COKE WATER GROUP HAS MEETING

An organizational meeting of the Coke County Water Supply Corporation was held September 14.

Bob Owens, attorney for the corporation, explained to the group the legal procedure for the organization of the Corporation.

William E. Fox, engineer for the corporation, discussed the study for Phase I which will be along and on either side of Hwy. 158, southwest of Robert Lee around Lake Spence.

The approved charter was presented to a large group present for the meeting. Members of the Corporation voted to elect 9 Directors for 1 to 3 year terms. Elected for 3 year terms were Floyd Harmon, Horace Scott, and Don Fields; 2 year terms: Martin Lee, Wayne McCabe and LeDrew Arrott; 1 year terms: Royce Fancher, Johnny Service and J. W. B. Robertson.

A directors' meeting was held directly after the general meeting to elect officers for the corporation. Those elected were Don Fields, President; Martin Lee, Vice-President; Horace Scott, Secretary; and Wayne McCabe, Treasurer. By-laws were approved by the Directors.

Don Fields, president of the Corporation, pointed out that persons interested in this program are urged to make application and pay membership fees because the number of persons in any one area making application determines where phase II will begin. At the present membership fees are \$100.00 per tap.

YOUNG TEXANS URGED TO REGISTER

AUSTIN—Workers in a statewide voter registration drive are making a concerted effort to reach young Texans, according to Sec. of State Mark White, who is directing the registration project.

White says statistics indicate Texans between the ages of 18 and 20 participate in elections less than any other population segment, with the 21-24 year bracket following close behind.

"We have contacted officials in virtually every high school in Texas, and we are now trying to organize registration drives in most colleges," White said. "Young Texans represent a large pool of the electorate that remains untapped, and we hope to register a large percentage by the October 1 deadline for registering to vote in the Presidential election."

White contends that most people, regardless of age, tend to vote once they complete the process of registering.

"Studies indicate that between 80 and 90 percent of registered voters do vote," White said. "All it takes to register in Texas is filling out a postcard, so if we can get our message to the people, we should see an upswing in Texas voting performance, which has been falling steadily for more than a decade."

Registration applications are available through county tax assessors or by calling White's office in Austin toll-free at 1-800-292-9602.

"Anyone interested in helping us register voters—especially young Texans—can get in touch with us at this number," White said.

CHARTER BUS GOING TO WELK PROGRAM

A charter bus will be operated to go to the Lawrence Welk Show Oct. 16. The show will be held in Abilene and the bus will run from San Angelo to Abilene and return. Persons in the Bronte and Robert Lee area will be picked up at Bronte and returned to Bronte following the show.

Cost of the trip, including the ticket and reserved seats, will be \$17.50 per person. Reservations must be made by Oct. 2 with a \$10 deposit required. Persons of Coke County may contact Mrs. R. W. Roby Lions Chew Up Longhorns, 69-0

The Bronte Longhorns suffered one of their most humiliating defeats ever when the Roby Lions came to town and whipped the Horns, 69-0. The Longhorns could do nothing right and did not register a first down until early in the fourth quarter. The only bright spot for the Horns was the punting of Wayne Coalson, who kicked ten times for an average of 44 yards.

First Quarter

The Roby team took the opening kickoff and marched straight down field, scoring in 9 plays with Britt Stuart going the final 3 yards for the touchdown. Ricky Morton kicked the PAT and with 4:59 gone in the first quarter it was 7-0.

Coalson almost broke the kickoff but was stopped on the 45. They were unable to move and Coalson punted. Billy Hamilton recovered a Lion fumble but the Horns were unable to move and Roby once again took over. The Lions picked up 2 first downs before the quarter ended.

Second Quarter

Roby continued to move downfield before Kyle James fell on another Lion fumble to give the Horns possession. Bronte couldn't move and Roby returned Coalson's punt to the Bronte 42. A Brad Stuart to James Putnam pass covered the 42 yards and the Lions had a 13-0 lead after the PAT attempt failed.

Randy Parker returned the kickoff out to his 12 yard line, from

where the Longhorns quick-kicked to the Roby 48. It took only four plays for the Lions to put 6 more points on the board and following a successful running play for the PAT the Lions had a 21-0 lead.

Following the kickoff Coalson again punted to the Lion 20. Again it took only 4 plays for the Lions to reach pay dirt with the final one being a 68-yard pass play for the TD. The PAT failed and the score was 27-0. The half ended shortly after the Roby kickoff.

Third Quarter

Parker fumbled the second half kickoff with Roby recovering at the Horn 28. The Lions scored on the first play and after the PAT failed had a 33-0 lead. The Longhorns let the ensuing kickoff roll and Roby recovered the loose ball on the Bronte 25. It took them 2 plays and a two-point extra point to push the score to 41-0.

Bronte couldn't move following the kickoff and Coalson punted. The Lions went right to work and in two plays had 6 more points. The PAT run was good and the score was 49-0.

After the kickoff and a Coalson punt the Horns got their best field position of the night by recovering a Lion fumble in Roby territory. However, on the first play a Parker pass was picked off and returned for 6 more points. A pass play on the EP was good and the Lions now had a 57-0 lead. The quarter ended shortly afterwards.

Fourth Quarter

Roby had the ball as the quarter got underway. The Longhorns held and Roby was forced to punt for the first time with the ball being killed on the Bronte 1. The Horns picked up 11 yards in three plays for their first 1st down of the night. They bogged down here and Coalson punted to the Lion 35 with a return to the 50. Two pass plays covered the 50 yards and the Lions lead 63-0. The PAT failed.

Donnie Jackson returned the kickoff to the Bronte 41. The Horns couldn't move and Coalson got off a 55-yard punt into the end zone. Roby picked up 15 yards in two plays and then a 65-yard bomb put 6 more points on the Lion side of the scoreboard. The PAT failed and the score was 69-0.

Jackson returned the kickoff to the 30. Hamilton picked up three yards and a Parker to Coalson pass gained 10. Roby then drew a 15-yard penalty. Hamilton picked up 4 before an interference call against Roby gave the Horns another first down. The Horns then fumbled the ball over to Roby who ran one play before the final buzzer with the score Roby 69, Bronte 0.

How has inflation affected life insurance?


