We have deplored Uncle's soft heart on many occasions and have not appreciated to greatly the bill which comes due for us each quarter plus the coming across with the grand total each April 15.

But dear old Unk has not only got a soft place in his heart—he has an obviously big soft spot in his head.

We are referring to the salary increase which was approved last week for employees of the U. S. Post Office Department.

In the midst of inflation and recession, dear old stupid Uncle Sam allowed the powerful union of more than 600,000 workers, who sweat in air conditioned buildings and vehicles to give us the most inefficient mail service imaginable, gave the whole crew a raise. The lowest full time postal employee was already starting out at \$10,800 per year and this new high in paying people more than they're worth will add considerably to the already exorbitant wage.

Dear reader, you will pay the bill for this inexcusable wage hike. You can bet your bottom dollar that the postage for a first class letter will go up 30 per cent before the end of the year.

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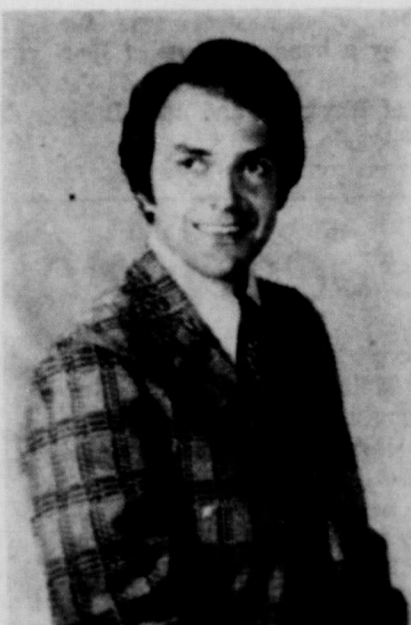

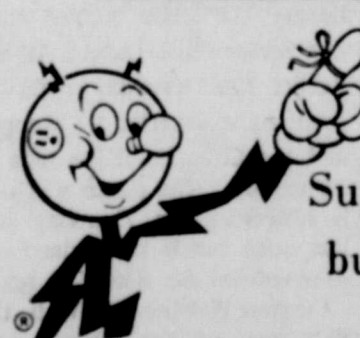

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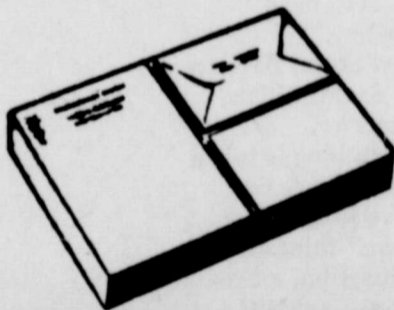

Story of European Trip Is Continued

(Below is the second installment of the story of the trip recently to Europe of Mr. and Mrs. Royce Fancher, Mr. and Mrs. T. F. Glenn and Laura and Gene Glenn. This account is being continued from last week.)

We had a banquet at the city hall restaurant where we were served a typical German meal re-embarked ship at Mannheim at 10:30 p.m. We departed Mannheim at 9 a.m. and arrived at Rudesheim at 2 p.m. Rudesheim was a quaint village with winding narrow streets, pubs, boutiques and shops of every description.

They were having a wine festival and people from all over Europe were there for the holiday. Shoulder to shoulder traffic was on the sidewalks and streets, an ideal place for a pickpocket to work.

We departed Rudesheim at 5 p.m. and arrived at Braubach at 8:15 p.m. to go to the Marksburg Castle for an evening of entertainment. This castle was built in the 1600's. The road was very winding, and had had a lot of hairy curves for a large touring bus to negotiate. The bus took us only part of the way, then we left the bus. We were met with pomp and ceremony. Guards dressed in black and red medieval costumes, complete with full headdress, handed each malle a lighted torch to use as we climbed further the winding paths to the summit and the castle entrance.

It was beautiful witnessing the 200 persons winding around the hill on different levels with lighted torches. We had a tour of the castle viewing rooms with furniture from that period, as well as one room with authentic armor dating from 6 B.C. to the late 1700's.

We departed Braubach at 6:45 p.m. More vineyards, more lovely little towns with picture book churches, more romanian ruins. But in spite of the antiquity, there was much traffic on the river, including dredges, scrap metal barges, pleasure boats, etc.

This is scenery day on the Rhine. A small 19th century castle, The "Pfalz," rises majestically from a tiny island in the river. We passed village after village, castle after castle until we reached the ruins of

the 16th century castle of Rheinfels at St. Goar. On the opposite shore, the Lorelei, a 400 foot high cliff rises straight out of the water. This is the narrowest and deepest part of the river, where it takes a sharp turn; the current is very swift and visibility is partially obstructed.

Elaborate signal lights on the west bank inform the captains of traffic ahead and every vessel takes on a pilot to guide it through these treacherous waters.

The ship's public address system played the appropriate song that many of us remember from high school—not about the rock, but about the maiden of legend. She combs her golden hair with a golden comb in order to ensnare lovesick mariners. Lorelei seems to regard these proceedings with equanimity, while the tourists in the area admire the wild riverscape.

We passed the towns of Boppard and Koblenz where we were reminded of the Latin confluence at this point where the Rhine and Moselle Rivers join.
