FUNERAL SERVICES HELD WEDNESDAY FOR L. L. WILKINS

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Wednesday for Leslie Leonard Wilkins, 69, in the First United Methodist Church, Bronte. The pastor, Rev. C. Earle Lewis, officiated. Burial was in Fairview Cemetery under direction of Newby Funeral Home.

Mr. Wilkins died about 5 a.m. Tuesday at his home after an apparent heart attack.

He was born Oct. 21, 1906, in Brown County and had lived in Coke County since 1948. He was a member of First United Methodist Church in Bronte and was a past master of the Bronte Masonic Lodge. Mr. Wilkins was well known to most all the farmers and ranchers of Coke County as he had worked with them since 1948 on soil and water conservation problems. He retired from the Soil Conservation Service July 31, 1975 after 33 years of service. He helped plan and lay out most of the soil conservation programs that are now in effect in Coke County.

He was married to Ola Belle Byrd June 20, 1930, in Clovis, N. M.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Leslie L. Wilkins Jr. of Pearland and Kenneth Ray Wilkins of Fort Worth; one brother, Homer Wilkins of Abilene; one sister, Mrs. Edna Byrd of Arizona; nine grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

A son and a daughter preceded him in death.

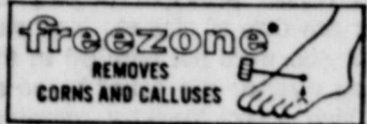

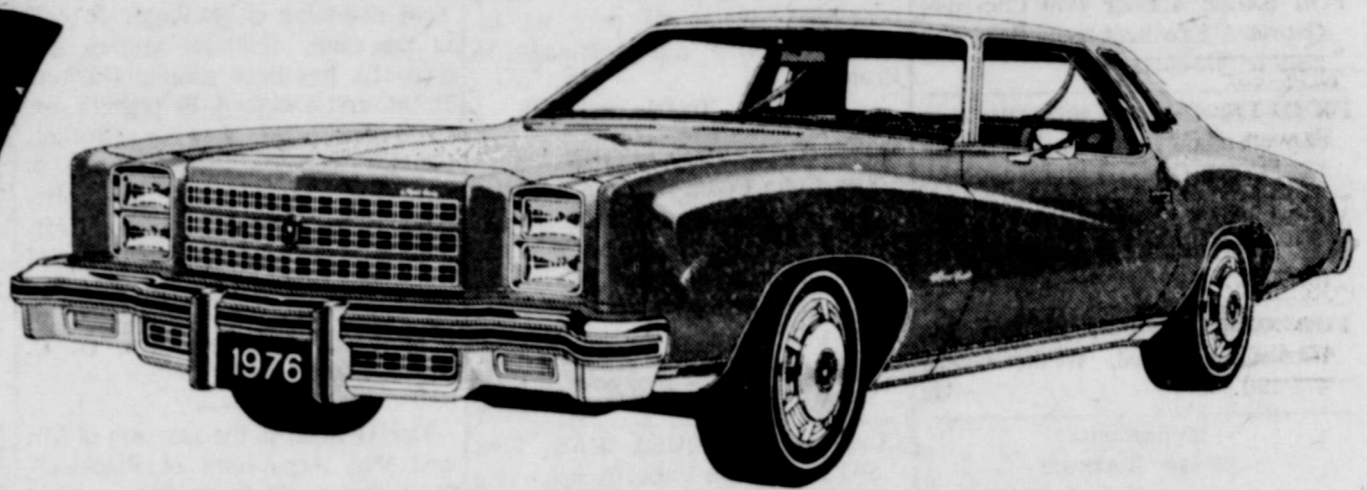
