## Tax Rate Set

The tax rate for the coming year was set at \$1.70 per \$100 valuation, a slight drop from this year's rate of \$1.73.

ington Street will be allowed to water 30 minutes on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays and persons who live west of Washington Street may water 30 minutes a day on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

Mayor Caperton said the City Council regrets having to take so drastic a step, but, he said, "We simply don't have enough water coming into town to allow everybody to water gardens and yards as much as they would like to."

He said the council feels that the 30 minute period three days a week will be sufficient to keep young or valuable plants alive until the water problem can be alleviated.

The city has on order a booster pump which engineers figure will bring in an additional 100,000 gallons of water per day. However, it will be at least two weeks before the pump can be delivered and installed.

Fire Chief Jack Lee told The Enterprise late Wednesday that there was not enough water in storage in the city to fight a major fire, in case of such a development. Lee said members of the Volunteer Fire Department are solidly behind the City Council in its water conservation efforts and members are ready to help the Council enforce the new ruling on watering yards and gardens.

Caperton said members of the City Council felt, in making the new ruling, that it is much more important for residents of the city to have water for household use and firefighting than for gardens and lawns.

City Water Supt. Billy Joe Luckett said he is pumping the maximum amount possible every day, mum amount possible every day.

### Homemade Dustcloths

Have you ever made your own dustcloths? Watchers of the TV series, "You Can Do It," saw Cindy Kidwell make hers recently. For those who missed her program, here are the ways it is done.

There are four preparation methods.

To use the first method, pour two tablespoons of furniture polish or liquid wax into a one quart jar or coffee can. Rotate jar or can to completely coat inside surfaces. Pour out excess liquid to avoid getting too much on the cloths.

Paste wax also can be used — by coating inside of the jar or can

with a light film of wax. Then place two or three dustcloths in the jar or can. Let them stand a day or two—they will absorb the liquid or wax evenly.

Another method combines one-fourth cup lemon oil with one pint of boiling water. Then add six to eight cloths and let them absorb as much liquid as possible. When the water cools, wring out each cloth and hang it up to dry thoroughly.

For all dustcloths, use old, soft cotton cloths. Always store treated dustcloths in a covered glass jar or can to prevent a fire hazard.

When they become soiled from use, wash in warm suds and treat them again if necessary.

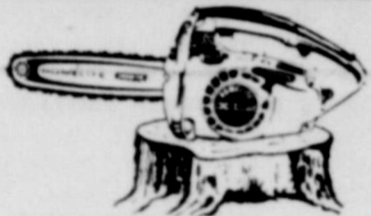
A third method calls for one tablespoon of kerosene mixed with one quart of hot water. Dip the squares of soft clean cloth into this solution, wring out, dry and store in covered jar or can.

For the fourth method, mix one quart of warm water, one tablespoon of mild soap or detergent, one tablespoon of household ammonia and two tablespoons of boiled linseed oil or a good furniture polish.

Mix well and dip soft cloths into the solution. After cloth is saturated with mixture, squeeze out, dry and store in covered jar or can.

## REDDY'S VACATION TIPS



**Clip and save this vacation checklist.**

- REFRIGERATOR OR FREEZER:** Change thermostat control to slightly warmer (or "Vacation") setting according to the manufacturer's recommendations.
- DISHWASHER:** Make sure it's empty. Shut the door, but do not latch.
- DISPOSER:** Run and flush with cold water.
- ELECTRIC RANGE:** Make sure all switches are in the "Off" position.
- WASHERS:** Turn off water supply at faucets.
- WATER HEATER (ELECTRIC):** Turn off at circuit breaker panel. When you return, run a small amount of water from a hot water faucet to make sure there is water in the tank before you turn the circuit on.
- TRASH COMPACTOR:** Remove any accumulated trash.
- TELEVISION SETS:** Unplug from electric outlet and disconnect the antenna lead-in cable.
- CLOCK RADIOS, ETC.:** Check these and all other items with automatic "On-Off" controls. Disconnect the ones that won't be needed.
- LIGHTING:** Be sure that all lights are off except those needed for security, such as: 1) yard light and/or other exterior lighting with automatic controls — on at dusk, off at dawn; 2) portable lamp in living area with automatic control; 3) hall or bathroom light.
- AIR CONDITIONING:** Normally, air conditioning should be turned off completely while on summer vacation. However, if there is anything in your home that might suffer heat damage, the thermostat setting could be raised 5 to 10 degrees above normal operation and the unit left on. For comfort, you might have a friend or neighbor turn on the unit the day of your return.

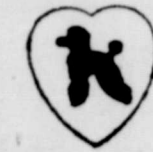

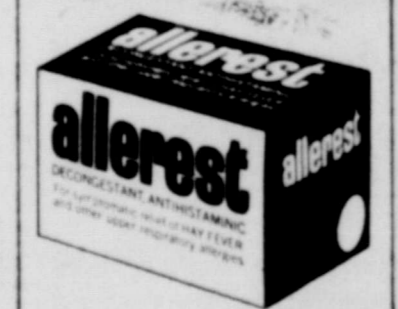
