**Camp Site Information.**

Camp Site Committee has arranged for four large sites and a number of smaller ones. Each camp site is being laid off in a systematic manner with streets traversing grounds north and south and east and west. Camp lots are numbered and located that each camping party has access to street without interfering with other campers. When a camp lot number has been issued party holding same will be protected and can rest assured no one else will camp on said lot.

Water, light, sanitary facilities, fuel for cooking purposes and community kitchens sufficient to meet requirements of each camp will be provided. Natural gas will be furnished where possible otherwise wood for cooking purposes will be furnished. Cook stove will be furnished with kitchen. No cooking utensils will be furnished.

Rates: Camp lots can be rented at 50 cents per car, with free access to community kitchen tents, all rentals must be paid in advance for full time of convention. Army sleeping tents will be \$3.00 to \$5.00 per day, according to size. These tents will accommodate from six to ten people. Army cots will rent for 25 cents per day. Parties expecting to camp while here should reserve tents and cots as early as possible.

Police—Camps to be patrolled twenty-four hours per day by National Guard.

Chapman Park Camp: Situated one mile south of business district on Bankhead Highway.

Oak Park Camp: Situated one mile from Convention Hall north of F. F. F. highway. High, cool and well drained, will not get muddy in case of rain. Contains 480 camp lots 40x40 feet.

Frank Richards Park Camp: Situated one half mile southeast of business district, level ground, convenient to rodeo, carnival and all attractions of convention. Contains 500 camp lots 40x40 feet.

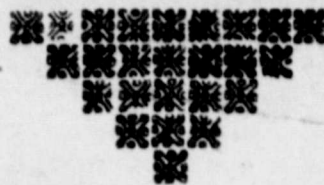
Mrs. Roy Kirkland and children of Bronte visited Mr. and Mrs. G. P. Kirkland Saturday and Sunday.
