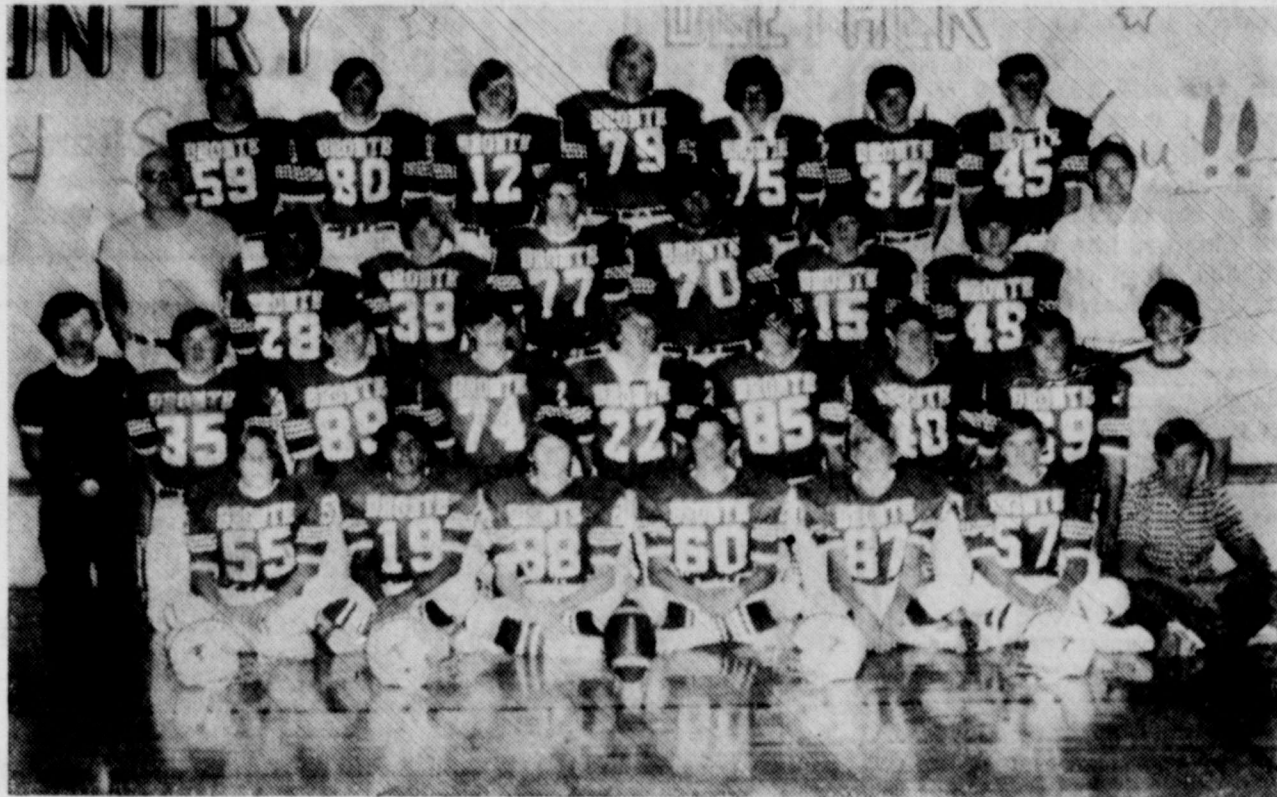

1975 Longhorns—Complete Successful Season Tonight

## Horns, Forsan In Season Finale

The Bronte Longhorns will close out the 1975 season tonight when they host arch-rival Forsan. The Horns, who have had an outstanding season, will be going after victory number nine. They have lost only one time. Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m.

The Longhorns and Buffaloes have developed quite a rivalry over the past several seasons with both teams going all out against the other. This will be the last years, however, for the two elev-

ens to be competing in the same district, as the Longhorns have been moved from 3-B to 6-B. They will continue to meet each other, however, and will vie in the season opener next year.

