Those persons receiving special introduction by Margaret Martin, Coke County social worker were Mrs. Pearl Dismore, Mrs. Nona Anderson, Mrs. Mary Phillips, Ernest Marshall and Mrs. Eva Knierim.

Other 90 year olds of the com-

munity who were unable to attend were Mrs. Martha Blake, 94, and Mrs. Josie Borders, 90, who are residents of Bronte Nursing Home.

Steve Badley, chairman of the Coke County Advisory Board for Senior Citizens, gave the welcome. Mrs. Martin introduced Ephraim

Garcia of San Angelo, assistant director of the Tom Green County Community Action Program, and Earlene Alexander, Coke County social worker. She also thanked the Bronte Home Demonstration Club and members of the Senior Citizens Advisory Board for their coopera-

Citizens who are in their 80s will be honored at the meeting of senior citizens on June 10.



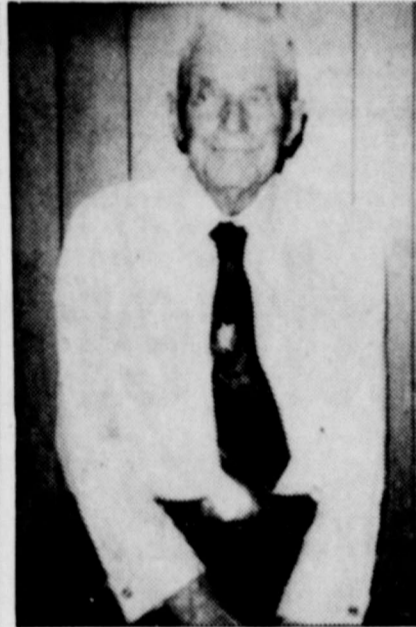

Mrs. Pearl Dismore is the oldest of the group honored at Special Older Texan Day on May 16. She was 95 years old Sept. 18. She was born in Smith County and later moved to Dallas County. She was married to John Dismore on Jan. 2, 1898. He died in 1911 while her six children were still very young.

The family moved to Runnels County in 1935 and lived in the Norton and Maverick communities until a few years ago when she moved back to Royce City near Dallas. Last year she became a resident at the Bronte Nursing Home where she enjoys digging in the flower beds. She loves flowers.

She likes to play dominoes and claims to be the champion at the nursing home. She is a member of

the United Methodist Church. She has six children and three live in this area: W. H. and Joe in Bronte and Jack in Ballinger.

Mrs. Nona Anderson was 93 years old last Dec. 13, and was born in 1902 to Jim Anderson, she moved to Edwards County near Rock-Goliad County. After her marriage springs, where she lived until the 1930s when the family moved to Bronte. Mr. Anderson died in 1961.

She still gardens, cooks and washes dishes and enjoys playing bridge and dominoes. She has a daughter, Mrs. Willie B. Millikin with whom she makes her home.

She attends the United Methodist Church and the Senior Citizen meetings. She recited an original poem

at the May meeting entitled "My Jim."

Mrs. Mary Phillips was 93 on Jan. 13. She was born in Stephenson, Ala., and has lived in Coke County since 1910. She lost her husband in 1918 while her nine children were still young. She said she raised her children with each of their help and each doing his share. They all worked and they all played, she said.

She played baseball with her grandchildren and they think she still can. She is a member of the United Methodist Church and enjoys piecing quilts.

She has eight living children, 29 grandchildren, 43 great grandchildren and nine great great grand-

children.

Ernest Marshall is 92 years old. He was born March 8, 1883, in Buffalo Gap and moved to Maverick when he was a few months old. He was married to Mrs. Pearl Horn Thomason in 1914 at Maverick and lived there all his life with the exception of a few years in Houston and Silver City, N. M. He has resided the past few years in Bronte where he lives alone since the death of his wife two years ago.

He attends the Bronte Church of Christ. His hobbies are playing dominoes and watching TV. He has two step-children, Mrs. Edna Thomason Anderson of Houston and Will Thomason of Midland.

Mr. Marshall was an early day

cowboy and went on cattle drives back in the early days, as well as participating in other activities.

Mrs. Eva Knierim was the junior member of the senior citizens honored. She is only 90 and was born March 3, 1885, near Lufkin. She was married to Charles Knierim in 1909. She has two children, Mrs. Frank Pohl of Matador and Charles Knierim of Phoenix, Ariz.

