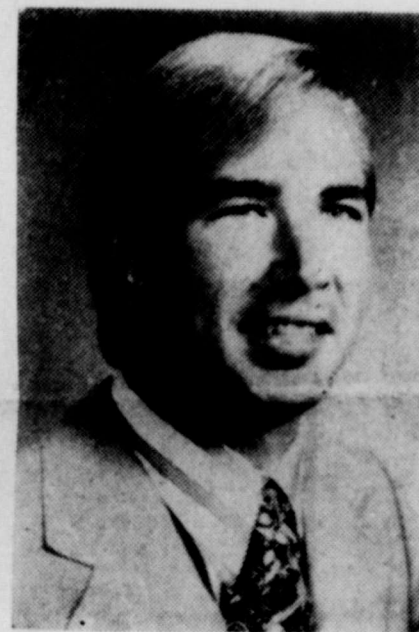
A nursery will be provided for small children.

Lone Star Asks for Rate Raise

Lone Star Gas Company's local manager, H. K. Russ, has requested Bronte officials to enact an ordinance to raise residential and commercial gas rates by about 19.8 cents per thousand cubic feet. The increase, Russ said, is being requested to offset the increase in Lone Star's wholesale costs to each town it serves in Texas, which was authorized by the Texas Railroad Commission on June 30.

The Railroad Commission authorized Lone Star to increase its intracounty "city gate rate" to \$1.0399 per thousand cubic feet of gas. According to Russ, the city gate rate applies to natural gas delivered by Lone Star's Transmission Division

to its distribution divisions for sale to residential and commercial users. The new rate replaces a temporary emergency rate of 94.19 cents per thousand cubic feet set by the Railroad Commission on May 1, 1975.

Russ explained that the new rate would increase Bronte residential customers' gas bills by about \$1.14 a month. He also said that his request is a minimum application covering only the gate rate charge.

Included in the most recent Railroad Commission order was the authorization to increase Lone Star's automatic pass-on of increased gas costs to 85 per cent adjusted month-

ly. Lone Star was formerly allowed to pass on only 65 per cent of their increased costs for gas every six months. Lone Star is also seeking to have this provision included in the new city rate ordinance.

Russ noted that the \$1.0399 figure authorized by the Railroad Commission was arrived at after reviewing the evidence which reflected \$1.20 as shown by the company and 94 cents as testified to by the cities. In addition to the increased rates for residential and commercial customers, Russ said the Railroad Commission's order is designed to provide Lone Star an 8 per cent return on the fair value rate base set by the Commission.

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Land Use Bill Dies In Committee

The Federal Land Use Bill which has been in committee and was voted down is of particular interest to farmers and ranchers of West Texas. Horace L. Scott Jr. has been leading a campaign against the bill and received an Air Mail-o-gram from Congressman John Young dated July 15. It stated:

In view of the interest you have heretofore expressed in opposition to Federal Land Use Planning Legislation, I am pleased to advise that the House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs has today voted down the Federal Land Use Bill and laid on the table a motion to reconsider. This action ordinarily would spell the doom of the legislation. For many reasons with which you are familiar, it is hoped that this is the case: but no relaxation of vigilance on the part of those of you who are fully aware of the adverse effect of such legislation is warranted.

In rejecting the bill the vote in committee was 23 to 19 with one member voting present which, under the circumstances, represents a rather substantial margin. I must caution, however, that these mat-

ters have ways of changing and "rising from their own ashes." You may be assured that I will continue to follow closely and carefully any further legislative development on Federal Land Use Legislation, and I know you will want to do so from your end.

Scott also received a letter from Dee E. Brune, president of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation, which read, in part:

For your information this is how the (Texas) Committee Members voted: Eckhardt (D) and Steelman (R) both for; Kazan (D) and Patman (D) both against.

Brune continued: These 23 votes were the most important ever cast in behalf of the private landowners of America. A "thank you" letter to each of the 23 would certainly be appropriate. A kind of "special thank you" to Congressmen Abraham "Chick" Kazan, Wright Patman of Texas and Sam Teiger of Arizona is a MUST! These three men worked their hearts out in your behalf. My special thanks to each of you for all your help and support.

