

January 9, 1976 Old Edith Store **Destroyed by Fire** Published Every Friday at Bronte, Coke County, Texas 76933

A Coke County landmark for almost 40 years was destroyed by flame early last Friday morning. The old Edith Store Building owned by Theresa Phillips and located about 8 miles west of Robert Lee on the Sterling City Highway, was a total loss.

The Robert Lee Volunteer Fire Dept. was alerted at 4:45 a.m. Friday but by the time the firemen arrived there was little left of the wood frame building or its contents. Because of hazards presented by nearby gasoline storage tanks and downed electrical lines. no attempt was made to extinguish the ruins.
