reservoir, which when full of water will supply the town for two years without any rainfall.

Mayor Chapman and associates have been very businesslike in their procedure. They had C. O. Holder who is an expert civil engineer, to make a survey and determine as to the adaptability of the site for a reservoir. It was found to be all that the city council could want as a site for an extra city lake.

By painstaking care the city council has funds sufficient to pay for the site and to erect the dam without a cent of additional expense to the municipality. Bids are being advertised for and soon as the contract can be let the reservoir will be constructed. Therefore when finished and full of water it will prove to be one of the most substantial assets the town has. It is near enough to lake Knierim that the water can be lifted with little expense into the present lake and then to the stand pipe as at present.

Congratulations to Mayor Chapman and the present city council. Since the present lake has taken its name after the gentleman who was mayor at the time of its construction The Enterprise suggests that the new lake be christened "Lake Chapman" in honor of the present mayor.

ORIENT MAKES AD CONTRACT

Dig for Hidden Gold in City of Jerusalem

A search for gold that rivals some of the expeditions that have sought the buried treasures of Captain Kidd, is in progress at Jerusalem under the direction of the Palestine government.

Nearly \$500,000 in gold is alleged to have been buried in Palestine by members of the Turco-German headquarters staff before they fled from Jerusalem before the advance of General Allenby's forces, the Toledo Blade announces.

German officers reported the burial of the treasure, according to reports, and the German government knew that it would be seized as a prize of war, if found, so a private German group was formed in Berlin, including some of the men who helped to bury the gold, to set out and rediscover the treasure and remove it from Palestine.

The German group purchased a site in Jemin, near the monument which has been erected to the fallen German soldiers, and was about to start work when British authorities learned of the venture from a German informant.

The Palestine authorities are understood to have detained the searchers.

The government has now announced that it has ordered excavations in the Jemin area, in search of the treasure; but thus far none of the gold has been discovered.

Colorado Bug Invades

German Potato Fields

An invasion of the potato fields of Germany is threatened by the Colorado potato beetle. This destructive insect pest has found a foothold at various times and places in eastern Europe but has hitherto been held in check or driven out by energetic measures.

Fox Rode Deer

A remarkable story of the rescue of a young deer has come to the fish and game department at Augusta, Maine. As it is reported, says the Portland Press-Herald, three men who were fishing at a lake in the vicinity of Mattawamkeag heard something cry out near at hand. At first they thought it might be a child, but presently something dashed through the bushes out to the shore with a fox on its back, and they saw that it was a small deer. The fishermen drove the fox off and rescued the deer. The back of its neck was bitten, and so were its hind legs.

The little animal is now recovering from its fright and injury and is as playful as can be. The men who rescued it have received a temporary permit to keep it until the department can make arrangements to put it in one of the parks.

European beauty experts are engaged in an animated discussion as to where the beauty spot, which is now being used so generally by women given to heavy make-ups, was invented. The Dutch claim the honor of having originated the use of bits of various colored plasters on the face nearly five centuries ago, when plasters were put on the temples to cure headaches.

Women of fashion saw the fine contrast offered to a fair skin by dark patches and inaugurated the use of black court-plaster cut in the shapes of stars, half moons, full moons and crescents.

Carthaginian Relics

Count Byron Khun de Prorok, who is a young French archeologist, is soon to bring to Washington two clay urns containing the ashes of young children, sacrificed by the Phoenicians to their sun-god Moloch. The Count de Prorok has been working in Africa and has discovered many priceless relics in Carthage, the city destroyed by the Roman legions in 146 B. C. The urns probably will be placed in the Smithsonian institution at the national capital.

Many Precious Stones Found in California

Few Californians realize that within the boundary of the state are precious and semi-precious stones as fine as any found elsewhere in the world. C. C. Kinrade, who has searched for precious minerals the world over, has in his collection jade from Siskiyou county as beautiful in color as the jade used in the loveliest of oriental objects of art. He has chrysoptase, clear and brilliantly blue-green, which is found in a single outcropping near Porterville, and rose tourmaline, said to be of the finest variety native to America, which comes from the region near San Diego. Mr. Kinrade, now in his seventy-eighth year, and long a resident of San Francisco, recently discovered a strange bit of stone on one of the Marin beaches, which had been washed up from the bed of Golden Gate. He was unable to determine its origin and sent it on to the geological department of the Smithsonian institution. The stone, when polished, shows a beautifully variegated yellow, red and green surface, and the Smithsonian institution has named it "Kinradeite" in honor of the finder.—San Francisco Argonaut.

Comfort in Travel in "Pullmans" of the Air

Not more than a dozen years ago an airplane was a curiosity, and people would go miles to see one.

It is a far cry from the crude models of those days to the Rolls-Royce W-8 air expresses which are now operating on the imperial airways winter service between London and Paris, London Tit-Bits remarks.

Behind the pilot is a long, low saloon, which has been fitted to be in every way a counterpart of the most luxurious Pullman car on the railways. Ample room is provided for the accommodation of 14 passengers, and for each there is a comfortable, cushioned armchair.

 Nine letters, signed and subscribed by the ill-fated Mary queen of Scots, are shortly to be offered to the British nation, and, in order to obtain them, together with 91 other documents connected with the queen, a fund of \$11,000 is being raised by popular subscription.

The documents come from the archives of the family of Mure of Rowallan. They have never been offered for sale before, few of them have been published, and all throw fresh light on one of the most keenly debated episodes in British history.

Czechs Learn Dressmaking
 Continuation schools for dressmakers' apprentices are maintained by the ministry of education of Czechoslovakia, says a United States consular report. Students may choose one of three courses, each of which requires eight hours a week. All of these courses include drawing and other technical subjects related to the dressmaking trade. Other subjects taught in these courses are hygiene, arithmetic, bookkeeping and civics.

Horticultural Triumphs
 Some remarkable new flowers were introduced at the autumn show of the Royal Horticultural society in London. One gladiolus produced in Scotland contained a single spike with seventeen orange scarlet blossoms and about a dozen buds ready to open. Another novelty was a mammoth salmon-pink chrysanthemum. Perhaps the most valuable new offering was a heliotrope and rose carnation which can be made to flower outdoors for six months, or until a severe frost. This flower has recovered the famous musk perfume of early carnations which has been largely lost with the intensive development of the flowers. The gladiolus exhibit was especially remarkable. Some gladioli were brought from Germany by airplane especially for the exhibit.
