Rep. Robert Krueger Visits Local Constituents

A good sized crowd was on hand Thursday afternoon to greet Congressman Robert Krueger when he made a stop in Bronte. First National Bank in Bronte hosted the gathering and President E. F. Glenn introduced constituents to Representative Krueger.

Following refreshments served by bank employees and mingling with the crowd, Krueger made a short impromptu speech. He told his audience what he was trying to do in Washington, and particularly pointed out that his effort to bring about an equalization in the prices of "new," "old" and "foreign" oil. The speaker noted that his proposal was defeated by only six votes, and he has high hopes he will be able to muster enough support to put it over during the

next session of the Congress.

Representative Krueger, who lives in New Braunfels, represents one of the largest districts in the

country and serves as the Washington spokesman for about a half million inhabitants. He said it was a great honor to serve the people of this area, and he will always vote on matters in the way he sees is best for his district and the country.

He pointed out that he is always glad to hear from constituents, by mail, phone, wire or in persons. The Congressman maintains four offices scattered over his mammoth district: at his home town in New Braunfels, at San Antonio, at Del Rio and San Angelo. He has a direct line running from the district offices to his office in Washington "and we can provide you with help or information many times in a matter of minutes."

The Congressman visited with a group at Robert Lee Thursday morning.

The Coke County women were killed about 12:30 p.m. Saturday in a one car accident about 9½ miles north of Bronte and 1¼ miles west of State Highway 70, on the Vernon Copeland ranch.

Fatally injured in the accident were Mrs. Charles Copeland, 88, and Abbie Love Windham, 72.

It was reported that the auto

ran off the roadway and struck a boulder. The two women were declared dead at the scene of the accident by Justice of the Peace Cecil Kemp. Highway Patrolman Bobby Hart investigated.

Services for Mrs. Copeland were held at 6 p.m. Sunday in the Blackwell Cemetery, directed by Newby Funeral Home.

She was born in May, 1887, in Brown County and came to Coke County in 1902. She was married to Charles Copeland in 1904 in Blackwell. He died in 1965.

Survivors include two sons, Shalor Copeland of Strawn and Vernon Copeland of Blackwell; a daughter, Mrs. Rhoda McCarley of Blackwell; seven grandchildren; nine great-grandchildren and three great-great-grandchildren.

No information was available on the services for Mrs. Windham, except they expected to be held in Tulia. She was a nurse and companion of Mrs. Copeland.

"Also, turkey rolls and roasts in foil pans are gaining favor as convenience items," said Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt, consumer marketing information specialist, added.

Of beef buys, "chuck cuts are good choices, and boneless rolled roasts, excellent for rotisserie cooking, are featured in some markets," she said.

At fruit counters cantaloupe and watermelon are in good supply at moderate prices, along with a wide variety of soft fruits—white seed-less grapes and nectarines.

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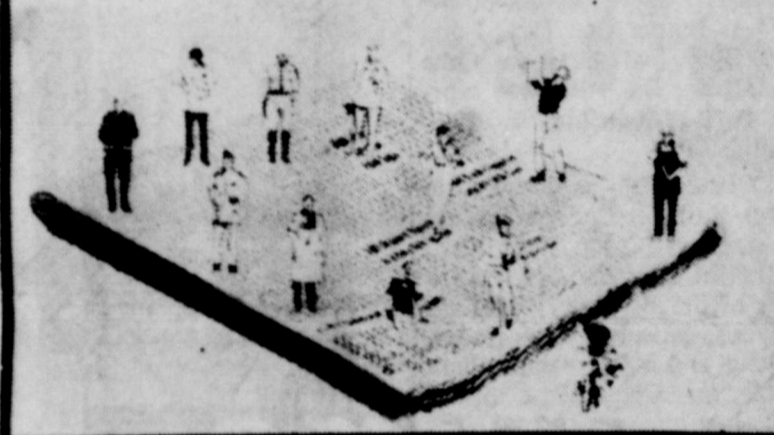

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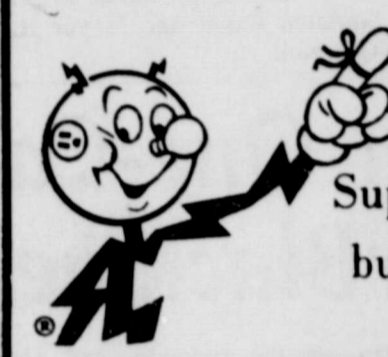

