TEACHER CONTRACTS EXTENDED BY BOARD

Bronte School's Board of Trustees met in regular session the main item of business was to re-hire teachers. All the teachers contracts were extended through the 1977-78 school year with the exception of a few whose salaries are dependent on approval of special programs.

Contracts extended included those of Wanda Barbee, Denise Boyd Jean Fancher Liz Golsen, Rita Hale, Ben Hambricht, Ann Hamilton, Wayne King, Mary Lawhon, Jean Raughton, Gerald Sandusky, Bob Shields, Jo Beth Shields, Zula Sweeten, Louis Thornton, Lynda

Thornton, Molly Weathers and Gary York.

Some contracts of special teachers are extended only one year at a time, including those of Delma Ensor, special education; Pat Rawlings, migrant education; and L. vonne Sims, Title I instructor.

Auxiliary personnel of the school will be considered at the April meeting of the board. Contracts of Supt. C. B. Barbee and Prins. James L. Golsen and James M. Raughton were extended at previous board meetings.

In other business the board:

* Approved a written report to the Texas Education Agency approving 1975 school tax values.

* Reviewed the status of the fence around the new track.

* Discussed the purchase of land adjacent to the football field.

* Agreed not to consider the purchase of a pickup.

* Agreed to use the same insurance company, United Fidelity Insurance Co. of Dallas for student insurance next year.

* Reviewed a letter from Dr. Marlin Brockett, Commissioner of Education.

* Discussed the Tennyson voting box and the legality of closing it.

* Accepted the Textbook Commission's selection on textbooks for math and spelling.

* Heard a report from the Texas Health Resources Commission regarding lighting at the school and found candlepower deficiencies to be negligible.

* Decided not to rewrite a school philosophy at this time, but retain present policies.

* Heard a report that \$7,062 had been paid on the special education building and \$8,000 plus interest is still owed.

* Heard a report that the school will receive \$6,981 from the State Compensatory Education Program.

* Agreed to interview prospective aides for a special math program for grades 4, 5 and 6 on March 19.

Bronte is going to have a big Bicentennial celebration Saturday — just about all day — with the festivities starting at 10 a.m. and ending that night. The celebration is being sponsored by the Bronte Longhorn Band Boosters Club.

A parade will form at the old Santa Fe depot at 10 a.m. and will be led by Uncle Sam through downtown Bronte and on to the County Park.

Booths will be set up there, contests are planned and a full day of activities in honor of the nation's 200th birthday will be held.

A contest will be held for the best decorated bicycle in the parade. Theme of the day's activities, "Progress: Old to New," will allow a wide variety of ideas for decorations for the bicycles in the parade.

Games of fun and frolic will be conducted in the park, and many local clubs will have booths set up for refreshments in the park area. Activities will continue at the park until about 5 p.m. when festivities will be transferred to the Bronte School.

The Band Boosters Club will serve a spaghetti supper in the school cafeteria, beginning at 5 p.m. A sumptuous meal is promised.

The supper will be followed by a variety show in the school auditorium. A large number of entries has been signed up and more are expected. Those who have already agreed to perform include:

Bronte Longhorn trackmen scored 40 points last Saturday to finish in a tie for fifth place in a track meet held at Robert Lee. Stamford and Reagan County tied for the meet title with 84 points each. Wall was 3rd, Rankin 4th, while the Longhorns and host Steers tied for 5th.

COKE BRUCELLOSIS STANDING CERTIFIED

Word was received last week from Texas Animal Health Commission that Coke County has been recertified as a modified certified brucellosis free area. Coke County has maintained a modified certified free status since January 1961 following the county wide brucellosis testing program late in 1960.

The certificate reads as follows: "This is to certify that Coke County has been declared a modified certified brucellosis area by virtue of the fact that brucellosis has been reduced to not more than one per cent of the cattle in not to exceed five per cent of the herds as indicated by official testing and other approved procedures conducted under the cooperative State-Federal program. This certificate is valid for the period of January 13, 1976, to January 13, 1979."

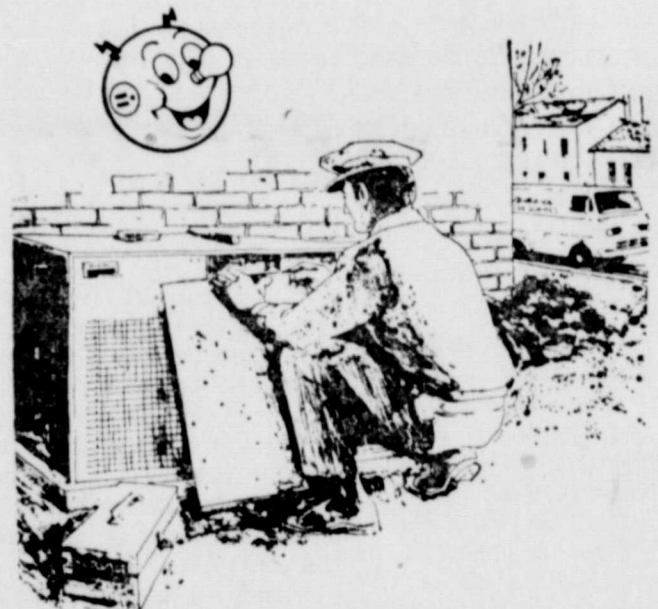

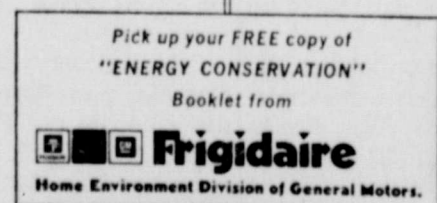

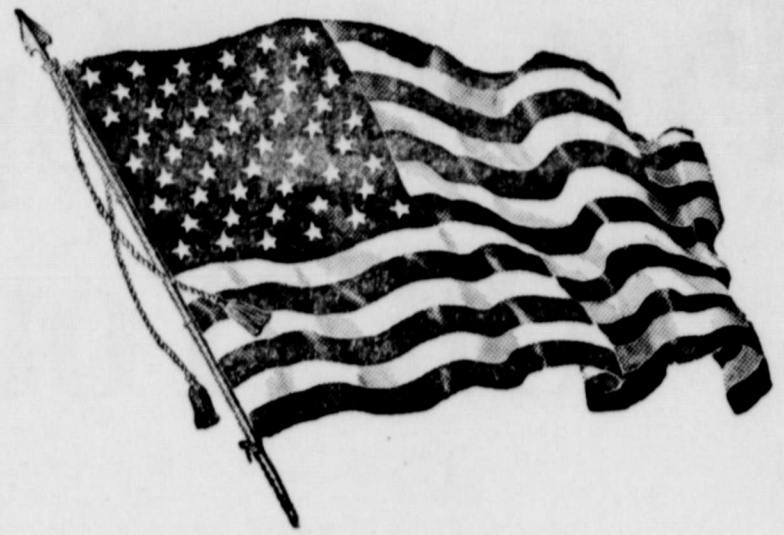
