LATEST OIL NEWS . . .

No. 1 Jack Lassiter - Still another producer has come in, located in the C NW NE 308-1A-H&TC, 2 1/2 miles northwest of Sanco, as well as 2 1/2 miles south and 3/4 of a mile west of No. 1 Arledge, which opened the Marble Falls lime pool. Is now awaiting storage after it headed oil and salt water from 6,495-6,528, total depth. Wednesday night, the well made 8 heads to pits through open 2-inch tubing with closed casing. Estimate on the final head was 85 per cent high gravity oil and 15 per cent salt water, no gas gauge, and probable production of a 300-barrel well. Gauges will be made tomorrow, it was indicated. A Schlumberger survey showed water coming from the bottom four feet, and it is likely a plastic 10-foot plug will be run later on, thus leaving 23 feet of pay.

No. 1 Wendland - Flowed 254.5 barrels of oil on a test last Monday through a 20-64 inch choke. The oil was trucked to the Bronte station of the Atlantic Pipeline Co., and by the latter part of the week, two 1,000 barrel storage tanks were ready for use. Production is from open hole at 6,235-50 feet, and it is located 4,950 from the south, 2,970 from the east line of Jose Antonio Gutierrez survey 22. It is the second Ellenburger strike in Coke, 7 1/2 miles southwest of Bronte and 5 1/2 miles west of Tennyson.

No. 2 Wendland - Location staked approximately 1/4-mile south of No. 1 Wendland.

No. 2 Reed - Arrow Drilling Co. has completed rigging at Seaboard and Southern Minerals newest well, located C NE NE 1-23-GC&SF, about 3/4 of a mile southwest of No. 1 Reed, the first Ellenburger producer in Coke. No. 1 Reed is 2 3/4 of a mile south-southeast of No. 1 Wendland.

No. 1 Rawlings - Located 1 mile west of Bronte, drilling at 4,500 in limestone and shale.

No. 3 Arledge - Flowed 23 barrels of distillate following 4000 gallons of acid through perforations at 6,582-95 feet.

No. 1 Cent. Nat. Bank - Some gas after swabbing.

No. 3 Walker - Using rig from No. 1 CN Bank, located 1/4-mile north of No. 1 Walker.

No. 8 H. H. Jameson - Swabbing out.

No. 10 H. H. Jameson - Cemented at 6,114 with 400 sacks.

No. 1 Bloodworth - Drilling 6,338.

No. 2 Walker - Drilling 6,100.

J. W. Raney Dies

Funeral services for James Washington Raney, 74, of Blackwell, were held from the Blackwell Methodist Church last Sunday afternoon following Mr. Raney's death in the Bronte Karen-Gayl Hospital Saturday morning at 3 o'clock after an illness of some two months.

Rev. Cecil M. Tune had charge of the services, and was assisted by Rev. Alvin B. Mauldin of the Bronte Methodist Church and Rev. C. R. Blake of the Bronte Baptist Church.

Mr. Raney was born March 16, 1874 in Coryell County, and moved to Nolan County in 1906, where he operated a produce house. He married Miss Fannie Hazelwood on December 3, 1893 in Coryell County, and the couple observed its golden wedding anniversary in 1943.

He was a charter member of the Blackwell Methodist Church, and also served as a steward. Mr. Raney also belonged to the Masonic Lodge and the Odd Fellows.

He is survived by the widow, two sons, J. O. of Bronte and Henry of Blackwell; three daughters, Mrs. W. A. Hazelwood of Sweetwater, Mrs. C. W. Odom, Jr., of Killeen, and Mrs. Alfred Taylor of Bronte; a brother, L. B. Raney of Indian Gap, and two sisters, Mrs. J. G. Raney of Blackwell, and Mrs. R. H. Simpson of Dallas, also five grandchildren.

Pallbearers included Austin Jordan, Roy Sanderson, Cecil Smith, Earl Cook, L. H. Montgomery, and Walter Sanders.

Burial was in the Blackwell cemetery following the services, and Wells Funeral Home of Sweetwater served as directors.

Whitt Secures Road Fund

Mayor H. O. Whitt received word this week that the State Highway Commission had authorized an appropriation of \$6,959 to widen the base and surface State Highway 70 which goes through Bronte.

Following his election in April, 1947, over a year ago, Whitt began work the following day to secure the widening of the highway through Bronte, and has worked untiringly and unceasingly ever since to achieve this fine improvement for Bronte.

At first it looked as if Bronte would bear some of the cost, but Whitt kept pushing away on the job, visiting highway engineers, writing highway officials, and doing all he could, practically single-handed, to push the project through to completion.

Work should start next week on resurfacing a lot of the Coke County roads on the east side of the county, which is on the main line between San Angelo and Abilene. In fact, the highway through Bronte was recently designated as a Federal Highway 277, although the actual change in numbers has not been carried out as yet.

This designation probably also plays a part in the securing of the funds, since the rising oil development will make the roads through Bronte even more highly traveled than at present.