Forsan will be coming off a loss to the Jayton Jaybirds by a score of 27-14. They will bring a season record of 2-6-1 into the game and a conference mark of 2-3-1. The Longhorn-Buffalo game could be one of the better ones of the entire season.

The Longhorns will be striving to finish the season with a 9-1 record. Following their only loss two weeks ago to Jayton, the Horns came back strong last week to outscore Sterling City 34-18. The win moved their conference record to 5-1 and assured them a second place finish. The Jayton Jaybirds clinched a playoff spot last week when they downed Forsan.

Eight Longhorns will be seeing their final action in a Bronte uniform. The eight have played on Longhorn teams which have accumulated a 32 win and 9 loss record over the past 4 years. Four of the seniors have lettered all four years. They include Nelson Coulter, Kerwin Denton, Mark Lee and Kyle Lee. The other seniors are Bobby Frazier, Kevin Gibbs, Billy Ren Lee and Eddie Angel.

This week finds Sands at Sterling; Forsan at Bronte; Hawley at Roby; and Loraine at Jayton.

The Bronte Longhorn girl volleyballers are once again the district champs. The local girls, who have dominated district action the past several years, downed Eula 15-0 and 15-6 to win the crown. The district playoff was held Tuesday at Rose Field House on the

campus of Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene. The girls are coached by Zula Sweeten.

The win advanced the volleyballers to the regional tourney to be held Thursday, Nov. 20, on the campus of Tarleton State University in Stephenville. The girls will play an opponent yet to be determined at 9:45 a.m. Should they win, another match will be played at 11 a.m. The regional finals are scheduled for 1:30 p.m. with the winner advancing to the state meet in Austin.

Mary was more than a fine nurse; she was an artist of more than ordinary talent and she was a gardener with an extremely green thumb.

Besides all that, she could make the best enchiladas we have ever eaten.

Her death is a great loss to her family and to this community, and will leave a void in many places.

Fishing was good and so was the weather here at Oak Creek Lake this past week. It's not too often we get both at the same time, but we'll take more of this anytime it comes along.

Bass fishing was up and down, fair at times, and just down right good at others. The Clovis, N. M., Bass Club was here over the weekend, and they found the fishing fair. L. D. Rothwell of Clovis took top honors with a total of 13 lbs., 14 oz.

Tuesday was the day. Where I was fishing I had the lake all to myself. Running a spinner bait on top. I caught 25 bass between 3 p.m. and sundown. It's been awhile since I found better fishing.

There were some fine strings of channel cat caught from the fishing dock all week. The top fish was caught on the weekend by J. B. Driver of Lamesa. This fish was also the largest channel cat caught from the dock this year at 9 lbs., 10 ozs.

Crappie fishing wasn't bad, but we didn't see or weigh any big barn door crappie. Trotline fishing was just as good as any fishing we had. Lines baited with live bait caught the best fish as usual. J. C. Collins of Midland took the top fish with a 26 pound yellow cat.

This lake is in perfect condition, and my guess is we're going to have some fine fishing during the month of November.

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**GRADE SCHOOLERS PAINT SCENES FOR CHRISTMAS SEALS**

Christmas Seals—An annual tradition in America's fight against lung disease for almost seven decades—have a youthful "new look" this year. Mrs. Billy Joe Luckett, Lung Association board member, revealed to the newspapers of Coke County that for the first time, they've been designed by school children throughout the United States.

The board of the Big Country Lung Association of Texas got a preview of the 1975 seals at their area meeting in San Angelo. Mrs. Luckett pointed out that the Texas seal is located number one on the sheet of seals being mailed to millions of citizens of the United States.

Tim Cole, a student at Winn Elementary School in Austin, designed the original painting from which the art for the 1975 Texas seal was chosen.

The 54 original paintings chosen for the seals have become the property of the American Lung Association and will hang in a special exhibition in the National Collection of Fine Arts in Washington, D. C., from Nov. 14, 1975, through Jan. 4, 1976.

Mrs. Luckett said this week, "I was glad to see something like this children's art project done with the seals. We were the first voluntary health association in this country, and we've always been interested in healthy lungs for people, particularly children. We've always been involved in school health; this is the place to develop good health habits.

