Owens worked eight years in the attorney general's office in Austin and served as attorney for Crockett County.

He attended McMurry College, then did a stint in the Army in Korea, and upon discharge, entered the University of Texas at Austin. He is a graduate of the University of Texas Law School.

The new lawyer has purchased Adams Abstract Co. offices in Bellinger and San Angelo. He is married.

Two new county commissioners were elected as Jerry M. Parker polled 147 votes to defeat Jack Corley, incumbent, with 120 votes in Precinct 4. Bobby Vaughn was nominated commissioner of Precinct 2 with 255 votes over Billy

New City Officers Are Sworn In

New city officials were sworn in last Thursday night when the Bronte City Council met at the City Hall. Outgoing Mayor Martin Lee conducted the swearing in ceremony.

R. T. Caperton took the oath of office to serve as mayor, and aldermen sworn in were James Badgett, J. T. Henry and Ernest Agueno. Badgett is the only incumbent of the four.

In other business, the council passed an ordinance regulating door to door selling in Bronte by itinerant salesmen. New personnel policies also were discussed.

Retiring council members in addition to Lee were Aldermen Tommy Lee and Mrs. Cecil Kemp.

Joe Luckett with 118. Vaughn will succeed Jesse Parker who did not run for reelection.

In the race for justice of the peace for Precinct 2, incumbent Cecil Kemp was reelected with 233 votes to 127 received by Mrs. Josie F. Craig.

Coke Countians favored Robert "Bob" Krueger for the 21st District Congressional seat that is being vacated by U. S. Rep. O. C. Fisher. Krueger received 297 votes; Nelson W. Wolff 235; John H. Poerner 197; Joe Sullivan 93; Allen Moore 36; Patrick M. Ainsworth 29. Wolff ran ahead of Krueger over the entire district and the two will face each other in a runoff.

Borden County Judge Glenn Toombs will face Michael H. Ezzell, Snyder Elementary School counselor, in a runoff for the Democratic nomination for the 63rd Legislative seat. Renal B. Rossion did not seek reelection. Toombs received 412 votes in Coke County; Ezzell 338; and Mary Thomas 75. Winner of the runoff election will face Republican candidate John R. (Rich) Anderson, Borden County rancher, in the November general election.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe was re-nominated to the governor's office Saturday after receiving 70 per cent of the votes cast. For Coke County it was 779 for Briscoe; 119 for Frances "Sissy" Farenthold; 19 for Steve Alexander; and .6 for W. H. Posey.

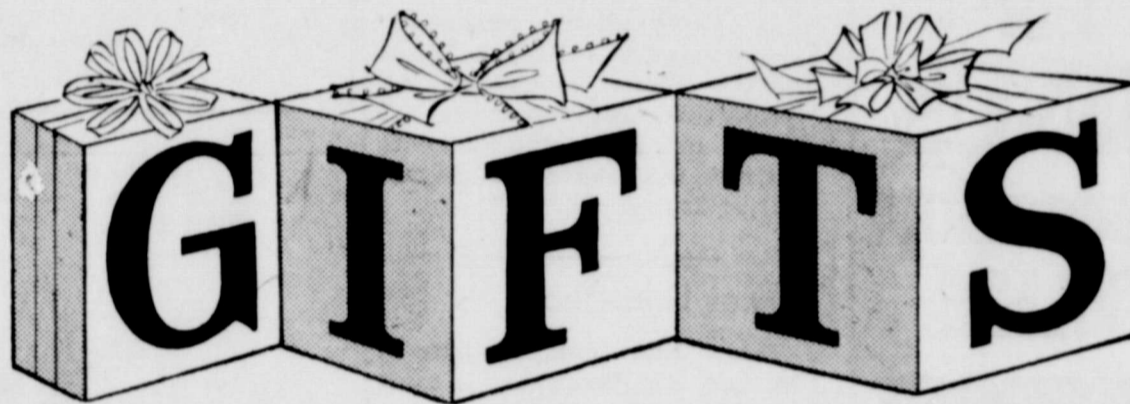
Even though I came up a little short in the election last Saturday, I want to thank everyone for your kind consideration in my race for Justice of the Peace, Precinct 2.

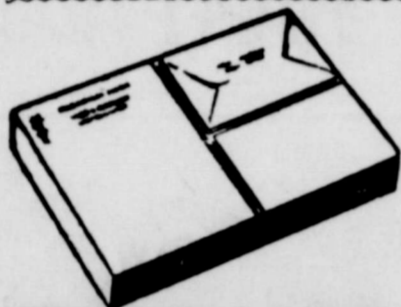
