Bronte School Enrollment Up

School Board Meets; Sets \$504,000 Budget

For the first time in the history of Bronte School the proposed budget for the 1975-76 school term exceeds a half million dollars. The budget approved at a recent hearing to consider 1975-76 expenditures amounted to \$504,099, which is some \$80,000 above the actual expenditures of last year.

The approved budget will include the expected revenue from

1975 taxes and will completely wipe out a \$17,453 carryover from last year.

At the Aug. 14 meeting of the board the 1974-75 budget was revised upward some \$11,000, from \$413,428 to \$424,078.

In other business, which held the board until the wee hours of the morning, the board:

- * Confirmed the employment of Brenda Tidwell as a full time teacher's aide and Sharon Strickland as a half-time teacher's aide.
- * Employed Bernice Sprengle and Barbara Ball as bus drivers.

- * Voted to enter into agreement with Region 15 Service Center for Migrant Student Services.

- * Appointed a Migrant Parental Advisory Committee, made up of Mmes. Billy Turner, Louis Baker Jr., Lydia Caesares, Cecil Ellis and Olivia Basquez; alternates, Mrs. Marvin Cobb and Mrs. Wilbur Ohlemacher.

- * Accepted a milk bid from Gandy's Dairies to buy milk for the lunchroom at 11 1/4 cents per half pint.

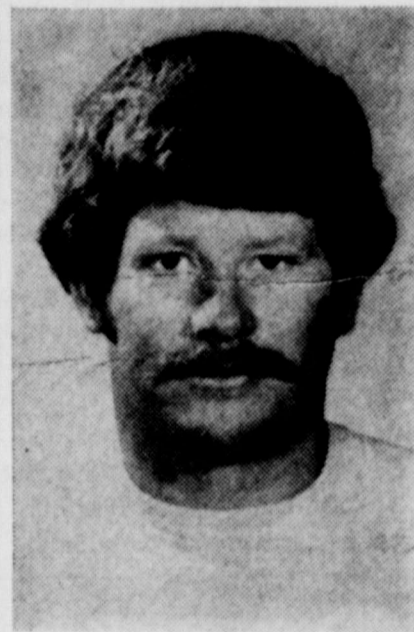
- * Received a letter from Secretary of State Mark White approving the combining of the Bronte and Tennyson voting boxes, effective for the April 10, 1976, trustee election.

- * Approved 102 seats to be reserved for football games for those who wish to buy them. They are seats 1-17 in Rows A, B, C, D, E and F. The seats must be purchased for all five home games.

- * Approved a Workmen's Compensation Plan which is required for all schools whose budgets exceed \$500,000.

- * Designated members to assist

Corley Named to A&I Coaching Staff for '75

Davis Corley who worked as an outstanding end on the Bronte Longhorn football squad for four years and was a star in the line of Texas Tech, has been named a football graduate assistant coach at Texas A&I University at Kingsville. He has been a coach in the Lubbock School System for the last two years.

Corley, a native of Bronte, will coach the defensive line for the Javelinas this fall.

He was offensive line coach at Lubbock Estacado High School last season under Pete Murray, who recently became head coach at H. M. King High School in Kingsville. Murray is a former Javalina assistant coach.

Corley is a 1973 graduate of Texas Tech and played four years with the Red Raiders. He was a defensive end for two years and played defensive tackle the other two seasons.

Corley is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Corley of Bronte.

The Rev. Charles Reuben Blake, 71 of Bronte died at 9:30 p.m. Friday at St. John's Hospital in San Angelo. Services were held at 3 p.m. Sunday in the First Baptist Church of Bronte.

Officiating were the Rev. Cecil Harper pastor, and the Rev. Harry Morris, former pastor. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Newby Funeral Home.

The Rev. Mr. Blake was born Aug. 10, 1904, in Gary. He served as pastor of the First Baptist Church in Bronte from 1944-1948, and had pastored the Tennyson Baptist Church for five years until his retirement this year.

He came to Coke County in 1944. He married Velma Lee Smith on Sept. 26, 1926, in Lubbock. He was a member of the Masonic Order, Post 962.

During his long career as a Baptist preacher he served churches in the following order: Petit, Cobelland, Tecula, Jacksonville, Rusk, Attoyac, Longview, Seal, Anton, Morton, Bronte, Sylvester, Woodrow, Wells, Welch, Pecos, Fort Davis, Miles and Tennyson.