She is the only one living of 19 children in her family. Her hobbies are music and writing poetry. She has been a member of the Baptist Church for 65 years and still sings at church. She has lived in Coke County since 1942. She recited an original poem, "Sleepy Hollow," at the May meeting.

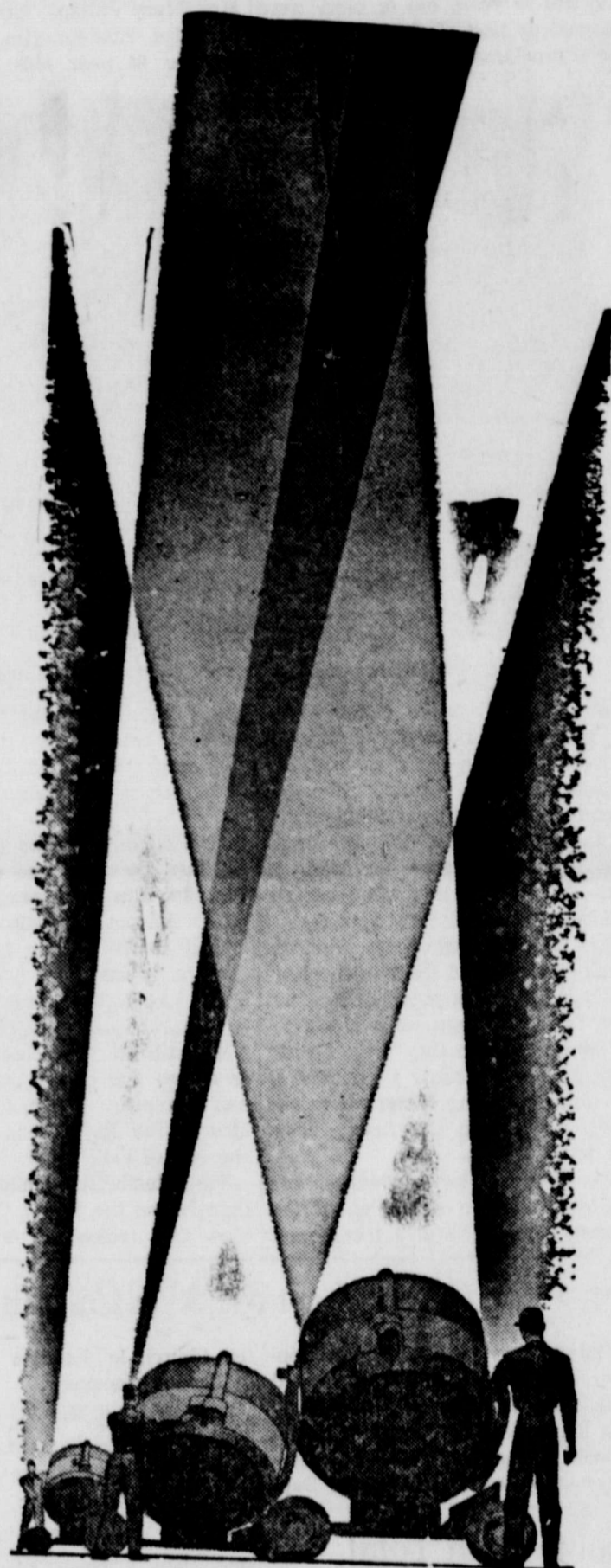

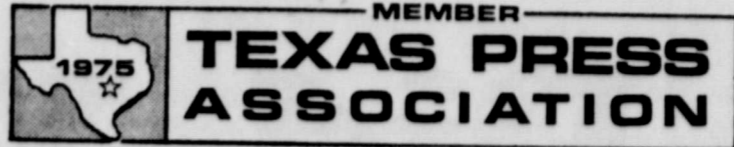

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SANCO HOMECOMING SLATED FOR WEEKEND

For the 21st consecutive year, the Sanco Homecoming will meet Saturday night and Sunday during the coming weekend at the former school building and the big tabernacle on Yellow Wolf Creek.
 The sponsoring organization, Sanco Community Association, will furnish the meat for the Sunday noon meal, according to Nolan Pentecost, president. Ulmer Bird, who from the first has often been master of ceremonies, was named in a Monday night meeting of the program committee, to emcee this year's event.
 The Saturday night get-together will open at 8 p.m., with songs and

a brief discussion of past and future significance of Sanco as related to the Bicentennial and the nation and to the Centennial of the occupancy of Yellow Wolf Valley by white Americans, looking to some special observance of both in 1976, but mostly just a visiting session.