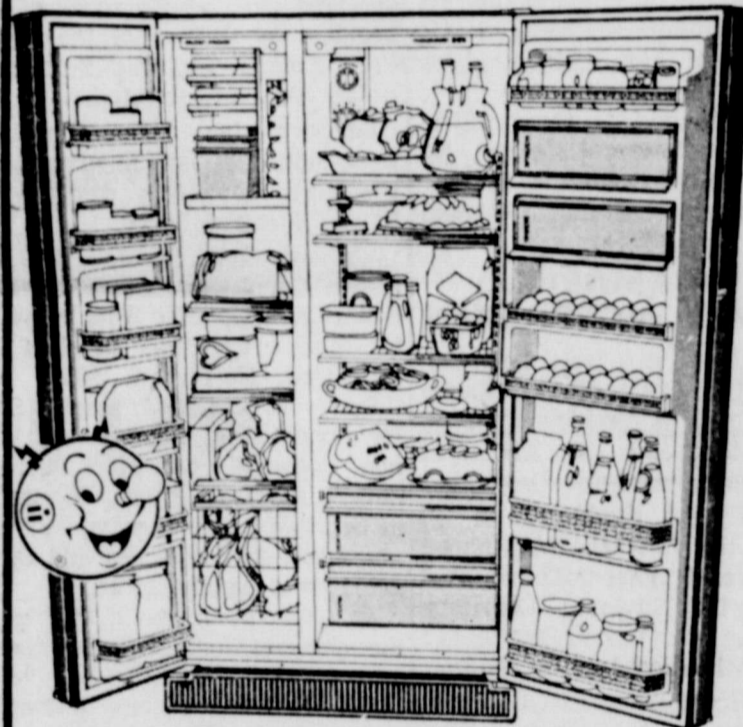

State Money Upped For Nursing Care

The Texas Legislature has approved a 19 per cent increase to the Department of Public Welfare that will result in vendor payments for ICF III type nursing care to be raised from \$454 to \$538 per month, effective Sept. 1, 1975. This increase was based on cost analysis from long term health facilities. Vendor payments for ICF II and skilled type facilities will be increased accordingly.

Most nursing homes will probably be raising their private rates to at least correlate with the new medicare vendor rates, said L. O. Clark, administrator of Bronte Nursing Home. One of the reasons, he said, for the large raise Sept. 1 is to help recover some of the impact of inflation over the last two years.

Wholesale prices for medical supplies have increased as follows: 1973, 13.2 per cent; 1974, 18.8 per cent; January through June, 1975, 2.4 per cent.

The Bronte Chapter of the Future Homemakers of America had their first meeting of the new school year and elected officers for 1975-76. About 30 persons were present.

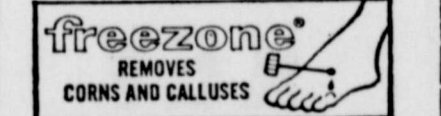

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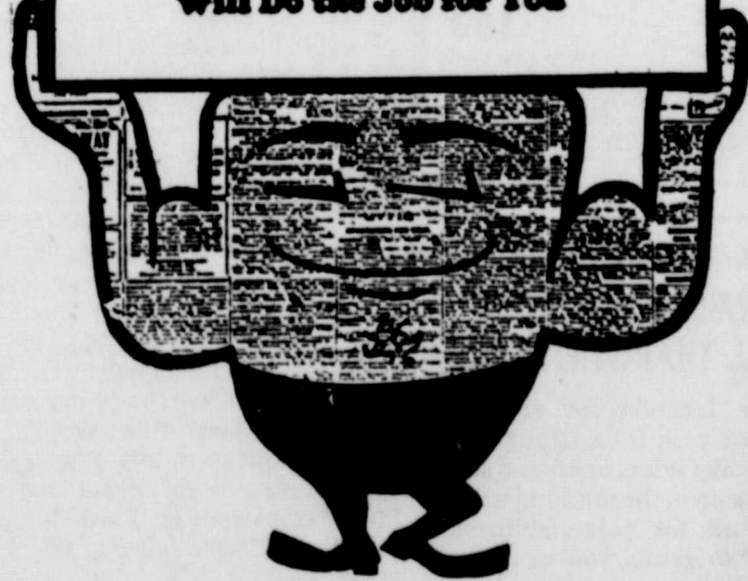