Survivors include his wife; a daughter, Mrs. Dale Brown of Robert Lee; four sons, Charles Blake of Houston, Glenn and Orville Blake, both of Irving, and Fred Blake of Houston; a brother, the Rev. Fred Blake of Leveland; two sisters, Mrs. Claude Denton of Socorro, N. M., and Mrs. Nell Foster of Poteet; his mother, Mrs. Martha O. Blake of Bronte; and eight grandchildren.

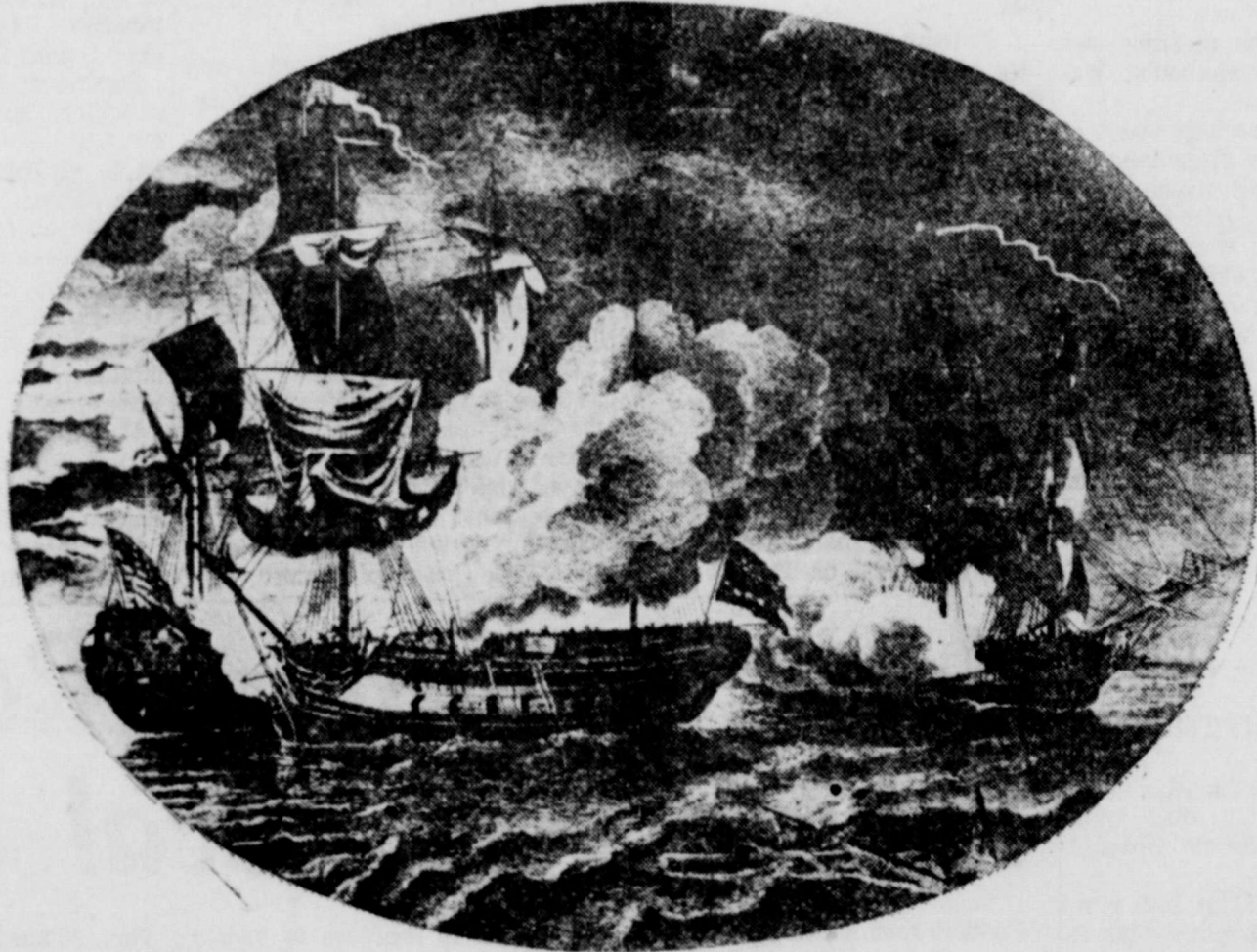

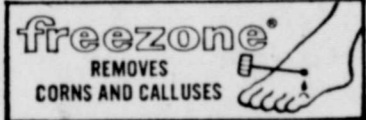

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POLICIES CITED ON FREE LUNCHES FOR SCHOOL KIDS

BRONTE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT BRONTE, TEXAS 1975-76