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
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City Ordinance

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF BRONTE, COKE COUNTY, TEXAS, PRESCRIBING FLOOD HAZARD AREA MAPS AS PREPARED BY FEDERAL INSURANCE ADMINISTRATION TO BE THE CONTROLLING MAPS FOR THE PURPOSE OF THIS ORDINANCE; PRESCRIBING SUBDIVISION REGULATIONS FOR MINIMUM ELEVATIONS ABOVE MEAN SEA LEVEL TO FIRST FLOOR LEVELS IN THE CITY OF BRONTE; PRESCRIBING PERMITS TO BE ISSUED ONLY ON PROOF OF ACCEPTABLE ELEVATIONS; PRESCRIBING STANDARDS OF BUILDING OF NEW CONSTRUCTION AND IMPROVEMENT OF EXISTING STRUCTURES; PROVISIONS FOR FLOODWAY; DISCLAIMER OF LIABILITY; PROVIDING FOR APPEAL; PROVIDING PENALTY; AND PROVIDING SEVERABILITY CLAUSE.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRONTE, COKE COUNTY, TEXAS:

SECTION ONE (1):
This ordinance supplements the ordinance of the City relating to subdivisions, building, inspections and issuance of building permits.

SECTION TWO (2):
Flood Hazard Area Identification Maps, Official Number H 48 081 0900 01, officially issued the 29th day of March, 1974, mean sea level (msl) water-surface elevations of a flood with one percent chance of occurring during any year, either shown on flood hazard area maps, or as otherwise provided, and floodway data to establish limits of encroachment of floodflow restricting development, as provided by the Federal Insurance Administration (FIA) shall be controlling in administration of this ordinance. Both maps and data, by reference, are made a part of this ordinance. Revisions of maps and data, issued officially by FIA, shall automatically replace prior issuances. They shall become official on their effective dates but shall not be applied retroactively in administering this ordinance.

SECTION THREE (3):
All official maps with controlling elevation and floodway data, after issuance, are available for public inspection at the City Hall of the City of Bronte, 114 South Washington, Coke County, Texas.

SECTION FOUR (4):
All subdivision plats embracing proposed development of portions of any areas officially identified as having special flood hazards must be approved prior to development. Approval shall indicate that the requirements of this ordinance have been met unless, for supportable reasons, exceptions have been granted by the city following appeal and adjustment procedures provided herein. Subdivisions or

other new development shall be required to:

- (a) Be consistent with the need to minimize flood damage;
- (b) Locate, elevate, and construct all public utilities and facilities, such as sewer, gas, electrical, and water systems, so as to minimize or eliminate flood damage;
- (c) Provide adequate drainage so as to reduce exposure to flood hazards; and
- (d) Locate and elevate streets and curbing, and locate size, and shape lots in a manner which will permit each lot to provide an adequate building site for residential or non-residential building as proposed, in conformance with the building permit requirements contained herein.

SECTION FIVE (5):
Official flood plain delineations and delineations of floodways denoting limits of permissible flood flow - restricting developments shall be clearly shown on all plats submitted for approval, wherever such plats contain flood plain and floodway segments.

SECTION SIX (6):
Permits shall be required prior to start of construction or new use for all new construction of substantial improvements, change of use, or landfill within any officially identified special flood hazard areas. Issuance of a building permit shall indicate that the requirements of this ordinance have been met unless, for supportable reasons, variances have been granted by the city following the appeal and adjustment procedures provided herein.

SECTION SEVEN (7):
Major repairs to structures shall:

- (a) Use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage; and
- (b) Use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.

SECTION EIGHT (8):
New construction or substantial improvements, including prefabricated and mobile homes, shall:

- (a) Be protected against flood damage;
- (b) Be designed (or modified) and anchored to prevent flotation, collapse, or lateral movement.
- (c) Use construction materials and utility equipment that are resistant to flood damage; and
- (d) Use construction methods and practices that will minimize flood damage.

SECTION NINE (9):
New construction or substantial improvement of residential structures

shall have the lowest floor either one foot or more higher than the water surface elevation at that point of a flood with a one percent chance of occurring during any year, as officially provided by FIA for administration of the National Flood Insurance program in this city, or seventeen (17) feet above mean sea level, whichever is higher.