Mr. and Mrs. Hughes attended the gathering.

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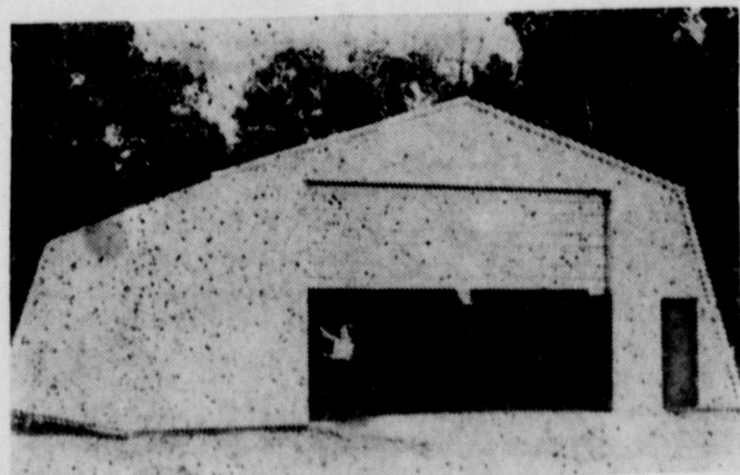

Story of European Trip Is Continued

We took a jolt back into the 20th century when we reached the confluence of the Moselle and Rhine Rivers, which is where we ended our narrative last week. At Remagen we passed the remains of the old Ludendorff Bridge, used by American troops in March of 1945. On to Konigswinter where we view modern apartment houses which vie for attention with the Drachenfels, a ruin that looks like a proper ruin should.

We passed the Bad Godesberg, a suburb of Bonn, and the residence of many diplomats and seats of foreign missions. The Rhine then started chewing its way through Siebenberge (seven hills) and forms the romantic legendary stretch so beloved by poets.

We arrived at Bonn at 10 a.m. for a two hour walking tour of the city. We visited the town square, city hall, Beethoven's birthplace. We left Bonn for Cologne, where we had a half day tour of the city. We saw the Cologne Cathedral; one of the most beautiful in the world—next to Notre Dame of Paris. Art work, carvings, paintings were all beyond description. Some of the ruins of World War II were visible in Cologne. This was the first time any guide had even mentioned anything about the havoc and destruction wrought by the U. S. during the

war. We spent the night docked at Cologne and disembarked the M.S. Britannia at 9 a.m. to go by bus to Brussels, which took 3 1/2 hours. The drive through Germany and into Belgium was beautiful. Fields of different shades of greens, neatly rowed, clean as a pin and interspersed with small patches of grass where beautiful Holstein cows grazed, stretched out for miles.

We arrived at the Brussels Hilton at 1 p.m. and took a tour of this city of 1 1/4 million people. We viewed the Common Market, American Embassy, Embassy Row, the Palace of the King and Queen, Old World Fair Grounds, NATO Headquarters, as well as the main business and banking districts.

The next day we went to Antwerp, second largest city in Belgium. We saw each step of how diamonds are cut, shaped and polished. Then we toured the City of Antwerp. We toured the home of Rubens, the renowned artist of Belgium and saw thousands of dollars' worth of old masterpieces and recognized the original of "The Cavalier" (which we used to study years ago in UIL picture memory).

We then visited the Gothic Church of Our Lady, the largest church in Belgium (478' x 212' with nine aisles and a 383' spire, containing a carillon of 47 bells. We also more Rubens paintings here.

The next day we took an all day tour of the countryside and stopped in Ghent, a historic Flemish town. This town is noted for its horticulture. We visited the St. Bavo's Ca-

thedral which contains one of the most famous masterpieces of art — The Adoration of the Mystic Lamb (1423) by Jan Van Eyck. We toured the countryside and then visited Bruggs, the lace capital of the world, where we saw the ancient art still being taught. This town is called the "Northern Venice" of Europe because it is built on canals.

The next day we toured in another direction and visited the crystal factory at St. Lambert. We went through the entire facilities, seeing each step done from blowing to etching, and cleaning of the finished product.

