## Improvements Being Made on Main Street

Things have been moving and changing in Bronte during the past several weeks. It's all a program to beautify the town during the Bicentennial year of 1976.

Perhaps the biggest alteration to the appearance of Main Street has been the tearing down of the old Red & White Store between Margaret's Flowers & Gifts and the Cactus Cafe. The razing of the old building left a big gap in the south side of Main, but plans are to start filling it up next week.

West Texas Utilities is going to put up a new building on the site for its Bronte office. Martin Lee has the contract for the new structure, and said work should be in

progress by Wednesday of next week.

The building will have a brick and glass front, will be 100 feet wide and approximately 35 feet deep, with parking area in the rear.

A display area for merchandise will be provided, along with office space and work area.

Completion date has been tentatively set for September.

### Mini-Park Progressing

The mini-park which is under construction north of the City Hall at the site of the old Magnolia Service Station, formerly operated by Barney Modgling and later by the late Buddy Kirkland, is coming along nicely. J. T. Henry is supervising and doing much of the tile work, and completion is expected shortly.

The old Conoco Station at the corner of Main Street and Highway 277 has been removed. No plans have been announced for any development of this site.

Mayor R. T. Caperton said this week that he is well pleased with the cleanup and beautification program which Bronte has undertaken as part of its Bicentennial celebration. "We have a lot to do," the mayor said, "but we have already accomplished quite a bit."

### Water Tower Being Painted

Work has been in progress since the latter part of last week working over the water tower here. The city has an \$8600 deal with American Tank and Tower Co. of Joplin, Mo. The company is reworking and applying three coats of epoxy finish to the interior and priming and applying one coat of paint to the exterior. The city gets a 10 year warranty on the job.

Bronte High School has once again captured the sweepstakes trophy given each year by Howard Payne University to the top school in Region IIB. The spring meet is hosted each year by the Brownwood College.

This marked the second straight year for the local youngsters to win the sweepstakes award.

## School Trustees Have May Meeting

Bill Grant was sworn in as a new member of the Bronte School board of trustees May 13, after being appointed to fill the unexpired term of James W. Lee who had resigned. The Lee family is moving to Crane after living in Bronte the past 15 years.

The board also accepted the re-

signations of Rita Hale, junior high math teacher and coach who is moving to Sonora, and Molly Weathers, second grade teacher who is moving to Wagon Mound, N. M.

In other business, the board:

- \* Reviewed a report of the TEA audit dated March 15 on pupil attendance from teacher records.

- \* Studied Title 9 guide lines and requirements and proposed some general precedents for compliance.

- \* Graciously accepted 2,000 feet of pipe from Exxon to build a fence around the new track.

- \* Approved early payment on carpet in elementary classrooms, to enjoy a considerable discount.

- \* Employed Harold Simpson as independent auditor of the school's books.

- \* Agreed to apply for USDA commodities for the school lunchroom for 1976-77.

- \* Agreed to enter into a lunchroom agreement in 1976-77 for milk and lunches under a special lunchroom program.

- \* Agreed to enter into a commitment with the Education Service Center in San Angelo for data processing in the fields of 1. pupil attendance; 2. schedule making; 3. grade reporting; 4. testing; 5. payroll.

- \* Approved final application for state foundation funds.

- \* Discussed the problem of student fees.

- \* Established procedure to follow in filling teacher vacancies.

- \* Agreed to advertise for bids to sell a 1972 International 36 passenger school bus.

### COKE COUNTY WELL MAKES 107 BARRELS

A Jameson (Strawn) Field well has been potentialled for 107 barrels of 46 gravity oil which came through a 2 1/4 inch choke and from perforations at 5,967 to 6,041 feet.

The well is Kendrick & Mulligan of Abilene No. 1 Frank Book. Location is 567 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the west lines of A. Barnhill Survey, A-1215, two miles northwest of Silver.

The pay zone was fractured with 20,000 gallons of fluid and 20,000 pounds of sand. Operator set 5 1/2 inch casing at 6,358 feet, and the hole was bottomed at 6,610 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 1,439.1.

West Texas Utilities Company (Oak Creek Power Station), P. O. Box 841, Abilene, Texas 79604, has applied to the Texas Water Quality Board for an amendment to Permit No. 03997 for a discharge not to exceed an average flow of 57,600,000 gallons per day of industrial wastewater effluent (to commingle boiler blowdown and once-through cooling water as acceptable method of pH Control) from the steam electric power station which is located on Oak Creek Reservoir ten (10) miles north of Bronte, Coke County, Texas.

It is proposed that the treated industrial wastewater effluent will be discharged into Oak Creek Reservoir, thence to Oak Creek, thence to the Colorado River. A hearing Commission of Texas Water Quality Board will hold a public hearing on this application which has been fixed for

to receive evidence on the conditions, if any, under which the amended permit may be issued, and to determine whether State Certification in accordance with Section 401 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act Amendments of 1972 may be issued.

Hearing Authority: Chapter 21-072.21.082, Texas Water Code, and Chapter V., Sections 500 and 510, Rules of Practice and Procedure of the Texas Water Quality Board.

The hearing may be continued from time to time and place to place, if necessary, to develop all relevant evidence bearing on the subject of the hearing. 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Rather than try to contact the company itself, you should contact the agent who wrote the policy. This procedure will usually save time since the agent has all the policy information necessary to report your claim. It depends upon the type of claim as to when it will be paid. If the damage is a result of a major storm, it sometimes takes slightly longer to service due to the excessive numbers of claims turned in. Normally you should be contacted within a week's time. If the damage is quite extensive, your agent should be made aware of this fact. It might be necessary to make immediate, temporary repairs to prevent further damage.