Even now, oil from the Wendland well is coming to Bronte by truck, and then sent out by the Atlantic Oil Co. pipeline station located south of town.

The fact that Bronte is also on the Santa Fe is a distinct help, thus making Bronte the railway shipping center of Coke County.

And now comes the paving from curb to curb of Highway 70 through Bronte, which should begin around the end of June.

Another indication of Bronte marching on, thanks to the untiring work of Mayor H. O. Whitt.

Lions Club Inauguration Next Week

The new officials for the Bronte Lions Club will be sworn into office at next Wednesday's meeting, it was decided last Wednesday during the regular meeting. Edward Cumbie will be the next president of the club, it was revealed.

T. H. Rogge suggested improvements on the roads leading to the oil fields southwest of Bronte, and he was named by the president, Vernon C. Lammers, as chairman of a committee to contact Ben Brooks of Tennyson and confer about possible improvements. Other committee members include Otis Smith, H. O. Whitt, and Clarence Arrott.

Otis Smith said his men had been helping with the grading of the Bronte streets after the rains, but there had been so much complaining about the work he might be forced to quit. It was reported that people complained about the way the streets were graded.

Norman Kiker complained about odors coming from the laundry near where he plans to build his house, and Vernon Lammers noted that any town always had smells, but that he knew of nothing done to control them. Smith remarked that the question of odors and smells had come to public attention a number of times before, and it was suggested Dr. John R. Harris might investigate the source of such smells.

Mention was made of the Enterprise political rally to be held next Friday night in front of the Enterprise office at 8 o'clock, with candidates not being compelled to buy anything - just appear and speak to the crowd. It was pointed out that merchants might prefer to stay open later than usual to handle a crowd estimated at around 1,000 people.

GASSIOT TO SILVER

H. R. Gassiot, Principal and Athletic Coach at Bronte, has been elected as Principal of the Silver Peak Consolidated Common School District in northwestern Coke County. The school recently voted a \$1.50 tax rate, and a \$31,000 bond issue for making a completely modern building out of their present structure, a teacherage, and lunch room. Plans are being drawn now for a large gymnasium which the community expects to erect in the fall.

The Coke County Commissioners convened in their final session as a Board of Equalization Tuesday at the Court House in Robert Lee, for the purpose of reviewing renditions. Notices are being mailed by Clerk Willis Smith to property owners whose property tax has been adjusted.

The Coke County Board of Education met in regular session Monday, May 31, 1948. Members present were S. E. Adams, Chairman, Noah Pruitt, W. F. Fikes, L. Y. Harrell, and Bob L. Davis, Secretary.

Raymond Schooler was appointed to the County Board from Precinct 3 after P. W. Millican, who was elected to the Board refused to serve. Mr. Will Millican, who has served that precinct for the past 18 years declined to serve further. Prospects of re-districting all the school districts in Coke County is under discussion by the Board. The schools in Coke County were classified as follows for the 1948-49 term:

Bronte Independent - 12 grade High School; Robert Lee Independent - 12 grade High School, Tennyson CSD No. 18 - 8 grade Elementary; Wildcat No. 21 - no grade; Walnut No. 25 - no grade; Green Mountain No. 27 - 6 grade Elementary; Silver Peak No. 29 - 8 grade Elementary; Mays No. 29 - no grade.

Political Rally Next Friday Night

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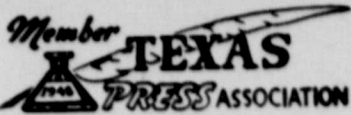

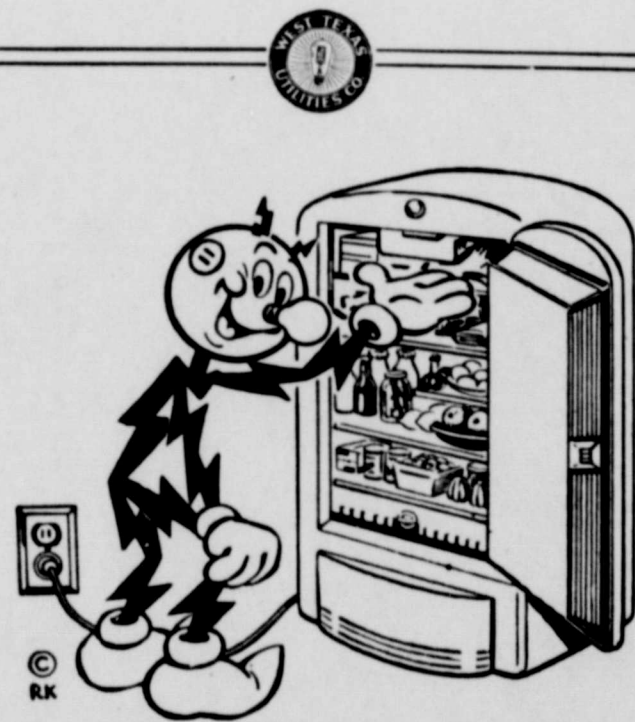