"Our main work is in education, educating the public and professionals. Since our goal is the control and prevention of lung disease, I think it is also important that we are involved in programs to get rid of the causes such as smoking and air pollution.

"Of the funds raised through the Christmas Seal campaign, 90 per cent remains in Texas. The other 10 per cent supports the national organization with a sizeable portion of that earmarked for medical research and training.

"No outside professional fund raisers are involved in the drive and all donations are tax exempt under IRS rulings."

The 32 county Big Country Office is located at 1962 W. Beauregard in San Angelo.

Citizens of Coke County are urged to contribute liberally when they receive their 1975 Christmas seals.

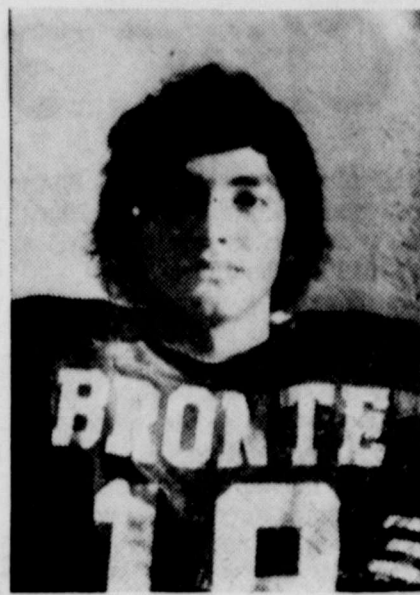

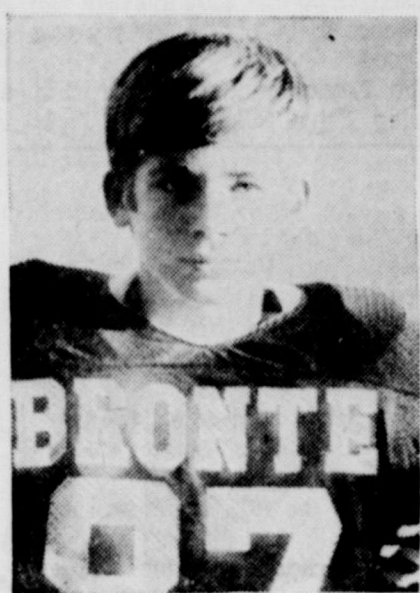

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# Longhorns Outscore Sterling City, 34-18

The Bronte Longhorns scored in every quarter to whip the Sterling City Eagles 34-18 in a District 3-B game played here last Friday night. The win pushed the Horns' record to 8-1 and their conference standing to 5-1.

The Longhorns and Eagles both put forth good efforts in last week's ball game. There was hard hitting on both sides as well as some good offensive play. Except for a mental lapse by the Eagles on a Longhorn kickoff the score could have been much closer.

## First Quarter

Wayne Coalson returned the Sterling City kickoff out to the Longhorn 28. The Horns immediately went to work with Nelson Coulter picking up 11 yards. He then completed passes of 6 yards to Kevin Gibbs and 34 yards to Randy Parker. Following an incomplete pass Coulter kept the ball himself and raced 21 yards for the score. A Coulter to Mark Lee pass was good for 2 extra points and the Horns led 8-0 with less than two minutes gone.

Following Coalson's kickoff the Eagles were penalized 5 yards to bring up 1st and 15. Jeff Copeland, who played a fine game for Sterling, carried three times for 12 yards and then he punted to the Horns 22. Kerwin Denton picked up

2 and Coalson 2 and a 3rd down pass went incomplete. Coalson's punt was blocked and the Eagles took over at the Horns 28.

The Eagles picked up one 1st down before the Horns dug in and held at the 20. The Longhorns picked up one 1st down before Coalson punted to the Eagle 40.

