



### City's New Fire Truck Now In Operation

Remember the fire truck that a lot of Bronte citizens contributed toward its purchase? It has become a reality and is ready for use by Bronte firemen when they have to tackle fire fighting jobs out in rural rough country.

The idea for securing the special truck came up when it became apparent that the regular trucks were not meant to be used on the rugged terrain which often has to be traveled to get to grass fires.

#### Long Distance Service Out 1-4 July 22, 23, 24

General Telephone Co. of the Southwest announced this week that long distance phone service will be out for a period next week in Robert Lee and Bronte. The stoppage of service is being planned in order to test local facilities to determine if changes are needed to improve service for the two Coke County cities.

Long distance service will be out from 1 to 4 a.m. on July 22 and 23 in Bronte and from 1 to 4 a.m. on July 22, 23 and 24 in Robert Lee.

Crews will be working near the city limits of Bronte July 22 and 23 and near Robert Lee July 24. In case of emergency, persons should go to the site of the work where workmen will be able to put through long distance calls. Also, phone company officials said they would try to make arrangements with Sheriff J. Lee Ensor to put through emergency calls via the county's short wave radio system.

Jim Newby, of the phone company, said he felt the hours of 1-4 in the morning without service would inconvenience very few Coke Countians.

Local calls will go through as usual, he said.

A new 750 gallon pumper has been ordered by the department and delivery is expected by the middle of November.

Prior to his transfer to Bronte in 1960, Stroebel was an employee with Exxon Pipeline Co. and had been assigned to work in Pampa, Borger and Childress Pipeline pump stations.

At a dinner held in his honor July 9, he was presented retirement awards by Operations Supt. J. L. Barthel Jr. of Midland.

During their 15 years in Bronte Mr. and Mrs. Stroebel have reared their three children to adulthood and they are all graduates of Bronte High. Their older son, Gary, is a graduate of Texas Lutheran College at Seguin and is presently working on his doctorate at the University of Utah. Their second son, Kenneth, is a 1975 graduate of Texas A&M University and will go on active duty in the United States Air Force next month. Their youngest child, Sandra, is a student at Sam Houston State University in Huntsville.

Mrs. Stroebel, the former Meta Weiser, is a long time employee of the Bronte Hospital.

The Stroebels plan to move to his hometown of Cisco for their retirement. They own a half section stock farm there which will keep them busy. He also plans to spend some time enjoying his hobby of working on antique cars.



## Account Given of European Trip Made Recently by Five Persons from Bronte

(Editor's note: We have obtained a resume of the trip of five local persons to Europe recently and we feel it will be of interest to readers of The Enterprise.)

Mr. and Mrs. Earl F. Glenn and Laura, Mr. and Mrs. Royce Fancher and Gene Glenn departed Dallas-Fort Worth International Airport at 3 p.m. June 7 along with 212 tourists and a crew of nine for a two week holiday in Europe, which was billed as The Rhine Discovery. The tour took us through Switzerland, Germany, France and Belgium.

We had a smooth flight to Bangor, Maine, where we stopped for refueling, and then on to Zurich, Switzerland with an 8:30 a.m. arrival. Lucerne is located on Lake Lucerne, a natural lake 24 miles long and crystal blue. The Palace Hotel, situated on the water's edge, was to be our headquarters for the next four days and nights.

Lucerne is situated at the foot of the Alps, bounded on two sides, one side by the lake and the other side by the world renowned Mt. Pilatus. We toured the city the first day and took the entire circuit tour of Mt. Pilatus the next day. We traveled by motorcoach, cog railway, and aerial tramway which revealed a magnificent panorama of ice, snow, and fertile valleys with Alping flowers and beautiful Brown

Swiss cattle unique with their large, melodious bells. We concluded the tour by lake steamer.

That afternoon we shopped in the world renowned Bucherer — largest watch and jewelry retailers in the world.

The Swiss hospitality and cuisine is unmistakably the best in the world. The average meal at night takes about 2½ hours to serve and consists of many courses. The Swiss are an unhurried people and the meals are a time of complete relaxation, fellowship and complete enjoyment of the delectable food.

The next day we took an all day tour, 9-6:30, to the Bernese Oberland which took us to the high country Alps and to the towns of Interlocken, Grindelwall and Brienz. This area is noted for its scenery and mountains, especially the man eater, Jungfrau (50 men have lost their lives trying to conquer it). The streams, lakes and beautiful waterfalls all contribute to the grandiose and unusual landscape of Bernese Oberland.

These scenic wonders have delighted artists and poets for centuries. In this area you'll find a wealth of medieval towns, churches and chateaus. In the town of Brienz we visited the school for woodcarvers and violin makers. This area was once patronized by Mark Twain and Mendelssohn.

The small farms, resplendent with wheat and sugar beets, gave us another view of this country and how it helped feed its population.

Tours the next day were to the Glaciers and Lucerne Castle. That night we dined at the famous and very unique Chateau Gutch overlooking the city of Lucerne.

The last morning in Lucerne was free, so we toured the city on foot and did our last minute shopping. We departed Lucerne at 1 p.m. by motorcoach to Basel with a short orientation drive through this port. We arrived at Basel Rhine Harbor at 3 p.m. and embarked on MS Britannia cruise ship, a luxurious 300 foot beauty that looked as if she had just been scrubbed and painted. This was to be our home for the next four days and nights, cruising downstream on the Rhine River and stopping at various ports in France and Germany.

The MS Britannia was booked exclusively for our tour group which completely filled the accommodations. This ship was built in 1965. We inspected our floating main lounge—very spacious and with enormous expanses of glass windows, so we could get a panoramic view from any location in the room.

The ship had a reading room, dining room and kitchen on the upper deck. Main deck had a gift shop, beauty shop, purser's offices; A deck had staterooms; B deck had staterooms, sauna, laundry and crew's quarters; sun deck had a swimming pool, shuffle board courts, chairs for

relaxing and sunbathing. Nothing was lacking.

We arrived at our first port of call at Breisach at 8 p.m., among well wishers and curiosity seekers. We left the ship for a short stroll through the small town of about 7,000 population. We visited with a couple that toured the world last year and visited the U.S. They inquired about where to visit in Texas.

We departed Breisach the next morning at 4 a.m. and arrived at Strasbourg, France, for a 2½ hour tour of the city and the surrounding countryside. This is an unmistakable French city of the province of Alsace, and dates back to the ninth century B.C. This is the biggest French port on the Rhine. Our excursion included tours past cobbled squares, canals, half timbered houses with ornate tiled roofs, past opera house, university, numerous parks and monuments, and we were given time to spend inside the most famous cathedral in Strasbourg. This cathedral was a combination of German and French Gothic architecture.

We reembarked ship at Gamsheim and arrived in Speyer, Germany, where we disembarked for the Heidelberg tour. Heidelberg is one of the most famous of all German cities. Dominated by the largest ruined castles in Germany, Heidelberg's know history dates back to prehistoric times some 2,000 years ago. The castle was built in the 13th century.

Heidelberg is most famous for its university. It was the first in Germany and was founded in 1386. It became the center of learning, culture and science, and to this day the university is the most famous in the field of science and medicine. Today a city of 135,000 population has still maintained its old world charm and beauty.