Incidentally the food in Belgium is also superb—especially the pastries, ice cream and strawberry cheese-cake.

June 20 has arrived; time for our departure is 1:15 p.m. A wonderful, exciting two weeks passed so quickly, but wonderful memories still linger.

(At the risk of incurring her displeasure we must express the thanks of The Enterprise to Mrs. Royce Fanchers for allowing us to have this summary of their trip through Central Europe. All the information came from her detailed diary of the trip. It is just possible that the story has been presented from a woman's viewpoint—and even that from a very trained viewpoint of a woman who has spent her adult life teaching kids how to sew, cook and do other things. At any rate, we are very grateful to Mrs. Fancher for supplying us with an interesting and cultured viewpoint of what their party saw in two weeks in Europe.)

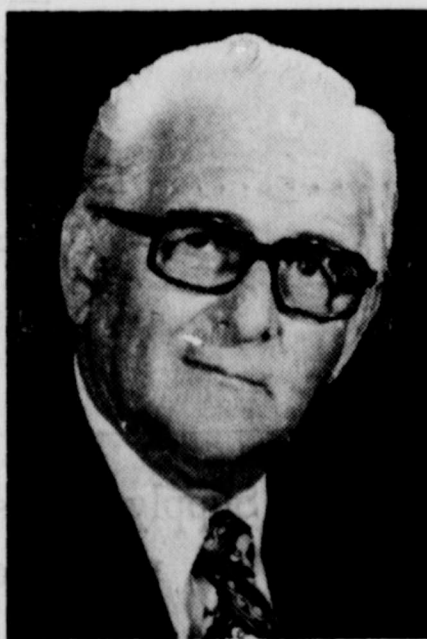

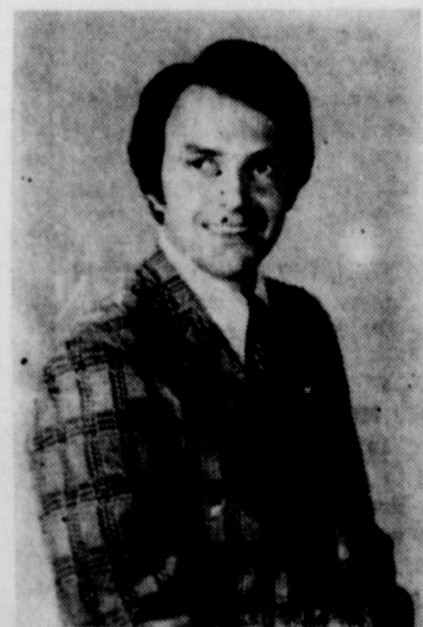

ORDINANCE

WHEREAS, the General Telephone Company of the Southwest has presented information indicating that present local exchange revenues at Bronte are not adequate; and

WHEREAS, application has been made for relief from this condition by an adjustment of its rates for local service; and

WHEREAS, under the conditions, said proposed schedule of rates appears to the City Council to be reasonable and just, and necessary to insure continued expansion and improvement of telephone service in Bronte; and

WHEREAS, the City Council recognizes the right of the General Telephone Company of the Southwest to earn a fair return on the fair value of its property devoted to the rendition of local exchange telephone service to the customers of Bronte.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRONTE, TEXAS:

Section 1: That General Telephone Company of the Southwest is hereby authorized to place into effect within the corporate limits of the City of Bronte on its August 16, 1975, billing date the following schedule of rates for local telephone service provided within its base rate area the rates contained in its Bronte Local Exchange Tariff for local telephone service provided outside its base rate area, and such

other charges and rates for services listed in its Texas General Exchange Tariff, as from time to time added to, deleted from, or in any manner changed.

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 KEY LINES: 22.90
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Section 3: The ordinance adopted March 1, 1973, and any other ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 4: That nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed in any manner, now or hereafter, as limiting, enlarging or otherwise modifying the statutory right and power of the City Council to lawfully regulate the rates charged by

the General Telephone Company of the Southwest for its services within the City of Bronte, Texas.