SECTION TEN (10):
New construction or substantial improvement of non-residential structures shall have the lowest floor either one foot or more higher than the water surface elevation at that point of a flood with a one percent chance of occurring during any year, as officially provided by FIA for administration of the National Flood Insurance programs in this city or, together with attendant utility and sanitary facilities, be floodproofed up to or higher than such elevation, or seventeen (17) feet above mean sea level, whichever is higher.

SECTION ELEVEN (11):
Until a floodway has been designated for a specific flood plain area, no building or new use, including landfill, shall be permitted until the applicant has demonstrated that the proposed building, landfill, or new use, when combined with all other existing and anticipated flood plain uses, will not increase the water surface elevation of a flood with a one percent chance of occurring during any year more than one foot at any point. Subsequent to floodway designation, which sets encroachment limits for flood flow-restricting developments, this requirement need not be met.

SECTION TWELVE (12):
New or replacement water supply and sanitary sewage systems shall be designed and installed to minimize or eliminate infiltration of floodwaters into water systems and discharges from sewage systems into floodwaters. On-site waste disposal systems, which use is permitted, shall be designed, located, and constructed so as to avoid impairment of them or contamination from them during flooding.

SECTION THIRTEEN (13):
Following provision by FIA of data required therefor, floodways, with encroachment limits for flood flow-restricting developments, will be designated. Floodways and encroachment limits shall be based on the principle that the delineated floodway will carry the flow with a one percent chance of occurring during any year without increasing the water-surface elevation of that flood than one foot at any point.

SECTION FOURTEEN (14):
After floodway designation for a specific flood plain area, no existing nonconforming floodflow-restricting uses in the floodway shall be expanded. Modification, alteration, or repair may be permitted to incor-

porate floodproofing provided such measures will not raise the water-surface elevation at any point of a flood with a one percent chance of occurring during any year.

SECTION FIFTEEN (15):
No fill or other encroachment shall be permitted within a designated floodway that will impair the ability of the floodway area between encroachment lines to carry and discharge the floodflow of a flood with a one percent chance of occurring during any year unless the effects of such fill or encroachment shall be fully offset by stream improvements. No unpermitted fill, encroaching development, or change of use within a designated floodway shall be made.

SECTION SIXTEEN (16):
In administering this ordinance, the city will coordinate its administration with affected neighboring jurisdictions to assure compatibility of related flood control and flood plain management decisions and measures across jurisdictional lines.

SECTION SEVENTEEN (17):
The city council is hereby delegated authority to promulgate, publish and apply guidelines and standards required in the uniform administration of this ordinance. Such guidelines and standards shall be available for public inspection at the City Hall of the City of Bronte, 114 South Washington, Bronte (Coke), Texas.

SECTION EIGHTEEN (18):
It is not intended by this ordinance to repeal, abrogate or impair any existing easements, covenants or deed restrictions. However, where the administration of terms of this ordinance will impose greater restrictions, the provisions of this ordinance shall prevail. All other ordinances or regulations inconsistent with provisions herein are hereby repealed to the extent of the inconsistency only.

SECTION NINETEEN (19):
Flood protection required by this ordinance is reasonable and is based upon sound surveys, data interpretations, and computations. However, larger floods than that of a one percent chance occurring in any year may occur on rarer occasions or under unusual conditions. Flood heights may be higher than computed, due to man-made or natural causes which inhibit discharge of floodwaters. This ordinance does not imply that areas outside of designated areas of special flood hazard or that uses permitted within such delineations will be free of flooding or flood damage. This ordinance shall not create liability on the part of the city or any officer or employee thereof for any personal injury, death or property damage from flooding that may result from reliance on this ordinance or on any administrative decision lawfully made thereunder.

SECTION 20 (20):

Upon any person being adversely affected by the provisions of this ordinance, he shall be entitled to appeal to the Board of Adjustment of the City of Bronte as appears in those ordinances dealing with the Building, Electrical, Plumbing and Housing Standard ordinances heretofore adopted by the City of Bronte, or as such may hereinafter be amended.

SECTION TWENTY-ONE (21):
Any violation of the provisions herein shall be punishable by a fine not less than \$5.00 Dollars and not exceeding \$200.00 in amount.

SECTION TWENTY-TWO (22):
Should any section, sub-section, sentence or provision of this ordinance be declared to be unconstitutional by a Court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of any of the remaining part or parts hereof, except insofar as the part so declared unconstitutional or void is indispensable to the operation of the remaining part or parts.