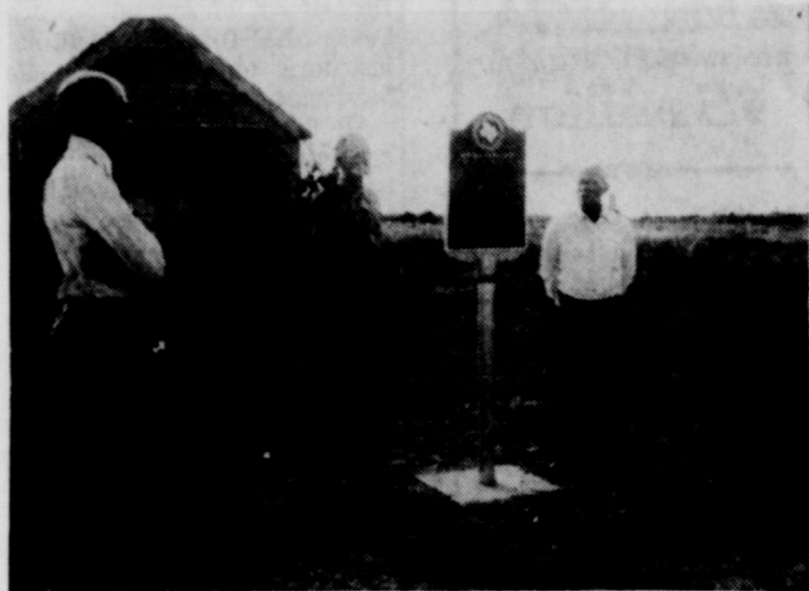

AN ORDINANCE FIXING AND DETERMINING THE GENERAL SERVICE RATE TO BE CHARGED FOR SALES OF NATURAL GAS TO RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL CONSUMERS WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF BRONTE, COKE COUNTY, TEXAS, AND PROVIDING FOR THE MANNER IN WHICH SUCH RATE MAY BE CHANGED, ADJUSTED AND AMENDED BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF BRONTE:

SECTION 1. Effective with the first gas bills rendered from and after thirty (30) days from the date of final passage of this ordinance the maximum general service rate for sales of natural gas rendered to residential and commercial consumers within the city limits of Bronte by Lone Star Gas Company a Texas Corporation, its successors and assigns, is hereby fixed and determined as follows:

First 1,000 Cu. Ft. or Fraction Thereof \$3.1277 Gross; \$2.8149 Net.
 Next 3,000 Cu. Ft. @ \$1.8388 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.6549 Per Mcf Net
 Next 6,000 Cu. Ft. @ \$1.7277 Per Mcf; \$1.5549 Per Mcf Net
 Next 15,000 Cu. Ft. @ \$1.6388 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.4749 Per Mcf Net
 Next 75,000 Cu. Ft. @ \$1.5832 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.4249 Per Mcf Net
 Over 100,000 Cu Ft. @ \$1.5499 Per Mcf Gross; \$1.3949 Per Mcf Net

No gas bill will be rendered to any residential or commercial consumer served under the above rate not consuming any gas during any monthly billing period, except that where customer's only use for gas service, is in an outdoor grill and-or a fireplace starter, the amount shown for the first consumption block shall constitute a minimum monthly bill.

ADJUSTMENTS

The amount of each net monthly bill computed at the above-stated rates shall be subject to the following adjustments: Plus or minus the amount of any increase or decrease, respectively, above or below the \$1.0399 per Mcf level in the intracompany city gate charge as authorized by the Railroad Commission of the State of Texas or other regulatory body having jurisdiction for gas delivered to Lone Star Gas Company's distribution system for sale to residential and commercial consumers where such changes are

caused by increases or decreases in the cost of gas purchased by the Company; plus an amount equivalent to the proportionate part of any new tax or increased tax, or any other governmental imposition, rental, fee or charge (except state, county, city and special district ad valorem taxes and taxes on net income) levied, assessed or imposed subsequent to July 1, 1975, upon or allocable to the Company's distribution operations, by any new or amended law, ordinance or contract. Each gross monthly bill shall be adjusted proportionately. Company at its option may forego the application of any adjustment if such adjustment would result in an increase in the monthly bill; however failure of Company to apply any adjustment shall not constitute a waiver of Company's right from time to time or at any time, to make any adjustment, in whole or in part, in any subsequent current monthly bill that may be applicable to such bill.

Net rate shall apply to all bills paid within ten days from monthly billing date; gross rate shall be applicable thereafter.

The above rate is applicable to each residential and commercial consumer per meter per month or

for any part of a month for which gas is used at the same location.