Bronte I. S. D. announced today its policy for free meals and free milk for children unable to pay the full price of meals and milk served under the National School Lunch and Special Milk Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for determining eligibility:

2	0-4,240
3	0-5,250
4	0-6,260
5	0-7,190
6	0-8,110

8	0-9,790

Each Additional Family Member \$750

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free meals and free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special medication expenses due to the mental or

physical condition of a child or disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy the building principals will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may make a request either orally or in writing to the Superintendent of Schools, Box 370, Bronte, telephone number 473-2511, for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

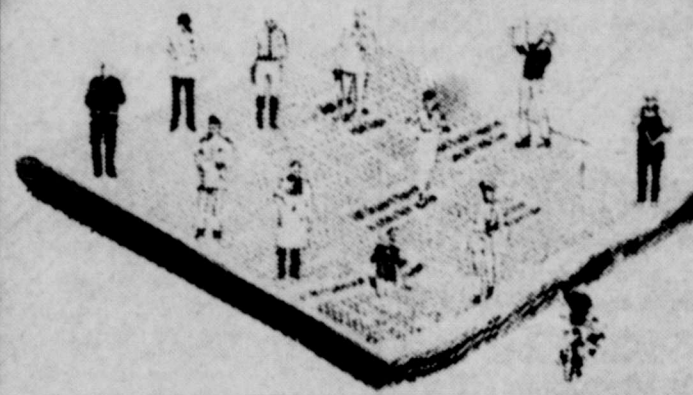

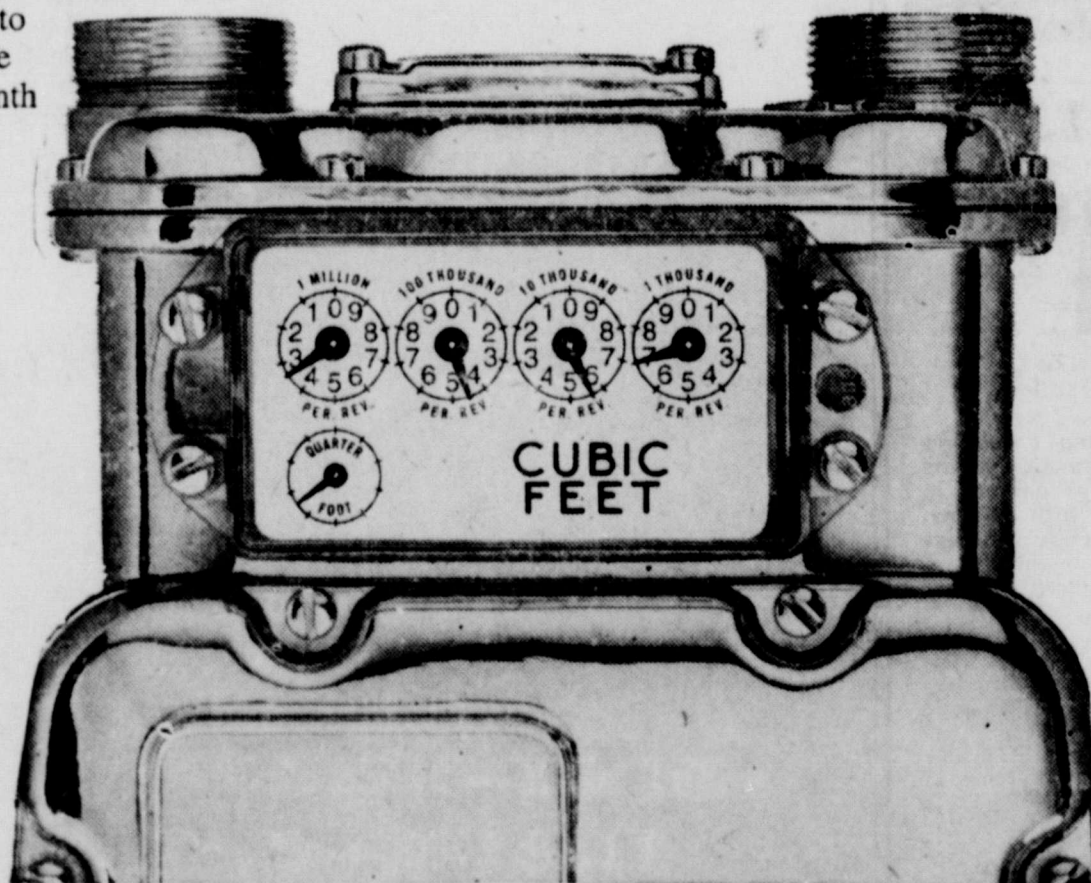