## Second Quarter

Sterling moved to the Bronte 46 before being forced to punt. A bad snap on the punt attempt turned the ball over to the Horns on the Eagles 36. The Longhorns were forced to punt with Sterling taking over at their 20. The Eagles again had to punt, with Coalson returning it 40 yards to the Sterling 18. Denton made 10. Billy Ren Lee carried for 1 and then got the remaining 7 on the next play to run the score to 14-0. The EP try was no good.

The Eagles mounted their first scoring drive following the kick-

off. Several running plays moved the ball out to the Bronte 47 and then two straight pass completions placed the ball at the Horns 9. Boots Demere carried the ball on a quarterback sneak for the TD with only 5 seconds remaining in the half. Copeland carried for the 2 EPs and the halftime score was 14-8.

## Third Quarter

A poor punt following the second half kickoff set the Horns up in good field position at the Sterling 20. B. Lee, Denton and Coulter carried once each to move the ball to the 1 where Coulter carried it in for 6 more points. The EP run again failed to leave the score at 20-8.

The score only remained at that figure long enough for Eddie Angel to kick the ball into the end zone and while Eagle players stood around looking at it Bobby Frazee fell on it for the TD to

make the tally 26-8. Extra point try again was no good.

Angel's kickoff again went into the end zone but this time the Eagles got it out to the 12. Copeland picked up a 1st at the 24. Following two short runs Copeland got off a 55 yard quick kick to put the Horns in a hole at their own 15. Bronte picked up one 1st at the 38 before a bad snap on 4th down sailed over Coalson's head into the end zone. Coalson picked up the ball but was brought down for a safety to bring the score to 26-10.

## Fourth Quarter

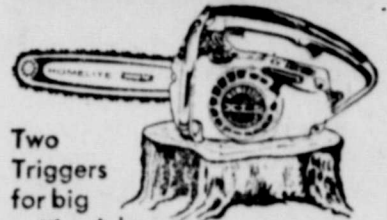
Following the free kick Sterling started a good drive which carried from their 43 to the Horns 5. On fourth and goal M. Lee picked off an Eagle pass and ran it out to the Sterling 18. Then lightning struck as Coulter hit Parker at the 50 and Parker outran his pursuers for an 82 yard scoring play. Coalson carried for 2 extra points and the Horns now had a safe 34-10 lead.

The Eagles couldn't move following the kickoff and Copeland got off a fine punt to the Horns 5. Disaster struck on the 3rd down as Sterling recovered a loose pigskin at the 3. Copeland got 2 yards on the first attempt and

the final yard on his next try to bring the score to 34-16. A run on the EP try was good and the margin was cut to 34-18.

The Longhorns ran three plays following the kickoff before the final gun sounded. The final figures on the scoreboard were 34-18.

