BROOKS BROWNING IS NAMED KAISER AND FRAZER DEALER

Willow Run, Mich., Dec. 6 - The appointment of the Browning's Super Station to handle sales of the new Kaiser and Frazer automobiles in Coke County was announced today by W. A. MacDonald, vice president in charge of sales of Kaiser-Frazer Corporation and Graham-Paige Motors Corporation.

The local company is headed by Brooks Browning. His firm will be a direct retail dealer of Kaiser-Frazer Corporation, producer of the Kaiser car, and a dealer in the Frazer automobile under the area distributor, Bob Fuller Motor Co. of Big Spring.

Mr. Browning announced that his temporary sales and service headquarters at Home Motor Co. will provide modern, scientific service facilities for both of the new automobiles. The company also will handle sales of parts and accessories for both cars.

Mr. Browning said that the new Frazer and Kaiser cars are now in production at the former bomber plant at Willow Run, Michigan, which has been converted to automobile manufacture. The first completely new automobiles since the beginning of the war, both cars feature advanced styling, extra wide seats, and powerful six-cylinder engines.

The Kaiser and Frazer were styled by Howard Darrin, noted automobile designer who has built custom cars for many Hollywood notables.

"I surely am proud of the Kaiser automobile now here," Mr. Browning said yesterday, "and I know everybody around will want to come see

this fine new automobile of tomorrow."

He went on to say that by next April, Kaiser and Frazer were expected to produce around 45,000 cars a month, and that these would be widely distributed as quickly as possible.

"As soon as building materials are available," Mr. Browning continued, "we'll have a modern equipped and up-to-date plant of our own, and in the meantime, we are grateful to Bob Knierim and R. W. Rees of the Home Motor Company for their kindness in permitting us the use of their facilities pending the construction of ours."

WHD OFFICERS' TRAINING SCHOOL WELL ATTENDED

Fifty-seven officers and guests under the gavel of Mrs. Taylor Emerson, attended the WHD Officers' Training School held last Monday, December 2, at the Baptist Tabernacle in Bronte, where they heard interesting discussions on all phases of WHD work in Coke County.

Mrs. Emerson, who was instrumental in having the WHD Council meet at Bronte half the time and at Robert Lee half time, called the meeting to order at 10:45, and Rev. C. R. Blake offered the invocation.

After Mrs. C. E. Arrott led the group in several songs, the editor of the Bronte Enterprise talked on the various factors involved in making good reports, and the members then went to their respective group meetings.

Highlights of the committee meetings were given when the guests re-assembled in the auditorium. Mrs. Charles Keeney, representing the president, vice-president, and parliamentary committee, suggested that the president call on committees for reports, take interest in the Club progress, have no part in the business discussions, and was responsible for naming the chairmen of the various committees.

Miss Gladys Waldrop, who spoke for the secretary-treasurer group, noted that the secretary was the historian, must know how to write minutes, should name those who made motions, record the vote, keep ballots, correct and sign minutes, and that the reporter should get her news from the secretary. She also related that the treasurer needed to make a financial report for each club, list profits and expenses, required proper books and equipment, and should possess copies of the Club committees, constitution, and records.

The 4-H sponsors group was represented by Mrs. C. E. Arrott, who gave duties and responsibilities of the sponsors, and emphasized the need of the mothers' support, as well as letting the 4-H girls do their own work and set their own goals. Both points were strongly emphasized.

Mrs. Bill Wrinkle described the duties of three Council members who made up the year-book committee, and said that its final form was the result of suggestions which came from all members through their representatives. Mrs. Wrinkle urged all members to keep careful personal records of their activities and projects during the year, and to talk WHD Club work among friends and neighbors.

COKE COUNTY OIL STRIKE FLOWS 10 BARRELS HOURLY, THURSDAY

Sun Oil Co.'s No. 1 Allen Jameson strengthened its bid for discovery oil production in northwestern Coke County when it flowed naturally 10 barrels of fluid, mostly oil, hourly for an hour and a half Thursday morning. It then began flowing largely drilling mud and at noon was making drilling mud cut 10 to 25 per cent by oil.

Flowing continued to clean out the open hole at 6,225 to 6,245 feet, the total depth, in the crinoidal of the Strawn section of the Pennsylvania. **Sale Unconfirmed**

Part of the royalty under the prospect, which is near the C SE SW 253-1A-H&TC, one mile southeast of Old Silver - was reported to have been sold on a basis of \$150 an acre. A 30-acre royalty interest on the same property about one mile south of the wildcat was said to have been sold at \$75 an acre. Neither of these reports was confirmed.

No. 1 Jameson was shut in dark Wednesday after swabbing to pits from mid-afternoon following installation of a choke on 2-inch tubing. Recovery was drilling water and mud

and some oil. When the test was opened through a quarter inch choke at 7 o'clock Thursday morning pressure on 7-inch cemented at 6,225 feet (the size of the pipe previously had been reported 5-inch) was 825 pounds. Pressure on the tubing set at 6,242 feet was 800 pounds.

Revised By Swabbing

The swab was run and at 7:30 No. 1 Jameson began flowing drilling water, mud and oil. At 8 o'clock it was flowing oil, cut with only a slight amount of mud and water, at a rate of 10 barrels hourly, casing pressure being 800 pounds. The test flowed consistently at approximately 10 barrels an hour until 9:30 o'clock, when it began making drilling mud cut with oil. Flowing pressures then were 100 pounds on the tubing and 800 pounds on the casing.

The wildcat at noon still was flowing regularly at approximately 10 barrels an hour. The fluid was drilling mud cut from 10 to 25 per cent with oil. Tubing pressure was 75 pounds and casing pressure 790 pounds. - San Angelo Standard-Times.

Such hearing will be continued from time to time, and from place to place, if necessary, until such determination has been made relative to said application as the said Board of Water Engineers may deem right, equitable and proper.