In addition to the aforesaid rates, Company shall have the right to collect such reasonable charges as are necessary to conduct its business and to carry out its reasonable rules and regulations in effect.

SECTION 2. The rate set forth in Section 1 may be changed and amended by either the City or Company furnishing gas in the manner provided by law. Service hereunder is subject to the orders of regulatory bodies having jurisdiction, and to the Company's Rules and Regulations currently on file in the Company's office.

SECTION 3. It is hereby found and determined that the meeting at which this ordinance was passed was open to the public as required by Texas law, and that advance public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given.

FINALLY PASSED AND APPROVED on third reading on this the 7th day of August A. D. 1975.

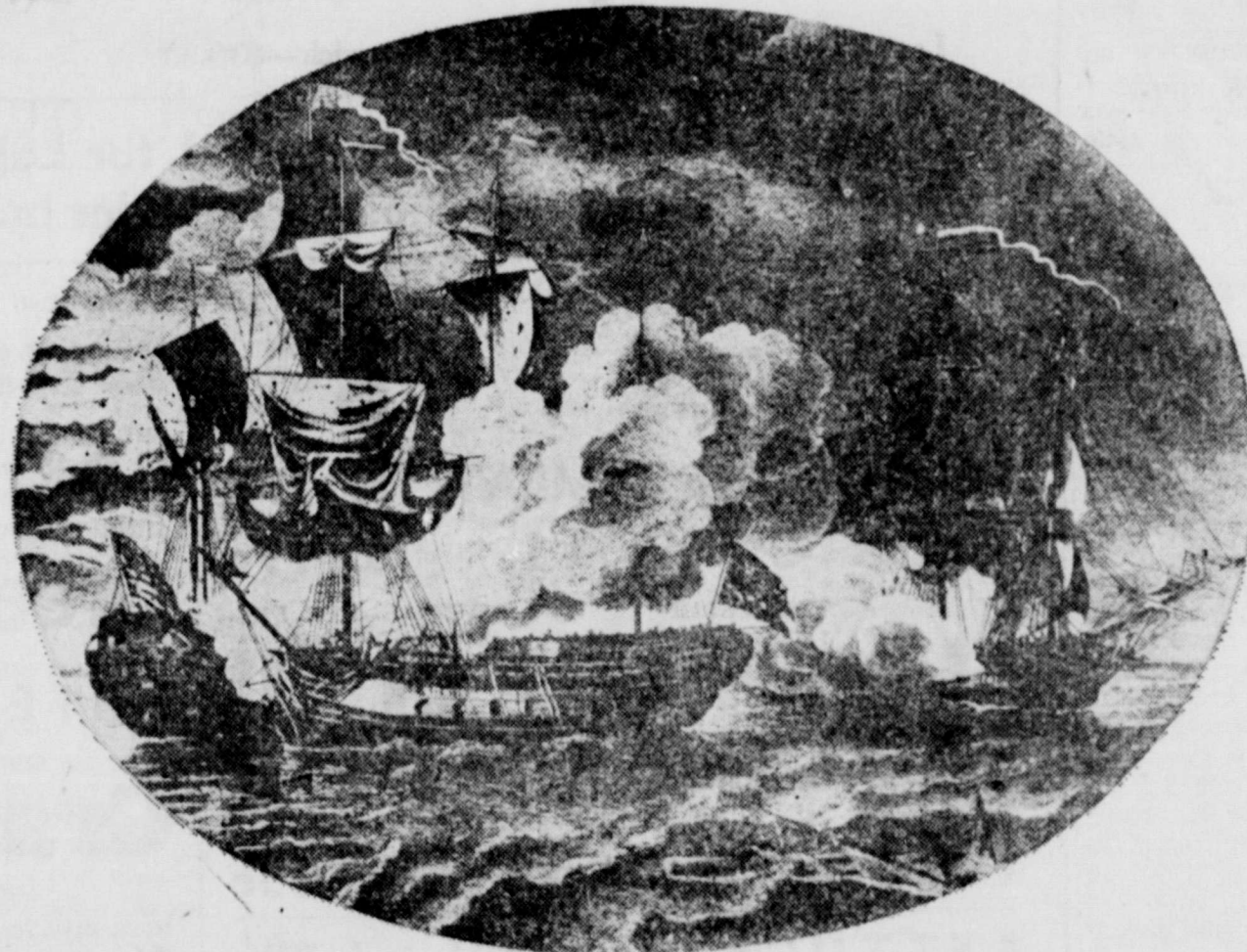