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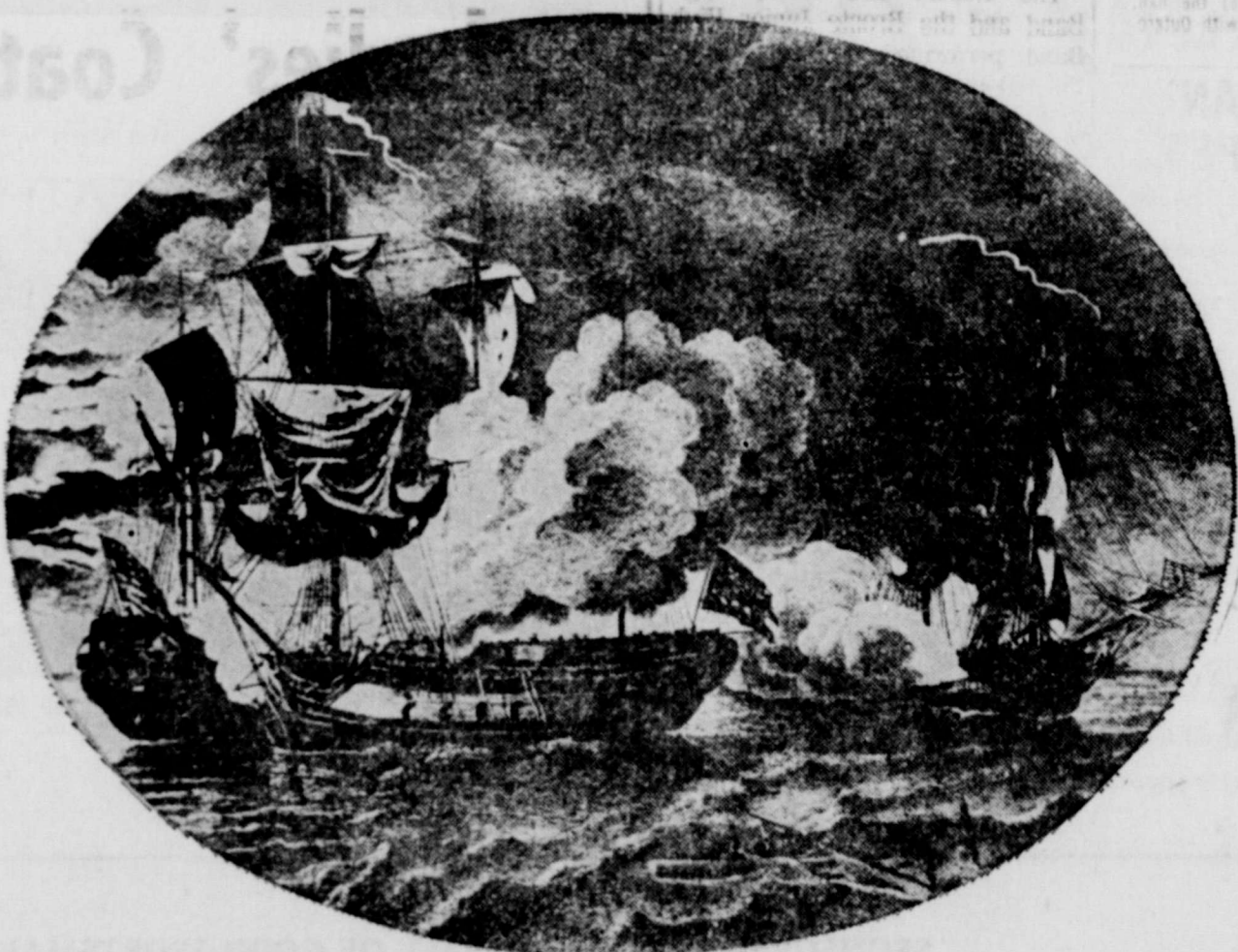


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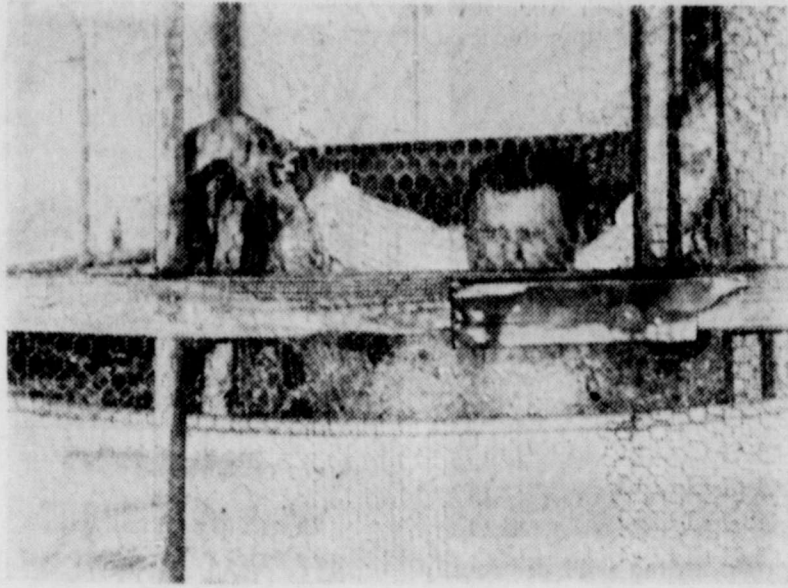

**DOROTHY HEANER'S CAKE RECIPE GOOD FOR HOLIDAY EATING**

I had a short visit a few mornings ago with Bobbie Arrott and she insisted I try a piece of the cake she had made. She made a pot of coffee and cut me a piece of cake which she said was made from a recipe supplied to her by Dorothy Heaner. It was delicious and was one of those cakes you mix in the pan and that makes cleaning up easy.

