Mrs. Ivey Elected Committeewoman

Mr. and Mrs. Cumble Ivey Jr., delegates from Coke County, attended the Texas Democratic Convention in Fort Worth on Sept. 17 and 18. Mrs. Ivey received the high honor of being elected Committeewoman from the huge 25th Senatorial District of Texas.

The first meeting attended by Mrs. Ivey was on Thursday, a pre-convention Board of Directors meeting of Texas Democratic Chairmen. She has served on this Board of Directors for the past three years. At the Midland County Caucus and the Val Verde County Caucus Mrs. Ivey spoke in behalf of her candidacy for the position of Committeewoman to serve on the State Democratic Executive

Committee.

At the Caucus of the 25th Senatorial District, Mrs. Ivey was elected with a wide-based support, carrying 32 of the 35 counties. She ran against incumbent, Miss Juanita Camfield of Tom Green County.

Claude Brown of McCamey was the incumbent Committeeman, having served in this position on the State Democratic Executive Committee for 22 years, but declined to run for another term. Ben Boch of New Braunfels ran against Tom Henderson of Kerrville for this position and Boch was elected Committeeman.

Mrs. Ivey commented, "It is especially exciting at Convention when the Governor is from your District and he and his family spend time visiting with old friends and delegates."

Patti Lynn Ivey, who is a second year law student at SMU, joined her parents and attended the convention as a guest. She especially enjoyed visiting with Janie Briscoe Vaughan. They were ZTA sorority sisters at the University of Texas at Austin.

HAMILTON BROTHERS, JOHN HEANER REACH SEMI-FINAL STATUS

Three Bronte students have advanced to the semi-finals in the 1977 National Merit Scholarship Program. These academically talented students will have an opportunity to continue in the competition for about 3,850 Merit Scholarships to be awarded next spring.

The three students from Bronte High School who are among the 15,000 semi-finalists in the nation are Billy Hamilton and Bobby Hamilton, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Pat Hamilton, and John Heaner, son of Mrs. Dorothy Heaner.

Over 1 million students from more than 17,000 high schools entered the 1977 Merit Program by taking the 1975 Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude test-National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT-NMSQT). Semifinalists are the highest scoring students in each state; the number named in a state is proportional to the state's percentage of the nation's total graduating senior class. The Semifinalists, most of whom will complete high school and enter college in 1977, represent the top half of one per cent of the nation's most academically talented young people.

Semifinalists who attain Finalist status will compete for at least 1,000 National Merit \$1000 Scholarships. Each Finalist will compete with all other Finalists in a particular state for these scholarships that are allocated on a state representational basis. Finalists who meet the qualifications established by grantors will also be considered for about 2,850 four-year Merit Scholarships to be offered in 1977.

NMSC will release the names of Merit Scholarship winners in 1977 in three public announcements through the news media, winners of corporate sponsored four year Merit Scholarships will be announced on April 6; winners of one time National Merit \$1000 Scholarships will be named on April 20; and the announcement of college sponsored four year Merit Scholarship winners will be made on April 27.

Coke Ladies Report on European Tour

(Editor's Note: We are running another installment of the story of the trip of Mrs. Charlie Boecking and Mrs. W. T. Roach to Europe. We missed a couple of issues due to crowded conditions one week and illness the next week. We hope our readers enjoy this instalment and any subsequent ones.)

Germany and Austria

The next day was the Fourth of July and we went to Lake Tegernsee in the beautiful lake country of Upper Bavaria. As long as I live, I'll never see anything more beautiful than those twin towns Rottach and Egern at the southern end of Lake Tegernsee. We had a great Fourth of July party. In the midst of all our singing and clapping to the "Yellow Rose of Texas," our tour guide, Bob Gray, stopped the whole thing and asked us to join hands with the ones next to us for a prayer of thankfulness for our U. S. A. That was something and I can't describe how that felt so far away from home and in a country with which only 25 years ago we had been at war.

We had to leave this lovely place and return via Autobahn to Munich.

Our tour the next day took us to Salsburg, Austria, home of the Trappe family immortalized in the Sound of Music. We had some free time before lunch to shop and bingo—another country—Austria and another change of currency. First, Swiss francs; then German marks; now Austrian schillings. It taxed a banker's brain even with the help of a conversion table until one got the feel of the new coins and currency.

We saw the places where the Sound of Music was made including driving down that lane with the trees on each side that the kids were hanging from when their daddy came home. Late that afternoon we joined our group on the chartered train to Vienna. Same compartments, same seat mates.

German is spoken in all the countries we have visited. However, the Swiss near France speak French; near Italy, Italian; and there is a Latin-like dialect that is dying out. German is most prevalent. In Austria, they have their own special way of speaking German. We, in the two weeks, picked up a few words, but very few. The language is difficult. "Bitte" can mean "please" or it can mean "you are welcome" or "think nothing of it." "Danke schoen" is "Thank you" and that is important in any language.

I had not expected Vienna to be so beautiful, grand and elegant. We had a change of pace here that was welcome. One could stay in Vienna for a year and sight-see every day. Vienna's history spans a period of over two thousand years.

Stadt Park was across the street from our Hotel Inter Continental and we spent lots of time there sitting on the Castle grounds listening to Strauss waltzes and music of Vienna.

In Vienna, we visited Prater Park where the Giant Ferris Wheel is located. We saw the Spanish Riding Horse Academy. We spent the most time seeing the Vienna Opera House which was almost completely destroyed the 12th of March, 1945. Only the outer shell remained intact. It has been fully restored and had a season in 1969 of 47 different operas in 60 days.

The food was good everywhere. In fact, in my opinion, it is the biggest bargain (only bargain) in Europe. The vegetables are particularly good and fresh. The deserts are simply out of this world.

On July 9, we boarded our chartered World Airways jet to come home. We flew to Shannon, Ireland, where we refueled. We were on the ground 1½ hours with 50 minutes shopping time in the Du-

ty Free Store there. We landed again in Bangor, Maine, where we went through customs; then on to Texas to Dallas-Fort Worth Airport.

All in all, it was a great tour and I am awfully glad I went in spite of the aches and pains, but it is wonderful to be at home in the U. S. A.

General Observations About People in Europe

The typical European woman always wears a dress, shoes with heels, no hose, has short hair, goes braless, and seldom, if ever, uses deodorant. The housewife rides a bicycle wearing a dress and hat, and carries some sort of shopping bag—sometimes heavy net or plastic as well as her purse. The very young European woman or miss

Germans play is "Yes Sir, That's My Baby."
