Stock Show Big Success

Another successful Coke County Livestock Show was held Monday at the show barn in Robert Lee and a large crowd was on hand for the events of the day.

The 1976 edition was one of the largest ever with 79 youth participating with their 182 animals competing for top honors. Of the 79 4-H and FFA Chapter members, there were 47 with sheep (121 sheep), 19 with pigs (43 pigs) and 13 with cattle (18 cattle).

Seventy-seven of the young people participated in the premium sale. The Champion Steer was top seller and brought a \$200 premium over market price. Total of the sale held following the show was \$3255.

Ronnie Wagner, Robert Lee FFA, showed the grand champion market swine, a heavyweight Duroc. Wagner is the son of Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Wagner.

Cindy Walker, 4-H Club Robert Lee and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D. J. Walker, showed the Reserve Champion Duroc and Reserve Breeding Swine.

Champion Other Purebred was shown by Terry Joe Millican, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wilbern Millican. He is a 4-H member.

Tom Ensor of the Bronte 4-H Club took top honors in the fine-wool division of the sheep show while Cody McClure, another Bronte 4-Her and son of Mr. and Mrs. J. P. McClure, had the Reserve finewool lamb. Ensor also showed the Champion medium wool lamb, the Reserve Crossbred lamb and the Reserve Southdown lamb. Kathy Ensor had the Cham-

pion Southdown lamb and Bill Ensor took Reserve honors with his medium wool lamb. They are the sons and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. Lee Ensor of Bronte. Robert Ball, also Bronte 4-H and son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy J. Ball, showed the Champion Crossbred lamb.

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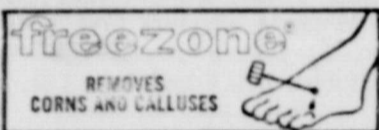

ALIENS REQUIRED TO MAKE REPORT DURING JANUARY

Joe F. Staley of the San Antonio Immigration and Naturalization Service has again reminded all aliens to report their addresses during January.

Cards with which to make the reports are available at Post Offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service throughout the country. The reports must be submitted in person to one of those offices.

Parents or guardians are required to submit reports for alien children under 14 years of age.

Staley urges all aliens to report before the end of January, as willful failure to do so may lead to serious penalties.

Old Edith Store Destroyed by Fire

A Coke County landmark for almost 40 years was destroyed by flame early last Friday morning. The old Edith Store Building owned by Theresa Phillips and located about 8 miles west of Robert Lee on the Sterling City Highway, was a total loss.

The Robert Lee Volunteer Fire Dept. was alerted at 4:45 a.m. Friday but by the time the firemen arrived there was little left of the wood frame building or its contents. Because of hazards presented by nearby gasoline storage tanks and downed electrical lines, no attempt was made to extinguish the ruins.

King "Boots" Ransom, who lives near the building, told firemen that he was awakened by the sound of the fire and drove to the home of Royce Phillips who in turn phoned in the alarm.

At the time of the fire and in recent years, the building housed a store and bait stand, selling mainly camping and fishing supplies, gasoline, etc., being leased and operated the past two years by E. A. "Dink" Lanier. The business was previously operated by Phillips and prior to that by Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Tierce.

According to information obtained from present and past residents of the Edith community, the building was moved to its present location from Water Valley in 1937 by D. A. Neal and his son, Loren Neal, who opened the business, also moving a small store and the Edith Post Office into the building from the Ralph Garvin place about one mile north. The Neals ran the general store and post office until the early 40s when it was acquired by Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Theford who operated it until 1951 when it was leased to Mr. and Mrs. Pinnell Smith. Mrs. Smith was the last Edith postmaster, as the post office was closed in 1953. The building was subsequently bought by Coke County in 1958 and was used as an equipment yard and storage for Precinct 3. In 1969 it was sold by the county to Ernest Varnadore, who shortly afterwards sold it to the Tierces and it was then converted back to use as a store.

There was no way to determine how the fire originated.

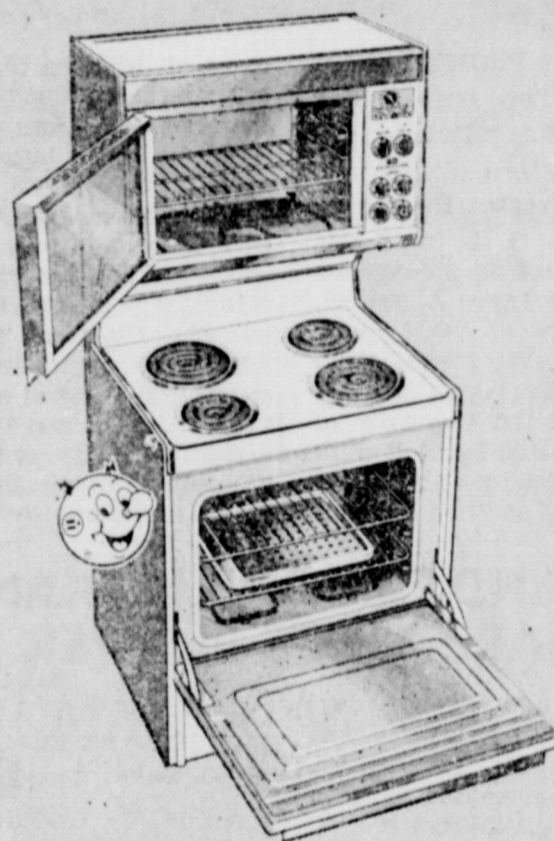
