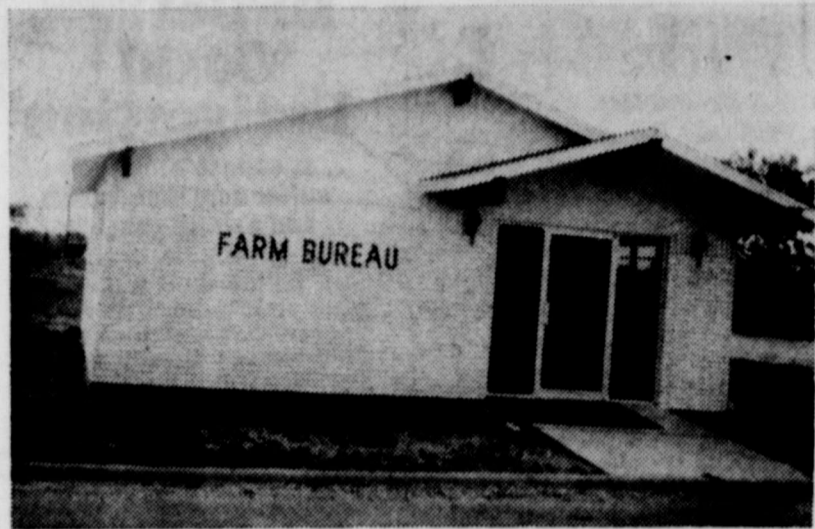

POOL OPENS FOR SUMMER SWIMMERS

The swimming pool at the Bronte County Park is open for business, and everyone in the community is invited to take advantage of the facilities which have been provided.

Season tickets to the pool which

allow holders to swim whenever they wish to cost only \$5.00 for the entire season. Individual admissions are 15 cents for children and 35 cents for adults.

The pool is open each day except Wednesdays and Sundays from 2:30 to 6 p.m. and on Wednesdays and Sundays it is open from 2:30 until 5:30 p.m.

Bro. Pete's Still Here But

Three New Ministers Now Serving Bronte Churches

After several months of having only one resident minister in Bronte, the community is suddenly deluged with preachers. For some time now, the Rev. M. E. (Pete) Patterson of the Central Baptist Church has been the only resident minister in town.

But that's all changed now.

The Rev. Cecil Harper has arrived to take over as pastor of the First Baptist Church, replacing the Rev. Harry Morris, long time pastor, who moved up to the position of district missionary and moved to Ballinger. Dr. James Shields of Howard Payne University in Brownwood has been serving as interim pastor.

Also arriving in Bronte recently was Robert C. (Bob) Adams, who is the new minister of the Church of Christ. He replaces Melvin Placke, who resigned and moved back to the Rio Grande Valley for missionary work.

The First United Methodist Church of Bronte has not been without a pastor, but the Rev. Grady Peters has been serving as interim pastor for almost a year and has continued to live in San Angelo. The Rev. C. Earle Lewis has been assigned to the Bronte church during the recent meeting of the Southwest Texas

Conference in San Antonio and will make his home in Bronte. He will also serve as pastor of the Miles Methodist Church.

The Enterprise tried Thursday to contact all three of the new preachers, but was successful only in talking with the Rev. Mr. Harper. He and his family have come to Bronte

from Gordon in Palo Pinto County.

Harper and his wife, Elicia, have four children: Julie 15; Joy 13; Jay 11; and Jimmy 9.

Harper has a B.S. degree in religion from Hardin-Simmons and a Master of Divinity from Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth. Harper is originally from Moran in Shackelford County and his wife is from Abilene.

Mr. Adams (or as he has told his congregation they should call him Bro. Bob) has come to Bronte from Morenci, Ariz. He and his wife have five children. All of them are grown, as the last of the five finished high school last year. Adams and his family are originally from Canada but have resided in the United States for several years.

The Rev. C. Earle Lewis replaces

the Rev. Grady Peters of San Angelo who took over as pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Bronte following the death of the Rev. Russell Heaner last May. Lewis is a former pastor of Methodist churches at Mertzon and Christoval, but has been going to school in Kansas City, Mo. He and his wife, Melba, are the parents of two children, David, a sixth grader, and Donnie, a first grader. The Rev. Mr. Lewis is an official referee and a licensed embalmer.

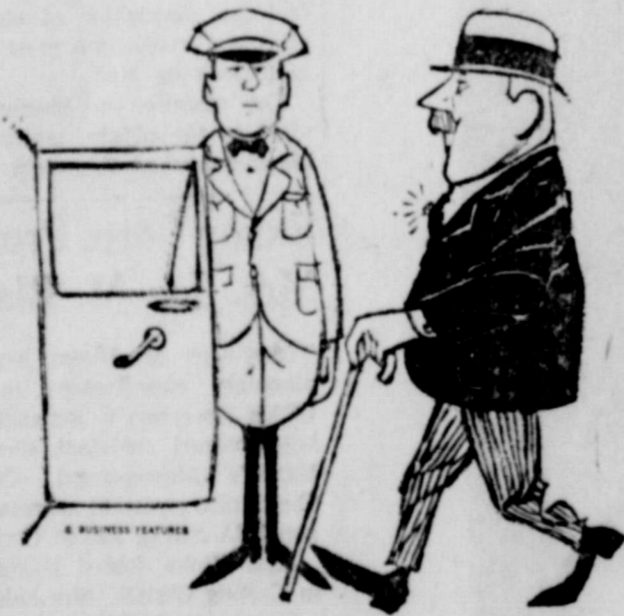

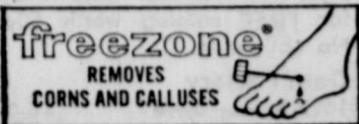

Mrs. Cliff Honored As 90 Year Old

Mrs. Bertie Indiana (Clark) Cliff was born Nov 17, 1881, in Texas. Her parents were George Clark and Mattie Warwick Clark, both of whom were born and reared eight miles north of Atlanta, Ga., but had moved to Texas before Bertie's arrival.

Bertie attended school in Runnels County and at Fort Chadbourne. She has many happy memories of her life at Fort Chadbourne. Her parents grew many flowers and fruits, and her home reflected their love of nature. Their friends remember the attractive landscaping of the home.

Bertie remembers that Fort Chadbourne young people liked horseback riding, which was in vogue when she was a young lady. (Automobiles were unknown in Coke County at that time. Bertie recalls that one time three young couples rode horseback to Hayrick to visit friends. While there a terrible blizzard blew in, and all were forced to spend the night at the Stevens home near Hayrick Mountain.

Bertie Indiana Clark was married to James Albert Cliff at the Clark home at Fort Chadbourne on Sept. 25, 1901, with the Rev. Nesbitt officiating.

Mr. Cliff was engaged in a general merchandising business at Fort Chadbourne and later at Robert Lee. She has been a member of the Methodist Church for many years. She is a sister of Freeman Clark of Robert Lee. Her husband and two sons, Wayne and James Wallace, are all deceased.
