record to 4-0 and gave them a District 3-B win as they opened defense of their 1974 title.

SCD DIRECTOR TO BE ELECTED

This is the year to elect a person from Zone 2 to serve as a director of the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District. The election will be held Monday, Oct. 13, at 7:30 p.m. at the Community Center in Bronte.

Zone 2 includes the land in the northeast part of Coke County. It includes the land north of the Colorado River and all of the land in Commissioner Precinct 2.

All land owners in Zone 2, both man and wife, are eligible to vote. Directors serve a five year term. They help administer soil and water conservation programs within the district.

Refreshments and a short program will be provided following the election.

All land owners in the northeast part of the district are urged to attend and participate in the operations of the Coke County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Horns Nip Hawley, 15-13

The Bronte Longhorns overcame a 13-0 halftime score to capture their fourth straight win of the season, 15-13, over the fired up Hawley Bearcats. The game was played last Friday night at Hawley and got the Horns off on the right foot in District 3-B play.

The first two quarters of play and the last two were almost like watching two different ball games. The inspired Bearcats completely dominated the Longhorns the first half to carry a 13-0 score to the locker room. The second half, on the other hand was all Longhorns. However, numerous turnovers by the Bronte lads kept the game close. But with just a minute remaining in the contest the Longhorns scored the winning TD and then fought off a last minute surge by the Bearcats to take the win.

First Quarter

The Longhorns' Clint Porter kicked off to start the ball game and boomed the ball into the end zone with a return out to the 10. Three plays later Hawley was forced to punt and the Horns had the ball at their own 40.

The Longhorns picked up one 1st down and then committed the first of eight turnovers when Hawley recovered a loose ball at the Bronte 46. Five plays later the Bearcats had put the first points on the board and following the extra point kick led 7-0 with less than half the first quarter gone.

Following the kickoff to Turney Coulter the Horns once again coughed up the ball and the Bear-

cats were in business at the Bronte 32. The Horn defense got tough and Hawley punted to Wayne Coalson at his 5 with a return to the 15. Bronte was penalized back to the 10 for clipping and following two carries by T. Coulter and another by Nelson Coulter, were forced to punt. Coalson's kick rolled dead at the Hawley 48.

Second Quarter

Three plays later the Bearcats punted the ball back and the Horns had it at their own 32. They couldn't move and a bad snap on 4th down gave Hawley the ball at Bronte's 23 yard line. This time it only took three plays for the Bearcats to score. The EP try was no good and the score was 13-0.

N. Coulter almost broke the following kickoff only to have a Bearcat trip him up at the Bronte 49. The Coulter boys carried for a 1st at the Hawley 40. Three straight tries by T. Coulter carried to the 33. Then a 4th down pitchout went astray and Hawley took over at their 37.

Following a Hawley punt the Longhorns once again turned the ball over at their 23. The defense dug in and pushed the Bearcats back to the 31 where they punted into the end zone. The Longhorns ran two plays before the half ended with the score Hawley 13, Bronte 0.

Third Quarter

T. Coulter had a fine runback of the second half kickoff, carrying it out to his 45. N. Coulter car-

ried for 5 and 14 and then Kerwin Denton picked up 6. N. Coulter made the 1st at the 25. Following two short gains N. Coulter found Randy Parker at the 6 to bring up 1st and goal. Two plays later the Horns once again fumbled and Hawley recovered at their 8.

Following a Hawley punt the Longhorns went to work and helped by a personal foul penalty moved the ball to the 33. Denton picked up 5 and N. Coulter 9 for a 1st. Then the Coulter brothers moved the ball to the 4 from where T. Coulter took a quick pitch for the score and the Horns were behind 13-6. The same quick pitch worked for 2 extra points and the Horns had closed the gap to 13-8.

Porter kicked off and Hawley drew a 15 yard clipping penalty to move the ball back to the 13. The Longhorns, playing with more fire now, held the Bearcats and the 4th down punt rolled dead at the Hawley 45.

Two plays later an N. Coulter pass was picked off at the Bronte 32. Hawley drew another 15 yard penalty to move the ball back to the 47 as the quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter

The Bearcats were forced to punt and put the Horns in a hole as the ball rolled out of bounds at the 4. Following one 1st down Coalson boomed a punt 44 yards to the Hawley 39. The Longhorn defense once again got tough and Randy Leigh broke through to

night's game with Hawley was almost more than the Longhorns could overcome. If the Horns hope to repeat as District Champs, they are going to have to start executing better and showing more spirit and desire than they did against the Bearcats.

The Sands Mustangs, this week's opponent, have been easy pickin's for the Longhorns in the past, but tonight's game could be a different story. The Mustangs have a 2-1-1 record and are 1-0 in district after whipping Forsan 19-7 last week. Their other win was over Garden City by a whopping 61-0 score. The Mustang lineup includes several seniors who must remember the thrashings the Horns gave them the last three years, which could give them an even greater incentive to whip the Longhorns.

In Praise Of The Devil

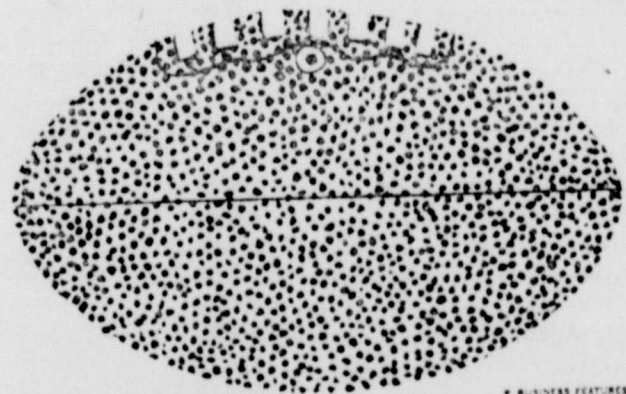

"Halloween (in Britain) was thought to be the most favorable opportunity for divination... It was the one day on which the help of the devil was invoked"—Encyc. Britannica. "It is associated with supernatural (demonic) influences, and clearly a relic of pagan times"—Encyc. Americana. Many, if not most, Halloween practices have come down from the ancient demon-worshipping Druids. They believed that black cats were reincarnated human beings. FOR ALL THAT DO THESE THINGS ARE AN ABOMINATION TO THE LORD." Deut. 18:10-12. Yet virtually all these evils are associated with Halloween. "But we only do it in fun and make-believe," you may object. God says, "Don't do it, period." God knows what you may not, that you can't get involved in Satanic practices without a positive and sure danger of getting hooked by the devil. 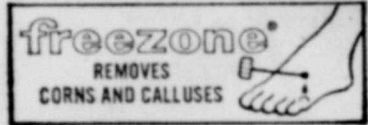

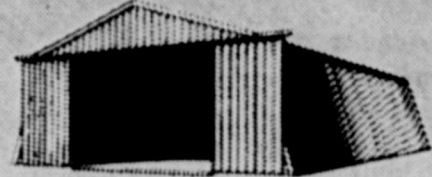
