Horns In Regional Tourney



1974 Longhorns—Gone to Regional Tournament

The Bronte Longhorns took a 55-47 win over Irion County (Mertzton) Tuesday night to win bi-district and earn a place in the regional tournament this weekend at South Plains Junior College in Levelland.

The Horns will play Spade at 7 p.m. Friday. The Spade team is champion of District 5-B and defending regional champs. They

defeated Bletsoe Tuesday night to gain entry into the regional tournament.

Other pairings in first games in the tournament (besides Bronte and Spade) are Hedley and Anthony, Channing and Meadow, and Grandfalls and Loraine. If the local lads win their Friday night game they will play the winner of the Grandfalls-Loraine game at 10:45 a.m. Saturday.

Twelve players, Coaches James M. Raughton and Bob Shields and Manager Ricky Frazee left here Thursday at 8 a.m. They are staying at the Levelland Motel, phone 806-894-7335. The Longhorns have a practice session scheduled from 3:15 to 4 p.m. Thursday.

Boys making the trip are Bob Waldrop and Andy Eubanks, seniors; Alan Barbee, Kit Carlton, Jim Dan Raughton, Ricky Frazee, Wayne Alexander, Marvin Ensor and Bobby Bailey, juniors; Nelson Coulter and Mark Lee, sophomores; Wayne Coalson and Johnny Hibbs, freshmen.

Donations for New Fire Truck Good

Bronte businessmen and other interested citizens have generously backed a request made in last week's Enterprise for donations to purchase another fire truck. The additional vehicle would have a four wheel drive and be adapted especially for use in fighting grass fires in rural areas.

First National Bank in Bronte headed up the list with a donation of \$1,000. Gifts from other citizens ran the total contributions to \$1289.

The truck itself will cost approximately \$1000, but additional money is needed to equip it for rural fire fighting. Firemen said they would particularly like to receive some donations from farmers and ranchers, who will be the main group to benefit from the new equipment.

Filing Deadline Nears In Three Local Elections

Some activity was underway this week with petitions being circulated for various citizens to run for offices on the city council, school board and hospital district board.

A petition bearing nine signatures requesting that Mrs. Mar-

garet Brunson's name be placed on the ballot for mayor was submitted to City Secretary Mrs. Helen Kirkland.

In the school trustee election, Grady Louis Coulter and Bill Jackson have filed for a place on the ballot and James Arnold Tidwell was petitioned to run for reelection.

Another petition had been circulated and signed but had not been submitted to the office of Supt. C. B. Barbee. It requested the names of Mrs. Nicky (Susan) Arrott, James O. Koenig and Mrs. Eddie (Earlene) Alexander be placed on the ballot.

Names of Rev. C. R. Blake and LeDrew Arrott, both incumbents, and Roy Stout have been placed on the hospital district directors election ballot.

City officials whose terms expire next month and who had not filed for reelection up to Thursday morning were Mayor Martin Lee and Aldermen Mrs. Cecil Kemp, Tommy Lee and James Badgett. Holdover aldermen are L. O. Clark and Louis Thornton.

Wayne Arrott's and James Arnold Tidwell's terms as trustees expire in April and Billy Joe Luckett resigned from the school board several weeks ago, leaving three spots to be filled. Arrott is not a candidate for reelection.

Holdover school board members are Glenn Skelton, Dale Thompson, Russell Carlton and Delbert Coalson.

Terms of hospital board members that expire this year are Dwain Pruitt, Blake and Arrott. Pruitt declined to run for reelection. Holdover board members are Glenn Sims and C. E. Bruton.

All three of the elections will be held Saturday, April 6, at the City

Hall, with a second school election polling place set up at Tenyson.

Deadline for filing is 30 days before the school and city elections and 10 days before the hospital election.

Fancher Top Conservationist

Royce Fancher has been selected as the Resident Conservationist for 1973 by the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District directors, it was announced this week by Joe Rawlings, chairman of the board. Fancher ranches in the Bronte area of the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Over the past several years Fancher has accumulated several

places. As each one was acquired a plan was developed with the district to protect and improve the land.

Practices such as brush management and range seeding have been used to renovate brush infested rangeland. Management practices such as deferred grazing and proper grazing use on the better grasses help maintain the range in a high state of vigor.

Ponds, fences and other practices also have been applied to help improve the management of grassland resources.

Terraces, contour farming, crop residue use, and a good cropping system have been used to control erosion and improve the production on cropland soils.

Fancher has been an active community worker. He serves on the board of directors of the Kickapoo Water Control and Improvement District, is a member of the Bronte Lions Club and First Baptist Church, and works on other community activities. He is a director of First National Bank in Bronte.

Fancher is married to the former Jean Duncan, who is home-making teacher in Bronte High School.

"The board of directors feels that Royce Fancher has done an excellent job in improving his land and is a land owner who represents the district's objectives in land management," said Rawlings.