Here is Dorothy's recipe:

**Apple Butter Cake**

- 1/2 cup butter
  - 1 1/4 cups flour
  - 1 cup sugar
  - 2 teaspoons cinnamon
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1/2 cup apple butter
  - 8 1/2 oz. crushed pineapple (undrained)
  - 1 cup chopped walnuts or pecans
  - 1 teaspoon soda
  - 1 egg
  - 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Melt butter, add other ingredients. Mix in pan with a fork. Cook at 325 degrees for 40 to 45 minutes in a 9 inch square pan. Sounds simple, doesn't it? But the piece I ate was more delicious than the simplicity of the recipe.

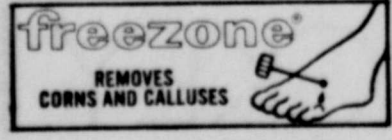

**ORDINANCE RELATING TO ANIMALS**

Section 1: Definitions. As used in this ordinance the following terms mean:

**Owner:** Any person, partnership or corporation owning, keeping or harboring animals.

**Animal:** Any living creature, domestic or wild, including but not limited to, cattle, horses, swine, goat's, dogs, cats and poultry of every type.

**Person:** An individual, partnership, company or corporation.

Section 2: Cruelty. No person shall cruelly treat any animal in the city in any way; any person who inhumanely beats, underfeeds, overloads, or abandons any animal shall be deemed guilty of a violation of this section.

Section 3: Noises. It shall be unlawful to harbor or keep any animals within the city which disturb the peace by loud or unusual noises at any time of the day or night.

Section 4: Nuisances. All animals shall be kept under restraint at all times either by a leash or by being kept in an enclosure. It shall be unlawful to permit any animal to run at large in the city; any such animal running at large in any public place in city is hereby declared to be a nuisance and shall be impounded in the manner provided in this ordinance. It shall further be unlawful to picket or tie any such animal in any of

the streets of the city for the purpose of grazing or feeding.

Section 5: Killing dangerous animals. All law enforcement officers are hereby authorized to kill any dangerous animals of any kind when it is necessary for the protection of any person or property.

Section 6: Housing. It shall be unlawful to cause or to allow any stable or place where any animal is or may be kept to become unclean, unwholesome, or unsanitary.

Section 7: Impounding. Unrestrained animals or animals at large may be taken by any law enforcement officer and impounded in an appropriate place and there confined in a humane manner. Impounded animals shall be kept for not less than five days unless reclaimed by their owners. If the owner can be identified, the city hall shall immediately upon impoundment notify the owner by telephone or mail of the impoundment of the animal. Animals not claimed by their owners within five days shall be sold or otherwise humanely disposed of.

Section 8: Redemption from pound. An owner reclaiming an impounded animal shall pay a fee of \$5.00 plus \$3.00 for each day that the animal has been impounded, to a total maximum fee of \$70.00. The owner may also be proceeded against for violation of this ordinance.

Section 9: Returning animal to owner if known. Notwithstanding

the provisions of Section 7, if an animal is found at large and its owner can be identified and located, such animal need not be impounded but may, instead, be taken to the owner. In such case, the peace officer shall notify the city of the violation of this ordinance and he may also proceed against the owner for violation of this ordinance.

Section 10: Rabies inoculation. It shall be the duty and responsibility of the owner or person in custody of any dog or cat kept in the city to have the dog or cat inoculated against rabies at least once each year. Failure to do so is a violation of this ordinance.

Section 11: Penalty. Any person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this ordinance shall be fined not less than \$10.00 nor more than \$200.00 and a separate offense shall be deemed committed on each day during or on which a violation occurs or continues.