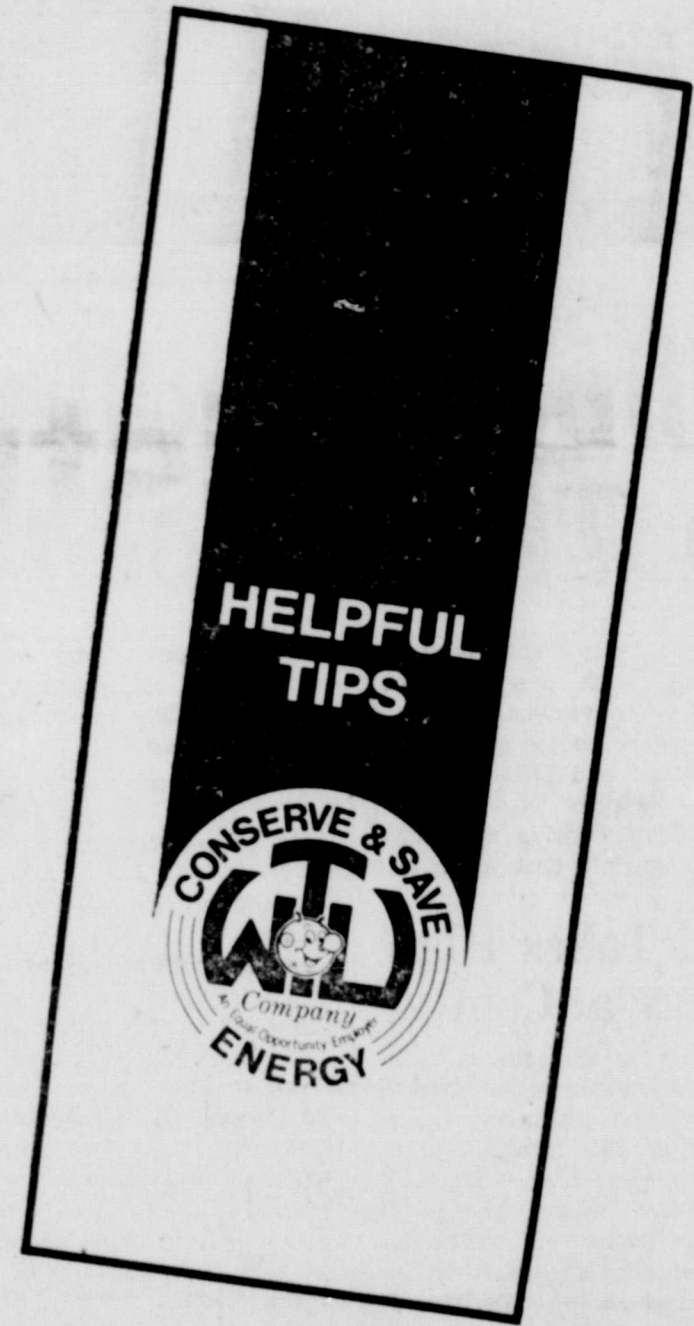

Among the business which was handled by the Bronte School's Board of Trustees Feb. 14 was the extension of the contracts of Principals James L. Golson and James M. Raughton. Their contracts are now effective through the 1975-76 school year.

In other business the board:

- * Approved the delinquent and supplemental tax rolls of the school district.
- * Determined that valuations on some personal properties will be set at the May meeting.
- * Reviewed the January Administrators Conference in Austin.
- * Updated information on Daylight Saving Time.
- * Set the annual trustee election for April 6.
- * Approved the introduction of the trimester (Quarter System) for the 1974-75 school year. The school year will consist of three 60 day periods. Policies and procedures are being formulated.
- * Approved a seven period day for next year, with school starting at 8 a.m. and ending at 3:30 p.m. The additional period will allow students to take both P. E. and band.
- * Previewed information pertinent to teacher contracts which will be considered in March.
- * Adopted a policy which states effective 1974-75 school year, no teacher with an emergency permit will be hired.
- * Agreed to put \$10,000 from the interest and sinking fund on certificate of deposit at First National Bank.
- * Gave final approval to Foundation Funds.
- * Reviewed financial report of receipts and expenditures through January.
- * Heard a review of a drug education program and agreed to participate in a community survey.
- * Approved January bills.

Supt. C. B. Barbee said the financial picture is good with all finances within bounds of the budget set last summer.

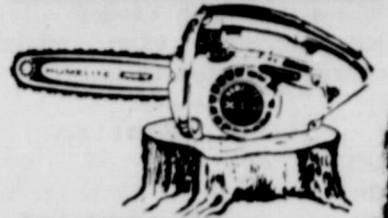

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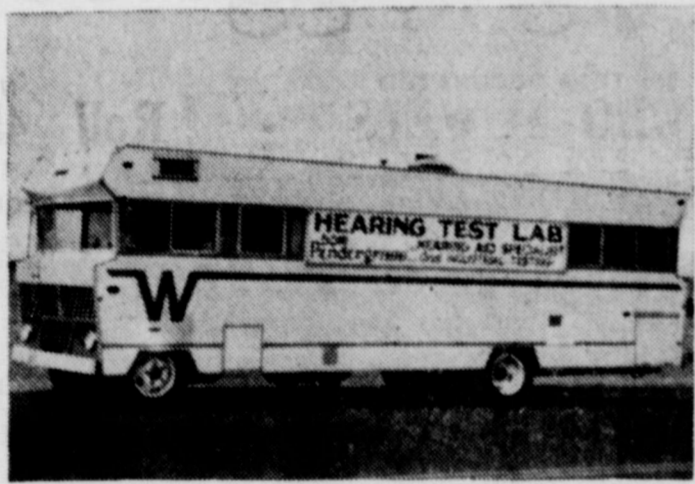
